

A Message was received from His Excellency the Governor General, desiring the immediate attendance of the House in the Senate Chamber :--

The House attended accordingly; and being returned, Mr. Speaker informed the House that, during the Recess, he had received communications from several Members, notifying him that the following vacancies had occurred in the representation, viz.:--

Of Arthur R. Dickey, Esq., Member for the Electoral District of Cumberland, by the acceptance of an office of emolument under the Crown;

Of the Hon. Felix Geoffrion, Member for the Electoral District of Vercheres. by decease ;

Of Walter Humphries Montague, Esq., Member for the Electoral District of Haldimand, by the acceptance of an office of emolument under the Crown ; and

Of the Right Hon. Sir John S. D. Thompson, K.C.M.G., Member for the Electoral District of Antigonish, by decease :

And that he had issued his several Warrants to the Clerk of the Crown in Chancery to make out new Writs of Election for the said Electoral Districts respectively.

Mr. Speaker further informed the House that, during the Recess, the Clerk of the House had received from the Clerk of the Crown in Chancery, a certificate and return of the Hon. Arthur R. Dickey, for the Electoral District of Cumberland.

Mr. Foster introduced a Bill No. 1, respecting the administration of Oaths of. Office: which was read the first time.

Mr. Speaker reported His Excellency's Speech from the Throne, and read a copy thereof to the House, which is as follows :---

Honourable Gentlemen of the Senate :

Gentlemen of the House of Commons:

It is with much satisfaction that I again have recourse to your advice and assistance in the administration of the affairs of the Dominion.

By the sudden and lamented death of the late Right Honourable Sir John Thompson, Canada has sustained a grievous loss. The deep and heartfelt sympathy expressed by Her Most Gracious Majesty the Queen, and the manifestations of sorrow with which the distressing intelligence was received throughout the Empire, as well as tokens of esteem and respect everywhere paid to the memory of the deceased statesman, have been gratefully appreciated by the people of Canada.

Satisfactory assurances having been received from Her Majesty's Government respecting the interpretation of certain clauses in the Treaty of Commerce with France, ratifications will be exchanged as soon as the necessary legislation has been passed.

The recent action of the Imperial Parliament enabling the various Australasian Governments to enter into preferential trade relations with the other self-governing Colonies of the Empire, affords gratifying proof that the suggestions of the Colonial Conference are being favourably entertained by Her Majesty's Government.

In conformity with a recent judgment of the Lords of the Judicial Committee of the Privy Council, to the effect that the dissentient minority of the people of Manitoba have a constitutional right of appeal to the Governor General in Council against certain Acts passed by the Legislature of the Province of Manitoba in relation to the subject of education, I have heard in Council the appeal, and my decision thereon has been communicated to the Legislature of the said Province. The papers on the subject will be laid before you.

The depression in trade which has prevailed throughout the world for the past few years has made itself felt in Canada, but fortunately to a less degree than in most other countries. Although this has not resulted in any considerable decrease in the volume of our foreign trade, yet, owing to low prices and recent reductions in, and removal of, taxation, it has been followed by a serious decrease in revenue derived from Customs and Excise. In order to produce equilibrium between revenue and expenditure for the coming year, it will be necessary to observe the greatest possible economy in the appropriations for the various branches of the public service.

During the period that has elapsed since the last Session of Parliament, I have had an opportunity of visiting many portions of the Dominion, including the Maritime Provinces, Manitoba, the North-west Territories and British Columbia. Throughout these tours I have been impressed and gratified by manifestations of an abounding loyalty and public spirit; and notwithstanding the phase of trade depression already referred to, I observed everywhere unmistakable signs of that confident hopefulness in the future, based on a thorough belief in the greatness of the resources of Canada, which is one of the characteristics of her people, and which furnishes a good augury and pledge of further development and progress.

The Government of Newfoundland having intimated its desire to renew negotiations looking to the admission of that colony into the Dominion of Canada, a subcommittee of my advisers have recently met in conference a delegation from the Island Government and discussed with them the terms of union. It will be a subject of general congratulation if the negotiations now pending result in the incorporation of Her Majesty's oldest colonial po-se-sion into the Canadian Confederation.

Measures relating to bankruptcy and insolvency, and to joint stock companies will be laid before you. You will also be asked to consider certain amendments to the Insurance Act, to the Act respecting Dominion Notes, to the Dominion Lands Act, to the Indian Act, to the North-west Territories Representation Act, as also a Bill respecting the land subsidy of the Canadian Pacific Railway Company.

Gentlemen of the House of Commons:

I have directed that the accounts of the past year shall be laid before you. The Estimates for the ensuing year will also be presented. They have been framed with every regard to economy compatible with the efficiency of the public service.

Honourable Gentlemen of the Senate:

Gentlemen of the House of Commons:

I now leave you to the discharge of the important duties devolving upon you with an earnest prayer that, being guided by the spirit of wisdom and patriotism your deliberations may, under the divine blessing, conduce to the unity and wellbeing of Canada.

On motion of Mr. Foster, His Excellency's Speech was ordered to be taken into consideration to-morrow.

Resolved,—That Select Standing Committees of this House for the present Session be appointed for the following purposes :—1. On Privileges and Elections.— 2. On Expiring Laws.—3. On Railways, Canals and Telegraph Lines.—4. On Mis cellaneous Private Bills.—5. On Standing Orders.—6. On Printing.—7. On Public Accounts.—8. On Banking and Commerce.—9. On Agriculture and Colonization, which said Committees shall severally be empowered to examine and inquire into all such matters and things as may be referred to them by the House; and to report from time to time their observations and opinions thereon; with power to send for persons, papers and records.

Mr. Speaker laid before the House,-The Report of the Joint Librarians of Parliament, which is as follows :--

TO THE HONOURABLE THE SPEAKER OF THE HOUSE OF COMMONS.

The Joint Librarians of Parliament have the honour to report as follows for the year 1894:-

The Colonial Conference of July and the later conference with delegates from Newfoundland, prove in the most striking manner the value of the large collection of Imperial and Colonial official reports and publications which the Librarians make constant efforts to maintain and increase. The space occupied by such collections is necessarily large, and like all the space in the Library is rapidly drawing to an end.

The Library contains a collection of manuscripts of great historical value, such as the correspondence of the Government of Canada with the Home Government, during the French regime; the Chisholm papers, the voyage of Henry to the Northwest, 1798-1814. It has been suggested on several occasions that these manuscripts should be made more available to those interested in the early history of the country. As far back as 1861, a petition bearing the signatures of several historians, &c., was presented to the Library Committee praying that these papers be printed for distribution.

The Librarians take the liberty to recommend the carrying out of that suggestion. One or two volumes might be printed every year at a small outlay—half for distribution to members of Parliament and educational institutions, and the balance to be sold at cost price. The whole collection would form about ten quarto volumes.

Additions of scarce and valuable works have been made during the past year to the *Canadiana* or section of old books on Canada, viz.: The Journals of the Legislative Assembly of Upper Canada for 1801 and 1802, which number among the earliest imprints of that province; also a very rare book entitled: "Histoire de la guerre contre les Anglais (1759-60)," by Poullin de Lumina.

The discussion of educational questions during the year will justify the effort made to provide information on the general question of education as well as on the special question before the public.

Among the additions to the Library during the year may be mentioned a set of Irish National Manuscripts, volumes which exhibit facsimiles of some of the most remarkable manuscripts in the world. Among the donations we have to acknowledge a set of the invaluable papers of the Royal Engineers from 1880 to 1893 (36 vols.). These papers are specially useful as containing information of use in regard to colonial defence.

In view of the constant discussion of labour questions, a complete set of the reports of the Royal Commission on Labour has been added to our collection, apart from the ordinary set of Imperial blue books. These reports contain a vast amount of information on the condition of labour in the United Kingdom and abroad.

The discussion and legislation in the United States on the Customs tariff of that country have induced the Librarians to provide full sets of the special Tariff Bulletins issued by the Treasury Department. These Bulletins are bound and indexed and contain statistical information of great value as well as a large body of opinions and voluntarily communicated by experienced business men.

The introduction of the Bankruptcy question into the work of the last Session made the procuring of the latest works on that subject imperative. In some cases, duplicate copies of the most recent volumes have been provided.

The annual catalogue of additions to the Library during the year has been prepared and is ready for immediate distribution.

The list of donations and of copyrights has been prepared and is attached hereto.



We are pleased to be informed by Your Excellency that the recent action of the Imperial Parliament enabling the various Australasian Governments to enter into preferential trade relations with the other self-governing Colonies of the Empire, affords gratifying proof that the suggestions of the Colonial Conference are being favourably entertained by Her Majesty's Government.

We thank Your Excellency for informing us that, in conformity with a recent judgment of the Lords of the Judicial Committee of the Privy Council, to the effect that the dissentient minority of the people of Manitoba have a constitutional right of appeal to the Governor General in Council against certain Acts passed by the legislature of the province of Manitoba in relation to the subject of education, Your Excellency has heard in Council the appeal; that Your Excellency's decision thereon has been communicated to the legislature of the said province; and that the papers on the subject will be laid before us.

We are glad to hear from Your Excellency that the depression in trade which has prevailed throughout the world for the past few years has made itself felt in Canada to a less degree than in most other countries. We regret, however, to learn that, although this has not resulted in any considerable decrease in the volume of our foreign trade, yet that, owing to low prices and recent reductions in and removal of taxation, it has been followed by a serious decrease in revenue derived from Customs and Excise. We respectfully concur in Your Excellency's opinion that in order to produce equilibrium between revenue and expenditure for the coming year, it will be necessary to observe the greatest possible economy in the appropriations for the various branches of the public service.

We are pleased to be informed by Your Excellency that during the period that has elapsed since the last Session of Parliament, Your Excellency had an opportunity of visiting many portions of the Dominion, including the Maritime Provinces, Manitoba, the North-west Territories and British Columbia; that throughout these tours Your Excellency was impressed and gratified by manifestations of an abounding loyalty and public spirit; and that, notwithstanding the phase of trade depression already referred to, Your Excellency observed everywhere unmistakable signs of that confident hopefulness in the future, based on a thorough belief in the greatness of the resources of Canada, which, Your Excellency is graciously pleased to say, is one of the characteristics of her people, and furnishes a good augury and pledge of further development and progress.

We receive, with a deep sense of their importance, Your Excellency's statements that the Government of Newfoundland having intimated its desire to renew negotiations looking to the admission of that colony into the Dominion of Canada, a subcommittee of Your Excellency's advisers have recently met in conference a delegation from the Island Government and discussed with them the terms of union, and that it will be a subject of general congratulation if the negotiations now pending result in the incorporation of Her Majesty's oldest colonial possession into the Canadian Confederation.

We thank Your Excellency for the imformation that measures relating to bankruptcy and insolvency, and to joint stock companies will be laid before us, and that we shall also be asked to consider certain amendments to the Insurance Act, to the Act respecting Dominion Notes, to the Dominion Lands Act, to the Indian Act, to the North-West Territories Representation Act, and also a Bill respecting the land subsidy of the Canadian Pacific Railway Company. Your Excellency may rest assured that all these matters will receive our best consideration.

Our thanks are due to Your Excellency for the information that the accounts of the past year shall be laid before us; and also that the estimates for the ensuing year will be presented to us, and that these have been framed with every regard to economy compatible with the efficiency of the public service.

In entering upon the discharge of the important duties devolving upon us, we join with Your Excellency in an earnest prayer that being guided by the spirit of wisdom and patriotism our deliberations may, under the divine blessing, conduce to the unity and well-being of Canada.

PRAYERS.

Nine Petitions were brought up, and laid on the Table.

Mr. Speaker informed the House, that the Clerk of the House had received from the Clerk of the Crown in Chancery, a certificate of the election and return of the Hon. Walter Humphries Montague, for the Electoral District of Haldimand.

The Hon. Walter Humphries Montague, Member to represent the Electoral District of Haldimand, having previously taken the Oath according to Law, and subscribed the Roll containing the same, took his seat in the House.

Mr. Maclean (York) introduced a Bill No. 13, to promote the safety of railway employees, which was read the first time, and ordered for a second reading tomorrow.

Mr. Laurier moved, That the House do now adjourn; which motion was, with leave of the House, withdrawn.

The House resumed the adjourned Debate on the proposed motion for an Address to His Excellency the Governor General, in answer to his Speech from the Throne at the opening of the Session, which is as follows :---

To His Excellency the Right Honourable Sir John Campbell Hamilton-Gordon, Earl of Aberdeen; Viscount Formartine, Baron Haddo, Methlic, Tarves and Kellie, in the Peerage of Scotland; Viscount Gordon of Aberdeen, County of Aberdeen, in the Peerage of the United Kingdom; Baronet of Nova Scotia, &c., &c., Governor General of Canada, and Vice-Admiral of the same.

MAY IT PLEASE YOUR EXCELLENCY :---

We, Her Majesty's dutiful and loyal subjects, the Commons of Canada in Parliament assembled, humbly thank Your Excellency for your gracious Speech at the opening of the Session.

We also thank Your Excellency for the expression of your satisfaction at again having recourse to our advice and assistance in the administration of the affairs of the Dominion.

We share most sincerely Your Excellency's feeling that by the sudden and lamented death of the late Right Honourable Sir John Thompson, Canada has sustained a grievous loss. The deep and heartfelt sympathy expressed by Her Most Gracious Majesty the Queen, and the manifestations of sorrow with which the distressing intelligence was received throughout the Empire, as well as the tokens of esteem and respect everywhere paid to the memory of the deceased statesman, have been gratefully appreciated by the people of Canada.

We learn with interest that, satisfactory assurances having been received from Her Majesty's Government respecting the interpretation of certain clauses in the Treaty of Commerce with France, ratifications will be exchanged as soon as the necessary legislation has been passed.

We are pleased to be informed by Your Excellency that the recent action of the Imperial Parliament enabling the various Australasian Governments to enter into preferential trade relations with the other self-governing Colonies of the Empire, affords gratifying proof that the suggestions of the Colonial Conference are being favourably entertained by Her Majesty's Government.

We thank Your Excellency for informing us that, in conformity with a recent judgment of the Lords of the Judicial Committee of the Privy Council, to the effect that the dissentient minority of the people of Manitoba have a constitutional right of appeal to the Governor General in Council against certain Acts passed by the legislature of the province of Manitoba in relation to the subject of education, Your Excellency has heard in Council the appeal; that Your Excellency's decision thereon has been communicated to the legislature of the said province; and that the papers on the subject will be laid before us.

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We receive, with a deep sense of their importance, Your Excellency's statements that the Government of Newfoundland having intimated its desire to renew negotiations looking to the admission of that colony into the Dominion of Canada, a subcommittee of Your Excellency's advisers have recently met in conference a delegation from the Island Government and discussed with them the terms of union, and that it will be a subject of general congratulation if the negotiations now pending result in the incorporation of Her Majesty's oldest colonial possession into the Canadian Confederation.

We thank Your Excellency for the information that measures relating to bankruptcy and insolvency, and to joint stock companies will be laid before us, and that we shall also be asked to consider certain amendments to the Insurance Act, to the Act respecting Dominion Notes, to the Dominion Lands Act, to the Indian Act, to the North-west Territories Representation Act, and also a Bill respecting the land subsidy of the Canadian Pacific Railway Company. Your Excellency may rest assured that all these matters will receive our best consideration.

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In entering upon the discharge of the important duties devolving upon us, we join with Your Excellency in an earnest prayer that being guided by the spirit of wisdom and patriotism our deliberations may, under the divine blessing, conduce to the unity and well-being of Canada.

And the question being put on the said motion, it was agreed to.

Colin F. McIsaac, Esq., Member for the Electoral District of Antigonish, having previously taken the Oath according to Law, and subscribed the Roll containing the same, took his seat in the House.

On motion of Mr. Foster, a Select Committee composed of Sir Adolphe Caron and Messieurs Amyot, Cockburn, Davies, Davin, Edgar, Fraser, Laurier, McNeill, Mills (Bothwell), O'Brien, Rinfret, Scriver, Weldon, and White (Shelburne), was appointed to assist Mr. Speaker in the direction of the Library of Parliament so far as the interests of this House are concerned, and to act as members of a Joint Committee of both Houses on the Library; and a Message was ordered to be sent to the Senate to acquaint their Honours therewith.

On motion of Mr. Foster, a Message was ordered to be sent to the Senate informing their Honours that this House will unite with them in the formation of a Joint Committee of both Houses on the subject of the Printing of Parliament, and that the members of the Select Standing Committee on Printing, viz.:—Messieurs Amyot, Bergin, Bourassa, Charlton, Costigan, Davin, Grandbois, Innes, Kaulbach, Landerkin, LaRivière, Lépine, Maclean (York), McLean (King's), McMullen, Putnam, Rider, Somerville, Stevenson, Sutherland, Taylor, and Tisdale, will act as members on the part of the House on said Joint Committee on the Printing of Parliament.

Mr. Montague laid before the House, by command of His Excellency the Governor General,—Report of the Minister of Agriculture for the Dominion of Canada, for the calendar year, 1894.

And,-Report on the Forest Wealth of Canada.

And,—Special Report on Poultry and Eggs, for the year 1893.

And,-Special Report on Butter and Cheese, for the year 1893.

And also,—The Papers referred to the Minister of Agriculture on the subject of the scheduling of Canadian Cattle by the Board of Agriculture, year 1894.

Five Petitions were brought up, and laid on the Table.

The following Petitions were read and received :--

Of the Manitoba and North-west Loan Company (Limited); praying for certain amendments to their Act of Incorporation and the Acts amending the same, empowering them to sell their lands for other real estate, and extending the time during which they may hold such lands for sale to a term of twelve years; authorizing them to execute a Trust Deed upon all the assets and property of the Company, to trustees, to secure the repayment of moneys borrowed; to increase their capital stock, and for other purposes.

Of the Temiscouata Railway Company; praying for the passing of an Act empowering them to extend their line of Railway to a point on the Intercolonial Railway.

Of Andrew Allan and others, of the City of Montreal, and Bryce J. Allan, of the City of Boston; praying for an Act of Incorporation under the name of "The Langenburg and Southern Railway Company."

Of John Kerr, of the Town of Petrolia, and J. Thompson and E. L. Mott, of the Village of Wyoming, all of Ontario; praying for the passing of an Act incorporating the Canadian Benevolent Society.

Of Francis Tothill, of The Grove, Stoke Bishop, and others, of other places, England; praying for the passing of an Act authorizing them to acquire and purchase the undertaking, assets, property and franchises of the Windsor and Annapolis Railway Company (Limited), now known and operated in Canada under the name of the Dominion Atlantic Railway Company, to issue paid-up stock in payment thereof, and for other purposes.

Of the Windsor and Annapolis Railway Company (Limited), known and operated and incorporated in Canada under the name of "The Dominion Atlantic Railway Company"; praying for the passing of an Act empowering them to wind up the affairs of the company, to organize a new company with additional powers and wholly under the control of the Parliament of Canada, and for other purposes.

