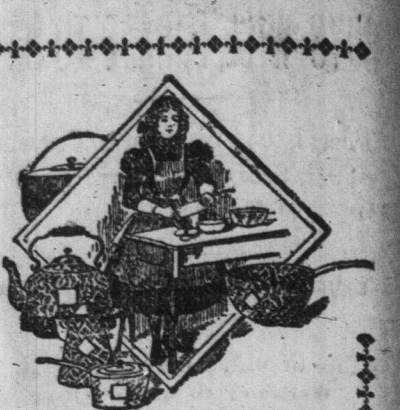

At the same time there is every indication that Great Britain is showing the most friendly consideration of the representations of both the ambassadors, and that the present difficulties are being settled in the most amicable manner.

Both the United States and German Embassies are now anxious to obtain a British declaration in regard to the treatment of neutral ships hereafter, and it is believed they exchanged views on the subject.

Of Course, All Denied. Washington, Jan. 9.—It is stated here on authority that the United States Government is not co-operating with Germany or any other Government in representations to the British Government respecting the seizure of goods destined for Portuguese East Africa, nor is any such co-operation contemplated.

LEFT TO DIE IN THE PRISONS.

NO WATER, FOR GOD'S SAKE!

The Exclamation of Electrician Frank Pond When Edison Plant Was on Fire.

RUINS FILLED WITH ELECTRICITY.

Stream of Water Thrown on Them Would Have Caused Death of Branchman.

New York, Jan. 9.—Nothing but ruins was left to-day of the Edison electric plant at 45 West 28th-street. The fire had been remarkable in that the firemen were compelled to stand by and see the flames lick up the plant for fear they, themselves, would be destroyed.

The plant is really a reservoir for electricity, which comes in a current of 6000 volts from the company's station at 36th-street. Pond was alone in the plant when a piece of machinery, known as a transformer, was blown into fragments.

That Pond was not killed is remarkable. Scrambling to his feet he found the interior of the plant blazing in a hundred places. Pond knew the explosion must have aroused the neighborhood, and that it was a question only of moments before the fire engines would arrive.

With infinite difficulty Pond crawled on hands and knees and turned off the alternating switches, but it was beyond his powers to reach the transformer. In the midst of his efforts he heard the engines arrive. Rushing to the street he yelled: "No water for God's sake men, no water."

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EATEN BY CANNIBALS.

Captain and Crew of a British Schooner Massacred on Admiralty Islands.

London, Jan. 9.—Mail advices from New Britain report the massacre of the captain and crew of 15 men belonging to the British schooner Mankama of New South Wales, while trading among the Admiralty Islands.

Only three boys escaped, and the natives, after murdering the others, inaugurated a feast ashore and ate their victims.

FRENCH CHAMBER OPENED.

Deschanel Re-Elected President of the House and M. Fallieres of the Senate.

Paris, Jan. 9.—The Chamber of Deputies was reopened to-day. M. Deschanel was re-elected President of the House by 308 votes, against 221 cast for M. Erlanger, who represented the advanced Republicans.

THE BOYCOTT IN PLAY.

Alleged Boer Sympathizers in Victoria, B.C., Have Had to Suffer—Vessel Scuttled.

Victoria, B.C., Jan. 9.—Indefinite charges of pro-Boer sympathy have resulted in the boycotting and serious embarrassment of a considerable number of Belgian and Swedish-Bore citizens, who vigorously repudiate any reasonable connection.

Capt. Victor Jacobson, who was reported to have originated the Transvaal aid campaign, had a fine sloop bored and scuttled at her moorings, after which the officers are offering substantial rewards for identification of their enemies.

Dewey Gets a Loving Cup.

Washington, Jan. 9.—A loving cup of silver made from the medals contributed by over 70,000 American citizens, the majority of whom were children, was presented to Admiral Dewey to-day, a small gathering assembled in the parlors of a heavy residence on Rhode Island-avenue and participated in the ceremony.

Deaf and Dumb Institute.

The annual report of the Deaf and Dumb Institute at Belleville has just been issued. The accommodation is not sufficient. For this reason a large number of applicants have been refused admission. The total number in attendance was 238. It cost \$48,215 to run it for the year. Each inmate cost \$195.00.

THE PREACHER GOT PERSONAL.

Rev. S. R. Robinson, of Bridgeport, Conn., Began Naming Alleged Sinners From the Pulpit.

