THE IRISH NEGOTIATIONS. LONDON, July 27.

The TRISH ARCOTATIONS. LONDON, July 27. In accordance with Premier As-quith's promise, the official paper giving the heads of the agreement, arrived at recently between Lloyd George and the Irish leaders in the Irish negotiations, was issued to-night. It bears out the contention made in the debate in the Commons, by John Redmond, with regard to the retention of Irish members in the Im-perial Parliament, inasmuch as clause four merely says, Irish representation in the Imperial Parliament shall re-main unaltered, namely, 103; and says nothing concerning any substan-tial reduction in their number. With regard to the duration of the new bill, the official paper confirms Pre-mier Asquith's statement of 'July 10, namely, that if Parliament had not by twelve months after the war, made further permanent provision for the Government of Ireland, then the dura-tion of the operation of the bill shall be extended by Order in Council for such time as may be necessary to

such time as may be necessary to make such provision. The clause re-ferring to the exclusion of the Ulster counties merely defines the excluded counties, but says nothing as to whe-ther exclusion is to be permanent. An interest clause in the agreement not previously mentioned, gives the Lord Lieut. of Ireland power to summon Lieut. of Ireland power to summon conferences, between members for constituencies in the excluded area and members for the rest of Ireland. The only new feature in the Irish sit-uation to-day is that a petition is bc-ing largely signed in the Commons asking for the renewal of pegotiations for an Irish compromise on the linos suggested by John Redmond and Sir Edward Carson