Of the Canada and Michigan Tunnel Company; praying for the passing of an Act empowering them to construct a railway bridge over, as well as a tunnel under, the Detroit River, between the Town of Windsor or the Town of Sandwich, in the County of Essex, Ontario, and the City of Detroit, in the State of Michigan.

Of the Municipal Council of the County of Elgin, Ontario; praying for the passing of an Act making all the railways of Ontario subject to the Provincial Act, known as "The Ditches and Water Courses Act, 1894."

Of the Municipal Council of the County of Essex, Ontario; praying for such change in the Fishery Laws of the Dominion as will place Canadian fishermen on the Detroit River on a like footing with their American competitors on that river.

Of the Municipal Council of the County of Bruce, Ontario; praying that Section 194 of the Railway Act of 1888 may be so amended as to make it compulsory on all Railway Companies in Canada to maintain safe and efficient cattle-guards at all crossings of public highways; and, also, for the passing of an Act requiring all Ontario Railways to carry first class passengers at two cents per mile, and second class passengers at one and one-half cents per mile.



Four Petitions were brought up, and laid on the Table.

The following Petitions were read and received :-

Of William McArthur and others, of the Village of Fenelon Falls, County of Victoria, Ontario; praying for an Act of incorporation under the name of the Lindsay, Haliburton and Mattawa Railway Company.

Of the Alberta Railway and Coal Company; praying for certain amendments of their Acts of Incorporation.

Of Edward D. Boswell and others, of Rivière du Loup and other places; praying for the passing of an Act incorporating them as a Company for the purpose of building bridges across the St. John River, at Claire, St. Hilaire, Edmundston and St. Leonards, in the Province of New Brunswick.

Of the Sable and Spanish Boom and Slide Company, of Algoma, (Limited); praying for the passing of an Act amending the Act 49 Victoria, Chapter 108, as regards the tolls chargeable for the booming of logs and timber on the Spanish River, in the District of Algoma, Ontario.

Of the Manitoba and South Eastern Railway Company; praying for the passing of an Act extending the time for the construction of that portion of their railway between the Town of St. Boniface and the Parish of Ste. Anne, for a period of two years from the passing of the said Act, and for other purposes.

Of the Red Mountain Railway Company; praying for the passing of an Act declaring the said Company to be a body corporate and politic, within the jurisdiction of the Parliament of Canada, and their Railway a work for the general advantage of Canada, extending the time for the completion of the said railway to the 12th day of April, 1899, and for other purposes.

Of John Harvey and others, of the Township of Peel; and of Joseph Rettie and others, of the Township of Garafaxa, all of the County of Wellington, Ontario; severally praying for such legislation as will free the cattle industry of Canada from unfair treatment at the hands of those interested in the carrying trade.

Of the Municipal Council of the County of York, Ontario; praying for an amendment of section 783 of "the Criminal Code, 1892."

Mr. Speaker informed the House, that the Clerk of the House had received from the Clerk of the Crown in Chancery, a certificate of the election and return of C. A. Geoffrion, Esq., for the Electoral District of Verchères. Mr. Speaker informed the House that in obedience to the Order of the House of Wednesday, the 24th instant, the Clerk had laid on the Table a statement showing petitions presented to the House of Commons, during the last two sessions and up to date of making return, from Municipal Councils, asking for legislation to secure improved facilities for drainage across lines of railway; giving date of presentation, by whom presented, and a copy of each form of petition, with names of municipalities from which each petition was sent.

C. A. Geoffrion, Esq., Member for the Electoral District of Verchères, having previously taken the Oath according to Law, and subscribed the Roll containing the same, took his seat in the House.

Mr. McCarthy introduced a Bill No. 25, further to amend the Act respecting the House of Commons, which was read the first time, and ordered for a second reading to-morrow.

Mr. Foster laid before the House,-Report of the Auditor General on Appropriation Accounts, for the year ended 30th June, 1894.

Mr. Daly presented,—Supplementary Return to an Order of the House of the 7th May, 1894, for a Return showing the number of settlers brought into the Yorkton and Saltcoats District from Dakota, and into the Calgary District from Chicago, and the States of Washington, Idaho and Oregon, and showing in each case the nationality of such settlers, the cost of obtaining them, and the number that still remain and the occupations those remaining are engaged in.

Mr. Mara moved, That an Order of the House do issue to the proper officer for a Return showing the amounts paid in Customs duties at Waneta, Nelson, Kaslo and the Boundary Kootenay River, from 1890 to 1894 inclusive, giving the amount paid yearly at each outport.

Mr. McMullen moved in amendment thereto, that the following words be added at the end of the said proposed motion :--

Also the names of the Customs officers at those places and the salary paid to each. And the question being put on the amendment, it was agreed to.

And the question being put on the main motion as amended, it was agreed to and the Order issued accordingly.

Of the Langenburg and Southern Railway Company, for an Act of Incorporation; of the Camp Harmony Angling Club, for an Act of Incorporation; of the Canada Southern Railway Company, for an Act to extend the time for construction of certain of their lines and branches, and to authorize them to lease the Leamington and St. Clair Railway; of the School Savings Bank, for certain amendments to their Act of Incorporation; of the Trail Creek and Columbia Railway Company, for an Act of Incorporation; of the Buffalo and Fort Erie Bridge Company, for an Act to revive their Act of Incorporation; of the Lake Manitoba Railway and Canal Company, for an Act to revive their Act of Incorporation; of the Ottawa and Aylmer Railway and Bridge Company, for an Act of Incorporation; of the St. Lawrence and Adirondack Railway Company, for an Act to increase their bonding powers; and of Julia Ethel Chute, for an Act to dissolve her marriage with William Osborne Chute, and that she be divorced from him.

The Committee have also examined the notices given on the Petition of the Nova Scotia Steel Company, Limited, for an Act to confirm the sale to them of the property and assets of the Nova Scotia Steel and Forge Company, Limited, and find them somewhat short in point of time, but as they will have fully matured before the Bill is considered in Committee, the Committee recommend that they be deemed sufficient.

The Committee have examined the notices given on the Petition of the Manitoba and North-west Loan Company, Limited, for certain amendments to their Act of Incorporation, and find that they are sufficient to cover the following amendments only, viz.: to give present and future debenture holders of the company security by a first charge upon the property and assets of the company, including the uncalled subscribed capital, and by authorizing the directors to change the head office, to change the mode of the execution of debentures, and to change the date of the annual meetings.

The Committee have also examined the notices given on the Petition of the St. Catharines and Niagara Central Railway Company, for certain amendments to their Act of Incorporation, and find them sufficient for all purposes of the application except for the acquisition of the Hamilton Radial Electric Railway, which is not mentioned in the Notice at all. Mr. Haggart presented,—Return to an Order of the House of the 29th April, 1895, for a Return showing the amount of moneys given as subsidies to the St. Lawrence and Adirondack Railway Company.

The House resumed the adjourned Debate on the proposed motion of Mr. Foster: That Mr. Speaker do now leave the Chair for the House to go into Committee of Ways and Means.

Sir Richard Cartwright moved in amendment thereto, That all the words after "That" be left out, and the following inserted instead thereof:—"the Estimates for the fiscal year 1894-5 amount to the sum of \$38,517,152 independently of any further Supplementary Estimates which may be brought down.

That the said sum of \$38,517,152 is in excess of the amount expended in 1893.4 by the sum of \$922,127.

That the deficit for the year 1893-4 amounted to \$1,210,322.

That the deficit for the present year is estimated by the Minister of Finance at \$4,500,000.

That from statements made by Ministers of the Crown, in this House, it appears that our existing obligations for railway subsidies and for public works now in progress will involve a further outlay of \$20,000,000, computed as follows :---

For railway subsidies now voted	\$8,729,000
For the St. Lawrence Canals	
For the Trent Valley Canal	
For the Intercolonial Railway and minor works	

\$20,729,000

The interest on which sum, together with the subsidy provided by Statute to be paid on account of a fast Atlantic service, will entail an addition to our already very heavy annual fixed charges of \$1,400,000. That, inasmuch as enormous sums of money are now exacted from the people of Canada which are not paid into the Treasury, and inasmuch as the burthens of the people are thereby greatly and unnecessarily increased, and it is of the utmost importance to the well-being of the community that not only should the present extravagant expenditure be diminished, but that the said burthens should be reduced as largely and speedily as possible,—it is expedient that in making provision to restore 'the equilibrium between revenue and expenditure,' as recommended in the Speech from the Throne, the existing tariff be so modified that it may be made a tariff for revenue only."

And a Debate arising thereon,-the said Debate was, on motion of Mr. Dickey, adjourned.

The House then adjourned.

Of Peter McCarthy and others, of the City of Calgary and other places, Northwest Territories; praying for an Act of Incorporation under the name of the Calgary and Lethbridge Railway and Irrigation Company.

Of the Eastern Assurance Company of Canada; praying for the passing of an Act to legalize and confirm a certain agreement entered into between the Directors of the said Company and the Union Assurance Society of London, England.

Of the Supreme Court of the Independent Order of Foresters; praying for certain amendments to their Act of Incorporation.

Of Henry Betts Taylor and others, of the Town of Whitby and other places, Ontario; praying for an Act of Incorporation under the name of the Permanent Reserve Life Association of Canada.

Of the Coast Railway Company of Nova Scotia (Limited); praying that no Act may be passed authorizing the construction of any rival line of railway through the section of country traversed by their proposed line.

Of the Council of the Montreal Board of Trade; praying for the passing of an Act providing that the rate of postage on letters mailed in cities and towns, for delivery therein, may be reduced from two cents to one cent per ounce.

Mr. LaRivière, from the Select Committee appointed to supervise the Official Report of the Debates of this House during the present Session, presented the Second Report of the said Committee, which is as follows :---

The attention of the Committee having been directed by occasional complaints made by Members of the House in reference to the delay in the publication of the French edition of the Debates deemed it advisable, under the circumstances, to inquire into the matter with a view of remedying, if possible, the cause which has in the past tended to retard its publication.

The Committee have, after careful consideration, come to the conclusion that it would materially expedite the publication thereof if the following proposition which they beg to submit as a recommendation be adopted by the House, viz. :--

That beginning with the next session of Parliament the present mode of paying each translator a fixed salary of \$1,000 per session be discontinued, and the translation of the Debates be paid for by the piece at the rate of \$1.00 per column, but that the chief translator and an assistant be paid by salary at the present rate, and that the said chief translator be held responsible to the Committee for the quality of the translation and the due despatch of its execution, and be allowed full liberty in choosing and dismissing the translators, subject, however, to the approval of the Committee.

Mr. Davin moved, That in the opinion of this House, the privilege of voting for candidates for membership thereof, should be extended to women possessing the qualifications which now entitle men to the electoral franchise.

And a Debate arising thereon,—Mr. Montague moved, That the Debate be adjourned, which motion was, with leave of the House, withdrawn.

And the question being proposed on Mr. Davin's motion,

Mr. Laurier moved in amendment thereto, That all the words after the word "That" be left out, and the following inserted instead thereof:—"the question of woman suffrage is one which, like all other questions concerning suffrage, more properly belongs to provincial jurisdiction."

And a Debate arising thereon;

PENSIONERS IN THE NORTH-WEST REBELLION-HEALTHY AND ROBUST MEN PENSIONERS ON THE PUBLIC BOUNTY.

"It is a time-honoured policy of the British Government that the defenders of the country and the fighters of the battles of the Empire, who have served long terms, should be rewarded with pensions; so there was no objection to the Canadian Government giving a pension to those who were injured in body or in general health in the campaign in the North-west in 1885, so long as they were suffering from the consequences of those services, but it does seem a waste of the public funds that pension allowances should be continued after the subjects have been restored to vigorous health. In the Public Accounts for 1894 there appears a pension grant of \$200.75 a year to Mr. Weir, of Keene, and of \$91.25 to Chas. Guy, of Peterborough. It is well known that both of these men have completely recovered, one of them being noted locally for his unusual physical strength and vigour. There are hundreds, who in that campaign served longer and endured more hardships, who had no such recognition of their services. The Government can't afford a few thousands to drill the volunteers whose services may be needed at any time, but they can devote large sums to bonusing volunteers who are in perfectly good health and able to earn their own living. It is such waste of public funds, repeated in a thousand different forms, that account for a deficit of nearly five million dollars, and the Government, instead of cutting off the source of waste, are crippling necessary public services to make up the leak and putting on extra taxes. That \$200 a year should be paid to Mr. Weir is simply indefensible. The information is given that he is in normal health, and the only trouble that appears to afflict him is that he has grown chronically tired of waiting for the date of his quarterly instalments to come around. It is time that this and other numerous instances of the abuse of the pension and superannuation system should cease. One or two big leaks from the public chest would be promptly noticed, and could be promptly stopped, but the money oozing out in thousands of

places, most insidiously, but not the less effectively, drains the public coffers and necessitates periodical trips to England for loans to replenish them. Mr. Foster's last loan of ten millions has already melted away and dropped into the grave of gigantic deficits. The individuals above referred to should in decency notify the Government that they have long ago recovered, and not wait for investigation which will only result in their further humiliation."





Seven Petitions were brought up, and laid on the Table.

Mr. Sproule, from the Select Standing Committee on Standing Orders, presented the Fifth Report of the said Committee, which is as follows :--

The Committee have examined the notices given on the Petition of the Ontario Accident Insurance Company, for an Act of Incorporation, and find them sufficient.

The Committee have also examined the notices given on the following Petitions, and find them somewhat short in point of time, but as they will have matured before the Bills are considered in Committee, the Committee recommend that they be deemed sufficient, viz.:—

Of the Lindsay, Haliburton and Mattawa Railway Company, for an Act of Incorporation; of Gilmour and Hughson (Limited), for an Act of Incorporation; of the St. Clair and Erie Ship Canal Company, for an Act to enlarge their bonding powers.

On the Petition of the Kingston and Pembroke Railway Company, for amendments to their Act of Incorporation, the Committee find that the notices are sufficient to cover all the proposed amendments, with the exception of those asking for power to reduce their capital stock from \$5,000,000 to \$2,900,000, and for power to issue preference stock, which are not mentioned in the notice.

The Committee have also examined the notices given on the Petition of the Hamilton and Lake Erie Power Company, for an Act of Incorporation, and find them in accordance with the requirements of the rule, except as regards the County of Welland, in which no notices were published.

In examining the notices given on the Petition of the Independent Order of Foresters, for certain amendments to their Act of Incorporation, the Committee find that while they have been published in the proper newspapers for the required length of time, they are not, strictly speaking, in compliance with that part of the rule which requires that all notices shall *clearly and distinctly* indicate the nature and object of the application, inasmuch as it is necessary, owing to the peculiar wording of the notice, to refer to the statute to ascertain the real meaning of the amendments asked for, but while the Committee, generally speaking, do not approve of notices so worded, and do not consider them within the requirements of the rule, in this particular instance, they have reason to believe that all persons affected are fully aware of the nature of the proposed legislation, and they therefore recommend that these notices be deemed sufficient.

The Committee have considered the following Petitions for leave to present a Petition for a Private Bill, notwithstanding the expiration of the time limited for receiving such Petitions, and recommend that leave be granted in each case, viz. :---Of the Clifton Suspension Bridge Company, for an extension of time for the construction of their works; and of the Canada Insurance Promotion Association, for an Act of Incorporation. The Committee have also examined the Potition of the Eastern Assurance Company of Canada, for an Act to legalize an agreement entered into with the Union Assurance Society of London, England, and find that no notices have been published, but as the necessity for the application arose too recently to admit of the notices being published, and as the proposed measure will only affect the shareholders and policy-holders, the Committee recommend that the 51st Rule be suspended in this case, provided that the rights of the parties affected are duly guarded in the Bill.

Mr. Sproule, from the Select Standing Committee on Agriculture and Colonization, presented the Second Report of the said Committee, which is as follows :---

The Petition of the Clifton Suspension Bridge Company; praying for the passing of an Act to extend the time for the commencement and completion of the construction of their proposed Bridge over the Niagara River, below the Falls, for a period of one year, was read and received.

Mr. Baker, from the Select Standing Committee on Public Accounts, presented the First Report of the said Committee, which is as follows :----

The Committee recommend that the House authorize them to employ a shorthand writer to take down such evidence as the Committee may deem necessary.

That, inasmuch as enormous sums of money are now exacted from the people of Canada which are not paid into the Treasury, and inasmuch as the burthens of the people are thereby greatly and unnecessarily increased, and it is of the utmost importance to the well-being of the community that not only should the present extravagant expenditure be diminished, but that the said burthens should be reduced as largely and speedily as possible,-it is expedient that in making provision to restore 'the equilibrium between revenue and expenditure,' as recommended in the Speech from the Throne, the existing tariff be so modified that it may be made a tariff for revenue only."

The Committee have also examined the Petition of the Domestic and Foreign Missionary Society of the Church of England in Canada, for an Act of Incorporation, and are of the opinion that it is not of such a character as to require the publication of notices under the 51st Rule.

As the time for presenting Private Bills has expired, the Committee recommend that that portion of the 49th Rule which limits the time for presenting Private Bills be suspended in reference to all the above Petitions.

On motion of Mr. Mills (Annapolis), it was Resolved, That in accordance with the recommendation of the Select Standing Committee on Standing Orders, that portion of the 49th Rule which limits the time for presenting Private Bills be suspended in reference to the following Bills, viz.:--

Bill to incorporate the St. John Fire Insurance Company.

Bill to incorporate the Dominion Trusts Company.

Bill to incorporate the Ottawa Land and Security Company ;--and

Bill to incorporate the Domestic and Foreign Missionary Society of the Church of England in Canada.

The following Bills were severally introduced, read the first time, and ordered for a second reading to-morrow, viz. :--

By Mr. Taylor :-Bill No. 100, to incorporate the Dominion Trusts Company.

Mr. Mills (Bothwell) moved, That the House do now adjourn; which motion was negatived.

Upon adjournment of the trial, the court may direct that during the adjournment the jury shall be kept together and proper provision made for preventing the jury from holding communication with any one on the subject of the trial. Such direction shall be given in all cases in which the accused, upon conviction, may be sentenced to death. In other cases, if no such direction is given, the jury shall be permitted to separate during the period of adjournment, being first cautioned by the court not to have communication of any kind with any person on the subject of the trial upon pain of being punished for contempt."

"4. Upon an adjournment over Sunday or from day to day, no formal adjournment is necessary and no entry thereof in the Crown book need be made."

Section 683. By repealing subsection 2 and substituting the following therefor :--

"2. Until otherwise provided by rules of court, the practice and procedure in connection with the appointment of commissioners under this section, the taking of depositions by such commissioners, and the certifying and return thereof, and the use of such deposition as evidence, shall be as nearly as practicable the same as those which prevail in the respective courts in connection with like matters in civil causes."

And by adding thereto the following subsection :--

"3. The depositions taken by such commissioners may be used as evidence as well before the grand jury as at the trial."

