During the first eight months of 1924, it was shown Canadian exports to France increased 112,284 francs in value, the figures this year being 368,104 francs as compared with 255,820 francs in the corresponding period last year. French imports during this time increased from 106,863 francs to 225,037 francs, an advance of 118,174 francs.

Baldwin Plans Use of Canadian Food Products to Cut Living Cost

London, Nov. 20-(By Herbert Briley, British United Press)-The etilteation of the food products of the dominions, particularly those of Canada, as part of a campaign to force down the cost of living here is one of the plans which Premier Stanley Baldwin has in mind upon the practical nature which the Royal Commission will be asked to report.

An Imperial economic committee such as was suggested at the Imperial Conference last year, to which Canada would not agree, is soon to be set up and this will further deal with this same question. Premier Baldwin also has an idea that food may be sent from the dominions at cost price to be distributed here with the least possible expense.







Berlin, Nov. 20.—Germany's experimentation with the turnover tax (Unsatzsteuer) is proving a tremendous hinderance to speeding up the wheels of production which the nation seeks for accomplishment of the Dawes plan. The Government, realizing that the 2½ per cent. tax is raising the cost of living and hampering export of German goods, pared down this tax to 2 per cent.

Now, however, the finance ministry has completed a thorough investigation, which led it to conclude that it would be well gradually to abandon this tax completely. The ministry found that the tax is being passed

Incidentally the question of tax calculation is proving serious at the moment. The government has been compelled to permit postponement of tax payment by some of the harder-hit agrarians. Adn it was found necessary to extend this special privilege system to certain industrial and commercial undertakings. These were permitted to pay half of their so-called half-year taxes by October 8 but with postponement of payment of the balance to January 15, 1925

New Brunswick was the banner province of Canada in potato raising this year and also set up a new record for acreage production, according to reports just issued by the Dominion Bureau of Statistics. The average production this year was 155.8 hundred-weights an acre which is the highest that has ever been recorded.

The area planted in potatoes this year is provisionally estimated at 563,899 acres, as compared with 560,942 acres last year. The average yield per acre is estimated for the whole of Canada at 103 cwt. as against 99 cwt. last year, and the total yield is placed therefore at 58,069,000 cwt. as cmopared with 55,497,000 cwt. in 1923. The total value of the crop is estimated at \$52,600,000, as compared with \$56,397,800 last year, the average price per cwt. being 91 cents this year, as against \$1.02 last year.

By provinces, the average yield per acre is highest in New Brunswick, 155.8 cwt., the yields of the remaining provinces averaging in cwt. as follows: Prince Edward Island 155, British Columbia 108, Nova Scotia 107, Quebec 105, Alberta 94, Ontario 93, Manitoba 63, and Saskatchewan 48. The yield in New Brunswick is the highest yet recorded, comparing with the previous record for the same province of 146.61 cwt. in 1913.



Patients on Lists.

The number of patients on the list has varied around the 300 mark. There were 298 on the list at the beginning of the year and at the close the list had 272 names. New patients reporting during the year were 864 and 498 patients were discharged. Of those discharged some were transferred to other care, some left the city and a large number were found non-tubercular. There were 17 deaths during the year. Five patients were transferred to the Jordan Sanatorium and 53 to the County Hospital. There were 182 prescritpions filled and 28 patients were supplied free milk.

Of the special examinations made there were 173 patients fluoroscoped and 101 X-rayed, while examinations were made of 104 sputums. Of patients that had been under care and for a time discharged there were readmitted 108. The association reported to the Board of Health 55 cases, tuberculosis being a notifiable disease.

The society's expenses of the year amounted to \$3,424.54, of which the chief items were \$2,918.36 for nurses' salaries, \$88 for car fare and \$25 for medicine. Receipts totalled \$3,689.61 and included tag day proceeds, \$1,555.37; donations, \$110, and collections, \$668.

Rev. F. J. LeRoy to Succeed Rev. W. P. Dunham at Good Shepherd.

At a meeting of the congregation of the Church of the Good Shepherd in Fairville, last night, by unanmious vote it was decided to invite Rev. F. J. His first charge was at Waterford, N.B., and after three years there he accepted the call to St. Martins where he was rector for eight years, removing to St. George four years ago. In each parish Mr. LeRoy has been held in very warm regard by the members of his congregation and his work has prospered greatly. He is exceptionally gifted and although English is not his mother tongue he is an eloquent preacher. He has been especially interested in urging new methods of teaching French in the schools of the province, having advocated teaching French as a living language, rather than as a dead language. His sister, Mdlle, LeRoy, who is the leader of the St. John branch of L'Alliance Francaise has a wide circle of friends in the city.

Great Run of Smelt in the Miramichi-Curtail the Lumber Cut

Three prominent North Shore business and lumber men, W. B. Snowball, M.P., Chatham; J. The J. B. Snowball Co., Ltd., was not preparing to do any lumbering this year, whereas in years past their winter's cut amounted generally to 18,000,000 feet. They were going into the woods, however, to cut railway

In the vicinity of Richibucto, the lumber prospects were not promising, Mr. O'Leary said. The cut would be small, but he was not in a position to say how much smaller than in an ordinary year.





Rowell was the only man in the world who could furnish rum in sufficient quantities and he doubtained contracts to supply both the army and navy throughout the war.



One of the oldest things in use is the sailboat. Some 6,000 years of hislory lie between the earliest scraps of fabric that propelled boats along the Nile and the "firebox" that Fulton built. If Flettner's own statements are to be believed in their simplest form and evident intent, he has applied the Magnus law to drive a ship and nothing more.

But Flettner seems to have a new principle, or a new method based on an old one. He says that his plan is a development of the Magnus law, discovered in the middle of the last centrification of the last centrifica

electrical power. But Flattner has apparently resorted again to that freest of all power, which seldom diminishes

of all power, which seldom diminishes and is never exhausted, but goes blowing around the world in a liberty that has never yet been restrained.

Flettner is not a newcomer in marine invention. He perfected a rudder some years ago that bears his name. He is now Director of Aerodynamics at the Institute of Amsterdam and is familiarly known to scientific men as an experimenter along original lines. His present affiliation with the Krupps and the leading steamship interests of Germany has been accepted here as evidence that his discovery is a matter of the first consequence.

Electrical men are interested in the Flettner researches. A new method of producing power would mean cheaper electricity for every need of life. It has been believed that the next development in this field would be the construction of generating stations at coal mines, so as to minimize expense. But Flettner may have found a method whereby a source of energy can be captured at will. The progress at the proposed experiment station in Berlin will be watched with close attention.

But an attempt to sum up all the possibilities involved in Flettner's inquiries would be an effort to survey the whole field of motive power. It is declared that we have realized almost the full possibilities of power supplied by coal and oil. In electricity we have many things to learn. Apparently we may yet find the wind to be the latest driving source at our command.

Man has speculated for ages on a method to employ this force, just as he has tried to make the tides serve his ends, but so far the accomplishments in either direction have not proceeded beyond a sailing ship. This vast, unknown, unmeasured element has awaited its conqueror. Perhaps that lucky man is Anton Flettner.

New York may get a glimpse of Flettner and his odd-looking craft, if all goes well. He has announced a trip across the Atlantic as one of his first moves. According to his estimates, the journey should not require more than eighteen days. One of these mornings we may see his ship the Bakau, sail up the historic Hudson under a motive power that was almost made obsolete by the experiments of Fulton in that same river.


