Chamberlain Hissed and Cheered.

London, April 13.—Mr. Chamberlain, wills

traveling to Ayr, was met at Kilmarnock sta-LONDON, April 19.—Air. Camberlain, while traveling to Ayr, was met at Kilmarnock station to-day by a crowd who insisted that he should make a speech. In complying with the request Mr. Chamberlain said that for the first time in its history the Liberal party was afflied with men whose hands were stained with blood and was assisting them to carry out an obstructive policy in Parliament, "It hope the time has arrived," he said, "when Great Britain will give an answer to the policy of intimidation. I am convinced that the bulk of the working classes will show no sympathy with those who commit these offences or with their allies. We are bound to maintain order and the union, but that need not prevent our sympathizing with people who have a practical grievance of which they rightly complain, and which it is our duty to remedy. We are not opposed to a reasonable remedy consistent with the greater interests of Great Britain, but we shall not yield to lawless agitators." Mr. Chamberlain was frequently interrupted in the course of his speech, the hisses of his opponents exceeding the cheers of his supporters.

Dr. Gilmour said the tendency of the present schools was to run the medical profession into the ground, and he did not believe that either Kingston or London was large enough to furnish a school or a hospital adequately equipped for giving a medical education. He hoped the clause establishing a medical faculty would be passed, as it would put the profession on a proper foundation and not be at the mercy of schools run for financial purposes.

Mr. Meredith warmly defended the Medical School of London against the insinuation of Dr. Gilmour, after which the remainder of the clauses were considered.

Passenger Agents Say They Will Impede
Tourist Trayel to Canada.

Montreat, April 13.—The general passenger agents of the Canadian railway and steamboat companies, now in session at the Windsor Hotel, to arrange summer excursion tariffs, have taken action in connection with the proposed new customs regulations regarding travelers baggage. It was resolved to send the following despatch to the Hou. Minister of Customs, Ottawa; "It has been considered by the general passenger agents of the Canadian railway and steamboat companies, in council, that the proposed new regulations in connection with the admission of travelers baggage from the United States to Canada are likely to seriously impede, if not altogether stop, tourist travel to Canada. It is, therefore, respectfully requested that the proposed new regulations be not put in force until such time as the companies interested in international travel have an opportunity of visiting Ottawa and explaining their views to the Government," (Signed), J. Adulterated Cream of Tartar.




