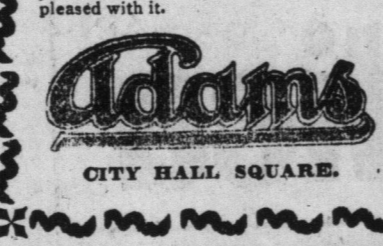

ADVERTISING CANADA.

Athletes Have Done Wonders—Strange Tributes to a Canadian Industry at Big Dinner in England.

Canada has once more been placed in the focus of the public eye throughout the world by Shering's wonderful run to victory over the historic road which links old Athens to the Town of Marathon by the sea.

In Canada's short history there have, in fact, been many such victories recorded; and many athletes in the different fields of sport and pastime have brought home with them the coveted trophies in the world's championship.

In industrial fields also this new country is achieving great fame, though little of it only bubbles up now and then under rather strange conditions. One instance recently brought to public notice was that which occurred at a large dinner given by the Sunlight Soap Company, at Port Sunlight, in England. The bill of fare was in the form of a miniature Copeland-Chatterton Perpetual Ledger, the menu itself being printed on a few ledger leaves in the front, the balance being composed of a small box filled with tasty chocolates.

The idea was in itself a novel one, being the fact that the Canadian ledger should be accepted as the ideal type was another tribute to the Dominion—solid testimony of the progress being made in foreign fields by Canadian firms.

EXTEND CIVIC PLANT.

Kingston Ratepayers Will Be Asked to Endorse By-law.

Kingston, May 4.—(Special.)—About two years ago the ratepayers of Kingston with some trepidation took over the Light, Heat & Power Co.'s plant from the private company at a cost of \$122,000. Since that time the sum of \$30,000 has been expended upon it out of the earnings. At the same time the cost to consumers has been reduced in the case of lighting gas from \$2 to \$1.50 per thousand, and for lighting by electricity from 14c per kilowatt hour to 12c, and for power, formerly 8c to 12c, now 6c with chance of further decrease. The council is about to submit a by-law to raise \$85,000 to be used in extending the plant. The by-law will doubtless carry, for in the light of the experience of municipal operation, the feeling is strongly favorable.

CHEESE FACTORIES IMPORTANT TO INDUSTRY

Government Bill Providing for Inspection Discussed by the Legislature.

Eighteen bills passed the final stage in the legislature yesterday, and it remains only for the lieutenant-governor to give his assent before they become law. Several other important government measures are ready for their third readings, but owing to the absence of Mr. Ross on account of illness final action will not be taken until next week. Mr. Harcourt intimated that the opposition would oppose the third readings of the public schools, education department, university, mines and county councils bills, and in all probability the government's several party divisions before the close of the session.

At yesterday's session there was a discussion of a bill to appoint inspectors of cheese factories. Several of the Eastern Ontario members spoke on the question, and generally approved the government's efforts to improve the sanitary condition of the cheese factories. Mr. Graham quoted a prominent dairyman as favoring more than one inspector for each factory. The importance of the industry demanded thorough inspection.

Extension to Petawawa. Mr. Duniop was granted leave to introduce a bill to permit the Pembroke Southern Railway to extend from Pembroke to the new military camp at Petawawa.

The premier spoke of the importance of the matter. If the railway was not extended it would be necessary for the Grand Trunk to transport troops at Pembroke. Under ordinary circumstances it would not be advisable to allow the rules to be transgressed, but it was a Dominion matter, and consideration of the military circumstances of the militia. He read a telegram from the C.P.R. that it offered no objection. The new line, it was explained, would parallel the C.P.R.

Mr. Harcourt, for the opposition, interposed no objection, and the bill was read a first time.

Confirms Sea Guarantee. Hon. Col. Matheson introduced a bill to confirm an agreement entered into between the government and the Canadian Pacific Railway Company, referring to the renewal of the guarantee of the Soo loan.

John Smith (Peel) introduced a bill respecting the settlement of boundary lines and double tract concessions. Final Stage.

