

PREFACE.

OUR Committee trust that this, the sixteenth volume of the Annual of the Ontario Branch of the R.C.C.C., will be found as useful, and as full of interest, as any of the previous issues.

They would respectfully direct attention to alterations made, and others proposed to be made, in the rules and regulations, for the better ordering of the affairs of the Association; and to an added clause in No. 4 of the regulations for the competition for the Ontario Tankard.

The publication of the lists of the office-bearers of the other branches of the Royal Caledonian Curling Club, established in the Dominion of Canada, will, they think, be acceptable to the members of the Ontario Branch.

They trust that the "Pro Forma Set of Rules, etc., for Curling Clubs," will be found acceptable and useful; it was, in substance, recently compiled for and adopted by one of the oldest and most active clubs in our Association, and the regulations seem to be very complete.

They would once more direct attention to the too large number of clubs, whose neglect to send in new lists of office-bearers and members is indicated by the oftrepeated phrase, reprinted from last year, no new list having been furnished, and to express the hope that the clause will not be required in any succeeding volume.

The portrait of our genial President, Dr. R. P. Boucher, of the Peterboro' Club, which graces this volume, will be cherished by his numerous friends, including all curlers who have attended the business meetings of the Branch Club, as well as those, still more fortunate, who have enjoyed the pleasure of a day's curling at Peterboro', and the hospitalities of the jolly members of this far-famed club.

And your Committee commend their "work" to the kind indulgence of their brother curlers, fully conscious that it might have been better executed, had better skill been theirs, and greater leisure.

BY-LAWS, REGULATIONS, ETC.

I.—OF THE CONSTITUTION.

- I. The Association shall be called the Ontario Branch of the Royal Caledonian Curling Club.
- 2. Its object shall be to promote the Game of Curling in Canada, and mainly in the Province of Ontario; to unite all the curling clubs in the Province in one organization; to hold fraternal intercourse with other neighbouring curling associations; and to maintain connection with the Royal Caledonian Curling Club, as a corresponding association.
- 3. Its membership shall consist of the members, regular and occasional, of all curling clubs which may be received into the Association, and conform to the rules thereof, as adopted.
- 4. The affairs of the Association shall be managed by a Representative Committee, composed of one representative appointed by each affiliated club, as hereinafter provided, which shall have power to elect the office-bearers of the Association, and to appoint committees for the transaction of the business thereof.
- 5. An Annual General Meeting of the members of the Association shall be held in Toronto, on the Second Tuesday in April of each year, to receive the Annual Report of the Representative Committee, and take action

upon the same; and to transact such other business as may be necessary.

6. No new law shall be enacted, and no existing law shall be altered or repealed, until approved of by at least two-thirds of the members present at the Annual General Meeting of the Association, and unless notice of such alteration or addition shall have been previously given at the preceding Semi-Annual Meeting of the Representative Committee in October.

II.-OF CLUBS.

- I. Any curling club shall be eligible to be received into the Association, which has a membership of not fewer than eight persons; and which has a constitution and a staff of office-bearers, including President, Vice-President, Treasurer and Secretary, and Representative Members.
 - 2. Clubs may be received into the Association at any meeting of the Representative Committee; and, provisionally, at any meeting of the Executive Committee, until confirmed or otherwise disposed of at the next ensuing meeting of the Representative Committee.
 - 3. Every club desiring admission to the Association shall furnish a list of its office-bearers and members, and name of club; and shall agree to be governed by the Rules of the Association; and must be proposed by one member of the Representative Committee and seconded by another; and a two-thirds majority of votes of those present shall decide the question.
- 4. Every club shall elect annually, and not later than ten days before date of the Semi-Annual Meeting in October, two persons as its representatives to the Representative Committee; the second to act only in the absence of the first, who must be a regular member of the club he represents, but the second may be a member

of any affiliated club; and no person shall, at any meeting of the Representative Committee, represent more than two clubs.

- 5. No person can be a member regular of more than one affiliated club at one and the same time; and the lists of members sent in by the secretaries of local clubs to the Secretary of the Association for publication in the Annual for the season, shall determine the membership of each person and club for that season. The status of new members received into a local club, after publication of Annual, can only be established by the certificate of the Secretary of the Association, that their names have been added to the roll of the local club and dues paid. Should the name of any person be returned in the list of more than one club, such person shall be disqualified in all of them, until the General Secretary shall be notified by him that his name has been withdrawn from every list except the one to which he properly belongs. Persons who, from change of residence or other sufficient reason, find it desirable, may withdraw from one club and may be received into another during the curling season; but the change, before coming into effect, must be assented to by both clubs, and be approved of by the Executive Committee; but no such change, or any other reason, shall make it lawful for any curler to play in any one season for or on behalf of more than one club for prizes allocated by the Association, or given under its auspices. Any club playing an Association Prize Match with one or more curlers in its ranks not properly qualified as members, shall forfeit all right to the prize if it shall have been successful in the contest.
- 6. If any person becomes or is a member of more than one club, he shall not play in any match against the club of which he is a regular member.
- 7. Clubs may classify their members in any way they deem suitable, as Honorary, Regular and Occasional. Entrance Fee and Annual Dues shall be payable for each member, regular and occasional, returned as belonging

to the club, but only members regular shall be entitled to take part in the Association games, and be eligible to the Representative Committee as first Representatives.

III.—OF THE REPRESENTATIVE COMMITTEE.

1. The Representative Committee, composed of a representative from each affiliated club (see Chap. II., Section 4) shall hold two regular meetings in each year, viz.: on the Third Tuesday in October, and on the day of the Annual General Meeting of the Members of the Association in April, besides such special meetings as may be called by the proper office-bearers. At all such

meetings seven shall be a quorum.

2. At the meeting in October the Representative Committee shall elect their office-bearers for the year ensuing, who shall also be the office bearers of the Association, and shall come into office immediately upon their election, and continue until their successors are appointed. They shall consist of a Patron, a I resident, a First and Second Vice-President, a Chaplain and a Secretary and Treasurer. At same meeting shall also be appointed the Standing Committees, viz.: The Executive Committee, consisting of the office-bearers and other six representative members; the Committee on the Annual, the Committee on Complaints and Appeals, and the Committee of Auditors; all members of the Association shall be eligible for any office therein, and the mode of election shall, in all cases, be by ballot, when more than one person has been proposed and seconded for any office.

a. The duties of the President shall be to preside and maintain order at all meetings of the Association, of the Representative Committee, and of the Executive Committee; and he shall sign the minutes of such meetings after they have been confirmed, and all official documents. The chairman at all meetings shall have a casting vote in case of a tie, as well as a deliberative vote.

b. The First Vice-President shall take the place and discharge the duties of the President when he is absent; and the Second Vice-President shall have the same authority in the absence of the President and the First Vice-President; and should all of them be absent from any regular or special meeting, it shall be competent for the meeting assembled to elect a chairman, who shall have, pro tem., all the rights and powers of the President.

c. The Secretary-Treasurer shall keep full and correct minutes of all the meetings of the Association, the Representative Committee and the Executive Committee, and shall conduct all correspondence arising out of the same, and generally carry out the work of the Association. He shall levy and collect all dues and fees, and pay all accounts, and shall keep regular and correct accounts of all moneys collected and bills paid. His books and accounts shall at all times be open to the inspection of the office-bearers, and shall be balanced on the first of April of each year.

d. The Executive Committee shall constitute the board of management, and shall conduct the business of the Association.

e. The Committee on Complaints and Appeals shall receive from the Secretary and adjudicate upon all complaints and appeals from clubs in regard to their curling intercourse with each other, and especially with reference to competitions for prizes played for under the auspices of the Association, and shall report to the Executive Committee. Their decisions shall always be communicated to the contending parties in writing, and will be held to be accepted and acquiesced in, unless they are notified to the contrary within ten days after their decision shall have been mailed to the said contending parties, and the reasons for non-acquiescence set forth in said notification.

f. The Committee on the Annual shall be charged with the publication of the Annual of the Association, which shall be issued every year about 30th November, and shall contain a list of the office-bearers of the Royal

ung Caledonian Curling Club, and of this Association, along with lists of the office-bearers and members of the clubs in connection therewith, the rules and regulations of the Association, the minutes of Annual General Meetings and of meetings of the Representative Committee, the financial condition of the Association from year to year, reports of competitions for prizes allocated by the Association, along with records of other matters affecting curling, and calculated to promote the game in Canada.