Section 763. By repealing sub-paragraph (i) of paragraph (a) and substituting the following therefor :—

"(*i.*) In the Province of Ontario any judge of a county or district court, junior judge or deputy judge authorized to act as chairman of the general sessions of the peace."

Form X. By striking out the words "upon (oath)" in the ninth line; and by inserting after the word "prosecution" in the tenth line, the words "or for the accused."

Mr. Davin moved, That in the opinion of this House, the outstanding claims for scrip from the Wood Mountain and Maple Creek scouts, and also individual claims elsewhere of scouts and teamsters who were engaged actively in warfare during the rebellion of 1885 in the North-west Territories, should now be fully inquired into and the demands of justice satisfied; which was agreed to.

Mr. Denison moved, That in the opinion of this House, Canada should take advantage of the International Convention as to industrial property, and that the Government should take such steps as are necessary to attain that object.

And a Debate arising thereon,-the said Debate was, on motion of Sir Adolphe Caron, adjourned.

A Message was received from the Senate, agreeing to the Bill No. 38, respecting the Hamilton Distillery Company (Limited), without any amendment. And the Bill No. 29, to incorporate the James Maclaren Company, Limited,

with an amendment, which is as follows :---

Page 2, line 46.-After "aforesaid" insert the following as Clause A :--

Clause A.

In the production, working, disposal or distribution of electricity, electrical or hydraulic power the company shall be subject to the following provisions, that is to say :-

(a.) The company shall not interfere with the public right of travelling on or using such public roads, highways, streets, bridges or watercourses, and other like places, and shall not do any unnecessary damage, nor in any way obstruct the entrance to any door or gateway or free access to any building;

(b.) The company shall not affix any wire less than twenty-two feet above the surface of the street or road, nor erect more than one line of poles along any street or road without the consent of the municipal council having jurisdiction over the roads or streets of the municipality;

(c.) In all municipalities the poles shall be as nearly as possible straight and perpendicular, and shall, in cities, be painted, if so required by any by-law of the council;

(d.) Whenever, in case of fire, it becomes necessary for its extinction or in the preservation of property, that the poles or wires should be cut, the cutting under such circumstances of the poles or any of the wires of the company, under the direction of the chief engineer or other officer in charge of the fire brigade, shall not entitle the company to demand or to claim compensation for any damage thereby incurred;

(e.) The company shall be responsible for all damage which its agents, servants or workmen cause to individuals or property in constructing, carrying out or maintaining any of the said works in this or the next preceding section authorized :

(f.) The company shall not cut down or mutilate any shade, fruit or ornamental tree;

(g.) In all municipalities the opening up of streets for the erection of poles, or for carrying the wires underground, shall be subject to the direction and approval of such engineer or other official as the council appoints, and shall be done in such manner as the council directs; the council may also direct and designate the places where the poles are to be erected in such municipality; and the surface of the street shall in all cases be restored as far as possible to its former condition by and at the expense of the company;

(h.) No Act of Parliament requiring the company, in case efficient means are devised for carrying electric wires underground, to adopt such means, and abrogating the right given by this section to continue carrying lines on poles through cities, towns or incorporated villages, shall be deemed an infringement of the privileges granted by this Act;

(i.) No person shall labour upon the work of erecting or repairing any line or instrument of the company, without having conspicuously attached to his dress a medal or badge on which shall be legibly inscribed the name of the company and a number by which he can readily be identified;

(j.) Nothing herein contained shall be deemed to authorize the company, its servants, workmen or agents, to enter upon any private property for the purpose of erecting, maintaining or repairing any of its works without the previous assent of the owner or occupant of the property for the time being;

(k.) If in the removal of buildings, or if in the exercise of the public right of travelling on or using any public road, highway or street, it becomes necessary that the said wires or poles be temporarily removed, it shall be the duty of the company at its own expense, upon reasonable notice in writing from any person requiring the same, to remove such wires or poles, and in default of the company so doing, it shall be lawful for such person to remove the same at the expense of the company, doing no unnecessary damage thereby; and such notice may be given either at the head office of the company or to any agent or officer of the company in the municipality wherein such wires or poles are required to be removed, or in the case of a municipality wherein there is no such agent or officer of the company, then either at the head office, or to an agent or officer of the company in the nearest or any adjoining municipality to that in which such wires or poles require to be removed;

(l.) The company shall make due provision for, take care and dispose of all water and drainage to the extent it disturbs or interferes with the same, whether from artificial drains, natural streams, or watercourses, which drains, natural streams or watercourses, in any work of the company undertaken for such purposes crosses, touches or interferes with and which are in existence at the time of the construction of such work;

(m.) All subsequent questions, disputes or complaints as to the construction of new drains and as to the alteration, enlargement and change of existing drains and of natural streams or watercourses, and as to who shall make such alterations, enlargements and changes and by whom the expenses thereof shall be paid, as also any complaint or dispute as to the manner or sufficiency of the compliance with the provisions of the next preceding paragraph, shall be inquired into, heard and determined by the Railway Committee of the Privy Council in the same manner as is provided for other matters to be inquired into, heard and determined by the said Committee under The Railway Act;

(n.) The authority herein given with respect to such streets, highways, and public places, shall only be exercised subject to such agreement with respect thereto as is made between the company and the said municipalities respectively, and under and subject to any by-law of the councils of the said municipalities passed in pursuance thereof.

The House then adjourned.





Sells or distributes any newspaper on the Lord's Day: Provided, that the distribution of newspapers on the Lord's Day by postmasters in the ordinary way, or the distribution of religious newspapers in churches, Sunday-schools or religious meetings on that day, or the free distribution of religious newspapers elsewhere on that day, or the publishing or issuing, or preparing for publication or issue of any copy or number of such a religious newspaper, for such distribution or with the intent that it shall be so distributed, shall not be an offence under this section."

"2. The word 'newspaper' in this section has the same meaning as it has under paragraph (p-1) of section 3, in the sections relating to defamatory libel."

OTTAWA, TUESDAY, 11TH JUNE, 1895.

PRAYERS.

Three Petitions were brought up, and laid on the Table.

Mr. Daly laid before the House, -A list of all land sold by the Canadian Pacific Railway Company, from the 1st October, 1893, to the 1st October, 1894.

Mr. Daly introduced a Bill No. 114, to amend the Act respecting roads and road allowances in the Province of Manitoba, which was read the first time, and ordered for a second reading to morrow.

The Bill No. 66, further to amend the Penitentiary Act, was considered as amended, read the third time, and passed.

The Bill No. 51, further to amend the Criminal Code, 1892, was read the second time, and referred to a Committee composed of Members of both Houses, and the Members on the part of this House be Sir Charles Hibbert Tupper, and Messrs. Daly, Dickey, Curran, Adams, Amyot, Baker, Brodeur, Carroll, Choquette, Coatsworth, Corbould, Delisle, Edgar, Forbes, Fraser, Girouard (Jacques Cartier), Langelier, McLeod, Masson, Monet, Mulock, Tisdale and Weldon, and Rule 78 was suspended in relation thereto.

On motion of Sir Charles Hibbert Tupper, it was Resolved, That a Message be sent to the Senate, requesting their Honours to unite with this House in the formation of a Joint Committee of both Houses to examine and report upon the Bill of the Commons, No. 51, intituled: "An Act further to amend the Criminal Code, 1892," and informing them that the Hon. Sir Charles Hibbert Tupper, and Hon. Messrs. Daly, Dickey, Curran, and Messrs. Adams, Amyot, Baker, Brodeur, Carroll, Choquette, Coatsworth, Corbould, Delisle, Edgar, Forbes, Fraser, Girouard (Jacques Cartier), Langelier, McLeod, Masson, Monet, Mulock, Tisdale and Weldon, will act on behalf of the House of Commons as members of said Joint Committee, should the Senate agree to its creation.

The House went into Committee of the Whole, to consider a proposed Resolution respecting the discharge of a mortgage to Her Majesty known as the Markham Mortgage.

(In the Committee.)

The following Resolution was adopted :--

That it is expedient to authorize the Minister of Finance to execute on behalf of Her Majesty, a release and discharge of a certain mortgage given to Her Majesty in 1858 by the Hon. George H. Markland upon certain properties in the City of Kingston, which were sold in 1862 under the said mortgage, and to convey the properties so sold, freed and discharged from the said mortgage, to the persons entitled thereto, on payment of such part of the purchase money as now remains unpaid, either with or without interest and on such other terms and conditions as the Minister deems expedient in the public interest.

"Q. When you had the notes for election expenses signed and discounted, you " intended to get political subscriptions to cover these notes ?-A. Yes."

"Q. Did you start these subscriptions afterwards ?-A. No, because I had other " money to pay them. I had some subscriptions, but I did not push them as I had " other money to pay the notes."

"Q. Money from the \$100,000 ?- A. Yes."

"Q. Which went to pay this ?- A. Yes, Your Honour."

Three Petitions were brought up, and laid on the Table.

The following Petitions were read and received :--

Of the Toronto Typographical Union, No. 91; praying that the Bill now before Parliament, intituled : "An Act respecting Union Labels, and to amend the Crimi-"nal Code, 1892," may become law.

Of the Municipal Council of the County of Halton, Ontario; praying that Section 194 of the Railway Act of 1888 may be so amended as to make it compulsory on all Railway Companies in Canada to maintain efficient cattle-guards at all crossings of public highways; and also, for the passing of an Act requiring all Ontario railways to carry first-class passengers at 2 cents per mile, and second-class passengers at $1\frac{1}{2}$ cents per mile.

Of David Fraser and others, Merchants, &c., of the Village of Virden, County of Selkirk, Manitoba; praying for such legislation as will provide for the establishment of a Board of Customs Experts, with power to deal with all questions and disputes arising between collectors of customs and importers, as to rates of duty, classification, and value for duty, &c.

Mr. Tisdale, from the Select Standing Committee on Railways, Canals and Telegraph Lines, presented the Sixth Report of the said Committee, reporting the following Bills with amendments, viz.:—

Bill No. 60, respecting the St. Catharines and Niagara Central Railway Company, and to change the name of the Company to the Niagara, Hamilton and Pacific Railway Company.

Bill No. 62, respecting the Buffalo and Fort Erie Bridge Company; - and

Bill No. 87, to incorporate the James Bay Railway Company.

And the following Bills without amendments, viz.:--

Bill No. 77, to amend the Act to incorporate the St. Clair and Erie Ship Canal Company;—and

Bill No. 97, respecting the Clifton Suspension Bridge Company.

With reference to the Bill No. 89, respecting the Thousand Islands Railway Company, the promoters thereof having expressed their intention of not proceeding further with the proposed measure this session, the Committee recommend that the said Bill be withdrawn, and that the fee and charges paid thereon be refunded, less the cost of printing and translation.

On motion of Mr. Taylor, Bill (C) No. 110, from the Senate, intituled : "An Act for the relief of Mary Bradshaw Falding," was read the first time, and ordered for a second reading to-morrow, on a division.

On motion of Mr. Tisdale, the Bill No. 89, respecting the Thousand Islands Railway Company, was withdrawn, and the fee and charges paid thereon ordered to be refunded, less the cost of printing and translation, in accordance with a recommendation contained in the Sixth Report of the Select Standing Committee on Railways, Canals and Telegraph Lines.

Mr. Montague laid before the House,—Report of the Board of Civil Service Examiners, for the year ended 31st December, 1894.

Mr. Ouimet presented,—Return to an Order of the House of the 26th April, 1895, for copies of all petitions, memorials, correspondence and other documents in relation to the claim made against the Government by Mr. L. T. Puizé, of Frazerville, in the County of Temiscouata.

Mr. Daly presented,—Return to an Order of the House of the 28th May, 1894, for copies of all correspondence in relation to tenders, and of all tenders received by the Government since 1st January, 1890, relating to the purchase of timber limits on Indian Reserves.

Mr. Daly moved, That the House do go into Committee of the Whole, to-morrow, to consider the following proposed Resolution :---

That it is expedient to provide that any payment heretofore made to the General Revenue Fund of the North-west Territories of any fine, penalty or forfeiture which belonged to Her Majesty for the public uses of Canada, or of any portion of any such fine, penalty or forfeiture, be ratified, and that the amount of such fine, penalty or forfeiture, or portion thereof, need not be paid over to Her Majesty to be applied to such public uses.

Whereupon Mr. Daly informed the House, that His Excellency the Governor General having been informed of the subject-matter of the said proposed Resolution, recommends it to the House.

Boyd, M.P., and others; praying to be permitted to lay before the House a Petition for the passing of an Act extending the time for the exercise of the powers conferred on the City of Winnipeg by the Act, chapter 89 of the Statutes of Canada, 1889, and amending Acts, notwithstanding the expiration of the time for presenting Petitions for Private Bills.

Of the Municipal Council of the County of Essex, Ontario; complaining of the poor results of the whitefish culture, as pursued in the fish hatcheries on the banks of the Detroit River and elsewhere in Canada, and praying for the appointment of three fishermen, of the above named County, authorized to examine the inland lakes of Nova Scotia and New Brunswick, in which whitefish fry have been placed, to ascertain if any mature whitefish exist at the present time in those lakes, &c.

Of the Municipal Council of the Town of Sandwich, County of Essex, Ontario; praying that certain fishing privileges, enjoyed prior to 1891, be restored, the close season for the month of November suspended, and Canadian fishermen allowed as free fishing as those of Ohio and Michigan, &c.

Of Walter Couthard, Reeve, and others, of Oshawa, County of Ontario; of Edward McMaster and others, of the County of Frontenac; of Stephen Burton and others, of the County of Simcoe; of George Sherwood and others, of the County of Oxford; of John R. Burn and others, of the County of Durham; of the Reverend Jeffrey Hill and others, of the County of Bruce; of G. J. Kerr and others, of the County of Middlesex; of John S. Troughton and others, of the County of Grey; of William Stubbs and others, of the County of Cardwell; of John D. Flemming and others, of the County of Victoria; of George Devitt and others, of the County of Waterloo; of C. P. Hill and others, of the County of Hastings; of Duncan N. McLeod and others, of the County of Glengarry; of West Anderson and others, of the County of Wellington; of C. H. Wood and others, of the County of Norfolk; of Joseph Menzies and others, of the County of Wentworth; of Clarence Hayward and others, of the County of Welland; of James Sills and others, of the County of Addington; of A. E. Gallagher and others, of the County of Lennox; of G. M. Kilty and others, of the County of Huron; of George Clayton and others, of the District of Manitoulin; of Thomas Vincent and others, of the District of Nipissing; of Thomas Lougheed and others, of the District of Algoma; and of James Van Malder and others, of the City of Toronto, all of Ontario; and of Henry Collins and others, of Vancouver and other places, British Columbia; severally praying that no interference be allowed with Manitoba in regard to the School System of that Province.

The Petition of Joseph Powell and others, Directors of the Duluth, Nepigon and James Bay Railway Company, and others; praying the House to grant the said Company certain money and land subsidies in aid of the construction of their Railway from Nepigon Bay to James Bay, and for other purposes, being read;

Mr. Speaker decided,-That as the granting the prayer of this Petition would involve the expenditure of public money, it cannot be received.

Mr. Montague presented,-Supplementary Return to an Order of the House of the 29th April, 1895, for a return giving the names of the various manufacturing or industrial establishments in the Counties of Queen's and Shelburne, Nova Scotia, as mentioned in the last Census returns, together with the names of the owners thereof and number of employees therein.

The Bill No. 85, to incorporate the Hamilton and Lake Erie Power Company, was read the third time, and passed.

On motion of Mr. Macdonald (Huron), an Order of the House was issued to the proper officer for a Return of all correspondence, petitions, memorials, reports or documents, relative to the extension of the Railway system in the Province of Prince Edward Island.

Mr. Flint moved, That in the opinion of this House, the manufacture, importation and sale of intoxicating liquors in Canada except for sacramental, scientific, manufacturing and medicinal purposes, should be prohibited by law. Mr. Guillet moved in amendment, That all the words after the word "That" in

the proposed motion be struck out and the following inserted instead thereof:-"whereas there is now before the Judicial Committee of the Imperial Privy Council the appeal against the decision of the Supreme Court of Canada on the jurisdiction of the Provincial Legislatures, to prohibit the manufacture and sale of intoxicating liquors; the further consideration of this question be deferred until this appeal shall have been decided and the report of the Judicial Committee thereon received."

Mr. Taylor moved in amendment to the amendment, That all the words in the proposed motion after the word "That," and all the words in the amendment be struck out and the following inserted instead thereof:----"this House, while reaffirming the position taken in 1884 and 1889 upon the question of prohibition, is of the opinion that it is inadvisable at the present time, until the results of the Commission which has recently reported, have been made available for examination and until the appeals now before the Judicial Committee of the Privy Council, involving the jurisdiction of the Provincial Legislatures and the Dominion Parliament in the matter have been decided, to further legislate with respect to the importation, sale and manufacture of intoxicating liquors."

That under these circumstances the Minister of Railways is responsible, and deserves the severest censure of this House, for negligence, inefficiency and gross mismanagement in connection with these works, and for the losses the country has sustained."

Mr. Mills (Annapolis), from the Select Standing Committee on Standing Orders, presented the Thirteenth Report of the said Committee, which is as follows :--

On motion of Mr. Wood (Westmoreland), the Bill No. 78, to incorporate the Permanent Reserve Life Association of Canada, was withdrawn, and the fees paid thereon, and on Bill No. 59, to amend the Act to incorporate the School Savings Bank, were ordered to be refunded less the cost of printing and translation, in accordance with the recommendation contained in the Fourth Report of the Select Standing Committee on Banking and Commerce.

If any Judge of a Superior Court who has continued in the office of Judge of a Superior Court in Canada, or in any of the provinces, for fifteen years or upwards, or who becomes afflicted with some permanent infirmity disabling him from the due execution of his office, resigns his office, Her Majesty may, by letters patent under the great seal of Canada reciting such period of office, or permanent infirmity, grant unto such Judge, an annuity equal to two-thirds of the salary annexed to the office he held at the time of his resignation, to commence immediately after his resignation and to continue thenceforth during his natural life."

Courts of Vice Admiralty and the Maritime Court of Ontario shall be deemed to have been Superior Courts, Local Judges in Admiralty of the Exchequer Court to be Judges of a Superior Court, and Stipendiary Magistrates within the North-west Territories to have been Judges of a Superior Court, within the meaning of this section."

PRAYERS.

One Petition was brought up, and laid on the Table.

The Petition of the Canadian Furniture Manufacturers Association; praying for the passing of an Insolvency Law, was read and received.

Mr. Mills (Annapolis), from the Select Standing Committee on Standing Orders, presented the Fourteenth Report of the said Committee, which is as follows :--

The Committee have examined the notices given on the Bill (H) No. 119, from the Senate, intituled: "An Act respecting the Shore Line Railway Company," and find them sufficient.

Mr. Tisdale, from the Select Standing Committee on Railways, Canals and Telegraph Lines, presented the Seventh Report of the said Committee, reporting the following Bills with amendments, viz.:--

Bill No. 90, respecting the Oshawa Railway Company ;--and

Bill No. 34, respecting the Toronto, Hamilton and Buffalo Railway Company.

