## ATTENDANCE INCREASES IN HAMILTON SCHOOLS

Average For December N ariy 500 Greater Than in Same Month in 1910.

HAMILTON, Jan. 4.—(Special.)—The number of pupils enrolled in the pub-HAMILTON, Jan. 4.—(Special.)—The number of pupils enrolled in the public schools of Hamilton last month was \$915, according to the report of the secretary of the board of education, which was presented to the internal management committee to-night. The average attendance for the month was \$628, which was nearly 500 greater than for the corresponding month in 1910. Of the pupils enrolled in the schools, \$801 paid 10 cents each for the privilege of attending, while 70 paid 50 cents each, and 44 others contributed \$1 each. That the pupils who attend the Hamilton public schools, if not exact paragons of virtue, are at least a pretty good bunch of boys and girls, is attested by the fact that only \$1 were the recipients of corporal punishment during the month of December.

Salary increases Not yet.

Several applications for increases in the salaries of the teaching staff in the public schools were laid before the committee to-night, but they were laid over until June.

At the conclusion of the committee's business a vote of thanks was tendered Chairman J. W. Lamoreaux, for the manner in which he presided over the meetings during the year. Mr. Jamoreaux this year will become chairman of the board of education, which office J. Orr Callaghan, in moving the vote of thanks, described as "the greatest honor that can be conferred on a citizen of Hamilton." R. H. Foster, secretary of the board, was also accorded a vote of thanks for his services.


OTTAWA, Jan. 4 .- (Special.) -- The icial correspondence between the department of trade and commerce and land, W. A. Beddie deveals the rectification of a curious anomaly. Mr. Beddoe observed that the official statistics entered the imports into New Zealand from Canada and from British Columbia separately, thus at once confusing the figures and creating the impression that British Columbia was not a part of the Dominion.

On communicating with the registrar-general, he found that in 1891 complaint was made by British Columbia boards of trade that certain shipments of lumber from British Columbia were credited to the United States. The New Zealand authorities remedied the situation by according British Columbia separate recognition.

The confusion thus created being represented to him, the government statistician of New Zealand agreed to enter all imports from Canada under the one head.



## Hockey Games O. H. A.

National Commission Grant Recognition on Last Day of Meeting -Praft Prices Boosted.

Class AA league clubs are permitted to draft from any league of a lower classi-fication, including the Class A, provided that the latter class club has not lost a player by draft to the major league

Class A 28, Class B 28, Class C 24. No regulation was made for the Class D leagues.

From May is to Aug. 20 major league clubs are restricted to 25 players, while the restriction in the minor leagues are: Class AA 20, Class A 18, Class B 16, Class D. Heretofore the National Association of Minor League clubs paid an annual assessment to the National Commission of Minor League clubs paid an annual assessment to the National Commission of 1000. This was done away with upon recommendation of President Johnson of the American League and in the future the commission will stand the entire expense of running itself. This is the result of the healthy receipts from the recent world's championship series, as well as the inter-city series, which were under the auspices of the commission.

Another rule which has a bearing on all minor league players was passed at the request of the minors themselves. 



SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-WEST LAND REGULATIONS.

A NY person who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years old, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitobe, Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Land Agency or Subagency for the District Entry by proxy may be made at any agency on centain conditions, by father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of intending homesteader.

Dutles—Six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres, solely owned and occupied by him or by his father, mother, son, gaughter, brother or sister.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section alongwide his homestead. Price \$3.00 per core. water a day, which is the amount required by the city.

It will require about three weeks, however, before the beds will be properly seasoned and the plant working at its rest. Pure water will then be available from the taps. Up to date only about one-half the water has been going thru the filtration plant.

Three quarters of a million dollars have been spent by the city on the new plant, work on which was begun two years ago last spring. The plant covers 17 1-2 acres. There are 12 filters, which each measure 312 x 117 feet and each covers four-fiths of an acre. The plant has an 8,000,000 gallon reservoir.

The slow sand filtration process is expected to remove all the muddless from the water as well as practically all the bacteria.




