No other country's administration is—perhaps — taking less interest in the affairs of its population, than is that of Newfoundland. Personal aggrandizement appears to be the sole object of our rulers, and with the power in their possession they are not slow to take advantage of it to vote themselves large salaries out of the public revenues. 

The Battle of Naseby.

Naseby was one of the battles in great war that was fought on English soil. That was nearly 300 years ago, for which we ought to be thankful. The village of Naseby, in Northamptonshire, is very nearly in the centre of England and the surrounding country is high rolling uplands. Here, on the height called Mill Hill stood the Parliamentary army, under the command of Fairfax, on the morning of June 14, 1645. Cromwell, not yet in supreme control, had the command of the horse that day. On the opposite hill King Charles arranged his army for his last battle. The space between was called the Broad Moor. The battle was opened by Prince Rupert, on the King's right wing, charging up the hill. He routed the forces opposed to him and went on to the baggage waggons of the Parliamentary army, with a view to plunder, but was beaten off. Meanile Cromwell on the Parliamentary right, charged down the hill and routed all before him. Then, having no thoughts about plunder, he turned on the King's main army. For three hours there was hard hand-to-hand fighting, with sword and pike and musket. The field was heaped with slain and Cromwell began to get the upper hand when Rupert returned. Rupert did his best, rallied the King's cavalry, and prepared to charge. But it was too late his troopers would not face Cromwell's victorious army. They turned and fled, were pursued for miles and most of them slain. The King fled to Leicester. His coach and papers were seized. His cause was lost. He flitted from place to place, trying to raise new armies, and was finally captured, tried and executed. His crime was trying to govern the country without the interference of Parliament. Compared to the Kaiser, he was no criminal at all. If his execution was just and right, that of the Kaiser is fifty times more so.

FLOUR. - The North American Wheat crop will certainly be short and there are no grounds for belief that flour will be cheaper. On the contrary, all the indications at present point to higher flour. The U.S. Winter Wheat is one-third short of last year, and the U.S. Spring wheat sowing is so far short. The same applies generally to Canada, where in addition the growth is said to be three weeks late. Unless the weather conditions in the next few weks are as perfect as can be desired, the North American crop will be certain to show the serious shortage indicated. Leading Brands here are \$17.25 wholesale, other grades \$16.50 to \$17. Consumers here would do well to take advantage of present prices.

POTATOES .- Some small lots are due this week on the S.S. Canadian Miner from Montreal and Gulf Ports. The stocks at Charlottetown are pretty well exhausted, and potatoes are obtainable at present in small lots only. After a few weeks, it is said none will be had there at any price. United States quotations are even higher, and Cables received by dealers here this week, show that it would cost \$17 a barrel (180 lbs.) to land potatoes here from New York. The first new potatoes on the market will come from Halifax early in August, and after this there will be a steady decline in price. Bonavista Bay and Straft Shore men brought in a few hundred barrels this week and sold them at \$12 to \$13.00, after a hard struggle to make sure they could not procure \$20.00.



The movement has of the work can be presented to the public and funds gathered for its support. In the course of his address, the Pastor pointed out how a boy in the Old Testament, lived according to the spirit of scouting and proved himself useful when his prvices were needed for the sake of his country and his God. 


