Fine—let us do so! But to be sure we begin by doing some clear thinking—some straight and sure road to our goal, let us thinking—on these two important questions:

- 1. What class of immigrants do we want? How are we going to attract them?

Valuable Lessons to be Learned from Past Failures.

Heretofore we have always taken it for granted—without much careful thought, perhaps—that it was farmer immigrants we most wanted,—people who would settle on our vacant land in the West, and produce more from the soil.

And complaints being loud and numerous that farming in Canada was not as profitable as it should be, we have tried to convert an unattractive situation into an attractive one by lowering the tariff on manufactured goods, in the hope of thereby lowering farm production costs, and so increasing the farmer's net.

Has that plan gotten us anywhere?

In 1924, despite tariff reductions made ostensibly to benefit agriculture, there were actually fewer farm immigrants than in 1923! And when, against the total immigration for 1923 and 1924, we offset the total emigration from our towns and cities, we find that the country has suffered a net loss!

So, obviously there is something wrong—somewhere—in the plan we have been following,—either in the assumption that it is farmers we most want, or in our method of attracting them. Perhaps it's a combination of the two.

Population Increases Should be Properly Balanced.

In shaping our policy as above, we have certainly overlooked one very important point. Farmers as a rule don't sell to farmers, but to town and city folk. So when we try to increase farm population by methods that operate to decrease town and city population, we are actually making things worse for the very people we are trying to benefit. We are curtailing a domestic market that our farmers can control, and we are increasing their dependence upon an export market over which they have no control!

An Alternative Plan that Promises Better Success.

Let us now go back to the beginning again, and start from the alternative assumption that it's primarily town and city population we want to attract.

Wrong Right?

WORLD EVENTS IN REVIEW

By G. A. MacBain

A New U. S. View on Debts

An extraordinary statement on the matter of war debts appeared in the last issue of the Manufacturers' Record in the United States which demands that the United States cancel the war debts of her allies. The statement points out that because of the war, the demands for war supplies in Europe, and the new markets opened for American trade (because the source of supply in Europe was cut off), amounted in five years to an increase of thirty-seven billion dollars over normal trade records. The statement points out that for two years of the conflict, the United States held aloof "except to grow fat on selling enormous quantities of supplies to the allies." "It was more than a year after war was decided upon by the United States against Germany," says the Record, "before we could put a single soldier on the battlefield of Europe. We have often claimed that we saved Europe. With equal truth we might say that Europe saved America. . . . Since we could not put a soldier on the battlefield for over a year, how could we do to help war to help finance the allies. Money loaned was not sent to Europe. Practically every dollar was spent here. . . . and in the main the prices paid were exorbitant and in many cases unconscionably high." The Manufacturers' Record then makes the statement that it believes that "the indebtedness of the allies to the United States should either be entirely wiped out or so materially reduced as to completely change the whole situation." It points out that the war debt situation is one upon whom right-minded Americans look "with shame-facedness and sorrow" and that it makes the suggestion "primarily on behalf of the people of the United States and only secondly on behalf of Europe." It is one of those rare appeals for leniency to war-weary Europe which go far towards establishing a right feeling between the United States and her late allies and admits a situation which has long been patent to people outside the Republic.

Vodka Again

Russia is once more in the public eye through the abolition of the prohibitory laws on the use of vodka. The soviet-ridden country during the past week has had an orgy of drunkenness which has added to the picture of desolation of that unhappy country. It may be an admission of worse conditions that the rest of the world realizes, for Duke Nicholas, former commander of the Russian armies in the Great War, speaking in Paris, says that hunger will eventually defeat the government of Russia. Vodka may have been thrown to them as a means of quieting the pangs of hunger, which according to the Grand Duke, grows keener every day. The Grand Duke believes foreign intervention incapable of doing anything for Russia and that the European nations are quite right in refraining

from interfering with the course of Russian events.

Hope from Locarno

The nations which are sitting around the conference table at the little Swiss city of Locarno are apparently making greater headway than had been made at any of the four previous conferences in the interests of European peace. This time Germany has been received on a basis of equality. Probably the most dramatic incident was the trip made to a small neighboring Swiss town by M. Briand, French Delegate, and Dr. Luther, German Chancellor. They went alone and spent several hours in a Swiss inn in a man-to-man talk about the positions of their respective countries, and it is believed their meeting will be productive of more permanent good than many formal conferences of delegates. It is now assumed that Germany will enter the League of Nations, and some doubt regarding Italy's position has also been cleared upon by the announcement that she will support Britain in the Rhineland pact and throw her weight either with France or Germany in the event of either being attacked by her neighbor. The recent assent of Germany to the allies terms concerning German reservations in the League make both her entry into the League and the consummation of the Security Pact practically certain.

World Conference in Ottawa

The conference of the Interparliamentary Union have shifted this week from Washington to Ottawa. Nearly four hundred representatives from forty-one leading nations of the world are in the party. This is the twenty-third year of its work. The delegates' first impression of Canadian hospitality was received through the railway accommodation provided on their way from Washington to Toronto, which was much more elaborate than that provided in the United States, including parlor cars and every modern railway convenience. The visitors were charmed and delighted both with the travelling accommodation and the arrangements for handling their luggage and transporting them from trains to hotels, and so on. Canada had a splendid opportunity for a timely bit of railway advertising, and grasped it. From Toronto the party went on to Ottawa where on Tuesday they held the first Canadian session in the history of the Union.

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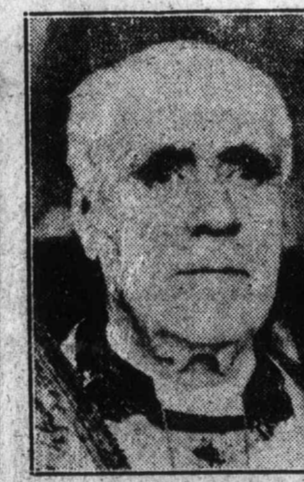

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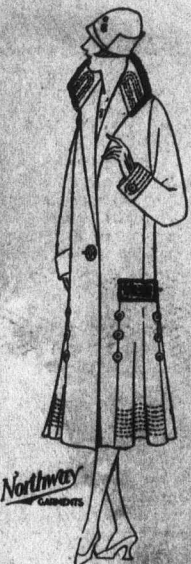
