London, Oct. 17.—The Alaskan boundary commission today reached an agreement whereby the American contentions are sustained, except those in relation to the Portland Canal, which Canada wins.

Where Alverstone stood, the long standing dispute was only settled after a week of keen, trying and secret deliberations between the arbitrators.

After lunch, the arbitrators, Secretary Root and Senator Turner agreed to concede those points and to start the American boundary line from the head of the Portland Canal, thus giving the Canadians that channel and some small islands which were not claimed by the majority of the tribunal.

May Refuse to Sign Whether Messrs. Aylesworth and Jetté, the Canadian Commissioners, will refuse to sign the decision and make it unanimous is yet to be known.

Bound to Secrecy The majority of the Commissioners left the Foreign Office hurriedly this afternoon in order to catch trains for the week end visit to the country.

Came as a Surprise The announcement of the Alaskan boundary arbitration this afternoon came as a complete surprise to all interested in the case.

Yankee Ever Content However, the Associated Press learned that a vote had been taken, and the decision to concede the American contentions, except that for the Portland Canal, which goes to Canada, had been arrived at.

No Hiccup Whatever No hitch occurred during the entire deliberations, and as these progressed the confidence of the United States Commissioners that a decision substantially upholding the American claims would be reached, was reflected in their conduct.

Cabinet Took Unto Death Spencer May Be Premier

Generally Believed Ministry Will Go When Parliament Meets, Says Ex-Attaché.

Chicago, Oct. 18.—"Ex-Attaché" writes to The Tribune from London as follows: Inasmuch as The Standard, which is not only the most cautious and sober of the great London newspapers, but also the recognized organ of the Conservative party, sorrowfully admits that the latter, which six months ago was at the height of its power, "could, naturally, stand with itself and its leader, and, above all, united, is now distracted, tossed on a sea of opposing influences and conflicting opinions," and in plain view of defeat; and since it is generally believed that the Balfour ministry will not survive the meeting of parliament by a single week, it may be assumed that some brief notes relating to those upon whom Edward VIII. would call in the event of an overthrow of the present cabinet to undertake the task of forming a new administration.

Of the names mentioned in this connection the first that occurs is that of Lord Spencer, who is the leader of the Liberals in the House of Lords, and who, by reason of his intimate friendship with the King, and of the confidence with which he inspires the King's legislative, is regarded as much better qualified to construct a cabinet than any other member of the House of Lords. Where, as Sir William Vernon Harcourt, in the case of the late Earl of Salisbury, is familiarly known at Westminster as "the Red Earl," it may be assumed that he will show no compunction about joining any administration formed by Lord Spencer, and that the question of home rule has been a great extent eliminated from English politics for some time to come. It is by no means impossible that some day George Wyndham's Irish land bill, which he retained from complaining that Lord Rosbery might have been crowded out on Tuesday and Wednesday he kept other dinner engagements, of which he had made no mention on the previous day.

What the matter, John? asked Sir William. "Didn't you expect to see me to dinner?" "Yes, sir," replied the butler, "but it wasn't for tonight; it was for next week."

Close investigation of Sir William's engagement book explained the mystery. It was arranged in pages, each page being a week's programme. Sir William in his haste had unwittingly turned over two pages, and was in that week keeping engagements which really fell due a week later.

Many more stories of this kind are current concerning Sir William, who at one moment was the most cordially hated of Englishmen by the other side of the Atlantic, and at another the pen of "Historical," he contributed some forty years ago to the Times a series of letters on points of international law raised by the Trent controversy and by the case of the Alabama, against him long since adjudged, and the closeness of his relations with this country is shown by the fact that not only he himself, but also his son, "Lulu," have married American women. The daughter of the late Walter H. Burns of New York, while Lady Harcourt is the daughter of J. L. Motley, the historian and diplomat.