- g. The Committee of Auditors shall examine and certify the Treasurer's accounts from year to year.
- 3. No complaint or appeal will be received unless sent in to the Secretary of the Association in writing, within one week from the date on which occurred the matter of the said complaint or appeal; and no complaint or appeal shall be decided until all parties thereto shall have been given an opportunity to state their case; and any party failing or neglecting to show cause within one week after being notified to do so by the Committee shall thereby be held to have departed from their claim, and to have forfeited all rights to any further hearing.
- 4. At the semi-annual meetings of the Representative Committee, the order of business shall be as follows, viz.:
 - I. Examining credentials of representatives present.
 - II. Reading and considering minutes of previous meetings.
 - III. Correspondence.
 - IV. Admission of new Clubs.
 - V. Reports of competitions for Association prizes.
 - VI. Reports of Standing Committees.
 - VII. Reports of Special Committees.
 - VIII. Election of office-bearers and appointment of Committees.

X. Distribution of prizes.

At other meetings no business shall be transacted other than that for which the meeting was convened, and which had been clearly set forth in the circular calling the meeting. The President, the Secretary, or any five members of the Executive Committee, may convene a special meeting of the Representative Committee at any time.

IV .-- OF ENTRANCE AND ANNUAL FEES.

- 1. The fees payable by clubs shall be an entrance fee, and annual dues.
- 2. The entrance fee shall be payable on admission, and according to the following scale, viz.:—

Clubs of 8 members and under 20 \$	4	00
Clubs of 20 members and under 50	6	00
Clubs of 50 members and under 100	8	00
Clubs of 100 members and over I	0	00

- 3. The annual dues shall be payable in advance, the first annual payment to be made, with entrance fee, on admission, and at the fo lowing rate, viz.: A club rate of two dollars from each club, and an additional sum of fifteen cents in respect of each member, regular and occasional, of the club. The membership rate shall be doubled for names of members sent in after Annual is made up.
- 4. From these sources shall be formed a common fund to be under the control of the Executive Committee, and from which shall be defrayed the printing, advertising and incidental expenses of the Association, and the cost of Medals and other prizes allocated by it.
- 5. No club in arrears shall be entitled to compete for any prize of the Association.

6. If any club shall fall three years in arrear of the payment of its annual dues, it shall be struck off the list of the Association, and shall not be reinstated except as a new club.

V.-OF THE GAME.

- 1. The standard length of the rink for play shall be 42 yards from hack to tee. If the ice turns out to be wet or soft before a game commences, or after it has been begun, the skips of both sides in the match, with the umpire as chairman, shall meet and decide whether the rink shall be shortened, and to what extent; and in no case shall it be shortened to less than 33 yards. The umpire shall have a deliberative vote, and, in case of a tie, a casting vote; when there is no umpire present the skips may call upon any neutral curler to act as umpire, who shall exercise all the powers of an umpire in the case. No important match shall be commenced if the ice be not in a condition fairly to test the curling skill of the competing players; and it shall be stopped and declared "off," if, after it has been begun, the condition of the ice, by reason of thaw setting in or snow falling, becomes such as not to afford a fair test of the curling skill of the competing players; or darkness comes on sufficient to prevent the stones at the tee from being distinctly seen from the further hack; and in all cases of stopped matches the postponed game shall be commenced de novo. The umpire's decision, regarding the condition of the ice and atmosphere, shall be final in all cases.
- 2. The tees to be made 38 yards apart, and around each as a centre shall be described a circle of seven feet radius, which shall be called the "Home," or "Ring." To facilitate measurements, intermediate circles may also be described around the tee. Every stone within, or resting upon the outer ring, shall be entitled to be counted in the game; no stone shall be considered without a circle, unless it is entirely clear of that circle, nor shall a stone be considered over a line unless it has crossed



and entirely cleared it. In every case this is to be decided by a square placed upon the ice.

- 3. From, and in exact alignment with both tees, a line, called the centre line, shall be drawn to a point four yards behind each tee; at this point a line shall be drawn, at a right angle to the centre line, on which the hack shall be cut. The hack shall not exceed six inches in length, nor shall the inner edge thereof be more than three inches from the centre line, so that all stones shall be delivered with their centre upon the centre line.
- 4. Other lines, called the MIDDLE SCORE, the HOG SCORE, the SWEEPING SCORE and BACK SCORE, shall also be drawn on the ice at right angles to the centre line. The MIDDLE SCORE shall be drawn at midway between the two tees, to point out the place at which sweeping may ordinarily be commenced. The Hog Score shall be drawn at a distance from each tee of one-sixth of the length from hack to further tee; and shall indicate the point, which if a played stone fails to pass, it shall be counted a hog, and removed from the ice, unless it has been prevented from passing by striking another played stone resting inside said hog score. The SWEEPING SCORE shall be drawn across the tees, for the guidance of the skips in sweeping. The BACK Score shall be drawn just outside and behind the 14 feet circle around the tee (the home); all stones having passed this score must be removed from the ice.

For method of laying out rink, see diagram.

5. All matches to be the majority of shots won after playing a certain number of heads, or definite period of time, to be agreed on by the competing clubs before beginning to play. In the event of both parties being equal at the conclusion of the match, play shall be continued, under the direction of the umpire, by all the rinks engaged, for another head, or for such additional number of heads as may be necessary to decide the match.

6. Every rink to be composed of four players a side,




each using two stones, and playing one stone alternately with his opponent, and the rotation of players observed in the first head shall not be changed during the match.

- 7. The two skips opposing each other shall settle by lot, or in any other way they may agree upon, which party shall lead in the first head, after which the winning party shall lead.
- 8. The skips shall have the exclusive management and direction of the game for their respective parties, and may play last or in any part of the game they please; but are not entitled to change their places when once fixed. When their turn to play comes, they shall each appoint one of their players to act in their places as skips of the game, and must take the position of ordinary players, until they have played and returned to the tee-head as skips.
- 9. Players, during the course of each end, shall be arranged along the sides, but well off the rink, as their skips may direct; and no party, except when sweeping according to rule, shall go upon the middle of the rink. Skips alone to stand within the 14 feet circle, or home; the skip of the party playing to have the choice of place, and must not be obstructed by the other in front of the tee, while behind it the privileges of both as regards sweeping shall be equal.
- 10. Every player to be ready to play when his turn comes, and shall not take more than a reasonable time to play. Should he play a stone belonging to another player, any of the players may stop it while running; but if not stopped till at rest, the stone which should have been played shall be put in its place to the satisfaction of the opposing skip.
- so played may be stopped in its course and returned to the player; should the mistake not be discovered till the stone be at rest, or has struck another stone, the opposing skip shall add one to his score, and have the option of allowing the game to proceed, or of declaring the end

null and void. But if another stone be played before the mistake has been noticed, the end must be finished as if it had been played properly from the beginning.

- 12. If any player engaged, or belonging to either of the competing clubs, shall speak to, taunt, or otherwise interrupt any other player, not of his own party, while preparing to play his stone, and so as to disconcert him, one shot shall be added to the score of the party so interrupted, for each interruption, and the play proceed.
- 13. If in sweeping, or otherwise, a running stone be marred by any of the party to which it belongs, it shall be put off the ice, and the opposing skip shall have the option to add one to his score and allow the game to proceed, or to call the end null and void; but if marred by any of the adverse party, it shall be placed wherever the skip of the party to which it belongs may direct. If marred by any other means the player shall replay the stone. Should any played stone be displaced by any of the players before the head is reckoned, it shall be placed as near as possible where it lay, to the satisfaction of or by the skip opposed to the party displacing. If displaced by any neutral party, both skips to agree upon the position to which it is to be returned, and if they fail to agree the umpire shall decide.
- The sweeping shall be under the direction and control of the skips. Except when snow is falling upon or drifting over the rink, a stone shall not be swept until it has crossed the MIDDLE SCORE, and may be swept by the party to whose side it belongs, until it comes to the SWEEPING SCORE; but all stones when they have passed the sweeping score may be swept by EITHER SKIP ONLY. Skips will have liberty to sweep behind the tee at all times, except when a player is receiving directions to play from his skip. All sweeping shall be across the rink, and the sweeper must be in front of the stone being swept, and at one side thereof; and no sweepings shall either be moved forward or left in front of a running stone, or of a stone "at rest." It shall not be allowable for the party to whom a running

stone belongs to place their brooms before it or behind it to screen it from the wind, unless with consent of both skips; and the use of a broom or any other instrument as a fan, either to promote or retard the running of a stone, is strictly forbidden, and is to be dealt with as "a running stone" marred by the party to which it belongs. See sec. 13.

