

An opinion has been expressed at Ottawa, by an eminent legal gentleman, to the effect that the Proclamation published on Dominion Day last, by the Governor-General, disallowing the Oaths to Witnesses Act, was illegal from beginning to end, and, in fact, amounted to nothing more than an arbitrary stretch of the Vice-Regal prorogative, and resorted to by Sir John A. Macdonald in order to prevent the Committee appointed to improceeding in astraightforward manner with the enquiry.
