A prominent strawberry grower in the Lyn district is feeling much elated over the late rains, without which, he says, the crops this year would have proved an almost total failure. As it now stands the chances for a good crop are excellent.

Forty years ago raw silk was produced only in Italy, France. Spain, Greece and Syria, but the production of these countries now only amounts to one-fifth of the production of the world. China and Japan are the great producers of silk, and the regulators of prices.

In connection with the growth of the Japanese cotton industry it may be stated Japanese cotton industry it may be stated that a Japanese gentleman has just sailed from England after having lelt orders with local firms for the equipment of six mills in Japan, ranging from 15,000 to 40,000 spindles each. In addition to this an gorder has been placed for 1,000 looms with a Lancashire firm.

A cablegram from Ambassador Bayard informed Secretary Olney that ratifications of the Behring Sea Claims treaty had been exchanged. The treaty will not be made nublic here until its promulgation in London, as it is desired to have it appear ainfultaneously in Great Britain and the United States. a Lancashire firm.

The enquiry into the charges of uncommercial conduct against Messas. Armour & Co. by the Chicago Board of Trade, for issuing short warehouse receipts, resulted in the dismissal of the charges against Armour & Co., the whole force of the blame and punishment falling upon Mr. A. A cable from Barbadoes has been received quoting molasses down another cent to 10c first cost, equal to about 261c to 27c laid down here. A small lot of new Barbadoes was sold on this market to arrive at 281c, but more was offered without getting buyers.

Advices from Eastport, Mc., are to the effect that 92 yer cent of all the saidine packers have joined the combination. The next meeting will be held on June 19th and in the meantime efforts will be made to bring the scheme into accord with the laws of Maine regulating trusts, &c.

Onions commence to arrive from Bermuda in January, but not until April do the receipts foot up to any material quantity. During April and May arrivals are very large, and early in June the season closes. The arrivals this year to June 1st have been 241,236 crates, against 219,345 crates to June 1st last year and 138,521 crates same period the previous year.


Laporte Martin & Co. wish to state that during the months of July and August, they will close on Saturdays at 1 o'clock.

Advices from Portugal state that the catch of small sardine fish has been very light and that large fish have not been plentiful. It is impossible to pack any quarters. Higher prices, the report said, are expected soon.

Lake freight rates on wheat have taken quite a tumble, owing to the competition of American vessels, and instead of the three-cent rate of the early part of the season, the shippers are offering only 25 cents. Several charters at that figure have been accepted for carriage between Fort William and Bullalo.

President Cleveland has approved the act releasing distillers of fruit brandy from "any provision relating to the manufacture of spirits except as to the tax thereon," when the Commissioner of Internal Revenue may deem it expedient to do so. The act repealing the section of the Wilson tariff law making free of tax alcohol used in manufactures and the arts has also been approved by the President..

Insurance companies doing business in the Southern States complain that there has been considerable falling off in receipts since the first of the year, and that unless there is a marked change after the opening of the cotton season, 1896 will show a derided retrograde movement in this respect. While losses have held up a trifle the fires in Texas, Kentucky and Georgia have made the question of profit in these States extremely doubtful. One of the causes to which is attributed the decline in premiums is that it is a Presidential year, and most of the agents in the rural districts are making free silver speeches instead of trying to earn a sound dollar.

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
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The past week has been the busiest during the spring trade season for Laporte Martin & Co. The bulk of the business was done in the grocery department.

The report that the Columbia and Williamette rivers are rapidly rising has been without influence on the salmon market, although if the flood continues it is believed that the catching of fish on the upper river will be stopped.

The advance of twenty-five cents per keg on blasting powder, which was put into effect on Monday of last week by the Hazard, the Laslin & Rand and the Dupont & Nemours powder companies was tollowed on Monday last by an advance of seventy five cents per keg on black sporting pow-ders by the same companies.

Laporte Martin & Co. have recently received their cargo of Barbadoes molasses and have shipped 200 puncheons during the past week.

AMERICAN SHAER.

There are probably but few of our merchants who have not noticed and commented on the manner in which American silver is replacing the Canadian coinage in all our leading cities. It is hardly possible in any of our lusiness centres to secure a dollar's worth of change without finding among it a number of American coins -usually well-worn, and often defaced —and, as it is an open secret that these "plugged" coins are deliberately imported by railway conductors, baggage men and other employes, who purchase them at rates varying the National banks. This act is inter-

from 65 cents to 80 cents in the dollar in the United States, and then put them into circulation in this country at par, the loss to Canada can readily be imagined. Plugged coins are resolutely refused in every city in the United States. In fact, in some States it is an offence against the law to even attempt to pass them. Yet they are imported in quantities into this Dominion, and although the larger corporations refuse to receive them in settlement of accounts, they seem to have no hesitation in paying them out to the public.

