**EAGER FOR FRENCH
TOBACCO MONOPOLY**

Rumors that British and U.S.
Interests are Negotiating
for Purchase.

New York, July 6.—Rumors are current here that British and American tobacco interests and a group of European bankers are negotiating for the purchase of the French government's tobacco monopoly for \$400,000,000. According to the report, George J. Whelan, president of the Tobacco Products Corporation; James B. Duke, of the British-American Tobacco Company; and Thomas F. Ryan are interested in the negotiations. The report said that Mr. Ryan would sail soon to complete the deal. Mr. Ryan said he expected to see Mr. Duke and Mr. Whelan today, and that he would sail Thursday for a two-month stay in Paris. He declared he had heard nothing definite about the plans. Mr. Duke denied that he was interested in the plan, and declared he does not want to put his money in any of these countries now. It was also reported that the sale of the tobacco monopoly is being considered by the French government as a means of helping the country meet its war debt. Bankers in Britain, the United States, France and Belgium were said to be interested. The tobacco monopoly is said to yield an annual net profit of \$80,000,000.

**ADMIRAL WINS HIS CLAIM
AGAINST VICKERS CO.**

London, July 6.—Admiral Sir Percy Scott has won his claim against Vickers, the armament firm in the law courts for royalties for inventions involving several thousand pounds. Mr. Justice Coleridge made some criticisms on Sir Trevor Dawson's evidence for Vickers, remarking that without being unduly harsh, the impression left on his mind was that Sir Trevor seemed through to be trying to recover from the past what he now thought he ought to have said or what he now thought it would have been wiser if he had said rather than by giving the court his present memory of what he really did say. From first to last there was a want of frankness on the part of the firm in dealing with Sir Percy, his lordship contended.

**TO REGULATE HOURS IN
INLAND NAVIGATION**

Genoa, Italy, July 6.—The international seamen's conference has approved a recommendation to all countries belonging to the international labor organization that the hours of work in inland navigation should follow, as far as possible, the general lines of the draft convention concerning hours of work adopted by the international labor conference in Washington and Genoa. The recommendation was adopted almost unanimously.

**ARGENTINA TO PROHIBIT
WHEAT AND SUGAR EXPORT**

Buenos Aires, July 6.—In view of the rise in the price of sugar, and because its calculations show that the quantity of wheat available for export will be exhausted this week, the Argentine government will prohibit the exportation of wheat and sugar before the week is over, according to an announcement in La Prensa today.

Edmonton, Alta., July 6.—Fred Timms is dead and James Smith is seriously injured in an automobile accident as a result of a collision with a steel girder on the high level bridge here last night. The car was traveling at a high rate of speed.

**WRANGEL WIPES OUT
RED CAVALRY CORPS**

Surrounded Eighteen Regiments and Concentrated Fire on Them.

London, July 6.—The British war office today gave out a message, the source of which was withheld, saying that the cavalry of General Wrangel, the anti-Bolshevik commander in southern Russia, had encircled a Bolshevik cavalry corps consisting of 18 regiments, on which the Wrangel forces concentrated fire from armored trains and airplanes. The message declares only 150 of the Bolsheviks escaped, 1,000 prisoners being taken, and the battlefield left covered with dead. In addition 40 guns were captured.

**PRINCE EMERGED SMILING
FROM OVERTURNED CAR**

London, July 6.—Albert Edward, Prince of Wales, emerged unscathed and smiling from the window of an overturned car when his train was wrecked yesterday, says a despatch from Perth, Australia, to The London Times. The accident occurred near Bridgetown, West Australia, according to the report. The prince's parlor car and one adjoining, which were last in the train, were derailed, dragged for two hundred yards, and then overturned. Upon after climbing from the wreck the prince was joking and good-naturedly chaffing the West Australian premier and other officials accompanying him. He was cheered by a crowd that witnessed his dramatic escape from the wreck. Some members of the prince's staff received bruises of a slight nature.

**POLES ARE DEFEATED,
BOLSHEVIKI CLAIM**

London, July 6.—Polish forces between the Beresina and Pripiet rivers have been defeated along the entire front by the Russian Bolsheviks, according to an official statement issued at Moscow yesterday, and received here by wireless. Northeast of Rovno, the Poles, the statement says, have been flung back behind the line from Beradna to Kostopol. Further south, near Ostroga, the Bolsheviks have driven the Poles from their positions, and have inflicted heavy losses. In the direction of Proskirov, farther south, the soviet forces are pursuing the Poles, the statement declares.

**FLIGHT TO ALASKA
BY WAY OF CANADA**

Plans for an Experimental Trip from New York Are Announced.

New York, July 6.—Plans for an experimental flight from this city to Nome, Alaska, and return, by way of Canadian territory, in part were announced yesterday by the United States war department. The expedition, composed of four airplanes of the DH-4B type, manned by army aviators, will start July 15 from Mitchell Field. Its purpose will be to prove the feasibility of opening new transcontinental lines of communication to aid economic development. The course will take the aviators above virgin flying territory, and on this account much difficulty was encountered in mapping out the route. The immediate purpose of the expedition will be to show the possibility of aerial mail service between interior cities in Alaska and United States points. An incidental reason will be the photographing of unmapped areas of Alaska.

**JAP FISHING DISTRICT
IS DESTROYED BY FIRE**

Tokio, July 6.—Fire has swept the entire fishing district on the western shore of the Sea of Okhotsk, which was leased to Japan under the Treaty of Portsmouth. The area burned over includes the city of Okhotsk, according to a wireless report received by the Hokkaido Fisheries Company from the steamer Kamchatka. The financial loss is estimated at \$4,000,000, and so far the fate of the fishermen along the coast is unknown. The company has asked the government to despatch warships to the scene to investigate the origin of the fire, which is believed to have been set by Bolsheviks.

**CHINESE HIGH COMMANDER
IS RELIEVED OF OFFICE**

Peking, July 6.—Militarist elements received another defeat Sunday night, when General Hsu Chucheng, resident commissioner of Inner Mongolia, and commander on the northwestern frontier, was relieved of those posts. This dismissal demonstrates the strength of the reform party, headed by Generals Chang Tsoling and Wu Peifu. The dramatic dismissal of Hsu Chucheng startled this city and gave rise to apprehension of an uprising by troops under his command, who are still in Peking. Many people have hurriedly deposited their valuables in foreign banks, and there is a feeling akin to panic. Officials, however, are not perturbed by the situation.
