INCREASE IN THE NUMBER OF WORKERS. Better Report on Employment In Canada for Week Ended April 9.

Ottawa, Ont., May 2—An increase of 8,837, or 1 1/2 per cent, of workers on the pay roll was reported for the week ended April 9, by 5,129 firms in Canada, as compared with their pay rolls of the previous week.

Pay rolls for the week ended April 9, showed employment of 553,922 workers by these firms. The favorable turn in the re-opening of railway shops in Quebec.

Comparing the figures of the week under review with the week of January 17, 1920, the index number of employment was 85.7. For the previous week it was 84.1, for the corresponding week of last year (April 10th), it was 102.9.

OIL GUSHER ON FARM OWNED BY CANADIAN GIRL. Since, Ont., May 2—Miss Retta Patterson of Windham township, a former employee of the Bell Telephone Company here, is owner of property in Montana, United States, on which an oil gusher has been struck. The flow of oil is about 1,000 barrels a day. Miss Patterson has been in Montana about three years.

STAKE GOLD CLAIMS IN THE GATINEAU DISTRICT. Ottawa, May 2—Gold has been discovered on the 400 acre farm of Robert J. J. near Kanabagan, in the Gatineau district, Quebec, 45 miles north of here. Provincial government assays give a high as 801 value a ton of ore. It is said that already 8,000 acres have been staked by people from this city and neighborhood.

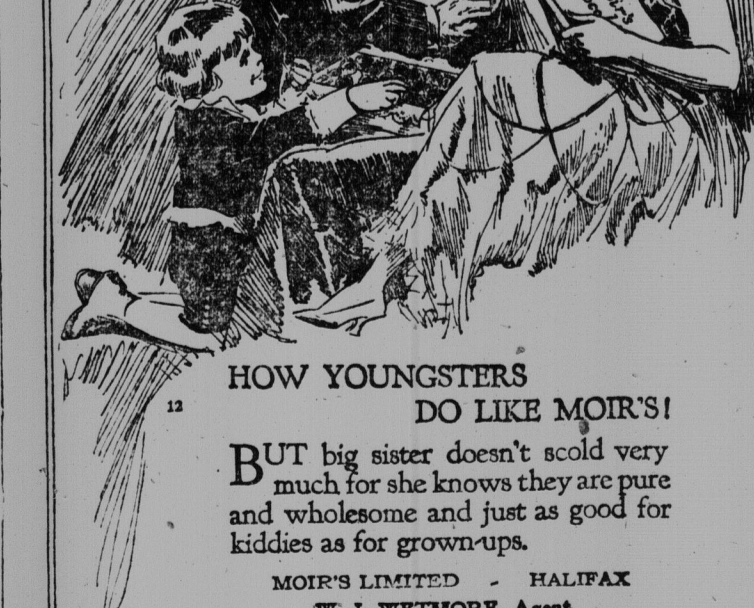



DUTCH PRINCESS' 12TH BIRTHDAY

Will be Queen of Holland Some Day—Spends Much Time in Study.

The Hague, May 2.—(By Associated Press)—Twelve-year-old school girls in America who sometimes think teachers are mean, or that their mothers make them work too hard, and who long for the life of a princess, would find they had only to study the more and work the harder if they led the life of Princess Juliana of Holland, whose twelfth birthday anniversary was celebrated on Saturday.

Far from being the princess of fairy tales, who has nothing to do but sleep on silken covered rose beds, eat chocolate drops and play with gay little page boy courtiers, Princess Juliana has to study French history, arithmetic, geometry, algebra, geography, drawing, grammar, voice culture and the rules of a queen some day and the ruler of Holland, no matter who her husband is, she is taught etiquette, court customs and the strict rules of conduct appertaining to a princess.

Up to the last year, Princess Juliana attended a little school at the palace with a number of little girls of the Dutch nobility. Now, however, as she has reached the age of twelve, which is an age of great decorum for a princess, she is having private lessons because she must learn things in a shorter time than other children of her age.

With all this work, Juliana has some time for play. She is a plump, fair-haired girl of the true Dutch type. She goes out in all weathers. She is particularly fond of skating and when there is ice on the canals, is frequently seen there, skimming along with her mother, the queen.

Her companions are very carefully chosen for her, and she, like her recent predecessors in the House of Orange, has been taught that it is not becoming royalty to make a "stage play" for popularity. She frequently accompanies her father, the Prince Consort, or her mother, on trips about Holland, when her geography teacher goes along and instructs her at first hand in her own country's features.

Government buildings were gaily decorated in celebration of her anniversary and a number of children called at the palace singing old Dutch songs.

DUG THROUGH WALL AND ESCAPED JAIL

Two Prisoners at North Bay Effect Sensational Delivery—Ladder Too Short.

North Bay, Ont., May 2.—Patrick Dubord, awaiting trial for the murder of Victor Collette, last December, and Mike Malnyauk, awaiting trial on a charge of rape, escaped from the county jail here on Monday night. During the night a canoe belonging to Clarence Raycraft was stolen from its boathouse, and the police suspect that the fugitives are responsible for its disappearance.

Dubord occupied a cell next to the rear wall of the prison and Malnyauk was in the cell next to Dubord. Using a small spike, wrenched from his bed, Malnyauk removed about twenty bricks from the wall which separated him from Dubord. Through this hole, about fifteen inches square, Malnyauk entered Dubord's cell and the pair worked together at the outer wall. The wall between the cells is about four bricks thick and the outer wall about six bricks. Before leaving their cells, the men made a ladder with their blankets and pieces of wood from the beds. A small yard separates the outer wall of the prison from the fence that skirts the building. This fence is twenty feet high and the fugitives found their ladder too short by about eight feet and they dug a hole under the fence and so made their way to freedom.