With respect to the last mentioned Bill the Committee desire to call the attention of the House to the provisions of sections 8 and 9, as no mention was made either in the notice or in the petition for the said Bill of the Company's intention to apply for these powers.

Mr. LaRivière, from the Select Committee appointed to supervise the Official Report of the Debates of this House during the present Session, presented the Third Report of the said Committee, which is as follows :---

The Committee recommend that the services of Mr. A. N. Montpetit, a member of the staff of Translators of the Debates, be dispensed with from this date.

On motion of Mr. Gillmor, it was Ordered, That the Bill (H) No. 119, from the Senate, intituled: "An Act respecting the Shore Line Railway Company," be placed on the Order Paper for a second reading on Monday next.

On motion of Mr. Foster, it was Ordered, That Wednesday's Order of Proceeding under Rule 19, be made the Order of Proceeding for Monday next.

On motion of Mr. Mills (Annapolis), that portion of the 49th Rule of this House which limits the time for receiving Petitions for Private Bills was suspended in reference to a Petition of the Municipal Council of the City of Winnipeg, presented this day; praying for the passing of an Act to revive and continue in force its Act and amendments thereto for the utilization of the Assiniboine River Water Power, and to extend the time for the commencement and completion of the works authorized by the said Act, in accordance with the recommendation contained in the Thirteenth Report of the Select Standing Committee on Standing Orders. Mr. Costigan presented,—Return to an Order of the House of the 10th June, 1895, for a return giving copies of all petitions, letters and telegrams in the possession of the Government relating to the placing of a bell buoy on the inside of Little Hope Island, off Lower Port Joli Harbour.

The Bill No. 125, for granting to Her Majesty certain sums of money required for defraying certain expenses of the Public Service, for the financial year ending the 30th June, 1895, and for other purposes relating to the Public Service, was read the second time, and committed to a Committee of the Whole on Monday next.

The Bill No. 92, further to amend the Insurance Act, was read the second time, considered in Committee of the Whole, reported without amendment, read the third time, and passed.

The Resolution adopted in Committee of the Whole on the 20th June instant, respecting the Superannuation of Judges of Provincial Courts, was reported, read the second time, and agreed to.

Sir Charles Hibbert Tupper then presented Bill No. 129, to amend the law respecting the Superannuation of Judges of Provincial Courts, which was read the first time, and ordered for a second reading on Monday next.

The House went into Committee of the Whole, to consider a proposed Resolution respecting fines, penalties and forfeitures in the North-west Territories.

This indenture made this thirty-first day of December, in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and ninety-four, between the "Nova Scotia Steel and Forge Company Limited," a body corporate, having its head office at New Glasgow, in the County of Pictou, Province of Nova Scotia, hereinafter called the "Steel and Forge Company," of the first part; and "The Nova Scotia Steel Company, Limited," a body corporate, having its head office at New Glasgow aforesaid, hereinafter called the "Steel Company," of the second part. Whereas, by virtue of Chapter 117, 57 and 58 Victoria, Statutes of Canada,

Whereas, by virtue of Chapter 117, 57 and 58 Victoria, Statutes of Canada, entitled "An Act to incorporate the Nova Scotia Steel Company, Limited," the said "Steel Company" was incorporated, and was granted by said Act, among other powers, rights and privileges, the powers, rights and privileges set forth and declared in sections "8" and "9" of said Act, which said sections, are in the words following, that is to say :—

Section "8." "The Company" (meaning "The Nova Scotia Steel Company, Limited ") " may purchase, lease, or otherwise acquire and take over as going concerns, in whole or in part, upon such terms as may be agreed upon with the other companies hereinafter mentioned respectively, and may thereafter hold, exercise and enjoy the business franchises, undertaking, property, rights, powers, privileges and assets or any of them of the New Glasgow Iron, Coal and Railway Company (Limited) and the Nova Scotia Steel and Forge Company (Limited), or of either of the said companies, and may pay the consideration therefor either wholly or partly in cash, or wholly or partly in capital stock of the company paid up or partly paid up or issued as wholly or partly paid up, and whether subscribed for or not, or wholly or partly in debentures of the company, or otherwise, as is agreed upon; or may, upon such terms as are agreed upon between them respectively, enter into and carry out any arrangement with either or both of such other companies for the working or carrying on by the company of the business of either or both of such other companies; and in in the event of such purchase, lease or other mode of acquirement or working arrangement being entered into, may also undertake, assume, pay or guarantee all or any of the obligations, liabilities, contracts and engagements of the said New Glasgow Iron, Coal and Railway Company (Limited) and the Nova Scotia Steel and

Forge Company (Limited), or of either of them, or affecting the assets and property of the said companies or of either of them; and may also subscribe for, purchase or otherwise acquire, and may hold and dispose of the shares, debentures or other securities of the said companies, or either of them, in connection with any transaction entered into with the said other companies, or either of them, or otherwise, under this section: Provided always, that after such amalgamation the companies herein mentioned shall no longer exercise their corporate powers, or make use of their corporate name, for any purpose, except for the purpose of supporting and carrying into effect the said sale, or other absolute transfer and winding up of their affairs."

Section "9." "The directors of the company" (meaning "The Nova Scotia Steel Company Limited") "may make and issue as paid up and unassessable shares of the capital stock of the company, whether subscribed for or not and whether paid up or not, in payment for the business, franchises, undertaking, property, rights, powers, privileges and assets of the said companies or any one or more of them acquired under this Act, and may allot and hand over such shares to the said other companies or any one or more of them respectively, or to such other company, firm or firms, individuals or individuals as partners, as may be agreed upon: and such issue or allotment of stock shall be binding on the company, and such stock shall not be assessable for calls, nor shall the holders thereof be in any way liable thereon."

And whereas the directors of the said "Steel and Forge Company," with the view of submitting to the shareholders of the said "Steel and Forge Company" the question of selling and transferring to the said "Steel Company" its real estate, plant, materials, moneys, contracts, debts, assets, and all property whatsoever, as provided by the said Act, called a meeting of said shareholders, by notice duly and regularly given.

But this said transfer shall be only on condition :

1st. That the said Nova Scotia Steel Company (Limited) shall assume all debts then due or owing by this company, and shall assume and carry out all contracts, actions at law, liabilities of every kind and undertakings for which this company shall then be liable.

2nd. That the Nova Scotia Steel Company (Limited) shall acquire the real estate, plant, materials, moneys, contracts, debts owing to the said company, and all assets and property whatsover of the New Glasgow Iron, Coal and Railway Company (Limited), in consideration of five thousand ordinary shares and five thousand preference shares of the capital stock of the said Nova Scotia Steel Company (Limited), which shares shall be fully paid up and non-assessable, said acquisition to take effect on the 31st December, 1894; the said Nova Scotia Steel Company (Limited) assuming all debts then due or owing by said New Glasgow Iron, Coal and Railway Company (Limited), and assuming all contracts, actions at law, liabilities of every kind and undertakings for which the said New Glasgow Iron, Coal and Railway Company (Limited) shall then be liable.

3rd. Neither the said New Glasgow Iron, Coal and Railway Company (Limitd) nor this company, shall pay to any shareholder any dividend for the half-year ended December 31st, 1894, nor any previously accrued dividend, and in consideration thereof the said Nova Scotia Steel Company (Limited) shall out of the first profits divisible pay to the holders of the preference shares of the said Nova Scotia Steel Company (Limited) a dividend of four per cent in lieu of the dividends so relinquished, which shall be in addition to the dividends to which they shall be entitled on their said preference shares from the date of their issue.

The shareholders of the Nova Scotia Steel and Forge Company (Limited) to transfer their shares to the Nova Scotia Steel Company (Limited.)

Resolution No. II.—That the five thousand three hundred ordinary shares and the five thousand three hundred preference shares of the capital stock of the Nova Scotia Steel Company (Limited) received by this company on the sale of its property under the resolution passed this day, shall be allotted to the shareholders of this company as follows:—

Three thousand preference shares of the Nova Scotia Steel Company (Limited), shall be allotted to the holders of preference stock in the Nova Scotia Steel and Forge Company (Limited), so that each shareholder shall receive for every five preference shares that he holds in the Nova Scotia Steel and Forge Company (Limited), six of the preference shares of said Nova Scotia SteelCompany (Limited).

Two thousand three hundred preference shares and five thousand three hundred ordinary shares of the Nova Scotia Steel Company (Limited), shall be allotted to the holders of the ordinary stock of the Nova Scotia Steel and Forge Company (Limited) pro rata according to their holdings.

In making the division of preference and ordinary shares among the shareholders of the Nova Scotia Steel and Forge Company (Limited), all fractions of shares so allotted, not previously arranged for between the shareholders themselves by January 15th, 1895, may be sold by the directors of the company, by auction, and the proceeds divided among the shareholders entitled thereto in the proportion which the fraction allotted to such, bears to the sum of the fractions sold.

One Petition was brought up, and laid on the Table.

The Petition of the Council of the Board of Trade of the City of London, Ontario; praying for the passing of an Act providing that the rate of postage on letters posted in cities and towns, to be delivered therein, be reduced from two cents to one cent per ounce, was read and received.

On motion of Mr. LaRivière, the Third Report of the Select Committee appointed to supervise the Official Report of the Debates of this House, was concurred in.

Mr. Costigan presented,-Return to an Order of the House of the 26th April, 1895, for a return showing the date the steamer "Stanley" commenced running in the fall of 1894, between Charlottetown, P.E.I., and Pictou, N.S., the date they commenced running between Georgetown, P.E.I., and Pictou, N.S. The date of each trip, both from Charlottetown and Georgetown to Pictou. The number of mail bags carried each trip. The number of passengers carried to and from Prince Edward Island. The receipts on account of passengers. The amount of freight carried both ways and the receipts therefor. The total expense and total receipts in connection with said steamer up to 15th April, 1895. And amount received for freight and passengers carried by the said steamer from Pictou to Charlottetown in the spring of 1894 and the spring of 1895 respectively.

Also, a statement showing the total expenditure of said railway from said period. Also, a statement showing the total expenditure of said railway from the same period on the following accounts respectively :--

- (a). Wages and salaries of employees.(b). Payments to the President as such.
- (c). Payments to the Directors as such.
- (d). Payments for other working expenses.

(e). Payments on construction account not included in above.

Sir Adolphe Caron presented,—Return to an Address to His Excellency the Governor General of the 21st May, 1894, for copies of all correspondence that has passed between the Post Office Department here, or any other Department of the Canadian Government and the Government of the United States on the subject of certain packets of printed papers franked by a member of the United States Congress which were received in this country from the United States, and which, according to a statement made in the House by the Postmaster Gemeral, 2nd April, were sent to the Dead Letter Office as not being prepaid by stamps and not being legislative papers or documents.

Also, copies of all correspondence that has passed between the Canadian and United States Governments on the subject of franked matter through the mails from one country to the other.

Also, copies of all correspondence that has passed between the Post Office Department and individuals to whom such rejected matter was addressed.

Also, copies of all correspondence between the Post Office Department and any of the officers of the Department on this subject, and copies of instructions sent to said officers in connection therewith.

Mr. Montague laid before the House, by command of His Excellency the Governor General,—Annual Report of the Department of Public Printing and Stationery for the Dominion of Canada, for year ending 30th June, 1894, with a partial report for services during six months ending 31st December, 1894.

The following Bills were introduced, read the first time, and ordered for a second reading to-morrow, viz. :--

By Mr. Montague :- Bill No. 130, further to amend the Civil Service Act ;- and

By Sir Charles Hibbert Tupper: -Bill No. 131, to amend the Acts respecting Penitentiaries.

Mr. Casey moved, That it is expedient to provide for the inspection of locomotive boilers by Government officials in the same manner as is now provided in regard to marine and other boilers.

And a Debate arising thereon,—the said motion was, with leave of the House, withdrawn.

Mr. Flint moved, That an Address be voted to His Excellency the Governor General for copies of all petitions and correspondence between the Coast Railway Company of Nova Scotia, or any of its promoters or directors, and the Government, in relation to the Company's undertaking. Also for copies of all correspondence between E. Franklin Clements, J. D. Rolston, Frederick Bard or other promoters of the South Shore Railway Company of Nova Scotia, or any of the directors of the said Company, and the Government up to date of proceedings in the Courts of Nova Scotia to wind up the said Company. Also, copies of all petitions, agreements and correspondence between the said Company and the Government, with reference to the obtaining of a charter for a new Company, from the Dominion Parliament, and relating to the undertaking of the said Company or the undertaking of the Company proposed to be incorporated.

And a Debate arising thereon;

At Six o'clock, P.M., Mr. Speaker left the Chair, to resume the same at half-past Seven o'clock, P.M.

The Bill No. 90, respecting the Oshawa Railway Company, was considered in Committee of the Whole, reported without amendment, read the third time, and passed.

The Bill No. 34, respecting the Toronto, Hamilton and Buffalo Railway Company, was considered in Committee of the Whole, and progress having been made and reported,—the Committee obtained leave to sit again at the next sitting of the House.

Mr. Muluck moved, That the Bill No. 4, to reduce the salary of the Governor General, be now read a second time.

Mr. Daly moved in amendment thereto, That the word "now" in the proposed motion be struck out, and the words "this day six months" be inserted instead thereof.

And a Debate arising thereon,—the said Debate was, on motion of Sir James Grant, adjourned.

The House then adjourned.

"Sacred Congregation for the propagation of the Faith.

"Protocol No. 12051.

"ROME, May 14th, 1895.

"Most Illustrious and Reverend Lord Bishop:

"The Sacred Congregation of the Propaganda is informed that laws very onerous for the Catholics of Manitoba have been recently adopted by the Provincial Government. That fact is the more to be deplored because those laws are contrary to a condition of things established in favour of the Catholics of that province by solemn compacts, and because they discriminate against Catholic schools, which had been flourishing in that country.

"It is, therefore, with reason that in order to remove such a serious danger all the Canadian Bishops have undertaken the protection of those Catholics by most praiseworthy communications with the Federal Government.

"The good-will and the authority of the Dominion Government in favour of the violated rights of the Catholics and in support of the efforts of the Bishops, have not been wanting. But obstacles of no light character have up to this moment prevented the carrying into effect of these good intentions. Now, however, that by the judgment of the English Privy Council, recently given, full authority is given to the Federal Government to deal with that most important business, there is hope that the affair will take such a turn that both the undoubted rights of the religion and the good of the country will be accomplished. But the opportunity must be seized without loss of time, and the protection of those Catholics must not be abandoned. Therefore, this Sacred Council, in a matter of such great importance, cannot but encourage and confirm by its words the zeal displayed by the Catholics, and especially by the Canadian Bishops. While also praising them for the earnest work already done for that most just cause, we express the hope that they will, with all their power prosecute the noble work thus commenced and press it to a happy termination.

An erroneous opinion seems to exist in certain minds to the effect that there is no danger in what are called neutral schools, and that Catholic children may, without any difficulty attend them. For, with few exceptions, these schools, which are called neutral, because the true religion is excluded from them with all other religions, have this bad effect that they exclude the religious principles, which should preside over human affairs, and especially in the education of youth. It is not permitted to assert that the private tuition of the parents can sufficiently remedy that defect. It can only remedy the evil partially, and it does not remedy the great wrong caused by an education given in godless schools. To that, we must add the fact that the dignity of religion must be much diminished in the opinion of children if they see it deprived of all public honour and confined within the walls of private houses. What will it be, if the parents, through negligence or on account of their ordinary occupations, do not give or cause others to give to their children any other education than that given in the school, and do not provide for their religious education.

Therefore, nothing is more conducive to the preservation of the faith among the people, nothing better can be done, especially in these times, when we see it attacked by so many errors, than to inculcate by means of the Catholic schools religion and piety in the tender minds of young children, in order that at the same time that they learn literature and the liberal arts they shall learn the doctrines ordained for a Christian life, and shall retain them firmly engraved in their minds for the rest of their lives.

He will have deserved well of religion who shall have given his care and his strength to the attaining of that object.

In conclusion, impressed by these principles which the Canadian Bishops have promoted with so much constancy, this Sacred Council commend most strongly their zeal in favour of the religious education of the Catholics of Manitoba, and hope that they will secure the triumph of their just cause, and will save the Church from a grievous wrong.

Mgr. Gravel's circular letter, including his report to Rome, written in French, reads as follows:-

CIRCULAR TO THE CLERGY.

Gentlemen and dear fellow workers :

I shall meet your wishes, I have no doubt, by bringing to your notice two documents relating to the Manitoba school question. The first is a memorandum which I prepared at the request of the Most Eminent Prefect of the Propaganda, and the second is a very important letter addressed by the same eminent personage to all the bishops of the Dominion of Canada.

THE REPORT TO ROME.

Rome, December 7th, 1894.

To His Eminence Cardinal Ledochowski, Prefect of the Sacred Congregation of the Propaganda:

Your Eminence:

I have the honour to submit to your Eminence the report which you have requested me to prepare on the question of the Manitoba schools.

I have done the work from memory, not having at hand any book or document relating to this question.

I believe, however, that I can affirm that the account which I give of the events surrounding this affair is strictly true.

The Confederation known under the name of the Dominion of Canada is composed of seven fully organized provinces, and of four territories still partially unorganized. Manitoba is one of these seven provinces. Her capital is the town of Winnipeg, separated from the town of St. Boniface by the Red River. Winnipeg and St. Boniface are about 1200 miles from Ottawa, the Federal Capital. Ottawa is about 120 miles from Montreal, and 300 miles from Quebec. There exists at Ottawa a Parliament for the whole Dominion of Canada, and each province administers its local affairs by a Legislature, at the head of which is a Lieutenant-Governor appointed by the Federal Government. The Governor General, who resides at Ottawa, is always an English nobleman appointed to this office by the Queen of England.

Among the local affairs left to the administration in each province, we must include all questions that relate to schools. However, the provinces are not all in the same condition in reference to schools. Quebec and Ontario, which are the two more important provinces, have a system of separate schools. This privilege is guaranteed to them by the constitution itself. In the other provinces the schools are common to Protestants and Catholics. At the same time, in Nova Scotia and New Brunswick, a certain tolerance has been exercised towards the Catholics, who can, thanks to this tolerance, have their separate schools in various localities.

As far as concerns the province of Manitoba, it is well to say that it has only been under the system of Common Protestant schools since 1890. Its history before the year 1890 includes two phases, which it is necessary to understand to appreciate the present school difficulty. The first phase embraces the period that preceded its erection into a separate province, and the second phase includes the twenty years which have elapsed since its erection into a province, that is to say, from 1870 until 1890.

FIRST PHASE.

Previous to 1890, the territory which now forms a province under the name of Manitoba was part of an immense extent of country, which was civilly administrated by an English company of fur traders. That company was named the Hudson's Bay Company. It had received from the English Crown an exclusive privilege to carry on the trade in furs in that vast country, which then contained but few inhabitants, the great majority of whom was Roman Catholic. That majority was composed of whites, half-breeds and Indians.

