blem age, and its secrets and its successes must be guessed out, but worked out. The parent who ignores this fact is going through the world with blind eyes; and he who hurries his children into the work of the world ill-trained, poorly equipped, is sending them into the rear ranks of the world's workers, and will have the life-long reproaches of those whom he has doomed to bondage.

A CHANGED WORLD The Brooklyn Eagle issued last week an educational number, dealing with educational institutions in the United States. On its introductory page the importance, indeed the absolute necessity of education, and the training of the young into skillful workmen is set forth in so striking a manner that parents everywhere should be deeply impressed.

With good weather the exhibition here next week should be a great success. The citizens of St. John should feel that something depends upon each of them to contribute to that success. The past summer has been one of prosperity for the farming community and the attendance and the exhibits should correspond with this happy condition.

The ranks of labor are crowded, the numbers in the industrial race are many, the prizes few. Shall we send them untrained to certain defeat, or shall we give them the intellectual, physical and moral discipline which is the price of success? What shall we do with these boys and girls for whom we are toiling and sacrificing, and in whom are wrapped all the pride and joy of life? We spend thought over the investment of our money; shall we not give equal thought and equal wisdom to our investment in our children?

The Toronto Telegram somewhat cynically observes:—"The man who can afford to put in his whole time at Ottawa may be a patriot. He may also be an undesirable type of hanger-on with no source of income outside of his sessional indemnity or the perquisites of a member of Parliament."

The Purify League movement should spread from Moncton throughout the province. The absence of canned tomatoes or any such preservative will not make the political campaign less interesting, while it would certainly make both parties feel better afterwards.

It is clear that there is no lack of men to take the place of the C. P. R. strikers. The surplus of unemployed labor makes the present a particularly unpropitious time for such disputes, which entail great hardship, engender strife, and fail to produce the desired result.

The exhibition yacht race should prove a great attraction. Whoever has witnessed a race at Millville knows how interesting such an event becomes, and how much enthusiasm is aroused when there is a good breeze and a large list of entries.

Lovers of the horse will regret that the exhibition race entries were not full, and the fact is an argument against slashing dates of provincial fairs. The experience of this season should be useful in the future.

McCARREN IS STILL BOSS New York, N. Y., Sept. 8.—By carrying 18 of the 23 Assembly districts of Brooklyn, Senator Patrick H. McCarran today maintained his political control of Kings county, only four of the seven districts returning anti-Curran leaders. Despite charges of fraud made in advance of the polling by both sides, very little disorder was observed. Only forty arrests were made for attempted illegal voting, and at no time was it necessary to send the platoon of police out, which was held in reserve.

RECIPES Temperance Mint Julep.—Bruise the sprigs and leaves of two or three sprays of fresh mint and place in a glass half filled with shaved ice. Macerate thoroughly, add four tablespoonfuls of grape juice and fill the glass with seltzer or carbonated water. Jelly Roll.—Make a layer of sponge-cake, and while it is still hot cut off the edges, spread it with jelly and roll it together. Then roll it in a stiff paper and tie it. If the cake is not overbaked and is rolled while hot it will not crack. The paper will keep it in shape. Cover the top and ends with icing. Decorate it with tracings of icing, candied cherries and angelica. Teed Tea.—Make a quart of tea and add half a cup of lemon juice, sweeten to taste with powdered sugar. Into tall glasses put half a glass of cracked ice and a slice of lemon and add the tea.