The house passed 18 bills, several of them being important government measures. The list is: Respecting agricultural societies (Monteith); respecting horticultural societies (Monteith); to amend the Act for the Education of the Blind (Pyne); to amend the Toll Roads Expropriation Act, 1901 (Brower); respecting the Town of Midland (Duthoge); to amend the Western University and College (Hodgins); to incorporate the Town of Blind River (Smyth); respecting the Township of Oliver (Smellie); to amend the T. & N. O. Railway Act (Reaume); to amend the Supplementary Revenue Act (Matheson); respecting the Township of Shumlin (Ker); to amend the Act respecting the Agricultural College (Monteith); for the suppression of fowl brood among bees (Monteith); to amend the Municipal Light and Heat Act (Caracallan, Hamilton); to amend the Ontario Election Act (Duff); respecting trustees of certain burying grounds (Gibson, Erce); to amend the Devolution of Estates Act (Fox); to amend the Act respecting Actions of Libel and Slander (MacKay).

In committee the house considered Mr. Downey's bill providing for the exemption of woodlands from taxation. The premier was opposed to the principle of the bill, but did not think any harm would come by allowing it to pass. Nothing more disastrous could happen than that the municipalities should take advantage of the provisions of the act. It was hoped that in the future an extensive scheme of provincial forests might be adopted, and this minor scheme might interfere with it. However the act could be repealed.

Mr. Downey believed that it would point in the direction of an elaborate forestry scheme, but was answered by the premier, who did not see the force of the remark.

Mr. Craig withdrew his bill to amend the Public Schools Act at the request of Dr. Pyne, who promised to provide for the inspection of cheese and butter factories, as some of the product exported to England had been shown to be of an inferior quality.

Mr. Ferguson (Greenville) did not think the bill went far enough. The great trouble was the uncleanness of the stables, cheese factories and dairies, and the manufacturing of cheese produced from fodder out of season. Until conditions were improved we could not hope to compete with the continent in the manufacturing of cheese.

Mr. McMillan (Glengarry) hoped the government would invest machines to measure out the whey and compel farmers to remove it from the premises.

