



Some of the ancients regarded it as the perfect number, for it represented the beginning, the middle, and the end: it was the Trinity. So round went the canny Scott boat three times with the sun.

Fate's Grim Jests.

The strange tricks Fate plays with the lives of men is illustrated by the recent case of a diver who met his death through drowning in an ordinary bath.

The incident calls to mind the case of a sword-swallower who used to perform outside publichouses, thrusting a formidable blade several feet long down his throat as often as his admiring audience required him to do so. Yet this redoubtable steeleater died from suffocation as a result of swallowing a small fish-bone. There is an account of a Spanish bull-fighter who had earned considerable repute in one quarter of Spale only to receive a fatal kick from voung steer on the farm of one of his

friends. A similarly unlucky end was that of a circus performer whose partigular feat was to plunge into mond, chained and manacled, and liberate himself before appearing on the surface. While taking a bathe one evening this performer took a dive linto a river and, becoming entangled in some weeds, lost his life

The Sacred Carpet.

This year over nine thousand Indian troops, provided with free passages by the British Government. have visited Mecca as pilgrims. It is the life desire of every Mohammedan to journey to the holy city of Mecca. And in preparation for this pilgrimage he spends many years making his own praying carpet. This

carpet he eventually leaves behind in Mecca, which now contains millions of carpets left by pilgrims. Green is the sacred color of the Mohammedan; therefore, his mission over, he wears a green turban, to show the world he has been to Mecca. The world's riches could not buy one carpet which is borne to Mecea every year with much pomp and ceremony. It is the sacred carpet of the Mohammedans, a thick, black pile carefully woven by the most ex-

pert weavers, and large enough to cover any of our public buildings. A fresh sacred carpet is woven every year, and the one it replaces is carefully put away and preserved. Once a year the sacred carpet travels by train from Cairo to Suez with a strong retinue of soldiers, pil-

grims and priests. It crosses the Red Sea in a boat, and an imposing camel caravan escorts it over the Arabian desert to Mecca. At the tail of the great procession walk seven priests, five playing fifes and two beating drums. At Mecca the holy carpet covers

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
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