Wherever there was a group of population the missionaries used to open schools for Catholics, and the Protestants were also in the habit of opening schools for their co-religionists. Several of those schools, under the direction of devoted nuns, or of brothers of the Congregation of the Oblats, were enjoying a pretty large amount of prosperity. The Catholic schools were supported by the Catholics, and the Protestants by the Protestants. The Hudson's Bay Company used to make them, from time to time, grants of money, as pure gifts.

Such was the state of things when an important political revolution took place in Canada. The provinces of Quebec, Ontario, Nova Scotia and New Brunswick, which up to 1868, had been isolated, formed the confederation as stated above. The Government of the new confederation immediately turned its attention to the vast country to the north, the possession of which had been granted by the Crown to the Hudson's Bay Company, and with the consent of England, bought that country.

When that transaction became known to the inhabitants, they thought they should not allow themselves to be sold as a vile herd of cattle, and formed a government, at the head of which they put an able man named Riel, to whom they gave the mission to prevent the entrance into the country of the officials of the Government of Canada. That leader accomplished his purpose victoriously. The Canadian officers presented themselves with certain troops, but were repulsed.

In that embarrassing predicament the Federal Government requested Mgr. Taché, who happened to be in Rome for the Vatican Council of 1869, to come back as soon as possible in order to pacify his people, and to act as a mediator between the two parties. Mgr. Taché hastily came back in order to play the difficult part of a pacificator. The Catholics of his diocese, which then included the whole country—1,200 miles in width by 000 miles in depth—entertained fears concerning the practice of their religion and the existence of their Catholic schools, after they would have passed under the authority of the Ottawa Government, composed of a majority of Protestants, and before laying down their arms they were desirous to make the Federal Government accept their terms. They asked, amongst other things, the continuation of separate schools as in Quebec and in Ontario. The Federal Government made that promise to them,

The same assurance was given to them by the Governor General in the name of the Queen. And Lord Carnarvon, then Colonial Minister in London, telegraphed to the Dominion Government, in the name of the Queen, to grant their demand.

A clause was therefore agreed upon as follows :---

"The rights and privileges which the Protestant or Catholic population was enjoying before the Union, either by law or by practice, shall be preserved to them after the Union."

This quotation is made from memory, but it certainly gives the meaning of the clause in question. Peace was then restored, and the first phase of the history of that country ended by its union with the Canada Confederation.

SECOND PHASE.

Immediately after the union the Federal Government constituted into a province under the name of "Province of Manitoba" a portion of the territory that it had bought, and gave it for the administration of its local affairs a Legislature composed of a Lieutenant-Governor and two Houses, as in the old provinces.

At its first session that Legislature commenced to make law in conformity with the Union Act, as understood by everybody, and gave legal existence to a system of separate schools.

Two Boards of Administration were established, the one Protestant and the other Catholic, each one having charge of the school affairs of its creed. The Catholics had to maintain their schools, and received annually, out of the public moneys, a sum which was in proportion to the number of children frequenting these schools. This system, so just and so satisfactory to both Catholics and Protestants, remained in operation until 1890.

During those twenty years of separate schools, Protestant immigration was more numerous than Catholic immigration. Protestants having thus become powerful in the Legislature of Manitoba, and most of them being foreigners newly arrived in the country, and being, therefore, little acquainted with the negotiations which had taken place at the time of the Union, thought that they could simplify that school administration, and enacted a law abolishing the Catholic schools, and establishing Common Schools, with only one board of administration, exclusively composed of Protestants. It was an audacious violation, by the right of the stronger, of the most solemn compact and the most sacred rights. In their trials the Catholics applied to the Federal Parliament and asked the disallowance of that unjust law. The Federal Parliament, by an unanimous resolution, advised the Catholics rather to apply to the Courts, in order to have the law from which they were suffering declared unconstitutional, the cost of those appeals to the courts of justice to be defrayed by the Federal Government.

The Catholics appealed in the first instance to the Court of Manitoba, which declared the law in question to be constitutional. They appealed from this judgment to the Supreme Court of Canada, composed of seven members, the majority of whom were Protestants. This court unanimously held the law to be unconstitutional. The Manitoba Government then appealed from that judgment to the Privy Council of the Queen sitting in London. That Council, which is the guardian of British interests, considered that it was more advantageous for the peace of the Empire to affirm the autonomy of the province of Manitoba than to maintain the rights of the Catholics. It therefore, reversed the judgment of the Supreme Court of Canada and declared to be constitutional, the obnoxious law passed by the Legislature of Manitoba. To reach that conclusion the Privy Council affected not to understand the force of the circumstantial evidence furnished by the negotiations which had taken place at the time of the Union, and by the solemn assurances given by the Crown. It claimed to consider itself bound by the letter of the act of Union, which says that : "the rights and privileges which the inhabitants enjoyed by law or practice before the Union should be preserved to them."

Then, says the Privy Council, under the regime of the Hudson's Bay Company, there was no school law, there was only a practice which consisted in the Catholics having their schools which they supported by their own money, as the Protestants supported theirs. The present law of Manitoba leaves the Catholics in the enjoyment of the right which they had by practice before the union to create Catholic schools at their own expense. Therefore, it does not violate the compact of Union, it is not unconstitutional.

That reasoning is so lame that it is impossible to believe that men of such intellectual strength as the noble lords could have advanced it in good faith.

Before the Union, indeed, the Catholics supported their schools, but were not taxed to support Protestant schools, whereas under this new law, the Catholics, while sustaining their own schools, are obliged to pay for the support of the Protestant schools, which the Privy Council is pleased to call neutral schools. The principal reason of the judgment is, therefore, false. This judgment was a cause of astonishment for all the Dominion of Canada. The Federal Government was dumbfounded by it. All the public men of Canada well know that the Catholics of Manitoba are subjected to a crying act of injustice. But what can effectively be done for them after this judgment. The friends of order and justice all over the country were putting this question to themselves, when another audacious blow was struck by the Legislature of Manitoba.

By the deplorable law of 1890, all schools became common. The Catholics lost the property in their school houses, their Catholic Bureau of Administration and fifteen thousand dollars which they had in their treasury. However, as the Catholics are generally grouped into parishes, the school officials of each parish elected by those interested men were found to be Catholic, which gave a Catholic character to the schools within their jurisdiction. This was a remnant of self-government on which they set much value. By a law passed in 1893, the Legislature forbids all religious teaching in the schools and permits only the reading of a passage from the Bible at the opening of the classes. This law contains other vexatious clauses on the subject of school books and of the qualifications to be required from teachers. There was no other alternative for the Catholics but to send their children to the neutral, but in reality, Protestants schools, or to build new school houses, and to engage and pay teachers, and at the same time to be taxed for the support of Protestants schools. With a courage beyond all praise, they decided upon this last alternative.

In the meanwhile, Mgr. Taché presented a new petition to the Federal Government. But this time, he believed he had special grounds for urging all the Bishops of Canada to join with him. The first reason which occurred to him was that the fanatics and some unbelievers in Canada had evidently chosen the Province of Manitoba to commence a struggle against Catholic teaching. After having triumphed in Manitoba, they would move the struggle into another province. It was important that it would be known that the Bishops were on their guard. The second reason was that many Protestants, and even Catholics, after the judgment of the Privy Council, were saying that the Catholics of Manitoba had no reason to consider themselves injured. The Legislature having given them good common schools they should be satisfied; it was said that in the provinces where a system of separate schools did not exist, there was not much fuss made about it; that neither the people nor the Bishops were complaining; that besides, the Church got along very well with neutral schools as was proved in the United States. Now, by calling all the Bishops to join with him in petitioning the Government to remedy the evils of which the Catholics of Manitoba were complaining, the Catholics of all the provinces would be aroused against the anti-Catholic agitators, and it would become evident that, in the opinion of the Episcopate of the Dominion, the Catholics were right in believing themselves injured, and in making complaints, and that the Church was not so easily satisfied with neutral schools as was claimed.

Mgr. Taché then prepared a petition very strongly drawn up, in which he demanded of the Federal Government to adopt remedial measures for the wrongs of the Catholics, and he requested Mgr. Emard, Bishop of Valleyfield, and Mgr. Larocque, Bishop of Sherbrooke, to solicit the signatures of all the Bishops in favour of this document. The mission of these Prelates was thoroughly successful. All the Bishops to the number of twenty-eight, willingly gave their signatures.

But the Federal Government, on its part, after receiving the appeal of Mgr. Taché, inquired of the Supreme Court of Canada if it would be constitutional for it to intervene in the Manitoba school question. The Supreme Court answered in the negative. The Government then brought the opinion of the Supreme Court before the Privy Council of London, where the question is still pending, that is to say, the question whether the Federal Government can constitutionally intervene in favour of the Catholics of Manitoba after the judgment of the Privy Council, which has been mentioned above.

While the Government was taking this question before the courts, the petition of Mgr. Taché was signed and reached Ottawa. In response to this petition, the Federal Government decided to make an energetic representation to the Government of Manitoba. They communicated to it, therefore, the letter of the Bishops with firm and dignified comments, which ought to have made it perfectly clear to the Government of Manitoba that the complaints of the Bishops were founded in reason, and that it should find means to remedy the just grounds of complaint of the Catholics.

The Government of Manitoba haughtily replied that it would change its legislation in nothing. So matters stand.

It is, therefore, beyond controversy:

1. That the Catholics had their Catholic schools before the Union;

2. That the Federal Government, the Governor General and the Colonial Minister in the name of the Crown, had promised them that they should have, after the Union, separate schools, as in the Province of Quebec;

3. That the Act of Union secured them this right by a special clause;

4. That during the twenty years following the Union the Legislature of Manitoba, interpreting the clause of the Act of Union, relating to schools, according to the intention of its framers, had given the Catholics separate schools;

5. That the same Legislature arbitrarily deprived them of this right by the laws of 1890 and 1893;

6. That if this violation of a most incontestable right is not remedied, this anti-Catholic movement against separate schools will perhaps extend to other provinces, and place Catholic interests in danger;

7. That it is important that the Bishops should not permit their noble petition to become a dead letter, but that they should, on the contrary, continue to vindicate their rights by a common course of action, in order to show to the anti-Catholic agitators, and to the faithful who may have been misled, that it is the sentiment of the Episcopate that the Catholics of Manitoba have been deprived of a clear and sacred right, and that the Catholics should keep themselves on the alert to prevent the same attempt in the other provinces.

Now, I am asked if the Sacred Congregation of the Propaganda can usefully intervene to assist in the settlement of this important question.

It is certain that the Sacred Congregation can contribute assistance of great value to the Bishops by giving them its support. As stated above, it has been sought to create the impression that the Catholics of Manitoba were complaining without cause, and that the Church would be well satisfied with the common schools of Manitoba, just as it is satisfied with the public schools of the United States. This opinion which it has been sought to create among the public would fall to the ground in the face of a support given to the Bishops by the Propaganda.

But in what way can this Sacred Congregation accomplish this intervention?

It might, perhaps, through the intervention of His Eminence Cardinal Vaughan, represent, among other things, to the Colonial Minister in London, that his predecessor, Lord Carnarvon, had given, in his own name, and in the name of Her Majesty the Queen, the assurance to the Catholics of Manitoba that they would have their separate schools, that, consequently, the Crown is bound in honour to fulfil these solemn promises, if it does not wish to alienate the heart of the Catholics of Canada. An intimation of this nature might have a good effect in reference to the judgment, which the Privy Council will render within a few months upon the question, which the Canadian Government has submitted to it.

At the same time, this Sacred Congregation might address to all the Bishops of Canada congratulations upon the act so noble and truly episcopal, which they have accomplished by their petition to the Government in favour of the persecuted Catholics of Manitoba, and express the hope that they will continue by common action to demand the equitable settlement of this question. Besides the fact that such a letter would be calculated to create a favourable opinion on the question, and unite Catholics in the vindication of their violated rights, it would greatly strengthen the hands of the future Archbishop of St. Boniface, upon whose shoulders the Holy See is about to place the burden of a succession difficult to be borne.

ELPHEGE, Bishop of Nicolet. The most eminent prefect at once placed himself in communication with Cardinal Vaughan, and it may be that his intervention has contributed, on his part, to create in the English official world an opinion favourable to the Catholics of Manitoba.

However that may be, His Eminence wrote me on the 18th March that "He had seized the occasion of the favourable judgment of the Privy Council to send a circular letter to all the Bishops of Canada, trusting much to the zeal and prudence of these prelates to secure a happy issue for so serious a business."

I communicate to you this important document, which should render more and more dear to us the cause of our Manitoba brethren.

Mr. Mills (Annapolis), from the Select Standing Committee on Standing Orders, presented the Fifteenth Report of the said Committee, which is as follows :--

The Committee have examined the notices given on the Petition of the City of Winnipeg for an Act to extend the time for the exercise of the powers granted them by Chapter 89 of the Statutes of Canada, 1889, and amending Acts, in respect to the utilization of the water power of the Assiniboine River, and find them sufficient.

As the time for presenting Private Bills has expired, the Committee recommend that that portion of the 49th Rule which limits the time for presenting Private Bills, be suspended in this case.

Mr. Tisdale, from the Select Standing Committee on Railways, Canals and Telegraph Lines, presented the Eighth Report of the said Committee, which is as follows :--

The Committee have had under consideration Bill No. 75, to revive and amend the Act respecting the Lake Manitoba Railway and Canal Company, and have agreed to report the preamble not proven, because in their opinion legislative interference is not desirable or necessary at present.

The Committee recommend that the fee and charges paid on the said Bill be refunded, less the cost of printing and translation.

Mr. Taylor moved, That so much of the Eighth Report of the Select Standing Committee on Railways, Canals and Telegraph Lines as relates to Bill No. 75, to revive and amend the Act respecting the Lake Manitoba Railway and Canal Company, be referred back to the said Committee for further consideration.

And a Debate arising thereon,—the said motion was, with leave of the House, withdrawn.

On motion of Mr. Mills (Annapolis), that portion of the 49th Rule which limits the time for presenting Private Bills was suspended in reference to a Bill to revive and amend the Act authorizing the City of Winnipeg to utilize the water power of the Assiniboine River, in accordance with the recommendation of the Select Standing Committee on Standing Orders.

The following Bills were introduced, read the first time, and ordered for a second reading to-morrow, viz. :--

By Mr. Martin :-Bill No. 132, to revive and amend the Acts to enable the City of Winnipeg to utilize the Assiniboine River water power ;-and

By Mr. Lavergne :- Bill No. 133, to again amend the Criminal Code, 1892.

The Bill No. 125, for granting to Her Majesty certain sums of money required rdefraying certain expenses of the Public Service, for the financial year ending the o0th June, 1895, and for other purposes relating to the Public Service, was considered in Committee of the Whole, reported with amendments, considered as amended, ead the third time, and passed.

On motion of Sir Charles Hibbert Tupper, the quorum of the Joint Committee of both Houses on the Bill No. 51, further to amend the Criminal Code, 1892, was reduced to nine members, and leave granted to the said Committee to report from time to time.

The Resolution adopted in Committee of the Whole on the 21st June instant, respecting certain fines, penalties and forfeitures in the North-west Territories, was reported, read the second time, and agreed to.

Mr. Daly then introduced a Bill No. 134, to legalize payments heretofore made to the General Revenue Fund of the North-west Territories of certain fines, penalties and forfeitures, which was read the first time, and ordered for a second reading tomorrow.

The Bill No. 123, further to amend the Public Works Act, was read the second time, considered in Committee of the Whole, reported with amendments. To be considered as amended to-morrow.

The Bill No. 113, to amend Chapter 10 of the Statutes of 1892, respecting the Harbour Commissioners of Three Rivers, was read the second time, considered in Committee of the Whole, reported without amendment, and ordered for a third reading to-morrow.

The Bill No. 124, further to amend the Act to readjust the Representation in the House of Commons, was read the second time, considered in Committee of the Whole, reported with amendments. To be considered as amended to-morrow.

The Bill No. 116, further to amend the Dominion Lands Act, was read the second time, considered in Committee of the Whole, reported without amendment, read the third time, and passed.

The Order of the Day for the House to go again into Committee of Supply, being read;

Mr. Foster moved, That Mr. Speaker do now leave the Chair.



PRAYERS.

Five Petitions were brought up, and laid on the Table.

Mr. Speaker communicated to the House the following letter which he had received from the Secretary of His Excellency the Governor General :---

OFFICE OF THE GOVERNOR GENERAL'S SECRETARY,

OTTAWA, 27th June, 1895.

SIR,—I have the honour to inform you that the Honourable Sir Henry Strong, Kt., acting as Deputy to His Excellency the Governor General, will proceed to the Senate Chamber, to-morrow, at 5 o'clock P.M., instead of this afternoon, for the purpose of giving assent to certain Bills which have passed the Senate and House of Commons during the present Session.

Mr. Montague presented,—Return to an Order of the House of the 3rd June, 1895, for a return of the manifests of the cargoes carried by the several steamships "Duart Castle," "Taymouth Castle" and Alpha and Beta for the past twelve months ending 30th April last, subsidized to run between St. John and Halifax and Cuba and Jamaica and other ports in the West Indies. Also, statement of the subsidies earned or paid to each of such steamships during such time. Also the names of all the shareholders in such steamships or in the company or companies entitled to receive such subsidies.

Mr. Daly introduced a Bill No. 135, further to amend the Acts respecting the North-west Territories, which was read the first time, and ordered for a second reading to morrow.

Mr. Foster moved, That the House do go into Committee of the Whole, tomorrow, to consider the following proposed Resolution :--

That it it is expedient to provide for the payment of a sum not to exceed \$150,-000 in five years to encourage silver-lead smelting in Canada, the payment for each ton of ore smelted not to exceed fifty cents.

Whereupon Mr. Foster informed the House, that His Excellency the Governor General having been informed of the subject-matter of the said proposed Resolution, recommends it to the House.

Ordered, That the House do go into Committee of the Whole, to-morrow, to consider the said Resolution.

Mr. Foster presented,—Return to an Address to His Excellency the Governor General of the 24th April, 1895, for copies of all correspondence not yet brought down between the Canadian Government and the Imperial Government and between the Imperial Government and the French Government concerning the French Treaty.

The Bill No. 113, to amend Chapter 10 of the Statutes of 1892, respecting the Harbour Commissioners of Three Rivers, was read the third time, and passed.

The amendment made by the Senate to the Bill No. 74, further te amend the Act to encourage the development of the Sea Fisheries and the building of Fishing Vessels, was taken into consideration and agreed to.

The following Bills were considered as amended, read the third time, and passed :---

Bill No. 123, further to amend the Public Works Act ;--and

Bill No. 124, further to amend the Act to readjust the Representation in the House of Commons.

The Bill No. 122, further to amend the General Inspection Act, was read the second time, considered in Committee of the Whole, reported without amendment, read the third time, and passed.

The House went again into Committee of Supply.

One Petition was brought up, and laid on the Table.

