



HAMILTON'S NEW RADIAL BOAD. rried in the Railway Commit

rman's Casting Vote. There was a large attendance at the Rail way Committee yesterday morning when the Hamilton Radial Electric Railway bill was considered

Mr. John Bell, G.T.R. solicitor, was heard in opposition to the measure, which he contended was unfair to the steam railways. It would cross the Grand Trunk system about 15 times and trains would have to come to a dead stop at considerable

system about 15 times and trains would have to come to a dead stop at considerable delay and expense. The Radial Electric has power to raise bonuses from munici-paities, while the G.T.R. paid taxes, there-by forcing them to contribute to the con-struction of a rival enterprise. Mr. Holman said the road proposed to get power from Niagara Falls, and if this scheme was successful it would greatly cheapen the cost of transportation. He ad-mitted that the Grand Trunk would be in-jured, but the fact that new enterprises would injuriously affect existing lines had never been considered an objection to grant-ing railway charters if the people of the localities desired them. The fare would be not more than 2 cents per mile. All cross-ings outside of cities, towns and incorporated villages would be overhead or underneath, and in other cases they would have to be and in other cases they would have to be approved by the Railway Committee at Ottawa.

Chairman Bronson was disposed to favor cheap and rapid transit, which promised to relieve the congested condition of the

cities Mayor Stewart of Hamilton spoke briefly in favor of the bill, which had the unani-mous support of the citizens of Hamilton. Mr. F. Makcelcan, Hamilton City Solici-tor, addressed the committee in support of

the measure. The praamble of the bill was then sub-mitted and the vote stood 19 yeas to 20 nays. The Chairman then voted yea as a member of the committee, making the vote a tie, and then gave his casting vote as chairman, declaring the preamble carried. Several clauses of the bill were carried with some amendments, the amount of stock necessary to be subscribed being in-creased from \$50,000 to \$100,000.