Sir William, strictly speaking, is a scion of the noble house of Vernon, and it was a Vernon that came into the world in 1827. But his grandfather, the earldom of Harcourt became extinct, and his grandfather's son, Archbishop of York, assumed by mission of the Crown the ancient name of the house of Vernon. Sir William's mother, Mrs. Lewis, inherited from a maternal uncle a fortune, likewise acquired in the dry goods business, on the condition that the testator's name on to his own, his title is due to the fact that he is a Knight of the Order of the Bath.

Believes in Cook Plighting. Lord Spencer, who has nobly championed the cause of cook plighting and who for more than forty years was master of the noblest of the British aristocracy, and on one memorable occasion appeared at Marlborough House to attend a dinner given by the Duke of Devonshire without either star or ribbon of garter. Now Edward VIII. is known to be a great admirer of this kind, and as soon as ever Lord Spencer's attention had been called by the Duke of Devonshire, the post-omission a servant was sent hastily on to Carlton House terrace, near by, in order to borrow the insignia of the Order of the Bath.

PLAN TO UNITE SYSTEMS TRUNK LINE FOR FARMERS

Rural Phones in New York State to Be Hitched Together Into One Service.

New York, Oct. 18.—Anybody who may have supposed that the farmers of the Middle West, in taking advantage of the lapse of the fundamental telephone patents to rig up their own telephone systems, have secured the New York State, doesn't know the up-to-date.

A recent number of a telephone magazine published in Chicago gives the number of independent telephone exchanges in this state as 292, most of them using the Bell system. The telephone movement is strongest, however, in the New England States. Massachusetts has just over 200, and New Jersey but 60.

To Unite Systems. Now a movement is under way to unite these independent exchanges by building a long-distance trunk line from Buffalo to New York City, establishing connections with each, and at the same time with an independent company which proposes to have secured already contracts for 75,000 telephones in a partial canvass of the city, and expected to be completed by the end of the year.

The plan is to organize the village independent telephone exchanges into a series of "hubs" for all villages and cities within a county, and a correspondingly low rate for long-distance calls outside of the county. It is argued that with a rate so low telephoning will very largely take the place of letter writing, and that so large will be the number of subscribers that the large expense of installing the system will quickly be made up despite the low rates.

Novel Mode of Travel. London, Oct. 18.—The Great Western Railway Company, that has for some time been giving consideration to the various modes of traction, recently arranged for the experimental introduction, on a portion of their main line west of Swindon, of a service of self-contained steam cars. These cars, which are now nearing completion at the Great Western Company's works at Swindon, are to be shortly introduced to give a regular service between Stonehouse and Chalfield, in the Stroud Valley, a distance of about seven miles.

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HARD TIMES MUST MEAN LOWER WAGES FOR WORKMEN

President Compers So Warns Employers at a Meeting in Chicago. Chicago, Oct. 17.—A warning to capital against cutting wages, if financial depression comes, by President Compers of the American Federation of Labor, and a plea for harmony between employers and toilers, by Mark Hanna, were made at the closing session of the National Civic Federation Conference today. It was in reply to one of the previous speakers who took occasion to tell the employees, in the event of a possible financial reaction, not to make any unreasonable demands on the employers, that Mr. Compers declared labor would oppose any effort to cut wages, and such effort would accentuate the industrial crisis. Successful arbitration, Mr. Compers said, is not a negotiable, unless the employers are strong and workmen organized and prepared to defend the stand they may take. Labor wanted improved conditions, he said, and wanted to get more and more out of the great production of the wealth of the land, which the working men are contributors.

On Violence and Boycott. Mr. Compers' expansion to the coupling of the term boycott as judgment as weapons of labor, as mentioned by a speaker yesterday. The boycott, attacks, violence, are not the weapons of trade unionism," he said, and he claimed that often the agents of some employment agencies were found at work among striking laborers creating trouble for which labor had to bear the blame. "Boycott, of course we boycott," he said. "People in other walks of life boycott, socially and financially. I propose to stand by our friends, help our friends in preference to those who have always their hands raised against us."
