"It has been my idea for years," he wild, "I have worked at it constantly. It is ready and it means much."

He spoke first of its purely local significance and then the broader aspect made its appeal to him.

It will reduce the cost of tilling the soil by one-half or one-third, and it will produce food in abundance for an increased population. It will make work, lots of work. 