Now this circulation of debased foreign coinage naturally prevents, or, at the very least, diminishes the coinage of Canadian silver to supply the demands of trade, besides involving the loss of the seignorage, which, at the present value of silver, is very large. It has also caused apprehension, owing to the rapidity and amount of its importation, of a repetition of the "silver nuisance" which existed in this Province for the seven years preceding 1870. It must be remembered that this money is not received in the legitimate course of trade. It is deliberately purchased in large quantities for the purpose of foisting it upon our citizens, and much of it is not a lawful tender in the country whose imprint it bears. To have, therefore, \$3,000,000 in American silver and \$3,000,000 m American bills current in the Dominion, simply involves the loss of that amount of circulation to the Canadian Government and the banks.

To meet this evil two courses are suggested. The first is that adopted by the British Government at the MONTREAL. time when the French two-sous pieces were being imported into England for a similar reason. The moment they discovered that the importation of French coppers had become a regular and lucrative business, they promptly made the payment of wages in foreign coinage illegal. This put an instant stop upon the practice, and the French sou, which had almost displaced the English penny, at once disappeared from circulation. This course was suggested by the late Sir Francis Hincks in this country in 1870, and would doubtless have proved equally effective, had it been put into force.

> The second suggestion is to fellow the policy of the United States in protecting its currency by imposing a tax of 10 per cent on all banks, corporations, firms or individuals issuing notes intended for circulation other than notes of the United States, or of

A large number of these notes are current in Canada, and, as they are only payable in silver, which is to-day at a parity of 31 to 1, they may depreciate in value at any moment without in any way involving a breach of faith on the part of the United States government, which expressly stipulates that they are not to be paid in gold.

The Canadian Government are as much interested in this question as the bankers; for it is a well-known currency law that an inferior coinage will always drive a superior one out of circulation. Up to the present the banks have received it at par and course, so far from decreasing the amount in circulation, has absolutely increased it; for it has established its credit with the public and thus has added to the volume imported. At present it is simply pouring in, and unless Mr. Foster makes up his mind to take some active steps in the matter, our Canadian currency will be high. gradually forced out of circulation and its place taken by the discredited coinage of a foreign country.

THE LONDON & LANCASHIRE.

One of the staunchest and strongest of the British life assurance offices doing business in this country is the London & Lancashire Life, of which Mr. B. Hal Brown is General Manager. It has insurance in force, in this country alone, amounting to \$6,870,461, and its Canadian premium income last year had risen to \$207,-509, or nearly 22 per cent of the total net income of the company. The new business during the past year amounted to \$1,059,775, of which 8882,500 is credited to its Canadian branch, and the care with which these risks were selected is shown by the fact that the death claims have again fallen considerably under expectations The total income of the company is now 81,173,395, and the fact that twenty per .ent of the total insurance carried by British companies in Canada must be credited to the London & Lancashire shows the energy of its Canadian managers in a very favorable light.

The company and Mr. Hal Brown are to be congratulated upon securing Mr. J. L. Kerr as Assistant Manager, as this is an additional guarantee that its onward march of progress towards prosperity will continue unchecked. Mr. Kerr was formerly connected with both the Confederation and Manufacturers' Life, and is thoroughly conversant with the business of life insurance in Canada.

THE POSITION OF COPPER.

