

ECLIPSES.

There will be two Eclipses this year; both of the Sun, and both invisible in Canada.

The first will happen on March the 15th, and will be a total and central Eclipse at noon, visible in South America.

The second will take place on September the 7th, and will be central and annular at noon; visible in the great Pacific Ocean.

Venus will be the Evening Star from the beginning of the year till the 6th of October, and thence Morning Star to the end of the year. Jupiter will be Morning Star till the 3d April, thence Evening Star till the 22d October, thence Morning Star till the end of the year.

JANUARY.

The snow which fell during the later days of December will, with a fall which will take place on the 31, make the roads good for travelling with sleighs. After that period a succession of very mild cloudy days will occur which will last until the 8th, when the frost will become intense, with clear bright skies, the glass varying from 15 below to 7 and 12 above zero; after the 16th the weather will become more moderate. A heavy fall of snow will commence at 10 minutes before 10 o'clock on the 19th, which will last until the same hour next day. Every three days a change from severe cold to a more moderate temperature, interspersed with slight showers of snow, will be the characterizing features of the last part of January.

FEBRUARY.

The weather which prevailed during the last 10 days of last month will continue until the 7th, when an unusually mild thaw will take place, and a heavy shower of rain will fall on the 9th. On the 10th the weather will again become cold, and continue, with occasional showers of snow, until the latter end of the month. This last mentioned period of the month, with little intermission, will be unusually disagreeable, cold, cloudy and gloomy, with occasional heavy fogs. On the 28th the weather will become more agreeable.

MARCH.

The weather which distinguished the last days of February will continue until the 4th, when the severe frost will soften again and more snow will fall. On the 10th a severe gale of wind, with snow, which will cause heavy drifts on the roads, sufficient for a time to impede travelling. On the 12th hard frost will again set in and will continue with little intermission until the 25th, when heavy gales of wind with snow and sleet, will characterize the remainder of the month. The weather during the last mentioned period will be unusually stormy and disagreeable.

APRIL.

The beginning of this month will be wet and disagreeable, rain followed by frosts and then snow again will be the distinguishing features of the first 10 days of April,—after that period the weather will again become more settled and indications of Spring will be discernable. The remainder of the month will remain unmarked by any great change, with the exception of a heavy fall of snow on the 23d. Rain will fall on the 15th, 19th, 24th, and 30th. On the 15th the snow will have altogether disappeared.

SEED POTATOES.—By an experiment carefully made several years ago, it was found that seeds from the top end of the potatoe yielded the largest and earliest crops; that seeds from the smaller or root end gave less than one-third of the first.

JUNE.

The first part of this month will be temperately warm, with occasional showers. JULY.

The first part of this month will be exceedingly sultry—the glass ranging from 78 to 90 fahrenheit in the shade, and on the 11th at noon, it will rise as high as 99. On the 12th a heavy thunder storm, after which the heat will become more temperate. On the 14th, 15th and 16th, cloudy weather, with nearly incessant rain. After this period the weather will again become bright and sultry and continue so to the end of the month, with occasional thunder squalls.

MILK.—To divest this, and butter, from the taste of turnips, cabbage, wild onions, or other offensive plants, on which the cows have fed, put a quart of boiling water into each pailful of milk, when it comes from the cow.

PROTECTION OF GRAIN AGAINST MICE AND OTHER VERMIN.—Put at the bottom, near the centre and the top of each stack, as it is raised, three or four stalks of wild mint, with the leaves on. The same experiment may be tried with cheeses, and with equal effect, by laying a few leaves green or dry, on the articles to be preserved.

CUSTOMS OF UPPER CANADA.

IMPORTS FROM THE UNITED STATES.

Prohibited.—Arms, Ammunition, Books such as are prohibited to be imported into the United Kingdom, Base Coins, Fish, dry or salted, Train Oil, Blubber, or skins of creatures living in the Sea, Tea.

Free.—Ashes, Bellion, Beef, Bread, Bacon, Biscuit, Corn, Cocoa Nuts, Cordwood, Cabinet-maker's Wood, Diamonds, Drugs, Dye-woods, Fruits, Meat and Fish, (being fresh,) Flour, Flax, Grain, (unground,) Gums of all kinds, Hay, Horses, Hams, Hemp, Live Stock, Lathwood, Lumber, Logs, Masto, Meal, Pork, Rice, Rosins, Resins, Rawhides, Staves, Shingles, Tortoiseshell, Tow, Tallow, Timber, Woodhoops, Wood.

Admitted at the Duty of 7½ per Cent.—Alabaster, Anchoives, Argot, Aniseed, Amber, Almonds, Brimstone, Botarge, Currants, Capers, Coral, Cork, Dates, Essenses, (of Burgamont, Lemons, Roses, Citron, Orange, Lavender, and Rosemary,) Emerystone, Fruit, (dry in Sugar or wet in Brandy,) Figs, Honey, Iron in bars, unwrought Pig Iron, Incense of Frankincense, Juniper-Berries, Lava or Malta Stone for building, Marble, Medals, Nuts, Oil of Olives or Almonds, Ostrich Feathers, Olives, Pickles, Pitch, Paintings, Pozzolona, Punice Stone, Punk, Parmesan, Cheese, Pearls, Precious Stones, Prints, Raisins, Sponge, Sausages, Turpentine, Tar, Vermiceli, Whetstones, Wine.

Admitted at the duty of 20 per Cent.—Candy Sugar, Cotton Manufactures, Glass Manufactures, Tobacco Manufactures, Refined Sugar, Soap.

Admitted at the Duty of 30 per Cent.—Books and Papers, Clocks and Watches, Leather Manufactures, Linen Manufactures, Silk Manufactures, Musical Instruments, Wire, (all sorts.)

Admitted at the Duty of 15 per Cent.—Goods, Wares, or Merchandize not being enumerated or otherwise charged with duty.

Duties Charged by Weight, &c.—Salt, 6d C'y per bushel; Spirits, 1s. C'y per gallon; Sugar, 5s. C'y per cwt.; Coffee, 5s. C'y per cwt.; Cocoa, 5s. C'y per cwt.; Molasses, 3s. C'y per cwt.; Wine in Bottles, 7d. per gallon, and further 7½ per cent. ad valorem, and 1s. C'y each doz. qt. bottles.
