The shareholders of both companies, who had already indulged in bright visions of -fanciel benefits to be derived from the working of the two railways for their mutual advantage, were astonished to-day by the official announcement that Mr. George Stephen had informed Mr. Tyler yesterday (17th inst.) that in consequence of objections reised in America he is unable, for the present at all events, to carry out the arrangements recently made. I understand that the difficulty has arisen chiefly in connection with the construction and control of the Ontario and Quebec railway. 
