

HISTORICAL MEMORANDA

IN CONNECTION WITH

THE FREE CHURCH, COTE ST.

NOW

CRESCENT STREET PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH.

The Congregation was organized, and for seven years ministered to by Deputies from the Free Church of Scotland.

1844.—The Rev. W. C. Burns, arrived in the Summer, and preached to large audiences in St. Gabriel Street Free Church.

The Rev. J. MacNaughton, of Paisley, arrived a little later, and continued the work in the same church.

1845.—The Rev. J. Bonar, of Larbert, arrived in Spring, preached in St. Gabriel Street Free Church till a temporary wooden church was erected in Lagauchetiere Street. He opened this Church on May 11th, and on the 25th of May ordained the first elders, viz.: John Redpath, James R. Orr, David Ferguson, Evander MacIver.

"The Rev. W. Arnor, of Glasgow, arrived about this time, and supplied the pulpit till the end of September.

The Rev A. N. Somerville, of Glasgow, took charge during October and November.

"The Rev. W. C. Burns, in November, received but declined a call to labour in Canada, the Congregation promising to support him. In December he was again urged to fall in with this request, but finally declined on January 19th, 1846.

1846.—The Rev. G. Stevenson, of Peebles, ministered from January to April.

The Rev. T. Maclaughlin, of Peebles, ministered during May and June.

The Rev. J. Munro, of Rutherglen, ministered during July and August.

The report of the Deacons' Court, with the Treasurer's statements, having been read, it was moved by Mr. John Stirling, and seconded by Mr. James Ross:

"That the report of the Deacons' Court, just read, be received and adopted, and that the same be printed and circulated among the members of the congregation." Carried.

It was moved by Mr. Hugh Brodie, and seconded by Mr. Stephen White:

"That the thanks of the Congregation are due, and are hereby tendered to the Clerks of the Session and Deacons' Court, the Treasurer, the Secretary of the Weekly Offering Fund, and the Seat Book Keeper, for the very valuable services rendered by them during the past year."

It was moved by Mr. John Robertson, seconded by Dr. McClure:

"That the thanks of the Congregation are due, and are hereby tendered to Mr. S. S. Bain, Miss MacMaster, and the Choir, for the very efficient services rendered during the year." Carried.

After remarks by the Chairman and music by the Choir, the business of the meeting was brought to a close, and an adjournment made to the Lecture Hall, where refreshments were provided by the ladies.

The year 1887 has come and gone with its lights and shadows, its joys and sorrows, its congratulations and regrets. Again we have to acknowledge God's goodness and our own unworthiness, and with hearts humbled by a sense of our many failures, but trusting in Him whose grace has never failed us, go on to the work of another year.

During the year there were registered 22 Baptisms, 22 Burials, and 11 Marriages. After revision at the end of the year, the number of names on the Communion Roll is 559.

It will be interesting for the friends to be informed that in the three Sabbath Schools connected with the congregation, viz: Crescent Street, Nazareth street, and Petite Cote, there are 729 scholars on the roll taught by 63 teachers, and raising for all purposes during the year the sum of \$913. Surely the very recital of these figures should stir us all up to prayerful sympathy and interest in the work that is being carried on. Let us remember all these labourers in our prayers, that they may be strengthened and guided and encouraged in their work, and that those under their charge may be led in the ways of pleasantness and peace.

In connection with Crescent Street Sabbath School, the most important feature of the past year's work was the formation of a new Bible Class. After much careful deliberation in the Session it was resolved to put this class under the charge of Mr. Robert Johnston, and the result has been exceedingly gratifying. The attendance has been large,

and it is to be hoped that it may be larger. There being now three Bible Classes in connection with the Crescent Street Sabbath School, having about 160 young people on the rolls, it is hoped that the senior pupils may be retained much longer than has hitherto been the case, and that among them many of our future teachers may be found.

In Nazareth Street the work of the Missionaries, Messrs. MacVicar and Johnston, has been very important. The attendance on Sabbath evenings has risen as high as 100, while that on the Thursday evening has been about half that number.

At Petite Cote the work is of an encouraging nature. Only a few years ago this Sabbath School received an annual grant from our funds, but now it is not only self supporting but contributes to a variety of good objects. The Annual Collection for the General Hospital is always very generous, and is given with great good will.

The Monday evening meeting in the library has been found very helpful for instruction and encouragement, and while the attendance has greatly increased, it is to be hoped that many more may avail themselves of this opportunity

to come together to edify one another.

On Wednesday evenings engagements of a secular nature are becoming more and more frequent every year, hence it is gratifying to see so many regular attendants at the Wednesday meeting, and we trust that many more may find out that it is a high privilege and a peculiar benefit to set apart one night in the middle of the week for united prayer and meditation on God's word.

The Sabbath morning prayer meeting in the library is one of the best preparations for the services of the day, and we would urge all those whose home duties permit of their presence, to come together there to entreat that Divine blessing without which all our labour will be in vain.