- 15. All stones shall be of a circular shape. No stone, including handle, shall be of a greater weight than fifty pounds, or of a greater circumference than thirty-six inches, or of a less height than one-eighth part of its greatest circumference.
- 16. No stone or side of a stone shall be changed after a match has been begun unless with the consent of the opposing skip. Should a stone happen to be broken during a game, the largest fragment shall be considered in the game for that end, and the player shall be entitled to use another stone or another pair during the remainder of the game.
- 17. Should a played stone roll over, or stop on its edge or top, it shall be put off the ice. Should the handle quit the stone in delivery, the player will not be entitled to replay the stone unless he retains his hold of the handle.
- 18. No measuring of shots allowable previous to the termination of the end. Disputed shots to be determined by the vice-skips, or, if they disagree, by the umpire; or, if there is no umpire, by some neutral person chosen by the skips. All measurements to be taken from the centre of tee to nearest point of stone, after removing stones intervening.
- 19. If any of the competing rinks are not ready to begin play at the hour named for a match, one end shall be counted as played for every ten minutes' delay; and the opposing rink, if ready to play, shall count one point in the game for each such period of time it is kept waiting.

VI.-OF ICE RINKS.

1. All District Medal matches and general competitions at the Points' Game must be played on new or virgin ice, or on neutral ice; and all important matches should be played on the same.

ICE FOR CURLING SHALL BE DEEMED NEW OR VIRGIN ICE

- a. When it has not previously been played on.
- b. When, since last played on, it shall have been flooded so completely, as that the water shall have come to its natural level, over the entire ice surface, before treezing.
- c. If, after being last used for curling, the ice shall have been refaced by sprinkling with water, and the tees changed, either at least two feet sideways or ten feet lengthways, so as to get rid of grooves or channels formed in the course of play.
- d. Shaving off nodules or protuberances from the surface of the ice, or the application of any other mechanical operations, having for their object the bringing of the ice to a true and correct level, shall not be held as degrading ice otherwise entitled to be called new or virgin ice; but such operations must be carried out under the direction of the umpire; and in no case shall any special preparation of the ice be made, intended, or calculated, or having for its object to facilitate the making of any particular shot, or to otherwise pervert the ice surface from the true and correct level.
- e. It is desirable that artificial single rinks should be constructed not less than 18 feet in width by 152 feet in length, so as to admit of changing the tees both sideways and lengthways.

VII.—OF MEDAL COMPETITIONS.

- 1. To promote curling intercourse and friendly rivalry between clubs comprised in the Ontario Branch, Medals, to be called Royal Canadian District Medals, shall be allocated annually for competition, according to the rules of the game, between each two clubs which did not win one in the previous season.
- 2. Medals to be competed for by the individual members of the club, at the Points' Game, shall be allocated to such clubs as are thought too far distant from other clubs to compete with them, and to any club left out in making the distribution of the clubs into pairs.
- 3. The Representative Committee shall have the sole power of disposing the clubs into pairs, and of appointing umpires to superintend Medal competitions; and in doing so they shall take into account distance, facilities for meeting, and all specialties, including the relative number of regular members in the clubs. The arrangement of the clubs for Medal competitions, and appointment of umpires to superintend them, shall be made at the meeting of the Representative Committee to be held in October in each year.
- 4. The umpire appointed to superintend a District Medal Competition shall correspond with both clubs, and endeavour to get them to agree upon the time and place for the contest; if they cannot be brought to a mutual agreement, he shall, in his discretion, appoint both time and place for the competition, making his decision so that it will be fair and equitable to both parties, and shall give notice to both in writing, allowing reasonable time for them to comply with the appointment.
- 5. Should either club fail to appear on the ice, agreeably to appointment, the Medal shall be awarded off-hand to the club putting in an appearance, provided the umpire be satisfied of its having complied with the regulations. Should neither club appear on the ice, the allocation shall lapse and become void; and no club,

pla gin bee making default in playing for a District Medal, shall be placed on the list of clubs entitled to compete for Medals in the season following, unless excuse, sufficient to justify such default, be submitted to the Executive Committee, at least two weeks before Annual Meeting in April, and receive their approval.

- 6. When the umpire appointed to superintend a Medal Match finds that he will not be able to do so personally, he shall appoint another curler, well conversant with the game, to act as his deputy, who shall have all the powers of the umpire, but the report of the match must be countersigned by the umpire, and all such reports must be transmitted to the Secretary of the Branch within three days after the match has been played, and must contain the names of the players in each rink on both sides, the number of heads played, the result of the match and of each separate rink, as well as the place where and the time when played, and such other information as the schedule may call for.
- 7. Should the two clubs meet agreeably to appointment to play the match, and the umpire or his deputy not be present, the skips representing the competing clubs shall meet and appoint any regular member of any associated club as acting umpire for the occasion, who shall have all the rights and privileges of the regular umpire.
- 8. All medals not played for, during the season for which they are allocated, shall be withdrawn.
- 9. All District Medals shall be contested for by at least eight players a side, and no club shall be compelled to play with more than that number unless its membership exceeds twenty; and, if beyond that number, not any more than one rink of four men for each complete series of seven regular ordinary members on its list.
- 10. All competitions for District Medals shall be played by twenty-two ends or heads; unless before beginning to play, some other number of ends shall have been agreed upon by the competing skips.

11. Umpires in all cases are enjoined to hear objections from the losing party before awarding Medals.

VIII.-OF THE POINTS' GAME.


- I. Rinks shall be laid off in accordance with the diagram given for this game in the last published Annual. Within the 14 feet circle, a circle 8 feet in diameter shall be drawn around the tee, and a centre line or score from the hack to the hog score; and the length of the rink from hack to tee shall be 42 yards.
- 2. Lots shall be drawn for the order of playing; each competitor shall change position one place each point, thus: The first player at any of the points to be the last in playing at next point, and the second player at any point to be the first at the next, and so on. Each competitor shall use two stones, and play them, the one immediately after the other, and shall not during the competition change the side of a stone, or the stone itself, unless it happens to be broken.
- 3. Every competitor to play four shots at each of the nine following points of the game, viz.: Striking, Inwicking, Drawing, Guarding, Chap and Lie, Wick and Curl In, Raising, Drawing through a Port, and Chipping the Winner, according to the following definitions, and each successful shot shall count as hereinafter provided.
- a. Striking—A stone placed on the sweeping score, and with its inner edge two feet from the tee. If struck to count 1: if struck out of the 14 feet circle to count 2.
- b. Inwicking—One stone being placed on the tee, and another with its inner edge 2 feet 6 inches from the tee, and its fore-edge on a line drawn from the tee at an angle of 45 degrees with the central line; if the played

stone strike the latter on the inside to count I; if it perceptibly move both stones to count 2.