The Petition of the Atlantic and Lake Superior Railway Company; praying to be permitted to lay before the House their prospectus inviting tenders for the purchase of certain bonds issued by the said Company, together with the correspondence in connection with the same, was read and received.

Mr. LaRivière, from the Select Committee appointed to supervise the Official Report of the Debates of this House during the present Session, presented the Fourth Report of the said Committee, which is as follows :---

Before issuing a license to a company legally formed elsewhere than in Canada, the Minister must be satisfied that the corporate name of the company is not that of any other known company, incorporated or unincorporated, or any name liable to be confounded therewith, or otherwise on public grounds objectionable."



A Message was received from the Senate, agreeing to the following Bills without any amendment, viz.:-

Bill No. 95, to incorporate the Grand Falls Water Power and Boom Company. Bill No. 113, to amend Chapter 10 of the Statutes of 1892, respecting the Har-

bour Commissioners of Three Rivers;—and

Bill No. 122, further to amend the General Inspection Act.

And also,—agreeing to the Bill No. 116, further to amend the Dominion Lands Act, with amendments, as follows:—

Page 2, line 24.—After "Gazette" insert the following as sections three, four and five:—

"3. Notwithstanding anything in the Dominion Lands Act, the Governor in "Council may, on such conditions as he deems proper, sell to the Cochrane Ranch "Company the following school lands, namely:—Section 11 in township 3, range "28, west of the fourth principal meridian, and so much of section 29 in township "3, range 27, west of the fourth principal meridian, as lies north of the Belly River: "Provided, that such sale shall not take place until the Minister of the Interior has, "by notice in the *Canada Gazette*, set apart as school lands, in lieu thereof other "public lands of equal extent and value as nearly as may be."

"4. Section three of chapter twenty-seven of the Statutes of 1889 is hereby "repealed."

"5. As respects every assignment or transfer of a homestead or a pre-emption "right held or acquired under any Act relating to Dominion Lands, in whole or in "part, and every agreement to make any such assignment or transfer, made or "entered into before the issue of patent and previous to the date of the passing "of this Act, no such assignment or transfer or agreement shall be *ipso facto* null "and void, nor shall any forfeiture accrue in respect thereof; but the Minister of "the Interior may declare any such assignment or transfer or agreement to be null "and void, and such forfeiture to have accrued, or either, and such a declaration "shall have force and effect as if herein enacted : Provided, that no such declaration "shall have force or effect in any case in which a patent for any homestead or pre-"emption land has issued previous to the date of such declaration, unless the patent "has issued through fraud, error or improvidence."

"2. Nothing in the next preceding sub-clause contained shall in any manner "have force or effect as respects any lands in relation to which the subject-matter of "the said sub-clause has already been adjudicated upon, or is in question in any "court of competent jurisdiction."

The House then adjourned.

One Petition was brought up, and laid on the Table.

Mr. Tisdale, from the Select Standing Committee on Railways, Canals and Telegraph Lines, presented the Eleventh Report of the said Committee, which is as follows:—

The Committee, in obedience to the Order of the House of 28th June, 1895, have further considered Bill No. 34, respecting the Toronto, Hamilton and Buffalo Railway Company, and have agreed to again report the same with further amendments.

Mr. Tisdale moved, That leave be granted the Select Standing Committee on Railways, Canals and Telegraph Lines to sit during the time that the House is in session.

And the question of order having been raised that such a motion could not be made without notice or without a report from the committee itself;

Mr. Speaker said: "With regard to the motion which has been proposed by the honourable member for South Norfolk I would say that I do not regard it as exactly in the same light in which I regarded the motion which was made the other day to reduce the quorum of the said committee. Then it was urged that the committee could not meet for want of a quorum, but in the present case the chairman has moved, without any report being made by the committee, that the committee have leave to sit during the sessions of the House. Now it is quite competent for the House, in a case of urgency, it seems to me, to grant to that committee power to sit during the sittings of the House, but I think before coming to that conclusion, we ought to have some definite statement from the committee itself, such as a report, that it is necessary to enable the committee to get through their work, that they should be allowed to sit during the sittings of the House. I do not, however, agree with those honourable gentlemen who say that this motion could not be put without notice, if a report has been made by the committee that it was necessary for the prosecution of its business that the committee should have leave to sit during the session. For these reasons I consider that the motion should not be put to the House on the present occasion." Mr. Montague presented,—Return to an Order of the House of the 3rd June, 1895, for a return showing the names, if any, of persons appointed to the Civil Service of Canada under Chapter 18, 57-58 Victoria, and the offices, if any, to which they were appointed.

On motion of Mr. Coatsworth, it was Ordered, That Bill No. 34, respecting the Toronto, Hamilton and Buffalo Railway Company, be placed on the Order Paper for consideration in Committee of the Whole this day.

Mr. Wallace introduced a Bill No. 140, further to amend the Customs Act, which was read the first time, and ordered for a second reading on Monday next.

On motion of Mr. Foster, the House resolved to go into Committee of the Whole, on Monday next, to consider the following proposed Resolution:---

That it is expedient to provide that instead of the deduction provided for by section six of the Civil Service Superannuation Act, a deduction shall be made from the salary of every person to whom the said Act applies, at the rate of $3\frac{1}{2}$ per cent per annum on such salary if it is \$600 or upwards, and of 3 per cent per annum thereon if it is less than \$ 00.

Mr. Foster moved, That the House do go into Committee of the Whole, on Monday next, to consider the following proposed Resolution :---

That it is expedient to provide that for the present session of Parliament the deduction of eight dollars per day mentioned in section 26 of the Act respecting the Senate and House of Commons, Chapter 11 of the Revised Statutes, shall not be made for twelve days in the case of a member who has been absent from a sitting of the House of which he is a member, or of some Committee thereof, during such number of days, but that this provision shall not operate to extend the maximum amount mentioned in section 25 of the said Act, and that in the case of a member elected since the commencement of the present session it shall not apply to days prior to his election.

Whereupon Mr. Foster informed the House, that His Excellency the Governor General having been informed of the subject-matter of the said proposed Resolution, recommends it to the House.

Ordered, That the House do go into Committee of the Whole, on Monday next, to consider the said Resolution.

Sir Charles Hibbert Tupper moved, That the Bill No. 127, further to amend the Act respecting the Judges of Provincial Courts, be now read the third time.

Mr. Mulock moved in amendment thereto, That the said Bill be not now read the third time, but that it be recommitted to a Committee of the Whole with instructions to amend the same by striking out the clause increasing the salary of the local Judge of the District of British Columbia.

REPORT OF SUB-COMMITTEE ON EXCHANGES.

The Sub-Committee appointed to consider and report upon the distribution and purchase of exchanges, met at 11 o'clock, A.M., on Monday, 17th June, 1895.

The Librarians were instructed to distribute certain copies of Kingsford's History of Canada to Canadian universities and foreign exchanges.

The Sub-Committee agreed to recommend to the Joint Committee the purchase of fifty copies each of "Acadia," by Edward Richard, and of the Life of Sir John Macdonald, by Joseph Pope.

In making this recommendation the Sub-Committee unanimously agree in advising that in view of the large sums that have been taken recently from the Library grant for the purpose of purchasing works for exchange, the Joint Committee should return to the rule laid down in 1890 by a Sub-Committee consisting of the Hon. the Speaker of the House of Commons and Hon. Messrs. Davies and Blake, as follows :---

"The Sub-Committee report that it is of opinion that the grant for the Library is not large enough to justify the purchase of books for the purpose of encouraging native literature, and that the purchase of exchanges should be confined to books of a character similar to that of the exchanges received from other countries."

The present Sub-Committee also advise that, hereafter, when the Joint Committee is disposed to encourage the circulation of any valuable native work, it should recommend such work to the notice of the Government, in order that a sum might be placed in the estimates for the purchase of a certain number of copies. Mr. Bergin, from the Joint Committee of both Houses on the Printing of Parliament, presented the Third Report of the said Committee, which is as follows :--

The Committee have examined and would recommend that the following docu-

ments be printed, viz.:--20a. The Governor General transmits to the House of Commons, "The Manitoba School Case, 1894," being a report of the proceedings before the Judicial Committee of Her Majesty's Privy Council, edited for the Canadian Government by the Appellant's Solicitors in London. (Distribution and Sessionals.)

42a. Return to an Order of the House of the 3rd June, 1895, for a statement showing the various amounts paid by way of bounty on pig iron made in Canada from Canadian ore, the quantities produced, the parties to whom the bounties were paid, and such other particulars as tend to show the effect of such bounties, since the date of the last return. Also, a statement showing the same particulars as to bounties paid under the Act of 1894, 57-58 Victoria, Chapter 9, upon iron puddled bars, and upon steel billets. (Sessional Papers.)

70. Return to an Order of the House of the 3rd June, 1895, showing the num-ber of islands sold from the Thousand Island Group, in the River St. Lawrence, during the years 1874 to 1878, inclusive, to whom sold, the price at which each separate parcel was sold, and the average price per acre for the total acreage sold.

Return to an Order of the House of the 26th April, 1895, for a return showing the date the steamer "Stanley" commenced running in the fall of 1894, between Charlottetown, P.E.I., and Pictou, N.S., the date they commenced running between Georgetown, P.E.I., and Pictou, N.S. The date of each trip, both from Charlottetown and Georgetown to Pictou. The number of mail bags carried each The number of passengers carried to and from Prince Edward Island. - (d). Payments for other working expenses. (e). Payments on construction account not included in above.

84. Return to an Order of the House of the 3rd June, 1895, for copies of all correspondence between H. Langevin, Félix Pilon, Alexandre Théoret, and others, concerning claims against the Federal Government on account of damages caused to their properties by the SS. "Ocean" breaking through Lock No. 12 on the Beauharnois Canal in the spring of 1894.

86. General Rules and Orders, Exchequer Court of Canada.

87. Return to an Order of the House of the 10th June, 1895, for copies of all tenders received by the Government in response to an advertisement dated October, 1894, calling for tenders for the construction of section 1 of the Simcoe and Balsam Lake Division and section 1 of the Peterborough and Lakefield Division of the Trent Canal.

Also, for the approximate quantities of the various classes of work as specified in the forms of tender for both the above sections, and on which the total amount of each tender was based.

88. Return to an Order of the House of the 3rd June, 1895, for a return of the manifests of the cargoes carried by the several steamships "Duart Castle," "Taymouth Castle" and "Alpha and Beta" for the past twelve months ending 30th April last, subsidized to run between St. John and Halifax and Cuba and Jamaica and other ports in the West Indies. Also, statement of the subsidies earned or paid to each of such steamships during such time. Also the names of all the shareholders in such steamships or in the company or companies entitled to receive such subsidies.

90. Return to an Order of the House of the 3rd June, 1895, for a return of all correspondence and petitions from the Council of the Municipality of Morris, in the province of Manitoba, in reference to the taxation of unpatented lands held or occupied by settlers, within the limits of their municipality.

91. Return to an Order of the House of the 10th June, 1895, for copies of all correspondence with regard to the homestead entry of William Fleming for the north-east quarter of section 16 in Township 9, Range 14, west of the First Principal Meridian, and also of all correspondence with Nathaniel Boyd, M.P., as to said quarter-section, and of Mr. Boyd's lease of said land, and also of the regulations as to leasing land and as to homesteading leased lands.

92. Return to an Address to His Excellency the Governor General of the 14th May, 1894, for copies of all correspondence, reports, or judgments, in relation to the dismissal of Mr. B. Loiselle (postmaster of Ste. Angèle de Monnoir). And a copy of the record, depositions, declaration and pleas in suit brought in Montreal of Loiselle vs. Guillet, and the Inspector's report.

93. Order of the House for a Return of all petitions, letters or other documents from the inhabitants of Duvar Road, Prince County, Prince Edward Island, or from any other person, asking for a flag station at Duvar Road Railway Crossing

(1.) The Committee recommend that the "Electoral Atlas of the Dominion of Canada" be supplied as follows: One copy to each Senator, three copies to each Member of the House of Commons, one copy to each Revising Officer. Also that, in addition, each Member of the House of Commons be furnished with 25 sheets of the map of the constituency which he represents.

(2.) The Committee also recommend, as per report of a sub-committee appointed to examine into and consider an application of D. C. Chamberlain, Accountant of the House of Commons, for remuneration for services rendered as Accountant for the Printing of Parliament, that he be paid the salary of two hundred dollars per year, commencing on the 1st July, instant.

(3.) The Committee further recommend, as per report of a sub-committee appointed to inquire into the application for additional help in the Distribution Office, that Moses H. Seed be appointed permanently as assistant in said office at a salary of four hundred dollars per annum, commencing from the beginning of the present Session.

Mr. Taylor moved, That in the opinion of this House, it is expedient that a few of the large islands in the River St. Lawrence which are yet undisposed of should be reserved for the use of the public as a Dominion park.

And a Debate arising thereon,—the said Debate was, on motion of Mr. Foster, adjourned.

The following Address was voted to His Excellency the Governor General,—and Orders of the House issued to the proper officers, viz. :--

By Mr. Casey :--Address to His Excellency the Governor General for copies of all petitions, correspondence, documents, or other papers from the electors of the Riding of South Renfrew, or any one or more of them, or any other persons, addressed to the Governor General or the Minister of Railwaye, in reference to the closing of the Railway Station at Barry's Bay, a station on the Ottawa, Arnprior and Parry Sound Railway, in the County of Renfrew, and for papers or correspondence, as above, containing complaints of any persons against the said Railway Company, for inconvenience and business losses occasioned by the closing of said Railway Station, and for papers or correspondence, as above, complaining against the action of said Railway Company, so largely assisted by Government moneys, for inconveniencing and injuring public business, in attempting to coerce an individual into giving the Company land or privileges which the Company could not obtain by action at law.

By Mr. McMullen :- Order of the House for: 1. Return showing the names of the several railways in the Dominion to which a cash subsidy was paid.

2. The province in which said railway is located.

3. The number of miles subsidized.

4. The number built.

5. The amount per mile granted and the gross amount paid.

6. The number of acres of land granted per mile, and the gross number of acres given or now due to each company.

7. The gross amount of cash subsidy given to railways in each province.

8. The gross number of acres of land granted in each province, and the grand total of money and land given to railways in the Dominion.

By Mr. Laurier:—Order of the House for copy of all memorials, petitions and other documents from the Indians of St. Peter's Reserve, Manitoba, and of all correspondence in relation thereto, since the 1st January, 1892.

Mr. McMullen moved, That an Order of the House do issue to the proper officer for a Return showing the number of seizures of goods or wares of any kind smuggled into Canada in violation of the Customs Act, the country whence brought in, the value of the goods seized in each case, the name or names of the claimants and where seized, for each of the years commencing the 1st day of July, 1890, to the 30th day of Jule, 1894.

And a Debate arising thereon,—the said motion was, with leave of the House, withdrawn.

Mr. Davin moved, That in the opinion of this House, it would be expedient to apply \$20,000 to aid in establishing creameries and cheese factories in the North-west Territories, and that this sum should be considered as an addition to the Immigration grant; that, further, the Government should at once take into consideration the propriety of giving a bonus on butter exported to the London markets as is done by some of the Australian Colonies, and also of raising the Customs duty from 4 cents per pound to 6 cents, in order to enable the North-west farmers to compete with the Australian exporters in the British Columbia markets.

Mr. Rinfret moved in amendment thereto, That all the words after the word "That" be struck out, and the following inserted instead thereof:—"this House cannot find any special reason for granting, at the public expense, a protection for creameries and cheese factories in the North-west which is not granted to like factories existing in the other Provinces of the Dominion.

And a Debate arising thereon;

Mr. Sproule moved, That the Debate be adjourned, and the question being put on the said motion; it was agreed to on the following division :---

Mr. Davin moved, That the commissioners appointed to inquire into Canadian Pacific Railway freight rates have reported that Canadian Pacific Railway existing rates for grain are from one-half to one cent per 100 pounds less than the Dakota schedule from all points west of Regina, which last, however, applied to Edmonton and Prince Albert, would be six and seven cents lower than the Canadian Pacific tariff; that as regards live stock the Canadian Pacific Railway rate runs at \$1.35 to \$1.84 per car to Montreal, while the Northern Pacific and Great Northern charge from \$1.63 to \$1.91 for the same distance; that as regards coal and lumber the comparisons show still more favourable rates to the Canadian public. That this House would suggest to the Government that it would be well to open negotiations with the President of the Canadian Pacific Railway, with the view of coming to an arrangement with that company to carry for the next twenty years produce from the Northwest to the sea-board ten per cent cheaper than at present, on condition of the Government guaranteeing bonds to a certain amount for twenty years, and should the railways of the United States lower their rate, the Canadian Pacific Railway shall lower their's proportionately.

And a Debate arising thereon;

At Six o'clock, P.M., Mr. Speaker left the Chair, to resume the same at halfpast Seven o'clock, P.M.

(The Order for Private Bills was called.)

The Order of the Day for the third reading of Bill No. 34, respecting the Toronto, Hamilton and Buffalo Railway Company, being read;

Mr. Coatsworth moved, That the said Bill be not now read the third time, but that it be re-committed to a Committee of the Whole with instructions to amend the same by striking out the words "and all others" in the sixth line of clause 9c., and by adding to said Bill the following new clauses as 9d. and 9e. :--

Clause 9d.

The debts to be paid under the foregoing provisions of this Act shall include only the following unpaid claims :---

(1.) The claim of the assignee of Bracey Bros. & Co. against the Dominion Construction Co. for wages paid and material supplied by him in the completion of the line from Hamilton to Cainsville.

(2.) The claims of sub-contractors of Bracey Bros. & Co. against them, for work done and material supplied in the said construction.

(3.) The claims for advances by the Bank of Hamilton and the Bank of Commerce, to or for Bracey Bros. & Co., amounting to about \$11,000 and \$2,000 respectively.

(4.) Claims for labour actually done upon or in connection with said construction.

(5.) Claims for board of men and teams employed upon said construction.

(6.) Claims for material actually used in said construction.

(7.) Claims for goods supplied to employees of Bracey Bros, & Co. or their subcontractors engaged on said construction and applied pro tanto in reduction of wages.

Clause 9e.

That payment by the Railway Company of the said debts or any of them in respect of which the Dominion Construction Company is now under any liability to Bracey Bros. & Co. or their Assignee or others shall to the extent of such payment by the Railway Company operate as and be a release and discharge of the Dominion Construction Company as against said Bracey Bros. & Co., their Assignee and others, but nothing herein contained shall in any way prejudice any existing right of any creditor of said firm or their sub-contractors or any of them.

And the question being put on the motion; it was agreed to. The Bill was accordingly recommitted to a Committee of the Whole, and reported amended in accordance with the instructions. To be considered as amended to-morrow.

The amendments made by the Senate to the Bill No. 26, to incorporate the Bankers' Life Association of Canada, were taken into consideration, and agreed to.