In conclusion, we cannot refrain from referring to the great blessing that has come upon this city through the visit of Mr. Moody. His clear and earnest preaching of the gospel of the grace of God has been greatly blessed to the quickening of God's children and the conversion of sinners. Some who had merely a name to live, while dead, have received new life, and others have received life more abundantly.

While the goodness and promise of some have been like the early cloud and the morning dew, the depth and reality of the work have been manifested more and more in the lives of others. Let us see to it that we are among the number of those who go from strength to strength. Let us lay aside every weight and the sin that doth so easily beset us, and let us run with patience the race that is set before us, looking unto Jesus, the author and perfecter of our faith.

Report of the Beacons' Court

FOR YEAR ENDED 31st DECEMBER, 1887.

In again presenting our Report to the Congregation it becomes us first of all to thank our Heavenly Father for the many unmerited mercies He has bestowed upon us as a congregation and as individuals.

WEEKLY OFFERINGS.

This system of giving for the support of Gospel ordinances and the Missionary and Benevolent schemes of the Church is still found to work favorably. The amount received during the past year has been \$9580.98, of which \$8400.36 in envelopes, and \$1180.62 in plate Collections,

showing a weekly average of \$184.25. These figures, compared with those of the previous year, show a falling off to the extent of \$190.61. The Court would take this opportunity of again commending the scheme to the Congregation, as it is quite evident, taking into consideration the membership and adherents of the Church, that a few have not yet fallen in with it, while there are others who do not seem to realise the importance of it. Unless additions to the list of subscribers are made from time to time, the results cannot be such as they should be. Let us lay to heart the words of our Saviour, "Give and it shall be given unto you: good measure, pressed down and shaken together, and running over."

PEW RENTS.

The income from this source has been \$4387.37, an advance of \$202.71 over the previous year, and the account shows a balance at credit of \$960.17. The Court has found it necessary to make extensive repairs to the roof of the Church, also to repaint the woodwork outside, and to tint and whiten the Lecture Hall, School Room, and vestibule. The cost of this work will more than absorb the balance now at credit of account.

BUILDING FUND.

There has been paid in during the year, on account of old subscriptions to this fund, the sum of \$125.00, to which has been added from the Weekly Offering account the sum of \$1289.51, making in all the sum of \$1414.51 to apply in liquidation of the debt. The Court having learned that the land adjoining the Church in front and rear, was being subdivided preparatory to its sale, came to the conclusion that it was of the utmost importance that the lots immediately adjoining the Church on Dorchester and Crescent Streets should be under our control. Negociations having been entered into resulted in the purchase of a strip of 18 feet in front by 120 feet in depth on Crescent Street, being part of the present lane, and a lot on Dorchester Street having a frontage of 34 feet by a depth of 120 feet, the whole at a cost of \$4248, on account of which \$1248 has been paid, leaving a balance of \$3000 to be provided for. In acquiring these lots the Court had in view the possible erection of a Manse, as also of a residence for the Church

officer. Taking into account this transaction, our position in regard to the debt will be as follows:—

ALLOCATIONS TO MISSIONS.

After providing for Minister's stipend, salaries of Missionaries, and all other fixed charges against the Weekly Offering Fund, as detailed in the Treasurer's Statement, there remains a balance of \$1800.00 for distribution, which the Court suggests should be made as follows:—

In addition to the above there is to be added the sum of \$495.18 contributed by the Pastor's Bible Class, Wednesday evenings, specially devoted to Foreign Missions.

PEW REPORT.

The letting of Pews and Sittings remains in charge of Mr. R. N. McCallum of No. 2217 St. Catherine Street, where the seat book and plans of the Church may be seen. Aplications for seats should be made to Mr. McCallum or to the Church Officer.

The total number of Sittings let in the Church is 747, of which 611 are in the area and 136 in the gallery.

CHURCH PSALMODY.

Our congregational singing, though much improved, has by no means reached perfection; and while Mr. Bain, the Precentor, and the members of the choir do all that they can to make this delightful part of our service bright and helpful, the congregation could more heartily second their efforts, and we trust they will do so. It is not Choir Psalmody but Church Psalmody at which we aim, and without painstaking care and hearty participation by each individual in the congregation, our ideal can never be realized.

CONCLUSION.

In conclusion we would press upon each individual in the congregation the duty and privilege of consecrating themselves and their substance to the service of the Lord Jesus. It is vain for any to say that they are following the Lord fully when they are withholding that which He has given to be used for His glory. All our offerings for the maintenance of the ministry of the Word at home and abroad are purely voluntary, and therefore an excellent test of the value that we put upon that ministry. If we are not to pay for it, or try to pay as little as possible, it is absurd to say that we value it aright, and it is no wonder that we have leanness in our souls. God himself has taught us that spiritual blessings are withheld because of selfish hoarding or parsimonious gifts. He has thrown down a challenge to us in regard to this very thing. Bring ye all the tithes into the storehouse, that there may be meat in mine house, and prove me now herewith, saith the Lord of hosts, if I will not open you the windows of heaven, and pour you out a blessing, that there shall not be room enough to receive it. May we each and all have grace to take up this challenge and prove the truth of His words. The bearing of the work of the Deacons' Court on the spiritual prosperity of the congregation is its chief end and highest glory. Let the floodgates of Christian liberality be thrown wide open, and there will pour forth upon us and others a flood of spiritual That this may, to a greater and greater extent, be the result of our labours, is our earnest desire as we thus respectfully submit our report.