- c. Drawing.—If the stone played lies within or on the 14 feet circle to count 1; if within or on the 8 feet circle to count 2.
- d. Guarding.—A stone, to be guarded, placed with its fore-edge on the tee. If the stone played rests within 6 inches of the central line to count 1; if on the line to count 2. It shall be over the hog, but not touch the stone to be guarded.
- e. Chap and Lie.—If the stone placed on the sweeping score, with its inner edge one foot from the tee, be struck out of the 14 feet circle, and the played stone rest within or on the same circle, to count 1; if struck out of the 14 feet circle, and the played stone rest within or on the 8 feet circle, to count 2.
- f. Wick and Curl In.—A stone being placed with its inner edge 7 feet distant from the tee, and its fore-edge on a line making an angle of forty-five degrees with the central line; if the stone is struck and the played stone curls on or within the 14 feet circle to count 1; if struck and the played stone rests within the 8 feet circle to count 2.
- g. Raising.—A stone placed with its centre on the central line and its inner edge 8 feet distant from the tee; if struck into or on the 14 feet circle to count 1; if struck into or on the 8 feet circle to count 2.
- h. Drawing through a Port.—One stone to be placed with its inner edge on the central line, 10 feet in front of the tee, and another stone placed parallel thereto and with its inner edge 2 feet from the central line; if the played stone passes between these two stones, without touching either, and rests within or on the 14 feet circle, to count 1; if within or on the 8 feet circle to count 2.
- i. Chipping the Winner.—A stone being placed on the tee, and another 10 feet distant, and with its inner edge just touching the central line, and half guarding the

one on the tee, and a third stone being placed 4 feet behind the tee, with its inner edge touching the central line, but on the opposite side from that on which the guard is placed; if the played stone strikes the stone placed behind the tee to count I; if it strikes the stone on the tee to count 2.

- j. Outwicking.—In the event of two or more competitors gaining the same number of shots they shall play 4 shots at outwicking; that is, a stone being placed with its inner edge 7 feet distant from the tee, and its centre on a line making an angle of 45 degrees with the central line; if struck within or on the 14 feet circle to count 1; if struck within the 8 feet circle to count 2.
- 4. If the competition cannot be decided by these shots, the umpire shall order one or more points to be played again by the competitors who are equal.
- 5. In the Points' Game the rink may be swept as often as required during the intervals between the playing of stones; a player may sweep his own stone, and may direct where a broom shall be held to guide him in playing.

NOTE.—The above rules and definitions for the Points' Game in Chap. VIII. are applicable only to medals given by the General Association, and are not intended to supersede any regulations made by local clubs, in competing for their own private medals.

It will save much time, if, in playing for local medals, two rinks be prepared lying parallel to each other, the tee of the one being at the reverse end of the other rink; every competitor plays both stones up the one rink and immediately afterwards down the other, finishing thus, at one round, all his chances at that point.

It will also save time if a code of signals be arranged between the marker and the players, such as: the marker to raise one hand when 1 is scored, and both hands when 2 are scored. In the case of a miss both hands to be kept down.

The Chairman intimated that, as the minutes of the last meeting had been published in the Annual, it was desirable that the reading of them be dispensed with, and that they be approved; and the suggestion was adopted by acclamation.

The Secretary then read the Report of Competitions for Royal Canadian District Medals for season 1889-90, as follows, viz.: The interest taken in these standard trophies is clearly shown by the large percentage of matches played for them during the past season, which has been the least favorable for curling experienced by the present generation; twenty-five out of thirty-three medals allocated, have been played for, four have failen to clubs through default of opponents; one, a Jubilee Medal continued from last year, was again not played for; from the Umpires of two no report has been received, and in regard to another, both clubs were reported as desirous to play, but were prevented by want We think it desirable to remind clubs that "default" is followed by exclusion from next allocation, in accordance with Section 5 of Chap. VII. of Rules.

The two matches unreported are No. 16, Guelph Royal City vs. Wingham, and No. 28, Orillia vs. Toronto Moss Park; we understand that Orillia Club travelled to Toronto to play, but there was no ice, and that Moss Park Club could not be induced either to play at Orillia, or midway at Barrie; and the Umpire reports that in No. 18, Howick Thistle and Owen Sound Clubs were both willing to play at Chesley, but there was no ice, and Midland made default in No. 31, while Aurora Club did not organize last season.

Mr. Wm. Rennie then moved, seconded by Mr. Jas. Pringle, That the Report on Medal matches as read, be received and adopted; and that we express our gratification at the spirited conduct of such a large number of clubs in playing, in such a season, for those honorable trophies of skill in curling, and that the Executive Committee deal with the matches not reported; and it was carried.

For Report in detail, see pages 116 to 127.

The Secretary then read Report of Competitions for the Ontario Tankard, season 1889-90, showing that the PRIMARY had been completed in 14 of the 16 Groups, and that 13 champion clubs had taken part in the FINAL, and that Walkerton Club had come out winner.

For Report in full, see pages 128 to 135.

REPORT OF ANNUAL MATCH, CITY OF TORONTO VS. ALL THE REST OF THE PROVINCE OF ONTARIO.

It was found desirable to drop this match for the year, many reasons combined to render this the only satisfactory course to be followed, of these we may mention the unfavorable character of the weather during January and well into February, when the Bonspiel should have taken place, and that through the want of ice, many of the clubs, especially those who had not wooden flooring on their rinks, had not had any practice and no enthusiasm had been aroused, and in addition the railway companies in January withdrew the specially favorable terms they had previously allowed to curlers travelling to and from this match, and, for this reason, several clubs who had entered for the match withdrew their entries, and as this match has been looked upon as the large curling demonstration of the year, it was thought better not to have it at all, than to have it on a petty scale; and we are convinced that as long as the railways continue their ungenerous policy of refusing to grant excursion rates between November and May, the difficulty of holding our large Annual Bonspiel is too great to warrant the effort being made, owing to the increased expense entailed upon those taking part in it. It was moved by Mr. Jas. Simpson, seconded by Mr. T. G. Williamson, that the report of the Executive Committee, in reference

to the suspension for last season of the match, City of Toronto vs. the rest of Province of Ontario, be received and confirmed, and it was carried.

THE COMPETITION FOR THE GOVERNOR-GENERAL'S PRIZE.

In reporting on this match, your committee admit a feeling of disappointment, at the unfortunate circumstances which attended this, the first competition for the Governor-General's Prize for stone playing clubs, under the new conditions laid down by His Excellency, and which he had prepared with great care, after consulting

with the several Provincial Associations.

Walkerton Club, the winner of the Ontario Tankard, represented our Association in the competition at Ottawa, and, as reported in the newspapers, played under the direction of the umpire, the ice not being in good condition, against two rinks from the Manitoba Branch Club made up of one rink from each of two Winnipeg Clubs, while the conditions laid down by His Excellency required that all the players should be from one club. Under these circumstances, your committee having regard for the interests of our Association, and of the game of Curling in general, respectfully drew the attention of the Governor-General to the reports appearing in the public press, with the result that His Excellency, after communicating with the Manitoba Branch, referred the whole matter to the Canadian Branch, which decided "That in the opinion of that Branch, the final competition, required by the conditions stated by His Excellency, did not take place in the match referred to, and neither party is entitled to the prize."

Your committee are of the opinion that the attention which has been drawn to the necessity of strict compliance with the conditions established for governing curling competitions, and with the rules of the game, will have an important influence in the proper regulation of curling matches in the future, and that the Governor-

General, our Patron, has exhibited excellent judgment in referring the whole case to the decision of a sister Branch, well conversant with the game, friendly alike to all parties concerned, and alive to the true interests of the noble game of Curling.

The Secretary then read Report on Match with the Canadian Branch of the Royal Caledonian Curling Club.

Your committee gladly welcomed a proposal from the Canadian or Quebec Province Branch of the R.C.C.C. to endeavor to establish an annual match between the two Branch Clubs, one part of the match to be played in Montreal, and the other part in Toronto, either on the

same day or as might be arranged.

Your committee looked upon this proposal as a step towards the unification of all the curling associations in the Dominion, and were very desirous to have it carried to a successful practical ending; they feared there was danger that the match might become not general between the Associations, but local between the cities of Montreal and Toronto, and with this in view they wished to have it on a large scale, and invited each club in our Association to send one rink at least to take part in it. response to this invitation was unexpectedly small. A considerable number were willing to play with Granite Stones in Toronto, but very few offered to go to Montreal and play there with Iron Stones; and a similar experience was found by the sister club in Montreal; many were prepared to play in Montreal with their accustomed irons, but few volunteered to travel to Toronto and play with granite stones, the standard implements of the game, but in the playing of which they had but little experience.