The past month opened with a comparatively dull market for American copper. Prices of Lake ranged from 103 to 11c, spot copper commanding a premium on account of the supply available for prompt delivery being limited. Before the first half of the month expired an improvement occurred and values showed a hardening tendency. At this time the Calumet and Hecla Co. entered the market and succeeded in selling 20,000,000 lbs. of their product at 11c per pound for the successive minutes up to October. Of this amount 16,000,000 to 17,000,000 pounds were taken by home manufacturers, the balance being for export to Europe. Since this sale the market developed decided firmness with a marked tendency to advance. Aside from this sale, and in addition thereto, other Lake copper was sold in considerable quantities from 11c up to 114c, mostly at the latter figure, with some at 11ic. Domestic consumers having allowed their stock of copper to run pretty low before making recent new contracts, and with consumption said to be on the mend, it is probable manufacturors may require to make further additions to their stock between now and the fall. There have likewise been extensive purchases of electrolytic brands recently from 11c to 111c. Copper, both in America and abroad, gives evidence of being in a most healthy condition, and with notable indications of awakened activity on this side of the Atlantic, a readjustment and a decided movement in prices may be confidently expected. European consumption shows a marvellous increase, amounting during the first quarter of this year, per reliable estimates, to 50 per cent in England, and 75 per cent in Germany, compared with same period last year. Consumption in England, Germany and France the first three to four mouths of 1896 has been at the unprecedented rate of over 175,000 tons per annum, or equal to more than the entire American production for the year 1895. Stocks of G. M. B. cupper in Europe are now down, on June 1, to the low cbb of 26,680 tens, the balance of stocks consisting of about 5,000 tons matte and other stuff. In January, 1888, the fereign stocks amounted to 104,000 tons, with Chili bars at £85 per ton, and Lake copper in New York selling as high as 17c. Notwithstanding the heavy shipments from this country, Europe has demonstrated its ability to absorb the supplies which have poured into the foreign market, and advices from the best sources are of a very sanguine character regarding the future course of the market, and continued good European demand.

A NEW MARINE ENGINE.

Remarkable results were obtained with the engines of a new steamer, the Inchmons, recently built at West Hartlepool, England. The object to be attained was to limit the consumption of fuel to 1.15 pounds of coal to one horse power an hour, and, if possible, to get still nearer to the ideal of one pound to one horse power. In trials extending over two days, with the vessel at the dock, the consumption was 1.07 pounds per hour, one run being actually a shade under a pound. The engines worked at eighty revolutions per minute, steam being easily maintained at a pressure of 225 pounds. To keep the steam dry, not only in the boilers, but in the engine, unusual precantions were taken, an "initial receiver" being added to the superheater, and the system of steam jacketing for the cylinders, the exhaust control, and the steam feeding arrangement were extraordinarily complete. In regard to the engines, the most interesting feature is their arrangement on five cranks, there being two lowpressure cylinders, and the cranks being set at equal angles round the crank path. The engines, therefore, work on the quintuple principle, each of the five cranks being driven by one of the five cylinders. While there has been of late no large demand for any of the different varieties of California dried fruits, with the exception of loose muscatel raisins, stocks have been worked down to narrow limits by the steady movement into consumption during the past few weeks. The season started with a short supply of apricots, but the comparatively high prices checked consumption. There has, however, been a sufficiently good demand to at sorb supplies, and at the present time there is very little stock left. The late frost in California was particularly severe on apricots, and from present indications the crop will be even lighter than that of last year. THE REPORT OF LA BANQUE NATIONALE.

The thirty-sixth annual meeting of the above bank was held in Quebec on the 20th of May. The report gives the profits of the year, after providing for accrued interest on deposits, as \$126,991. This is over 6 per cent on the capital, which is regarded as "satisfactory." The sum was distributed as follows: \$48,000 was taken to pay two semi-annual dividends of 2 per cent: \$50,895 was absorbed by bad and doubtful debts, leaving \$28,096 to be carried to the credit of profit and loss, the balance of which is \$42,260. This bank tells us what has been written off for bad debts-a policy we favor as a rule. These losses are explained to have been "the result of operations made previous to the administration ' of the present Board. We trust such explanstions will not be called for in any future report. The resources of the Nationale are amply sufficient to bring its condition into a far more prosperous state than that which at present exists. What the bank needs is a decided policy, pushed for all it could be made worth by the manager, with a single eye to the one object of restoring the prestige of the Nationale. The report announces the retirement of Mr. Crebsess, the general manager, owing to failing health. Mr. P. Lafrance has assumed the position, and will, we trust, do good work in making the bank once again strong and prosperous, as it could be by sound and vigorous management.

THE SILK SALES.

In comparison with business done recently in an ordinary way the average would probably fall short by from 74 to 10 per cent and would work out somewhat better on the whole offering of blacks than last October. In colored and fancy silks results were not so good. These were naturally affected by the lateness of the sale and by the variations of of these from regular quotations would run f: an 20 to 25 per cent average and 10 to 15 per cent under recent sales in the open market, while in all instances where comparisons were available they showed s material decline from last October. First choice in fancies is a great consideration and there were instances of fully 20 per cent more being paid for first pick over than what the last lot of the same line sold at. THE LOT OF THE FARMER.

