

Generally speaking the most profitable application of rape in Ireland is soiling or feeding off with sheep. It is also cultivations in the state of ed for the sake of the seed, and although in this manner considerable sums are realised, yet it is questionable whether on the aggregrate of seasons (except in the more favourable districts of the north east coast) this application of the crop can be consider ed at all times beneficial to the farmer. Rape possesses that convenient pliability of character and hardness of constitution, that sow or plant it when or where you will, it is sure to make a vigorous struggle to exist; and although the climate may in some cases render it expedient to cultivate it exclusively for its seeds, as a green crop for winter or spring feeding it is invaluable, yielding as it does an abundant supply of the most nutritious food at a season when turnips and mangel are equally exhausted and before the winter vetch, clover, or Ita-

lian rye-grass are fit for use. One great advantage which the culture of rape presents is, the facility with whiel it may be produced on inferior soils. Rape may often obviate the necessity of an en-tire summer fallow upon such soils, for it may be eaten on the ground by sheep in onth of September, and thus a crop of wheat be sown the same year.

As a stolen crop, (or a crop taken in the interval between harvest and spring), rape becomes particularly valuable to the farmer. It will often yield a good cutting in October, when the frosts have stripped the clover of its leaves, and before the turnips are fit for use, and come in afterwards spring when the turnips-are exhausted, and before the winter vetch is sufficiently

As an intermediate crop it may be culti-uated in various ways. Should the crop it is to succeed be likely to remain too long on the ground, a seed-bed should be sown in June, and the plants transplanted out, as soon as possible after the previous crop. If after vetches, the rape plants should be put in ridge after ridge, as the vetches are cut, giving the ground a dressing of manure. In a great majority of cases the vetches will be off the ground in sufficient land. It is situa ed in the cled Town of Clinton.
Clinton, Aug. 10, 1855. time to sow the seed, transplanting in such cases may be dispensed with. It, however, the vetches had been fed off with sheep, the ground will be sufficiently rich for the rape. In give five or six weeks feeding of a warm and nutritious kind, at the scarcest season of the year, and the ground cleared off for a spring crop. Mr. Blacker advises, with a view to saving the turnips, that the rape land he cover with the vector which will land be sown with late vetches, which will

Rape may be sown with advantage on a well prepared fallow, as by overshadowing the land it will fertilise it much; and if on sandy or gravelly soils, and fed off by sheep, it will fit it for a crop of barley. "It may also be sown without manure on a stubble, on which a good crop of brush turnips could not be expected; for although it will not afford much keep during the winter, yet the manure deposited by flock of sheep, and the benefit derived fr the roots when ploughed in, will ultimately promote the fertility of the soil. When rape is sown in this way, it would not be icious to let it stand for seed, as the land not being manured, and the seed late sown, the crop would not produce well, and would leave the land very foul.'*

Quantity of produce.—It is difficult to estimate green food by weight, so much depends upon the state of the weather or hours of the day at which it is cut. Mr. S20tt, of Lurgaboy, near Market-hil', states, in a letter to Mr. Blacker, that he obtained in a cutting in January, 31 stone, 5 pounds, from an English perch; and that he would have a second cutting in March, and a third one in May.