It was finally arranged to play the first part of the match in Toronto, on Saturday, the 1st February, with 20 rinks a side, and the other part in Montreal on 1st March, with a like number of players. When our friends from the east arrived, it was found they had brought only 14 rinks of players, but they were true curlers every one, well skilled in the game and overflowing with

enthusiasm, and although placed at disadvantage in having had but little practice in the use of granite stones, they held their own gallantly against their skilful western brothers, and when the several scores had been summed up, it was found that the men from the east had run up an aggregate of 242, against 291 made by those of the west.

For the match three of the five City Rinks were occupied, and after the games were finished a few hours of very pleasant intercourse were enjoyed with the visitors, first in supplying the requirements of the physical man, and afterwards in developing the feast of reason and the flow of soul, until the inexorable command "All on board for Montreal," compelled our honored guests to depart—in the words of a venerable curling song,

They met as strangers in the morn, At night they parted friends.

The second part of the match was prevented by a long continued spell of mild weather in Montreal, and although 18 Rinks from Ontario had arranged to go east on 28th February and were prepared to take their chance of ice, or wait for it, the Quebec Province Branch deemed it unwise to risk disappointment on that score, and declared the match off.

We are hopeful that another year will see this match carried out on a good large scale, and that it will not be confined entirely or mainly to the cities of Montreal and Toronto, but that it will be truly representative of both Associations, and that the meeting will lead up to the formation of a Grand Dominion Curling Club, embracing all the Provincial Branches of the R.C.C.C., and thereafter, that every few years, there will be a grand rally of Canadian Curlers, from ocean to ocean, to meet each other in council, and on the ice around the Tee, in some central and convenient locality.

It was then moved by Mr. W. H. Bleasdell, seconded by Mr. W. F. Davison, "That the Ontario Branch cordially approves the action of the Executive Committee in accepting the invitation of the Canadian Branch to establish an annual match between the two Associations, and desires to express the hope that at a day not far distant, specific steps will be taken to have a general meeting of the several Branches of the Parent Club in the Dominion, looking to the amalgamation of them all;" and it was carried.

The Executive Committee have the pleasure of reporting the addition of two clubs to the Branch during the past year; the very extraordinary weather which characterized the last two curling seasons, and made it difficult for the best equipped clubs to obtain even a moderate amount of curling, operated strongly against the establishment of new clubs; they are aware, however, that notwithstanding this very serious hindrance several clubs have been organized, and will be found applying for admission before next season, enough they hope to bring up our membership to one hundred clubs.

The Argyle Club of Prince Albert has ceased to exist, and the Saskatchewan Club of the same place has found a more convenient home in the Manitoba Branch, and our present club membership numbers ninety-seven, two only of which are not in active working order, viz., Bradford and Ingersoll, and we hope that both will soon be re-organized and restored to their former position in the Branch. The reports submitted show that although the past season was even less favorable for the practice of the game than the unprecedentedly unfit one of the year preceding, our principal matches have been carried out with as much completeness and as successfully as in years when we were favored with what we were wont to call our Standard of 100 Curling days-twenty-five out of thirty-three District Medals allocated have been actually played for, and the Primary Competitions for the Tankard were completed in 14 of the 16 groups, while the Final was carried out under the most favorable conditions, both of ice and weather, and it is matter for congratulation and a proof of the untold wealth of our curling resources that the Tankard was won by the Walkerton Club, hitherto comparatively unknown to fame, and under such admirable conditions of weather and ice as made the competition eminently a test of superior curling skill.

The Match, City of Toronto vs. the rest of the Province of Ontario, was not carried out during the past season, partly on account of the weather, but mainly owing to the withdrawal by the railway companies of the special rate of fare formerly accorded to this match, and to the final competition for the Tankard.

Your committee arranged for an annual match with the Canadian (the iron-playing) Branch to be played partly in Toronto and partly in Montreal, but the latter part of the match was not played owing to the very unusual circumstance of lack of curling ice in the last-named city. Your committee entertained high hopes of important results to follow from freer in ercourse between the Curling Associations of the Dominion, and they strongly recommend that the beginning which has been made, be

followed up in future years on a greatly increasing scale of magnitude.

The continued appreciation of the Annual is a source of the deepest satisfaction to your committee, and they again recommend it to the hearty support of the members of the Branch.

The Annual Meeting of the Grand National Curling Club of America will be held this year in the City of Toronto, and it is desirable that a committee be appointed to visit the sister club in session, convey our congratulations and meet any committee it may appoint to consider arrangements for the contemplated institution of periodical international matches, the first to take place in the winter of 1891-2.

Your committee have again, with the deepest sorrow, to report the death of another of the Ex-Presidents of the Association. Mr. John O. Heward was one of the oldest curlers in Canada, having been pressed into the game in Toronto when a stripling, to make up the com. plement of players about 1834 or 35, and he continued to take a lively interest in the grand old game during all his subsequent life; possessed of ample means and leisure, he gave himself heartily to all forms of out-door manly recreations, was an excellent cricketer, an expert with the rod and gun, and a curler keen and true-just as jolly undergoing defeat as when leading his opponent by a good majority-blessed with a happy, sunny spirit, he had also the faculty in a high degree of awaking a like feeling in the hearts of all with whom he associated, and everyone liked to play with or against him on the same rink, knowing that whether winning or losing they would have a pleasant time. The world's happiness is largely due to such kindly lives; while remembrance awakens regret at his departure, may it also arouse to imitation of his virtues.

Mr. Wm. Bayly, the third player in Mr. Heward's rink, whose death followed within a few weeks that of his skip, demands also a tribute of affectionate remembrance. He was well known for many years as a prominent member, first of the London, then of the

Toronto Curling Club; tender and true of heart, gentle and unassuming in demeanor, gallant and unflinching in our friendly contests on the ice, he was a noble comrade, beloved by all, and most by those who knew him best, and he will be long remembered as a most amiable man, a kind friend and a true curler.

The adoption of this report was moved by Dr. Ross, seconded by Mr. Wright, and carried.

Dr. Boucher then read and moved the adoption of the motion of which he gave notice at previous meeting, it was seconded by Mr. Flavelle, and after some discussion, it was put to a vote and lost, obtaining a majority of 18 to 14, while a majority of two-thirds was held to be necessary to carry. Mr. Shepard then moved, seconded by Dr. Ross, that the railway companies be requested to grant excursion rates during the curling season, with a view of fostering the carrying out of curling matches on a large scale, and it was carried. Mr. Bruce moved, seconded by Mr. Rennie, that a committee be appointed to wait upon the Grand National Curling Club of the United States at its meeting in this city, on the 9th July, and convey our friendly greeting, and meet any committee it may appoint to consider about arrangements for the proposed international matches, and that the committee consist of Mr. Harvey, Dr. Boucher, Mr. Badenach, Mr. Russell, Mr. Flavelle, and the mover and seconder of the motion, and it was carried.

Mr. Badenach gave the following notice of motion, viz., That at the October meeting I will move that all the words in clause 3, of section IV. from the word "rate" in the third line, to the word "dues" in the eighth line, be struck out, and that said clause be amended to read, that the annual dues be as follows, "A club rate of two dollars from each club, and an additional sum of twenty-five cents a member, for each member regular and occasional, of every club whose membership is less than fifty, and of fifteen cents for each member of every club whose membership is over fifty and less than one hundred, and of ten cents for each member of clubs whose membership exceeds one hundred; and retain the sen-

tence following the word "dues" in the said eighth line of clause 3, of section IV.

Mr. Flavelle gave notice that at the October meeting he would renew the motion brought up by Dr. Boucher to-day, in reference to member's fees.

Mr. Russell then moved, seconded by Mr. Badenach, that the following words be inserted after the word "competition" in the 6th line of clause 4 of the rules for Tankard competition, viz., "but the position of the players in the order of play may be changed, but only between matches," and it was carried.