The report of the United States Secretary of Agriculture contains some facts and figures which present the lot of the farmer in a very encouraging light. So much has been said in recent years about the alleged burdens and distresses of the crop-raising class that it is refreshing to read something of the opposite character, and to learn from the official statistics that the most of this wailing has been nothing but lying. This report shows, to begin with, that the farms of the United States have an average value, including implements, of \$4000 for a family averaging six persons. These farms have fed the owners and their familics and 40,000,000 dwellers in towns and cities, besides supplying \$500,000,000 worth of products for foreign consumers annually. The mortgages on farm values aggregate only 16 per cent-that is to say there is an incumbrance of but \$1600 on each \$10,000 of rural real estate—which is less than in any line of industry or on any other form of property; and the value of farm lands is steadily increasing and must continuo to do so as the population increases, which is not true of manufacturing plants and other kinds of mortgaged property. "How can any one dare to assert," the Secretary says, in view of such At the large trade sales of silks in New facts, "that farming is generally unremunerative and unsatisfactory to those

with those of merchants, manufacturers and general traders.

A SIGNIFICANT STATEMENT.

The address of Mr. John P. Townsend, President of the Bowery Savings Bank, delivered before the Manhattan Club of New York, is one of those statements of actual conditions which deserves the attention of wage-carners. Mr. Townsend points out that there is now on deposit in the savings banks of the United States, \$1,800,000,000. This huge sum represents the savings of five millions of denositors. The average share of each depositor, to be sure, is not great, only \$371.36, but to thousands upon thousands of these depositors, their deposits represent their security from want, and their outlook upon life. Furthermore, these small depositors compose the most valuable element in our national life. So long as the gold standard is retained, every dollar of this colosal sum, affecting the prosperity and happiness of tens of thousands of homes, will be paid in money worth 100 cents to the dollar. If the nation decides to make 80 cents worth of silver, or 50 cents' worth, or 30 cents' worth equal to a gold dollar in debt-paving power, this vast creditor class will be paid in that kind of money. It does not take 5,000,000 voters to determine the result of a national election, and though each depositor may not be a voter, there are comparatively few of them that do not influence a vote. When we come to analyze the "debtor" and "creditor" classes, it will be found that the creditor class is by no means limited to the persons whom those interested in silver mines are fond of denominating " gold bugs," " Wall Street Shylocks," and " Eastern money lenders."





FINANCIAL.

The stock market continues dull, and there is a tendency towards lower prices visible in most of the leading lines. The traffic returns from both railways showed satisfactory increase, and money closed more plentiful at 5 per cent on call. But horrowers were few, and there seems to be a general agreement to let stocks alone until the turmoil of the elections is over.

In New York the political situation cansed considerable disturbance in stocks. The outlook at the St. Louis convention caused an unexpected liquidation, with the result that the market broke badly. It is evident that the 16 to 1 delusion is still a factor in the Presidential election, and until the platform of both parties is made public, Wall street will continue to be nervous and unsettled.

In New York money on call runs from 13 to 2 per cent, and prime piercantile paper discounts at from 4½ to 5 per cent. In London call money still ranges round 1 per cent, and the rate of discount in the open market has fallen to 3 per cent. Sterling exchange is firm both in New York and here. In New York posted rates are 4.88 for sixties and 4.89 for demand. Actual rates are 1.871 for staties and 4.883 for demand. Commercial bills, 4.86 to 4.863. In this market sterling exchange was firm. Between banks sterling sixties were 93 to 9 7-16; demand, 95 to 93, and cables 97. Over the counter sixties were 95 to 93; demand drafts, 95 to 10, and cables, 10%. New York funds were 1 to 1-10 discount between banks, and par over the counter.

Bar silver continues to maintain its value, in view of the possible endorsation of the white metal by the two political bodies across the border. In London it closed higher, at 31 5-16d per ounce. The New York prices for commercial bars is unchanged at 68% to 69% per ounce, Government assay bars, 68% to 69%c.



For the four months ending April 30 the gross earnings were \$5,759,763, an increase of \$1,156,313 as compared with the corresponding period of last year, and net \$1,797,313, an increase of \$400,000.

The advices from Eastport by mail are the effect that the saidine packers of Maine have concluded to form an alliance against low prices. Nearly all of the packers have gone into the combination, having been induced to take this step by the very unprofitable prices which have been realized on their product in distributing markets for several years past in consequence of over production and the large quantity of trash packed. The object of the combination is to insure a better average quality of fish packed, and more remunerative prices to the packer. If the scheme proposed is successful it is said that prices can be held up to profitable figures, because the plan contemplates the packing of a better grade, and will prevent the sharp competition which has demoralized the market in the past.