THIS WAS A LITTLE TOO MUCH.

Several Stalwarts Moved on the Pulpit—Soprano Saved Preacher From Them.

New York, Jan. 9.—Bridgeport, Conn., departs today for a lively time in Zion Methodist Church of that city. The pastor, the Rev. S. R. Robinson, has been preaching red-hot sermons against tobacco, liquor, dancing and theatre-going. His congregation took the sermons in good part until he began to be personal in his remarks by picking out the sinners by name. Then there were protests.

In his last sermon Mr. Robinson pointed to a woman, with the remark, "Your husband is in jail."

"You have no right to say that in God's pulpit," shrieked another woman, springing from her seat.

"I'm here to preach the truth to a great sinner," returned the minister.

Then his eye caught sight of a score of stalwart figures advancing deliberately upon the pulpit from every side. Realizing that the time had come for disappearing, he retreated to the organ loft.

Burdette Lee, of the president of the Rice Lewis Company. He was 64 years of age.

THE PRUSSIAN DIET OPENED.

Imperial Chancellor Announces That the Finances Are in Good Condition.

RAILROADS ARE TO BE BUILT

And the Rhine-Elbe Canal Bill Will Come to the Front Again Shortly.

Berlin, Jan. 9.—At the opening of the Diet today, Prince Hohenzollern, the imperial chancellor, read the speech from the throne, wherein it was shown that the finances of Prussia were in a satisfactory condition. The year 1898-99 closed with a considerable surplus, and the current year, the chancellor said, was expected to give favorable results. The estimates for 1900 maintained an equilibrium, and the revenue of the State railroads continued satisfactory.

Railroad Building.—The speech from the throne also announced the introduction of a bill for the construction of light railroads, the re-annexation of the Rhine-Elbe Canal bill after the completion of the proposed waterway for large ships between Berlin and Stettin and other river improvements, and the intention of the Government to make the port of Bremen available for trans-oceanic steamers, with the object of rendering the Hanseatic commerce independent of foreign ports.

MUST HAVE STRONG NAVY.

Emperor William Thanks King of Wurtemberg for Assistance.

Stuttgart, Jan. 9.—Emperor William, telegraphing his thanks to the King of Wurtemberg for assuming the patronage of the Wurtemberg committee of the Navy League, says: "I hope the events of the last few days will have convinced the ever-willing allies that not only Germany's interests but Germany's honor must be protected on distant seas, and to this end Germany must be strong and powerful on the sea also."

Greenway v. Gardiner.—Chief Justice Armour and Mr. Justice Macdonnell yesterday handed out their judgment on the appeal in Greenway v. Gardiner by the defendant from the judge's decision at London. Their lordships find that the plaintiff should have judgment in the court below for \$171 and costs; the defendants also to have judgment in the same court for \$200 and costs on her counter-claim. The plaintiff's judgment is to be set off against the defendant's.

Clark, president of the Canadian Life Insurance Company; President Dominion Radiator Company; George H. Hres, manufacturer of Toronto and Detroit; J. Douglas Wright of Rosedale, vice-president of the General Engineering Company of Ontario, Limited; Wm. M. Gray, of the Merchants' Fire Insurance Company; W. Greenwood Brown, Manager Equity Fire Insurance Company; Ralph E. Gibson, president Conger Coal Company, Limited. 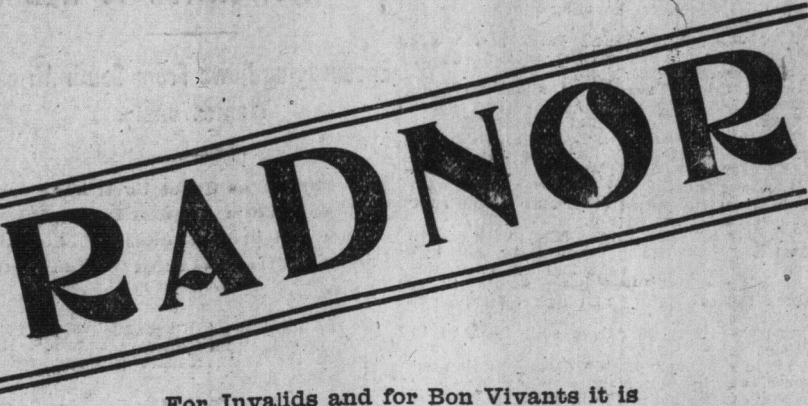