The President then presented the Banner, the main trophy of the Tankard competition, to Mr. J. F. H. Gunn of the Walkerton Club, and also the Gold Medal, his own donation as President, to the winner of the Tankard, and Mr. Gunn made a suitable reply, acknowledging his deep sense of the honor, not altogether anticipated, which had been achieved by the Walkerton Club; they entered the contest conscious of being possessed of some skill and determined to do their best, but not at all sanguine as to their chance of success against such redoubtable competitors as the Guelph, St. Mary's, Hamilton Thistle and Toronto Granite Clubs; and having won the prize in a fair field they felt satisfied with themselves, were delighted with their victory, and would preserve with honest pride the beautiful tokens of their success which had been presented to them by the Association and the President.

Vice-President Dr. Boucher presented the Second Prize, a handsome Silver Medal, his souvenir to the last competing club in the Tankard competition, to Mr. Williamson of the Toronto Granite Club, who made a neat speech of acknowledgement.

Dr. Ross moved a vote of thanks to the proprietors of the Walker House for their continued kindness in affording such excellent accommodation for our meetings; it was carried by acclamation, and acknowledged by Mr. Wright.

Mr. Rennie moved a vote of thanks to the Chairman, which was seconded by Mr. Flavelle, and carried.

The meeting was then adjourned.

Mr. Badenach moved, seconded by Mr. Simpson, that the minutes of the meeting of the Representative Committee now adjourned, be held as read, and it was carried.

The minutes of last meeting were read and confirmed.

The Secretary reported that he had received one application for admission into the Branch, viz., from Durham Club, and moved that said club be received into the Association in the usual manner, which was seconded by Mr. Congalton, and carried. The Secretary reported further that a club was being formed at Richmond Hill, and that he expected their application for admission at an early date.

The following report from the Executive Committee was read, viz.:

Your committee report that having taken into their consideration the unwonted difficulty of finding suitable ice for important matches last season, they have decided

that all the clubs which were unable to compete for District Medals last winter be included in this year's allocation.

They have received from the railway companies notice of the continuance of the special rates of travel hitherto granted to parties of not less than eight persons "going a curling," and that they will give due consideration to our request for excursion rates for large matches, and for the final for the Tankard, and the match City of Toronto versus the rest of the Province.

They also recommend that, in view of the urgency of the matter, and that the necessity of increasing the fees has been before the Association for two years, the various proposals regarding the manner and extent of the increase be considered as unfinished business, and

taken up and decided at this meeting.

In order to meet the enlarged expenditure of the Association they recommend that the annual club rate be increased from \$1.50 to \$2.00, and the member rate be increased from ten cents to fifteen cents in respect of each member of every club, but that no club will be called upon to pay more than twenty-five dollars in respect of members' fees.

They recommend that a committee be appointed to

revise the By-Laws, Regulations, etc.

It was moved by Mr. Badenach, seconded by Mr. Shepard, and carried, that the report as read be received.

There was then read, Report of Committee appointed to meet the Grand National Curling Club of the United

States.

Your committee waited upon the delegates of the Grand National Curling Club at their annual meeeting held in this city in July last, and were well received.

After a very pleasant and friendly consideration of the proposed establishment of a periodical international match, between the curlers of the United States and those of Ontario, the following points were agreed upon, viz., First, that it shall take place every fifth year; Second, that it shall be open to all curlers residing within

the boundaries of the United States on the one side, and to those living within the limits of Ontario on the other side; Third, that the first match of the series, which it is hoped will continue to all time, shall be played in Toronto, on an early day in January, 1892. And it was further agreed that every effort be put forth to make this first match of the series, the grandest bonspiel that has

ever taken place on this continent.

The joint committees were unanimously of opinion that it is very desirable to have a trophy in connection with the proposed series of international matches, to be held by the winning side until the time for the next match arrives, when it shall be given up to the umpire, to be han led over by him to the winning side; and that it be preserved in perpetuity as a token of the friendly feeling existing at this time, between the curlers of these adjacent countries, and as a pledge of the continuance of such sentiments of good-will and mutual esteem.

Your committee are happy to report that the sister institution is flourishing, and that a fine spirit is manifested in the conduct of its affairs; and are further pleased to record that the curling clubs of the city vied with each other in entertaining, at their several rinks, the visiting delegates during the whole time of

their meeting.

Respectfully submitted.

It was moved by Dr. Boucher, seconded by Mr. Thomas McCraken, that the report be received, and

it was carried.

The meeting then proceeded to the election of Office Bearers, and on motion of Dr. Boucher, seconded by Mr. Badenach, and carried unanimously, Lord Stanley of Preston, Governor-General of the Dominion, was elected Patron.

Dr. Boucher was unanimously elected President. Mr. Harvey congratulated the President-elect on his elevation to the highest office in the Association, and welcomed him to the chair,—on assuming which Dr. Boucher gracefully expressed his sense of the honor done him by his brother curlers, and his hope that during the term of his tenure of the office, the Association would enjoy as great prosperity as it had done under the presidency of his predecessor.

Mr. W. Badenach was elected First Vice-President.

Dr. Beaton was elected Second Vice-President.

Rev. D. J. Macdonnell was re-elected Chaplain.

Mr. J. S. Russell was re-elected Secretary-Treasurer.

Messrs. Wright, McIntosh, Dalton, Shepard, Davison and Walker were elected the Council of Management.

Messrs. Judge Dartnell, Thomas McCraken. Hugh Millar, and Dr. Ross were elected the Committee on Complaints and Appeals; Dr. Ross to be Chairman.

Messrs. W. D. McIntosh, J. S. Russell, and W. F. Davison were re-elected the Committee on the Annual; Mr. Davison, Chairman.

Messrs. James Pringle and T. G. Williamson were elected Auditors.

The meeting then proceeded to general business and took up for consideration the Report of the Council of Management.

The first, second, third and fifth clauses were adopted,

on motions duly made and seconded.

Mr. Flavelle moved that in clause fourth, all the words from and after "but," be left out; Mr. Baird seconded the motion and after a keen discussion it was carried.

On motion of Mr. Tamblyn, seconded by Dr. Ross, the Report of the Committee appointed to meet the Grand National Curling Club of the United States was confirmed.

The Secretary then read the Allocation of District Medals prepared by the Council of Management for the season 1890-91; after which Dr. Beaton moved, seconded by Mr. Fennell, that the Report and Allocation be received and laid on the table, and it was carried.*

^{*} This motion cancels the Allocation of Medals for this season, and was made necessary by the delay in revising, and increasing the rate of annual fees.

Mr. Dalton moved, seconded by Dr. Beaton, that four silver medals be given by the Association to be played for by the clubs taking part in the Ontario Tankard Match, on the same principle as last year in the contest for the four pairs of curling stones presented to the Association. On being put to the meeting it was declared lost.

Mr. Badenach gave notice that at next meeting he will move that the allocation of district medals be discontinued, and that a silver medal be awarded to the champion club of each group in the primary competition for the Ontario Tankard.

Mr. Russell gave notice that at next meeting he will move that in clause I of chap. vii., the last three words, viz., "the previous season," be deleted, and that the words "either of the two preceding seasons" be inserted in their stead.

The plans of grouping the clubs was then taken up for consideration, as revised by the Council of Management, after receiving suggestions from the clubs, to all of whom it had been submitted; and after several motions to make further changes had been made and lost, the Report was adopted.

2nd. The Primary Competitions for the Ontario Tankard, beginning about the middle of January, and to be concluded by the 8th of February.


3rd. The Final competition for the Ontario Tankard about the middle of February.

4th. The Competition for the Governor-General's Annual Prize, between a champion club from each stone playing Province in the Dominion.

5th. The Scottish Counties Medal Match; the medal is now held for Lanarkshire by Mr. Leggat of Hamilton, to whom challenges from other counties may be addressed.

6th. The annual match between the City of Toronto vs. the rest of the Province of Ontario, to take place about the 20th of January.





THE GOVERNOR-GENERAL'S PRIZES.

CONDITIONS OF COMPETITION FOR HIS EXCELLENCY
THE GOVERNOR-GENERAL'S CURLING PRIZES, TO
BE PLAYED FOR BY STONE AND IRON
PLAYING CLUBS DURING THE
SEASON OF 1890-91.