We have a well filled library of good books, and the scholars are liberally supplied with religious papers and

tracts.

Prizes are given to those who have repeated the Shorter Catechism and Golden Texts correctly for the year, and a silver medal and books to those bringing in new scholars during the year.

The lady teachers have met every Tuesday since October, till the end of December, as a Dorcas Society, and clothing, shoes, &c., are distributed to those children in

need.

Singing classes are also held every Tuesday since October, conducted by Mr A. Hyde and the Misses Norval and Dawson.

The Band of Hope has been resumed under the leadership of Mr A. Hyde. Meetings are held every Friday fortnight, when a choice programme is given and temperance principles instilled into the children. A new feature has been introduced this year in electing a chairman and secretary from among the members, and has been found to work satisfactorily.

Our thanks are tendered to Mr. S. S. Bain, who in the early part of summer kindly donated a large number of flowers and plants to be grown by the scholars. In the fall prizes were distributed to those having the best cared for

flowers and plants.

We have pleasure in reporting an increase in our Missionary collections. Last year the collections were \$186.64, and this year they reach the sum of \$215.31, being \$28.67 over any previous year.

The library, which is well patronized, has received an addition of 26 volumes, costing \$25.80; the scholars are also supplied with the "British Workman," and "Cottager and Artisan."

Our annual Pic-nic was held at Pine Island, Back River, on June 17th, the weather being all that could be desired. Races and games and promenading were engaged in, and all seemed satisfied with the day's pleasure.

Quite a number of the old scholars were present at the second quarterly review, which was conducted by Mr

Wallace. Mr. Greig reviewed the third quarter's lessons; with these exceptions there have not been many visitors to the school.

On the evening of November 25th, the Rev. A. B. Mackay conducted the Fourth Annual Thanksgiving service. After an instructive sermon, and some good singing by the Crescent Street Church Choir, refreshments were served. The collection for the benefit of the General Hospital amounted to \$126.00.

There has been a good attendance on Sabbath evening preaching services, supplied by the Methodist Home Mission Board.

On September 11th a special collection for the Italian Bible and S. S. Mission realised \$10.58. \$17.00 has been contributed to Foreign Missions in Formosa.

The Mission Band of Crescent Street Church, which was organized December 9th, 1886, re-assembled November 10th, 1887, and is continued fortnightly on Thursday from three o'clock until six.

The meetings, we are happy to state, have been characterized by a greater degree of zeal and interest than formerly. A particular feature of our work is the introduction of strangers to the congregation, and we very cordially invite all those ladies who have not yet joined us to do so at once. Another feature is the gleaning of such missionary intelligence as will prove interesting and instructive to us all. For this purpose the Society has been divided into groups, each representing some field of home or foreign mission work. At stated times a member of one of these groups reads or tells us what information she and her co-laborers may have gathered from a personal correspondence or from printed matter. By this means many of us have been aroused from seeming indifference to active interest int

A convenient amount of practical work has also been accomplished in plain sewing. A quantity of useful clothing has been made up for the children's ward in the General Hospital and the Boys' Home; a number of destitute people have also been supplied with warm clothing. At present we are engaged in making garments for the Hervey Institute, and hope to be able to overtake other charitable institutions of the city in turn.

In submitting our report, we acknowledge with thanks the donations of money and material which we have received throughout the year from friends of the Society.

Trusting that God's blessing may attend our efforts, let each of us strive to imitate her of whom the Master said, "She hath done what she could."

Anzareth Street Mission.

The work of your City Missionaries has been prosecuted this year as usual. By this means we are enabled to increase our influence with the people, and so to use it for the furtherance of the work of our Master. We have also been successful in finding employment more or less regular for some of the many who are idle during the winter; at this we always aim, believing that to be the truest help which enables these people to help themselves.

In all our meetings we have been greatly indebted to Miss Tena Johnson, who has now for several years kindly acted as organist, thus making our service of song much more attractive than it would otherwise be.

We cannot close this brief report for the year without referring with sorrow to the removal by death of Mr Johnson, for many years one of the most earnest workers in connection with the Mission. His heart was ever with us in our work, and his sympathy had not to be sought. A good man, he has gone to his reward, and in his removal from the work in which he labored, we would hear the Master's Voice calling to more earnest toil, knowing that for those also who are left "the night cometh."