The House resumed the adjourned Debate on the proposed motion of Mr. Flint for an Address to His Excellency the Governor General for copies of all petitions and correspondence between the Coast Railway Company of Nova Scotia, or any of its promoters or directors, and the Government, in relation to the Company's undertaking. Also for copies of all correspondence between E. Franklin Clements. J. D. Rolston, Frederick Bard or other promoters of the South Shore Railway Company of Nova Scotia, or any of the directors of the said Company, and the Govern ment up to date of proceedings in the Courts of Nova Scotia to wind up the said Company. Also, copies of all petitions, agreements and correspondence between the said Company and the Government, with reference to the obtaining of a charter for a new Company from the Dominion Parliament, and relating to the undertaking of the said Company or the undertaking of the Company proposed to be incorporated.

And the question being again proposed;

Mr. McDougall (Cape Breton) moved in amendment thereto, That the following words be added at the end of the motion: "Also for copies of all correspondence between the promoters of the South Shore Railway Company of Nova Scotia, or any of the Directors of the Company and the Government, from the date of the proceedings in the Courts of Nova Scotia to wind up the said Company, up to the present time."

And a further Debate arising; the said Debate was, on motion of Mr. Forbes, adjourned.

A Message was received from the Senate, agreeing to the following Bills without any amendment, viz.:--

Bill No. 97, respecting the Clifton Suspension Bridge Company ;---and

Bill No. 124, further to amend the Act to readjust the Representation in the House of Commons.

"And also includes any irrigation district incorporated under an Ordinance of "the North-west Territories."

Clause B.

"The provisions of sections thirty-five, forty-two and forty-three of the North-"west Irrigation Act shall not apply to any irrigation district incorporated under "an Ordinance of the North-west Territories."

Clause C.

"The Ordinance of the Legislative Assembly of the North-west Territories, No. "6 of the Ordinances of 1894, is hereby ratified and confirmed, and this ratification "and confirmation shall have effect as from the date of the passing of the said Ordi-"nance, namely, the seventh day of September, 1894."

Page 1, line 35.—After "time" insert "or in case of a vacancy in the office of "Speaker, or of the absence from the Territories of the Speaker after the first meet-"ing of the Legislature."

And also, that they had agreed to the amendments made by the Commons to the following Bills of their own, without any amendment:-

No. 109, further to amend "The Indian Act."

No. 141, for the settlement of certain questions between the Governments of Canada and British Columbia relating to lands in the Railway Belt, British Columbia.

Mr. Forbes-Either in Committee of the Whole or on the third reading of Bill No. 88, entitled "An Act respecting the South Shore Railway Company, Limited,"the following amendments thereto :---

1. That the following words be inserted in the preamble of said Bill after the words "Nova Scotia," in line 19 :---

"And whereas litigation is in progress in the Province of Nova Scotia, in the name of the Attorney General of said province, which calls in question the validity of said charter of said Company and its organization, and it is desirable that nothing in this Act contained shall be used as a defence in said action or in any other suit now pending affecting this Company."

2. That the following words be struck out of the preamble of said Bill, viz. :--

"And desires to extend its line to a point in or near the city of Halifax, in the said Province of Nova Scotia," being lines 19 and 20.

"Nothing in this Act contained shall affect or prejudice in any manner the rights or obligations of any party to any suit, action or proceedings at law pending on the 10th day of July, 1895, nor shall this Act or any part thereof be pleaded in any such suit or action."

4 Amend clause 4 by striking out the following words wherever occurring in lines 12, 13, 15, 17, and 10:-

"Queen's, Lunenburg and Halifax to a point in or near the city of Halifax, Nova Scotia," and also the words "at Bridgewater, in Lunenburg County," so that the said clause will read as follows :—

"The Company may lay out, construct and operate a railroad of the gauge of 4 ft. $8\frac{1}{2}$ inches from a point at or near the harbour of Yarmou'h, N.S., thence passing through the Counties of Yarmouth and Shelburne to Shelburne, N.S., and the Company may for the purpose of building its railroad and in connection with the approval of its maps and plans, divide it into sections of ten miles each."

Amend subsection 2 of section 4 by adding after the word "County," in the 24th line thereof, the following :---

"And shall contemporaneously with the building of the line to or from Shelburne lay out, construct and operate a branch line of railway from Liverpool to Caledonia, in the County of Queen's."

5. That section 6 be amended by striking out the words "\$750,000," and inserting instead "\$2,000,000."

6. That the words "twenty-five" in 4th line of section 10 be struck out and the word "twenty" inserted in lieu thereof.

7. That clause 11 in said Bill be struck out.

That the following be added as section 20 to said Bill:-

"This Act shall not come into operation until after Proclamation shall have been published in the *Canada Gazette* to the effect that the Governer General in Council has been satisfied by affidavit or solemn declaration that all the debts and obligations of the Company for work and labour and for materials and supplies and board of labourers, turnished to or for the said Company or any of its contractors or sub-contractors up to the date of the passing of this Act, shall have been paid in full to the original creditors notwithstanding any assignments obtained by or on behalf of the said Company or its contractors or otherwise."

The Committee recommend that owing to the advanced period of the Session these Bills be placed on the Orders of the Day, of this day for consideration in Committee of the Whole.

Mr. Taylor, from the Select Committee appointed to supervise the Official Report of the Debates of this House during the present Session, presented the Fifth Report of the said Committee, which is as follows :--

The Committee recommend that Messrs. A. N. Montpetit and F. Hughes be paid the sum of \$500 each for services performed by them during this Session in connection with the translation of the Official Report of the Debates.

The Committee have had under consideration the item "Tobique Valley Railway, \$19,341.54," as set out under the heading "Railway Subsidies, paid in 1893-4," on page 2148 of the Auditor General's Report on Appropriation Accounts for the fiscal year ended 30th June, 1894, and in connection therewith have heard a statement made under oath by the Hon. the Minister of Marine and Fisheries, and for the information of the House, report herewith the said statement and the evidence given by the said Minister, and the exhibit filed in connection thereto; and the Committee recommend that the said evidence and exhibit be printed.

(For the evidence, exhibits, &c., accompanying this Report, see Appendix to Journals, No. 2.)

The Committee have had under further consideration the items "Fredericton and St. Mary's Railway Bridge Company Loan Account, \$300,000," and "Fredericton and St. Mary's Bridge Loan, \$60,000," set out on page XVI of the Public Accounts of Canada, for the fiscal year ended 30th June, 1894, under the headings "Sundry Investments" and "Interest Special Accounts," respectively, and in connection therewith, have taken further evidence under oath, and for the information of the House, have agreed to report such further evidence annexed hereto; and the Committee recommend that the said evidence and that contained in their Second Report, be printed.

(For the evidence accompanying this Report, see Appendix to Journals, No. 1.)

The Committee would recommend that the following documents be not printed, viz. :--

Mr. Wood (Westmoreland), from the Select Standing Committee on Banking and Commerce, presented the Ninth Report of the said Committee, reporting the Bill No. 105, to incorporate the Ottawa Land and Security Company, with amendments.

The Committee recommend that Bill No. 86, to incorporate the Canada Insurance Promotion Association, Limited, be withdrawn as the promoters have signified their desire not to proceed any further with the measure this Session, and also recommend that the fees paid on the said Bill be refunded, less the cost of printing and translation.

The Committee recommend that owing to the advanced period of the Session, Bill No. 105, to incorporate the Ottawa Land and Security Company, be placed on the Orders of the Day of this day for consideration in Committee of the Whole.

On motion of Mr. Wood (Westmoreland), the Bill No. 86, to incorporate the Canada Insurance Promotion Association, Limited, was withdrawn, and the fees paid thereon ordered to be refunded, less the cost of printing and translation, in accordance with a recommendation contained in the Ninth Report of the Select Standing Committee on Banking and Commerce.

On motion of Mr. McKay, it was Ordered, That Bill No. 105, to incorporate the Ottawa Land and Security Company, be placed on the Order Paper for consideration in Committee of the Whole this day, in accordance with a recommendation contained in the Ninth Report of the Select Standing Committee on Banking and Commerce.

The following Bills were introduced, read the first time, and ordered for a second reading to-morrow, viz. :--

By Sir Charles Hibbert Tupper :-Bill No. 144, further to amend "The Winding Up Act";-and

By Mr. Foster :- Bill No. 145, to authorize the Treasury Board to exempt certain Societies from the operation of the Insurance Act.

Mr. Sproule, from the Select Standing Committee on Agriculture and Colonization, presented the Third and final Report of the said Committee, which is as follows :---

The Select Standing Committee on Agriculture and Colonization have the honour to present their Third and final Report.

The investigations made by the Committee at its sittings during the session have embraced the subjects of Agriculture in its several divisions, the question of branding cheese, and immigration.

On the subject of Agriculture the several Officers of the Central Experimental Farm were examined, and a report of the information obtained from them is hereunto annexed and submitted for the consideration of the House.

It will be found to contain information not only of interest to the farmers of Canada but of economic value to all who are interested in the welfare of the Dominion considered in relation to agricultural development. Much new matter will be found in this report and evidence, while many facts which were before known are presented in a new and striking light.

Mr. William Saunders, the Director of the Experimental Farms, was first examined (7th May). He stated that in all the operations which have been carried on, the lines prescribed by the Experimental Farms Act had been closely followed. The work of clearing, cleaning and fencing the land was begun at the Central Farm in 1887; that on the farm in the Maritime Provinces was commenced in the following year, as was also that on the farms at Brandon and Indian Head, and that on the Agassiz Farm in 1889. The Director stated that it required three or four years to complete the effective organization of the Farms. It is, therefore, yet early to estimate all the advantages for the farmers of the Dominion which may be reasonably expected to flow from them.

The nature of the work carried out includes experimental tests with the grains, root crops, vegetables, fruits, trees and plants, in particulars which are of interest and great importance to farmers. The number of varieties of farm crops he said on which experiments had been made is upwards of 500, and the number of varieties of large and small fruits much greater, including, at Brandon, 200 varieties of the bardiest sorts of Russian apples, and the same at Indian Head. So far, however, only one variety of Siberian crab has proved entirely hardy at Brandon and Indian Head.

At the Experimental Farm at Agassiz there now exists in very successful operation one of the largest test orchards in the world. As many as 1,800 different varieties of fruits are under test, of which upwards of 1,200 are large fruits, and it is believed that valuable results will be obtained.

The distribution of samples of seed grain in three-pound bags was actively continued during the past year. It was reported to the Committee last session that 88,501 of these samples had been distributed to 44,181 farmers from the commencement. This year between the 11th of February and the 6th of May, 19,040 threepound samples had been sent out to about 19,000 farmers, while there were at the date mentioned, about 8,320 applications which could not be supplied. These facts show the very great interest of farmers in this sample distribution. The practical results have been highly satisfactory in improving some of the grain crops of the country. From a sample of three pounds carefully sown one year, a farmer can obtain a good supply of seed for the next, and afterwards have enough for the improvement of his neighbourhood. This makes an appreciable accretion to the wealth of the country.

There has been a new feature in the grain distribution of the present year, namely of one-pound packages. of some of the new cross-bred wheats and hybrid barleys which have been produced at the Central Farm. The trial of these in many parts of the Dominion may be looked forward to with much interest. As many as 1,150 of the one-pound samples of cross-bred wheats and the same number of onepound samples of hybrid barleys have been distributed.

In explaining the several crosses tried at the Farm, the Director pointed out that he hoped to succeed to produce a variety of wheat having the qualities of the Red Fife, but ripening a few days earlier. If such a result could be obtained it would be one of very great importance for the whole of the Canadian North-west.

The Director of the Experimental Farms gave much practical information in his evidence relating to experiments with barnyard manure and some of the artificial fertilizers, showing the results obtained by applications to the different crops. The practical details afforded being of most interest in the information given, the farmer is referred to the report annexed. The information given with regard to hedge and tree planting, including shelter belts, at different points of the Dominion is interesting and the farmer is referred to the details.

The Director gave an account of the trouble which had been found in connection with the disease of Tuberculosis among the herds of the Experimental Farms and the methods taken for its extirpation.

The Dairy Commissioner, Mr. James W. Robertson, of the Experimental Farms, next gave evidence before the Committee, and the information he furnished had relation to what had been already achieved and what was hoped to be by the operations carried on by him under the administration of the Minister of Agriculture. The information he furnished was divided into four heads, namely (1) Dairying in connection with the various experimental dairy stations established in the different provinces of the Dominion; (2) the action taken under the direction of the Minister to help the butter trade by means of shipments io the United Kingdom; (3) the cold storage service and accommodation proposed to assist in the development of this trade; and (4) the outlook of the cheese market for the current year.

The dairying progress which has been made under the operations which have been carried out can only be described as remarkable. In Prince Edward Island, in 1892, there was only one dairy station on that Island. It was put up by the farmers and the department loaned the machinery to fit up the factory. Some other factories were built and fitted up at the expense of joint stock companies of farmers. In 1893 the Dairy Division of the Department of Agriculture managed 11 dairy stations. patronized by 1,187 farmers, turning out cheese to the value of over \$48,000. The actual cost to the Government in bringing about this result was \$2,500 for the year. including the salary of Mr. Dillon, the Dairy Superintendent. In 1894 there were 16 cheese factories and 2 creameries, and at the end of that year the value of the cheese and butter turned out was over \$90,000, of which amount \$11,830 was in butter. The quality of cheese made in Prince Edward Island was the highest and sold for half a cent a pound above the average price of Ontario cheese. The growing of corn ensilage and winter butter-making are gaining a decided footing on the Island and it is clear that very soon no further assistance will be required from the Department, the whole cost of which to the Dominion, to the end of 1894, was \$4,800. A wealth making progress of importance has thus been set in motion at a trifling money cost, the effects of which will be permanent.

The Dairy Commissioner showed that in the Provinces of Nova Scotia and New Brunswick similar operations have been carried on, with promise of much success, in addition to that already obtained. In 1894, 16 new factories were built in Nova Scotia, and 39 were in operation. The farmers are commencing to make butter in winter and cheese during the summer in that province. During the present year (1895) the Commissioner believed that there would be 49 cheese and butter factories in operation, and Nova Scotia will this year become an exporter of cheese. The methods pursued in New Brunswick are similar in kind. The travelling dairy in New Brunswick visited 68 places in the province, and the farmers were shown how to avoid making losses, and how instead to make gains. The Dairy Commissioner pointed out that the presence of His Excellency the Governor General at very large dairy meetings in the Maritime Provinces during the past year had the effect of quickening the interest and exciting enthusiasm among the farmers. As many as from three to ten thousand people being at each of these gatherings, together with Lieutenant Governors and Provincial Pre-miers. There was also present ex-Governor Hoard, of Wisconsin, a very high authority in dairy matters; and he published in his paper,-Hoard's Dairymanthe most widely circulated dairy paper, after his return, the statement : "They make the finest cheese there (P.E.I.) that I ever saw. . . . You would never know that all that cheese was not made by one man, on account of its uniformity. Every single cheese had been trained to a given standard." This is very satisfactory testimony from very high expert authority.

In the Province of Quebec very active work has been done under the supervision of the Assistant Dairy Commissioner, Mr. J. C. Chapais, who during the past year, addressed 9 meetings in Prince Edward Island, 1 in New Brunswick, 8 in Ontario and 82 in Quebec; besides delivering 34 lectures to the students at the Dairy School at St. Hyacinthe. The Dairy School at St. Hyacinthe receives \$1,000 a year from the Dairymen's Association of Quebec, and the Department of Agriculture meets other expenses. The work of teaching and spreading information as to the best methods of dairy practice appears to be very active in that province. The total number of cheese factories in Quebec is 1,192, and of butter factories, 262. The Dairy Commissioner expressed the opinion that this year the Province of Quebec will produce about half of the total amount of cheese exportable from Canada.

In the Province of Ontario, the Dairy Commissioner stated that in 1894 the butter-making plant which had been loaned by the Department to companies of farmers was sold to them and last winter they commenced to manage the business for themselves. It is believed that the teaching assistance may in the future be withdrawn from that province. The operations of winter butter-making, with the assistance of a vote of Parliament, under the direction of Dairy Commissioner Robertson, were commenced at Woodstock and Mount Elgin in 1892; and from these points have since extended all over Canada. Last winter there were in operation about 100 buttermaking factories in Ontario. The Dairy Commissioner particularly described the starting of a large factory at Renfrew, a joint stock company putting up the buildings and entirely furnishing them. The Department carried on the butter-making, so that the factory might have the advantage of the good name which had been gained. He said he had information that this factory would make a ton of butter a day after it had got well in operation in June.

In Manitoba and the North-west Territories the operations have been actively carried on. Travelling dairies were started in the province and territories last year, the procedure followed being somewhat similar to that in New Brunswick. Sixty-three places were visited. The work done appears to be approved by the people interested in Manitoba and the North-west, the fact having been expressed by resolution of the Manitoba Dairymen's Association. Butter factories have commenced in the North-west, and there is reason to hope for success.

In concluding this part of his evidence the Dairy Commissioner expressed the opinion that the vote for dairy service in educational work in the provinces may soon be very much reduced, with a view to discontinuance.

The second division of the information which the Dairy Commissioner furnished to the Committee, namely, the promotion of the shipment of butter, to foster the butter trade, is cognate with the third division of his classification, namely, cold storage, and both contain matter calling for serious consideration in the interest of dairy farmers. And both these points have again important bearing on his fourth division, namely, the cheese market in the United Kingdom. He stated that we now send to England 60 per cent of the total amount of cheese which is imported into that country; and he contended that if the Canadian dairy farmers kept on extending the cheese trade only, at the same time enlarging the flow of mild per cow and lengthening the milking season, the result would probably be congestion of the market, and consequent placing of the cheese trade in a very bad condition. He, therefore, held that safety would seem to lie in the direction of turning milk in larger quantities into butter instead of continuing to enlarge the making of cheese. He said that in this would be found to rest the only hope to escape from an era of low prices which would arise therefrom. At present the influence of Canadian butter on the ruling prices of the British market was hardly appreciable because we sent less than two pounds out of every 100 which were imported. The whole of the Dairy Commissioner's remarks on this subject are worthy of the careful consideration of the farmers, for the guidance of their operations. There is ample evidence that Canadian butter, if shipped in good condition, will command a high, if not the highest price on the English market.

He held the position that the same principle of departmental aid in dairying which had led to the results shown, increasing the exports of cheese from a figure of \$6,774,626.00 in 1886, to the very considerable total of \$15,448,191.00 last year, might with great advantage be applied to the stimulation of increase in the trade of butter. This very large increase of output was obtained at a comparatively small expense by the system pursued. The Dairy Commissioner held that the same principle applied to the shipping trade in butter by providing cold storage in Canada on shipboard, also on the other side of the Atlantic, would lead to similar results. What has been done, the Dairy Commissioner stated, has already saved financial distress in many respects, and there cannot be a doubt that the reasonable prospect of success which is offered by the proposals to promote butter export should receive the support of Government and Parliament. The Dairy Commissioner pointed out that Denmark offered for Canada a very striking example. Denmark had been even more inert in regard to butter-making than the Canadians have been, but from the judicious guidance and assistance afforded by the Government, that kingdom had become one of the most prosperous in the agricultural industries in the world.