- 1. One club each to be selected by the Central Associations of iron and stone playing affiliated clubs in each Province to represent their respective Provinces, with two rinks, at a Bonspiel to be held at Ottawa.
- 2. The selection of such clubs, and the conduct of all Primary competitions for the above prizes, to be entirely in the hands of Central Associations.
- 3. The representatives sent to Ottawa need not be the same as those who competed in the Primary, but in the contest at Ottawa the players must not be changed after they have taken part in one game. Should any player become, from sickness or from any other cause deemed sufficiently urgent by the umpire, unable to appear on the ice, the next player before him, on that side, shall play with two pairs of stones, or the second player when it is the first who is absent.
- 4. In all the Final matches for the Governor-General's Prize, if any of the competing rinks are not ready to begin play at the hour named for the match, one end shall be counted as played for every ten minutes delay, and the opposing rink, if ready to play, shall count one point in the game for each such period of time it is kept waiting, and each game shall consist of 22 ends.
- 5. The Governor-General's Curling Club is debarred from taking part in this contest.

6. The umpire or umpires for the Finals shall, if possible, be chosen from among the members of the above Club by the Governor-General's Secretary, who shall select the ice on which the several games are to be played, and shall decide by lot what clubs shall play against each other in the event of more than two Provinces being represented in the final contest.

7. The Secretaries of Associations will notify their entry to the Governor-General's Secretary, Government House, Ottawa, so that it shall reach him on February 22nd at the latest, and the day or days on which the contest shall take place will be arranged as soon as possible, and so as to suit the convenience of rinks coming from distant Provinces.

8. Unless more than one Province is represented in this competition, both as regards the iron and stone playing clubs, the Cups will be withheld.

9. In the event of anything preventing the club entered in the first instance from competing, Associations are permitted to substitute some other club.

10. Except as regards the foregoing conditions, all matches shall be played under the rules of the game as laid down by the Royal Caledonian Curling Club.

THE ONTARIO SILVER TANKARD.

REGULATIONS FOR THE COMPETITION.

1. There shall be an Annual Competition for the Tankard, open to all clubs affiliated with the Association.

2. For the Primary Competition, all the clubs in the Branch shall be arranged in groups of six or more in each; and the clubs in each group shall play off against each other, with not less than two rinks a side, as they may be drawn, No. 1 vs. No. 2, No. 3 vs. No. 4, and so on, or in any other mode of drawing the umpire of each group may decide upon; and the winning clubs in each contest shall, in like manner, be drawn to play against each other, until only one club remains undefeated; and the finally winning clubs of all the groups shall meet in Toronto, at the call of the Secretary of the Branch, to carry out the Final Competition in the same manner, with two rinks a side; and the club remaining undefeated shall be declared the winner for the year, have its name engraved as such on the Tankard, and be entitled to have it in keeping until the next competition, and to the possession of such other trophies as may be awarded to the winning club. The name of the club playing the final contest with the winner shall also be recorded on the Tankard as the "last competing club,"

3. At the half-yearly meeting of the Representative Committee, in October, the clubs shall be arranged in groups, and one club in each group shall be appointed to nominate a convener for that group, who shall take the entire management of the Primary Competition therein, and report to the Secretary of the Branch agreeably to a prescribed form, setting forth the names of the clubs in the group, the parties to each successive

contest and their results, and the name of the club winning the last match. All of these reports must, without fail, be in the hands of the Secretary of the Branch club before or on the 10th day of February, AFTER WHICH DATE NONE WILL BE RECEIVED.

4. In the Primary Competition the players of any of the clubs may be changed for the successive matches; but in the Final Competition the players who represent a club in the first contest must continue unchanged as long as the club remains in the competition; the position of the players in their order of playing may be changed, but only between matches. Should any player become, from sickness, unable to appear on the ice, the next player before him on that side shall play with two pairs of stones; or the second player when it is the first who is absent.

5. That, when the umpire for the group is a member of one of the competing clubs, the two clubs shall mutually agree upon time and place for the ma.ch; but if they fail to do so, then the umpire shall report the same to the Secretary of the Association, and the President shall decide the matter; and when the competing clubs in a group have been reduced to not more than three, the umpire, if a member of any of the surviving clubs, shall appoint a deputy umpire from one of the retired clubs, who shall conduct the further matches in the competition.

6. In all the Primary Competitions the orders and decisions of the umpire must be obeyed and accepted, and are subject only to *immediate* appeal, by the club feeling aggrieved, to the President, through the Secre-

tary of the Branch Club.

7. Immediately on the receipt of the returns of the Primary Competition, the Secretary of the Association shall appoint a time for the Final Competition; and shall give notice of the same to the clubs reported as being the survivors in the various groups; he shall also recall the Tankard from its custodians, so that it may be on exhibition during the Final competition, and handed to the winning club at its close.

8. That, in the Final competition, if a winning club be present from more than eight groups, two sets of matches shall be played off the first day, so as to leave only two sets to be played off on second day.

9. In all the matches for the Tankard, both Primary and Final, if any of the competing rinks are not ready to begin play at the hour named for the match, one end shall be counted as played for every ten minutes' delay; and the opposing rink, if ready to play, shall count one point in the game for each such period of time it is kept waiting—and each game shall consist of twenty-two ends.

10. As only those clubs which have been reported to the Secretary of the Branch, by the 10th February, as survivors in the Primary Competition, can take part in the Final Competition, the last winner in each group will take care that the report of their success be duly made before that date.

11. The winning club will have the additional honor of representing the Province in the Inter-Provincial Competition for the Governor-General's prizes at Ottawa.

Immediately after the close of the match, a meeting was held in the spacious club room of the Victoria Rink, and the Tankard was presented by President Harvey to Mr. Nichols, President of the Walkerton Club, the presentation and acceptance being prefaced by neat and appropriate addresses; thereafter vigorous congratulatory speeches were made by Mr. O'Connor, M.P.P., Mr. Ballantyne, M.P.P., and our late President, Mr. Ferguson, M.P.P.; and in response to a vote of thanks for their unfailing kindness in furnishing admirably prepared ice for our annual competitions, Messrs. W. B. McMurrich and W. Badenach replied on behalf of the proprietors of the Victoria, the Granite, and the other City Rinks.

The Consolation Match, for the four pairs of curling stones and handles presented by Mr. Thos. Thorburn of Scotland, was begun at same time as the second drawing in the Tankard competition, and it was brought to a close on Saturday afternoon, by the St. Mary's Club defeating the Toronto Club by a score of 65 to 24. In all, nine clubs took part in this special contest, viz.: St. Catharines, Toronto, Lindsay, Belleville, Woodstock, Barrie, Bobcaygeon, Elora, St. Mary's; the other three, viz., Guelph, Hamilton Thistle, and Toronto

Granite, declined to compete.

The valuable prize was presented, on the ice, by the Secretary of the Association to Mr. McIntyre, the President of St. Mary's Club, and was suitably acknowledge; and thus terminated a most successful Tankard competition. The ice was in excellent condition during the whole time of the contest, the playing was of a high class, and the onlookers were very numerous, and warmly interested in the success of the players, and enthusiastically applauded skilful and successful shots.

PRO FORMA

RULES and REGULATIONS

-FOR-

CURLING CLUBS

I. The Club shall be called the Curling Club.

2. Its membership shall consist of such persons as may be admitted into the Club, pay the necessary fees, and comply with the regulations as adopted from time to

3. The office-bearers of the Club shall be a President, a Vice-President, a Secretary and Treasurer; and these office-bearers, together with.....members chosen from among and by the Skips of the Club, immediately after their election in December, shall constitute a Board of Management. The members of this Board shall continue in office until their successors shall have been appointed, and at any of their meetings four members

4. The office-bearers shall be elected by and from amongst the members of the Club at the regular meeting to be held on the first Tuesday in October of each year, and at such hour and place as may be determined upon by the Board of Management; at same meeting the amount of the annual fee for the ensuing curling season shall be decided on; Representative Members shall be chosen to act for the Club in the Ontario Branch of the Royal Caledonian Curling Club. In all cases, when more than one person has been nominated for any office, the election shall be by ballot.