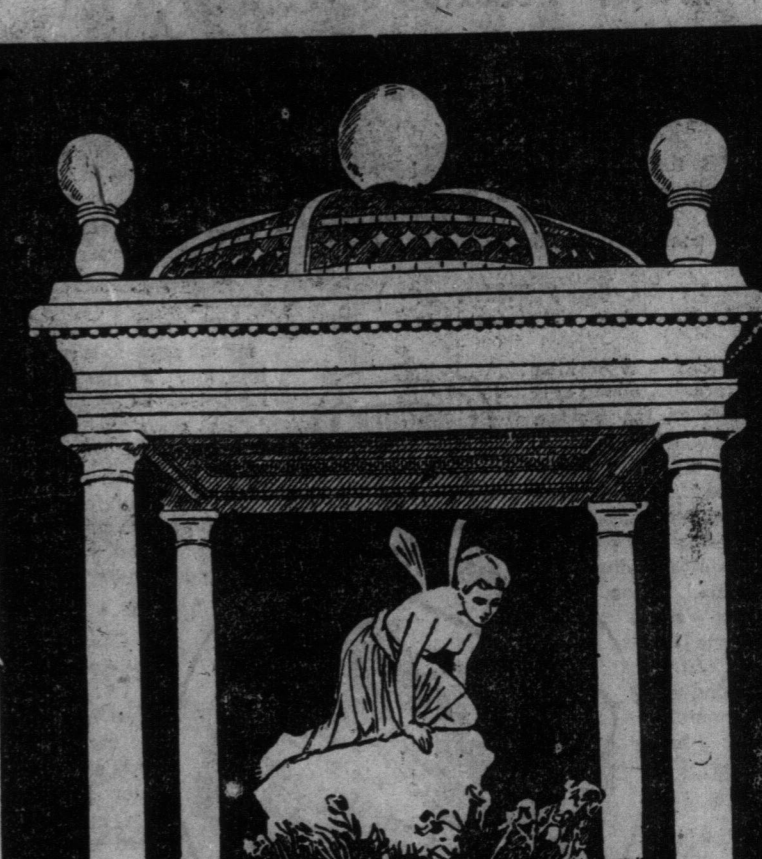

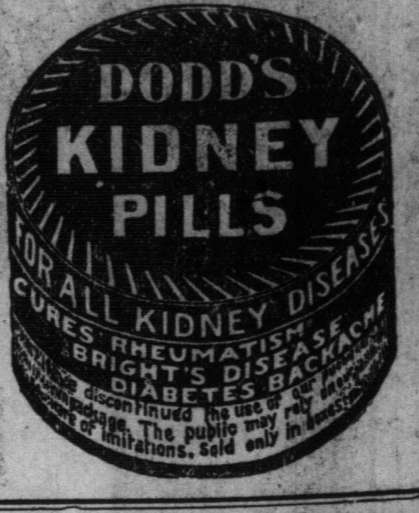

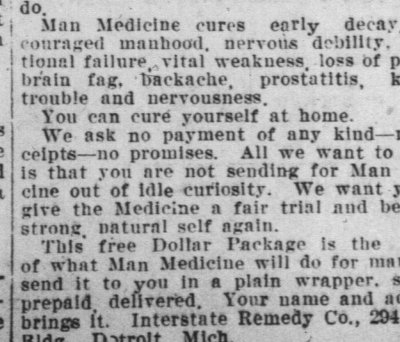

Means Big Expense and Probable Loss of Traffic, so Officials Explain.

This afternoon it was stated that the work of unloading grain aboard are now lying at the various lower lake ports awaiting to discharge their cargoes, which, owing to the strike of the longshoremen's union, cannot be done.

Soo Canal Opening. Detroit, May 4.—The traffic report for the Soo Canal shows the tonnage for April to have been 2,513,267, or nearly double the figures for the same month last year. More than 15,000,000 bushels of grain and 1,250,000 tons of vessels passages, and over 600,000 tons of coal was carried up the river. It was the biggest month for the opening of navigation on record.

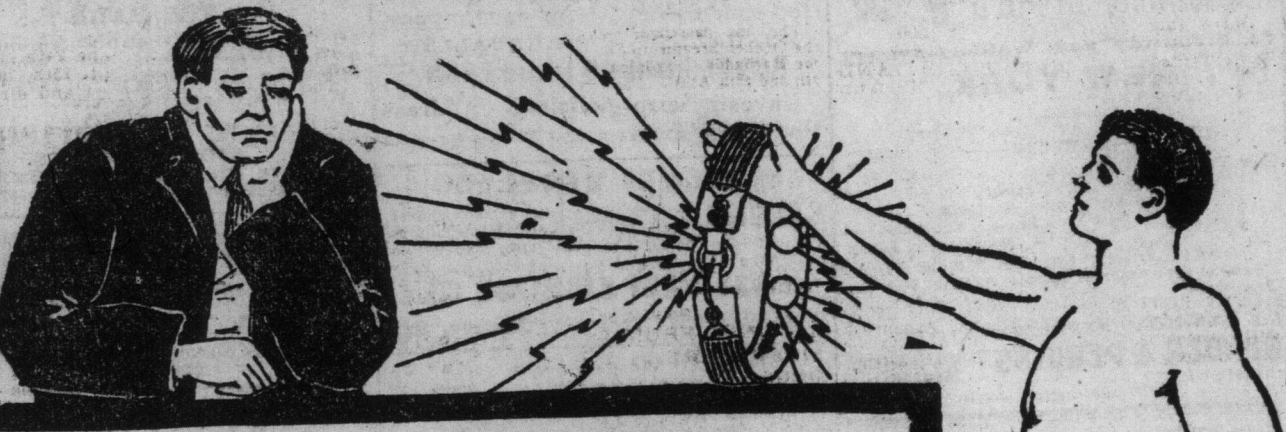
