

ATTEMPT RUSSIAN MINISTER'S LIFE

Paris, Nov. 28.—A train on which Prince Demidoff, Russian minister to Athens was going to Saloniki, was fired on by a band of reservists, according to an Athens despatch to the Petit Parisien. On the return journey the train was de-railed by a criminal band, close to Lito-ehori. No one was hurt in either at-tempt. Sir George established the first manu-factory of airplanes in England. 


IRON HEEL STAMPS DOWN AGAIN ON BELGIUM