5. The regular meetings of the Club shall be held on the first Tuesday in the months of October, November, December and March, and on Tuesday of each week, at 7.30 p.m., in the months of January and February; and the annual meeting shall be held on the third Friday in the month of March of each year. Special meetings shall be called at any time, after due notice, by the President, or in his absence by the Vice-President, whenever he may think fit, or when requested to do so by written requisition, stating the object of the meeting, and subscribed by not fewer than.....members of the Club; at all meetings of the Club.....members shall form a quorum.

6. The President of the Club shall take the chair at all meetings of the Club and of the Board of Management. He shall be charged with the duty of seeing that the Rules of Order and the By-laws of the Club are strictly adhered to, and that the business of the Club is properly conducted, and he shall be, ex officio, one of the Skips of the Club, and guardian of all the trophies belonging to the Club. In his absence at any meeting, the Vice-President shall take his place, and in the absence of both of them the meeting shall elect a chairman, who shall have, pro tempore, all the powers of the President. At all meetings the chairman shall have a deliberative vote,

and in cases of equality a casting vote.

7. The Secretary shall keep a full and correct record of all meetings of the Club, and of the Board of Management, as well as of all matches played under the auspices of the Club, and keep a register of all the trophies of the Club, and shall generally carry out the instructions of

the Board of Management.

8. The Treasurer shall collect the members' fees and other assets of the Club, and shall pay all accounts after they have been passed by the Board of Management; he shall keep a correct and distinct account of his receipts and expenditures, and report the same from time to time to the Board of Management as well as to the annual meeting of the members of the Club. The offices of Secretary and Treasurer may be combined.

9. It shall be the duty of the Board of Management to see that proper arrangements be made whereby the members of the Club may have suitable facilities for curling, and that the ice be properly prepared; they shall arrange practice days, and fix the hours for playing; they shall appoint time and place for all inter-rink and other matches within the Club, as well as matches with other clubs, provide refreshments for visiting clubs, convey stones of Club Rinks appointed to play matches, and in general take charge of carrying out the work of the

Club.

10. Skips, in the proportion of one skip for every seven members of the Club, shall be nominated at the monthly meeting in November, and the election shall take place at the monthly meeting in December of each year; only members who have paid their fees for the season next ensuing shall be eligible to vote or to be voted for as Skips. Immediately after their election the Skips shall meet and elect from their number members for the Board of Management, and make up their rinks in the following manner, viz.: They shall draw numbers for priority of choice, the party drawing the lowest number having first choice, and proceeding in order to the party drawing the highest number, who shall have last choice; then under the same drawing, but in reverse order, they shall choose their next players, the party drawing the highest number having first choice, and proceeding downwards to the party having lowest number, who shall have last choice; a second drawing shall then be made, under which, in manner aforesaid, additional players shall be chosen, and the skips and their players thus chosen shall constitute the rinks of the Club for the season, and be entered as such in numerical order on the minutes of the Club, the President's rink being number one, and the others following the order of the first drawing. players or vice skips may be selected by any skip through private arrangement, and must be announced before drawing begins. As new members join the Club, they shall be assigned (temporarily) by the President or Secretary to one or other of the regular rinks as "extra" players. After the December meeting additional rinks may be formed by the Board of Management, but such rinks shall not rank on the rota of Club rinks for outside or inter-rink matches, and up to first of January of each year, members may exchange from one rink to another, but only with the consent of both skips interested.

be entitled to play in all inter-rink matches, and shall also play, in the order of rotation, in friendly matches with other clubs. If any rink declines to play in its turn, it shall thereby forfeit its right to play in that rotation, and the next rink in order shall be called on to play under same conditions. In matches with other clubs, for trophies of any kind, the Skips for each match shall be chosen by the Skips of the Club, at a

special meeting called for that purpose.

12. In all inter-rink matches for prizes given by the Club, any four of the members of any rink shall be entitled to play as that rink. If only three of such members appear on the ice prepared to play a match, the game shall proceed, one player playing two pairs of stones according to rules of Ontario Branch Club; if only two players come forward, the rink shall be declared to have made default, and to have lost the match by five shots, and a win with a majority of three shots shall be awarded to the rink ready to play. In all cases three players of a rink present and ready to play shall be held to be a rink. If any rink plays an interrink match with one or more players not belonging to it, said match shall be declared to be a default against both competing rinks, and each of them shall be declared to have lost the match by five shots.

13. For matches at the Points' Game members desiring to play shall draw for order of precedence in playing, and the entire number of players may be divided into sections of from eight to twelve persons in each. These sections will play in numerical order, and the members of each section in like order, but changing as each point is played, the party playing first at any of the points playing last at next point, and the party playing second at any of the points playing first at the

next. It shall be lawful for persons who draw to play in different sections to exchange places with each other, and members who fail to play in their own section may take the place of any absentee in any following section; and, in the discretion of the Board of Management, an additional section may be made up of members who fail to play in the section in which they were drawn. In all such matches, no player shall be allowed to enter after the first stone has been played for the competition

at the second point.

14. On the ordinary practice days, the Skips of the Club on the ice at the hour of meeting for play shall have the privilege of acting as Skips on that day. On any such day, if more Skips and rinks are present at the hour of meeting, than can be accommodated on the ice, the Skips of the rinks present shall draw for ice, and those who draw blanks shall have ice reserved for them next practice day at same hour. On other days, each eight players on the ice may choose their own Skips, and members other than Skips may have ice allocated to them to play matches, on application to the Board of Management. And, on ordinary practice days, any of the Skips of the Club may appoint any one of the members of his own rink to act as Skip of his rink for the day.

15. Any member may be expelled from the Club for cause, by a ballot vote of members present at a meeting specially called for the purpose; the charge or charges having been preferred against him in writing at any previous meeting, and the party so charged having received a copy of the said charge or charges from the Secretary at least four days before the special meeting takes place; a vote carried by two-thirds of the mem-

bers present shall expel the offending member.

16. The regular matches within the Club shall be first, an inter-rink match between all the rinks of the Club, each against every other rink; second, a match at the Points' Game open to all the members of the Club; and third, a match at the Points' Game, open only to junior members of the Club, who shall have

played not more than two seasons previously; here any other matches may be inserted; all these matches shall be played according to the rules of the Ontario Branch Club, and prizes shall be awarded by the Club to the successful competitors.

17. Rules of order at meetings.

I. Reading minutes of the preceding meeting, which after approval shall be signed by the chairman.

II. Reading of correspondence.

III. Business arising out of minutes.

IV. Reports of committees.

V. Proposal and reception of members.

VI. Payment of dues.

VII. Unfinished business.

VIII. New business.

IX. Adjournment.

All motions and notices of motion must be in writing, and shall bear the names of the mover and seconder, and must be read aloud by the presiding officer before being discussed. Reports of Committees must be in writing, and bear the signature of the chairman.

18. No new law shall be enacted, and no existing law shall be altered or repealed, until after it has been discussed at a meeting of the Club, held not less than one month after the meeting at which notice of proposed change had been given, and posted in the Club room, and unless concurred in by two-thirds of the members present at latter meeting.

TRAVELLING FACILITIES

The GRAND TRUNK and the CANADIAN PACIFIC RAILWAYS have granted to Curling Clubs associated with the Ontario Branch of the R.C.C.C. special rates of fare when travelling, in bodies of not less than EIGHT PERSONS, to and from curling matches.

These rates are a single trip fare of TWO CENTS A MILE from station to station, and a return trip fare at the rate of ONE AND ONE-THIRD the ordinary single fare, and include the handling and carriage of stones and brooms.

For the GRAND TRUNK RAILWAY, rate orders, entitling clubs to the above-named reduced fares for the season, can be obtained upon application to the GENERAL PASSENGER AGENT of the G. T. R. at Montreal.

For the CANADIAN PACIFIC RAILWAY, applications may be addressed to GENERAL PASSENGER AGENT, C.P.R., Montreal, or to DISTRICT PASSENGER AGENT, C.P.R., Toronto.

Secretaries of clubs will please take notice that these orders should be procured early in the seasou, before curling begins, and applications for them should not be put off until going away to a match. And they must be shown to local agents when applying for tickets.

Curlers when travelling are requested to have their curling stones, etc., forward at the railway station at least fifteen minutes before time of starting, and to depute one of their number to procure the necessary tickets.