The information furnished by the Dairy Commissioner as to the methods of butter-making may well be commended to the careful consideration of farmers.

The second division of the information obtained by the Committee during its sittings had relation to the branding of cheese. There was much conflict of opinion, the weight of evidence seeming to be against the branding which had been advocated; and the views of farmers so far as obtained are on the affirmative side. The opinions of both sides and the reasons on which they are based are sufficiently clearly stated in the evidence appended.

Mr. Craig, the Horticulturist; Mr. Shutt, the Chemist; Mr. Fletcher, the Entomologist; and Mr. Gilbert, the Poultry Manager, all furnished the Committee information relating to their respective divisions of the Experimental Farm of much interest to the farming community. Each narrated the principal incidents of their operations during the year. The Horticulturist dealt with the question of cold storage as a means of preserving the more delicate of the Canadian fruits sufficiently long to enable shipments to be made to the markets of the United Kingdom, where indubitably a large demand would be found to arise if the fruits could be safely carried there. The establishing of a cold storage system seems to be feasible in connection with that now being carried into effect for the preservation of dairy products. This proposal so far met the approval of the Committee as to lead to the passing of a resolution, on motion of Mr. Carpenter, seconded by Mr. Rooms, commending it to the attention of the Minister of Agriculture, and recommended active assistance in the carrying out of the project. The information furnished by the Entomologist contained matter of much practical interest to farmers, as did also that of the Chemist of the Farm. The relations of Chemistry to farming are now so clearly elucidated that advanced farmers everywhere are beginning to avail themselves of them. These will find matter of interest in the statements of Mr. Shutt appended to this report; and also similar remarks may be made with respect to the information furnished by the Entomologist. The damages which have been inflicted in the past by injurious insects, parasites and fungoids, have been so great as to make the means which may be employed to arrest the destruction they cause of very great interest to farmers. The Poultry Manager gave many interesting details in his evidence as to the advantages and economies of poultry keeping, which is a matter of sufficient interest to call for the increasing attention of farmers and others.

On the subject of Immigration Mr. A. M. Burgess, the Deputy Minister of Interior, was examined. He informed the Committee that there had been a decline in the immigration to Canada and that he did not see any distinct evidences of revival. He stated the whole number of arrivals of the immigrant class, at the ports of Quebec, Halifax and Montreal, during the year 1894 was 27,911, as compared with 63,447 during the previous year, and that of the 27,911 mentioned 20,680 declared their intention of becoming residents of the Dominion, being over 8,000 less than the previous year. These statistics, however, only refer to the Atlantic maritime ports, no attempt being made to obtain statistics from the interior ports.

Mr. Burgess gave a specific account of the homesteading which had taken place, there having been a particular movement in that direction from the western United States. He mentioned that the reduction of the vote by Parliament from \$200,-000 to \$130,000 for the present year would necessarily make a reduction of effort in immigration propagandism by the department, but he hoped that in the present state of things such would not materially affect the movement to the country. Mr. Burgess communicated to the Committee a letter from Mr. Alfred B. Owen, the Manager of Dr. Barnardo's Homes in Toronto, in which he described the system on which the Homes are conducted in Great Britain, where the children are first taken in charge. He particularly di-claimed the prevalent impression that these childdren are gathered in promiscuously from among the vagrant class known in England as "street arabs," and he asserted, on the contrary, that Dr. Barnardo's Homes come to the rescue of children of honest parents, who have succumbed in the struggle of life, and in consequence of which the parental home became broken up. He showed that these children were carefully trained in the Homes in the Mother Country in which they are gathered, and where they are furnished with such education as to fit them to gain livelihoods. He said those selected for this country are particularly trained; and that the exceptions to the rule of moral and physical well-being on the part of these young immigrants are very small. Mr. Owen claims that the following points have been established by the actual facts as respects the juvenile immigration which has been conducted for some years past under the auspices of Dr. Barnardo's Homes: -(a) That the system rescues from a life of street adventure the children from homes broken up by the misfortune of sickness or the death of parents; -(b) That less than one per cent of these immigrant children has been convicted of offences; -(c) That the bulk of those placed in the Dominion have experienced remarkable immunity from disease, the death rate and health statistics in relation to them comparing favourably with those of any other class in the Dominion; -(d) That as a rule the domestic relationships which have grown up between the children from the Homes and those who have taken them in have been mutually satisfactory; -(e) and that at least 85 per cent of those children who have come to Canada and arrived at adult age are now permanently established on farms managed or owned by themselves.

The question of the advantage of these juvenile immigrants has been for many years past variously discussed before this Committee, it having been always maintained by the officers of the Immigration Department that the adverse opinions had invariably rested on the cases of a very fractional number of exceptions, while the great bulk of those who had done well and proved of great advantage to the country were not taken into account. It is, therefore, to be pointed out that a sweeping generalization should not be made on the fact of fractional exception.

The Committee recommend that a suitable building be erected at the Central Experimental Farm in which excursionists and parties visiting the farm might be accommodated as a place of shelter and lunch taking, with a good supply of water, by fountain or otherwise, and other necessary conveniences for their comfort.

It is also recommended that at least fifty copies of the report of the Committee be supplied to each member representing a rural constituency, in addition to those usually supplied.

The annexed report of the sub-committee is submitted herewith, as a part of this report, together with the evidence herewith.

REPORT OF SUB-COMMITTEE.

The sub-committee appointed to examine into and report upon the present methods of distribution of the official reports on agriculture, with a view to suggest improvements in such distribution, if found practicable, beg to submit the following report for consideration of the whole Committee :—

1. That in view of the fact that there are not likely to be any additional number of reports to those already ordered from the Experimental Farm available in time for distribution in the current year, no immediate change is recommended.

2. We recommend that the Director of the Experimental Farm take such means as he can for the p.esent to correct the distribution lists to be used for the current year.

3. That the permanent mailing lists at the Experimental Farms be divided into Electoral Ridings so that each member can be supplied with the names of parties in his constituency receiving reports, with a view to a revision of said lists from year to year. 4. We recommend also for the future that in addition to the number of reports provided for supply of the permanent mailing lists at the Experimental Farm, a quantity be provided to the number of 250 copies of each of the Experimental Farm Report and the Dairy Report, to every such member of the House of Commons as represents a rural constituency, for his personal distribution.

Read, and on motion of Dr. Roome, adopted.

(For the evidence, &c., accompanying this Report, see Appendix to Journals No. 3.)

The House resumed the adjourned Debate on the proposed motion of Mr. Daly for the third reading of Bill No. 121, further to amend the North-west Territories Representation Act.

And the question being again proposed, that the Bill be now read the third time, Mr. Edgar moved in amendment thereto, That the word "now" be struck out of the motion and the words "this day six months" added at the end thereof.

Mr. McCarthy moved in amendment to the amendment, That all the words in the amendment be struck out, and the Bill be not now read the third time, but that it be re-committed to a Committee of the Whole House with power to amend the second clause thereof by striking out "the first subsection," and that it have power "to repeal section four of 57-58 Victoria, Chapter 15."

And a Debate arising thereon,-the said Debate was, on motion of Mr. Montague, adjourned.

The Bill No. 131, to amend the Acts respecting Penitentiaries, was read the second time, considered in Committee of the Whole, reported with amendments. To be considered as amended to-morrow.

The Order of the Day for the House to go again into Committee of Supply, being read;

Mr. Foster moved, That Mr. Speaker do now leave the Chair.

Mr. Laurier moved in amendment thereto, That all the words after the word "That" be left out, and the following inserted instead thereof:—" this House regrets the failure of the Government to deal with the Manitoba School question in a manner demanded by the best interests of the country, and is of opinion that the ministerial declarations in regard to the question are calculated to promote a dangerous agitation amongst the Canadian people."

And a Debate arising;

At Six o'clock, P.M., Mr. Speaker left the Chair, to resume the same at halfpast Seven o'clock, F.M.

7.30 P.M.

(The Order for Private Bills was called.)

The House went into Committee of the Whole on Bill No. 88, respecting the South Shore Railway Company, Limited. After some time passed in Committee, and the hour devoted to Private Bills under Rule 19 having expired, Mr. Speaker resumed the Chair.

On motion of Mr. Bergin, the First, Second, Third, Fourth and Fifth Reports of the Joint Committee of both Houses on the Printing of Parliament, were concurred in.

Mr. Ouimet presented,—Return to an Order of the House of the 3rd June, 1895, for copies of all correspondence and reports in reference to the condition of the breakwater across the Yarmouth Bar at Yarmouth, Nova Scotia, and a statement of the original cost and subsequent expenditure on the same.

Mr. Haggart moved, That the House do go into Committee of the Whole, at the next sitting of the House, to consider the following proposed Resolution:-

That it is expedient, in order to enable the Winnipeg Great Northern Railway Company to construct so much of their railway to Hudson Bay as reaches from Winnipeg to the Saskatchewan River, to authorize the Governor in Council to enter into a contract with the said company for the transport of men, supplies, materials and mails for twenty years, and to pay for such service during the said term \$80,000 per annum, as follows: One-half of the said sum annually, commencing from the date of the completion of one-half of the company's line between Winnipeg and the Saskatchewan River, or the completion of a line from Portage la Prairie northerly to a point of intersection with the company's main line where the latter is located through township thirteen, or from Gladstone and to the Saskatchewan River, and the other half of the said sum annually, commencing from the date of the completion of the remaining half of the company's line between Winnipeg and the Saskatchewan River; and that in the event of the said company not complying with the conditions to be made in relation to the construction of the first half of the company's line the Governor in Council may transfer the \$40,000 per annum applicable to such first half, to a company authorized to construct a line from Portage la Prairie or Gladstone to Lake Dauphin or thereabouts.

Whereupon Mr. Haggart informed the House, that His Excellency the Governor General having been informed of the subject-matter of the said proposed Resolution, recommends it to the House.

Ordered, That the House do go into Committee of the Whole, at the next sitting of the House, to consider the said Resolution.

The House then resumed the Debate on Mr. Foster's proposed motion: That Mr. Speaker do now leave the Chair for the House to go again into Committee of Ways and Means;

And the question being again put on the said motion, it was agreed to.

The House accordingly went again into Committee of Ways and Means.

(In the Committee.)

The following Resolutions were adopted :--

1. Resolved, That it is expedient to amend Section 130 of Chapter 34 of the Act 49 Victoria (the Inland Revenue Act), as amended by Section 4 of Chapter 46 of the Act 54-55 Victoria, by repealing such Section and substituting in lieu thereof, as follows:—

130. There shall be imposed, levied and collected on all spirits distilled, the following duties of excise, which shall be paid to the collector of Inland Revenue, as herein provided, that is to say:—

(a.) When the material used in the manufacture thereof consists of not less than ninety per cent by weight, of raw or unmalted grain—on every gallon of the strength of proof by Sykes' hydrometer, and so in proportion for any greater or less strength than the strength of proof, and for any less quantity than a gallon, one dollar and seventy cents;

(b.) When manufactured exclusively from malted barley, taken to the distillery in bond and on which no duty of customs or excise has been paid, or when manufactured from raw or unmalted grain, used in combination, in such proportions as the Department of Inland Revenue prescribes, with malted barley taken to the distillery in bond and on which no duty of customs or of excise has been paid—on every gallon of the strength of proof by Sykes' hydrometer, and so in proportion for any greater or less strength, and for any less quantity than a gallon, one dollar and seventy-two cents;

(c.) When manufactured exclusively from molasses, syrup, sugar, or other saccharine matter, taken to the distillery in bond and on which no duty of customs has been paid—on every gallon of the strength of proof by Sykes' hydrometer, and so in proportion for any greater or less strength, and for any less quantity than a gallon, one dollar and seventy-three cents.

2. Resolved, That it is expedient to amend the Act 57-58 Victoria, Chapter 33, "An Act to consolidate and amend the Act respecting the Duties of Customs" by repealing the following mentioned items of the Schedule "A" to the said Act, viz.: Nos. 7, 31, 32, 55, 80, 81, 82, 152, 392, 393, 394, 396 and 397, and No. 708 of the Schedule "B" to the said Act, and substituting the following in lieu thereof:—

- 7. Spirituous or alcoholic liquors, distilled frem any material. or containing or compounded from or with distilled spirits of any kind, and any mixture thereof with water, for every gallon thereof of the strength of proof, aud when of a greater strength than that of proof, at the same rate on the increased quantity that there would be if the liquors were reduced to the strength of proof. When the liquors are of a less strength than that of proof, the duty shall be at a rate herein provided, but computed on a reduced quantity of the liquors in proportion to the lesser degree of strength; provided, however, that no reduction in quantity shall be computed or made on any liquors below the strength of fifteen per cent under proof, but all such liquors shall be computed as of the strength of fifteen
 - per cent under proof, as follows :---(a.) Ethyl alcohol, or the substance commonly known as alcohol, hydrated oxide of ethyl or spirits of wine; gin of all kinds, n.e.s.; rum, whiskey and all spirituous or
 - alcoholic liquors, n.o.p.; amyl alcohol or fusel oil, or any substance known as potato spirit or potato oil; methyl alcohol, wood alcohol, wood naphtha, pyroxlic spirit or any substance known as wood spirit or methylated spirits, absinthe, arrack or palm spirit, brandy, including artificial brandy and imitations of brandy; cordials and liqueurs of all kinds, n.e.s.; mescal, pulque, rum shrub, schiedam and other schnapps; tafia, angostura and similar alcoholic bitters or beverages, two dollars and twenty-five cents
 - (b.) Spirits and strong waters of any kind, mixed with any ingredient or ingredients as being or known or designated as anodynes, elixirs, essences, extracts, lotions, tinctures or medicines, n.e.s., two dollars and twenty-five cents per gallon and thirty per cent ad valorem \$2.25 p. gall.

4. Resolved, That it is expedient to provide that the foregoing resolutions and the alterations thereby made in the Duties of Customs and of Excise on the articles therein mentioned, shall take effect on and after the third day of May instant.

5. Resolved, That it is expedient to further amend the Act 57-58 Victoria, Chapter 33, intituled : "An Act to consolidate and amend the Acts respecting the Duties of Customs," by adding the following items to the schedule "A" to the said Act, viz. :--199a. Salmon, fresh, n.e.s., one-half cent per pound, provided that

such salmon may be imported free of duty upon proclamation of the Governor in Council, which may be issued whenever it appears to his satisfaction that fresh salmon may be imported into the United States from Canada free of duty.....

Resolved, That towards making good the Supply granted to Her Majesty, on account of certain expenses of the Public Service for the financial year ending the 30th June, 1896, the sum of \$20,605,459.80 be granted out of the Consolidated Revenue Fund of Canada.

Resolution to be reported.

The said Resolution was reported, read the second time, and agreed to, and the Committee of Ways and Means to sit again at the next sitting of the House.

Mr. Foster then presented a Bill No. 149 for, granting to Her Majesty certain sums of money required for defraying certain expenses of the Public Service, for the financial year ending the 30th June, 1896, and for other purposes relating to the Public Service, which was read the first time, and ordered for a second reading at the next sitting of the House this day.

The following Bills were severally read the second time, considered in Committee of the Whole, reported without amendment, read the third time, and passed, viz.:--

Bill No. 146, to amend the Customs Tariff, 1894.

Bill No. 147, further to amend the Inland Revenue Act ;--and

Bill No. 148, respecting the bounty on Beet-root Sugar.

The amendments made by the Senate to the Bill No. 98, respecting the Quebec, Montmorency and Charlevoix Railway Company, were taken into consideration, and agreed to.

The House went into Committee of the Whole to consider a proposed Resolution respecting the Winnipeg Great Northern Railway Company.

Resolved, That it is expedient, in order to enable the Winnipeg Great Northern Railway Company to construct so much of their railway to Hudson Bay as reaches from Winnipeg to the Saskatchewan River, to authorize the Governor in Council to enter into a contract with the said company for the transport of men, supplies, materials and mails for twenty years, and to pay for such service during the said term \$80,000 per annum, as follows: One-half of the said sum annually, commencing from the date of the completion of one-half of the company's line between Winnipeg and the Saskatchewan River, or the completion of a line from Portage la Prairie northerly to a point of intersection with the company's main line where the latter is located through township thirteen, or from Gladstone and to the Saskatchewan River, and the other half of the said sum annually, commencing from the date of the completion of the remaining half of the company's line between Winnipeg and the Saskatchewan River; and that in the event of the said company not complying with the conditions to be made in relation to the construction of the first half of the company's line the Governor in Council may transfer the \$40,000 per annum applicable to such first half, to a company authorized to construct a line from Portage la Prairie or Gladstone to Lake Dauphin or thereabouts.

Resolution to be reported.

The said Resolution was reported, read the second time, and agreed to.

Mr. Haggart then presented a Bill No. 150, respecting the Winnipeg Great Northern Railway Company, which was read the first time, and ordered for a second reading at the next sitting of the House this day.

Then the Honourable the Speaker of the House of Commons addressed His Excellency the Governor General as follows :—

"MAY IT PLEASE YOUR EXCELLENCY:

"The Commons of Canada have voted certain Supplies required to enable the Government to defray the expenses of the Public Service.

"In the name of the Commons, I present to Your Excellency the following Bill :-- 'An Act for granting to Her Majesty certain sums of money required for defraying certain expenses of the Public Service, for the financial year ending 30th June, 1896, and for other purposes relating to the Public Service,' to which Bill I humbly request Your Excellency's assent."

To this Bill the Royal Assent was signified in the following words :--

"In Her Majesty's name, His Excellency the Governor General thanks Her Loyal Subjects, accepts their benevolence, and assents to this Bill."

After which His Excellency the Governor General was pleased to close the Fifth Session of the Seventh Parliament of the Dominion with the following Speech:—

Honourable Gentlemen of the Senate :

Gentlemen of the House of Commons :

In bringing this Session of Parliament to a conclusion, I have to congratulate you on the industry and zeal which have marked your labours.

The necessary legislation having been passed, the Treaty of Commerce with France, from which favourable commercial results may be expected, will, as soon as ratified, be put into force by proclamation. The negotiations with Newfoundland to which reference was made at the

The negotiations with Newfoundland to which reference was made at the opening of the Session, I regret to say have not resulted in any agreement for the present.

The reply of the Provincial Legislature of Manitoba to the Remedial Order issued by my Government on the 21st March last was considered of such a character as to justify postponement of further action until next Session.

I am pleased to observe the grant of Parliament in aid of the fund contributed by the Canadian people for the benefit of the family of the late Right Honourable Sir John Thompson.

The amendments which have been made to the law relating to the Civil Service, will, it is believed, result in increased efficiency and economy.

The Legislation of the Session will, I trust, lead to an improved administration of criminal law, to the advancement of commerce and the extension of railway and telegraphic communication.

Gentlemen of the House of Commons:

I thank you for the liberal provision which you have made for the services of the current year.

Honourable Gentlemen of the Senate, and Gentlemen of the House of Commons:

In relieving you from your duties, I venture to express the hope that you will find among the people you represent a continuance of that prosperity which marked the opening year.
