1,221 PATIENTS AT FREE CLINICS

Great Progress Made in Fight Against Tuberculosis

In the reports submitted at the annual meeting of the St. John Association for the Prevention of Tuberculosis it was shown that the attendance at the clinics held three times a week had totalled as many as 1,221 and that in all there were 144 clinics, making the average attendance at each clinic slightly less than nine.

The number of patients on the list has varied around the 300 mark. There were 298 on the list at the beginning of the year and at the close the list had 272 names. New patients reporting during the year were 864 and 498 patients were discharged.

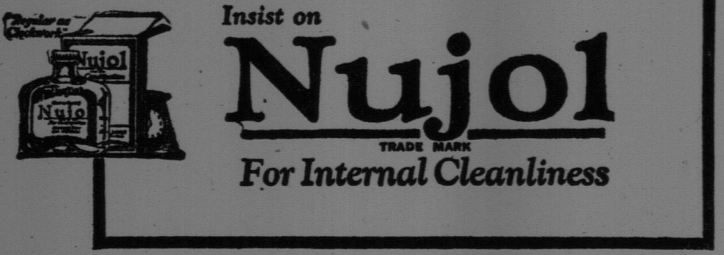
REFUSED LEAVE TO APPEAL SENTENCE

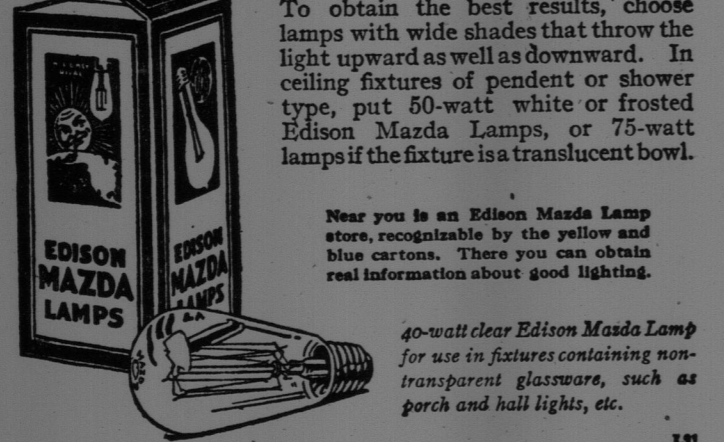