Not Missed Till Morning

The men were locked in their cells at six o'clock on Monday night, and it was not until five the following morning that their absence was discovered. They had neither money nor provisions with them and were dressed in ordinary brown clothes. The authorities here consider that Dubord is insane and he had informed them that he intended to enter a plea of insanity at his trial. He had permitted his beard to grow while in prison. He is a stout man with a reddish and shaggy beard and about forty-five years old. Malnyauk is a young man who has a slight moustache and the nucleus of a beard.

The men had been here since February 10th awaiting the spring assizes. Dubord is charged with killing Victor Collette with an axe and disposing of his body through a hole in the ice near Cochrane. The victim of the Malnyauk crime, a little girl eight years old, is now in a Montreal hospital and her recovery is despaired of.

The guard at the goal here says that none of the goal officials would enter Dubord's cell alone, as he was considered dangerous.


Malnyauk immediately before his escape had been on a hunger strike and had not eaten anything for three days.

SOFT-TONGUED BOLSHEVISTS

Teriojki, Finland, April 12.—(Associated Press by mail.)—Copies of Bolshevik posters designed to quiet the strikers of Petrograd during the recent revolution at Kronshtadt which have been brought across the border here, show the Communists turned to soft words in their effort to win over the workmen. Previous posters were couched in words of command but these were addressed to "Dear Comrades" and were full of promises. One of them reads: "Dear Comrades—We offer you the following seven concessions: "Eighteen million pounds (of 36.07 pounds each) of coal have been ordered from abroad. "Non-party representation will be allowed on the grain trade commission. "Preparations for city vegetable gardens are under way. "County workers will be dismissed and sent home from Petrograd because of the short rations. "Check detachments on the railways are ordered to exempt workmen. (The 'check' detachments were communist guards who seized any produce brought from the country into Petrograd.) "Sixty new trains will be operated to the suburbs for workmen. "Unlimited regulation of grain will be replaced by the definite quota system.

DEMONSTRATIONS ON MAY DAY

There were May Day demonstrations in several Canadian cities by the radical elements. In Toronto 200 men gathered in Queen's Park on Saturday afternoon at a "Red" meeting, which was orderly but strongly critical of the local authorities. Many policemen were stationed in the park to keep the peace. At Hamilton, about 1,000 workers gathered, the majority of them being foreigners, and sang the national anthem of Ukraine. A Union Jack was ordered by the chief of police to be placed at the head of a parade of 2,000 workers in Winnipeg. After the parade a mass meeting was held, when the red banner was hoisted above the Union Jack. In Montreal 2,000 Socialists held their annual May Day celebration, but the demonstration was unusually quiet.

In Europe. May Day was quieter in most foreign countries than was expected. Bombs were thrown in Buenos Aires and an attempt was made to blow up the railway bridge there, but nobody was injured and little material damage was done. The Italian government took precautions by ordering out the militia. In Paris the day passed very quietly. Patriotic gatherings marked the day in New York, and while strict measures were enforced in Boston, no disturbance was created. The day also passed very quietly in other American cities. "Hunger only becomes greater through revolution."

1,000,000 BATHS AT CITY'S EXPENSE

New York Community Service Investigation Shows Facilities for 20,000,000 Are Needed.

(New York Times.)
New Yorkers took more than 8,000,000 baths at the city's expense last year, according to the report of the City Recreation Commission of the New York Community Service which for a month has been investigating the city's bathing facilities.

Henry F. Lutz, who made the investigation, recommends that the bathing be increased so that at least 1,000,000 baths can be taken during the year. One-fifth of the population of Manhattan, his report says, resides in districts bounded by Grand and Division streets to East Fourteenth street, and the East River to the Bowery and Broadway. This is the most congested section of the city and bathing facilities are very inadequate.

It is also asserted that the increased issue of bank notes being solely intended for the restoration of the devastated regions—that is to say, for investment rather than for the payment of expenses of administration—need not necessarily depreciate the franc.

The issue would be considered merely as a provisional one that would be withdrawn in proportion as amounts are collected from Germany on reparations account. The French treasury, it is argued, can take care of all other demands upon it when once relieved of the pressing burden of reconstruction.

The government has not received suggestion with much favor.

FRENCH FINANCE

Question as to How Increase in Paper Circulation Will Affect Franc Values—Matter of Foreign Trade.

Paris, April 18.—(Associated Press by Mail.)—The question whether France's financial crisis cannot be tided over by the printing press is being seriously discussed by French financiers and statesmen.

It is argued that an increase in paper circulation, if it further debases the franc, will at the same time bring to France the benefit Germany is now enjoying from the low value of the mark that is, an immense profit on exports sold in foreign money, and a consequent automatic equilibrium in her foreign financial transactions.

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CREDIT TO DUKE OF CONNAUGHT

Harmony in New Indian Legislature Considered a Result of His Visit and Appeal for Unity—Country Still in Critical State.

London, April 18.—(A. P. by mail.)—The session of the new Indian legislature which is now closing may mark a definite epoch in Indian administration, says the Bombay correspondent of the Times.

It opened, he adds, under the shadow of unassuaged bitterness in the Punjab and under the oppression of heavy burdens of taxation made necessary by military considerations.

"In this heavy weather," he correspondent writes, "the new constitution took shape, and the Duke of Connaught's visit."

This royal visit, with the duke's appeal for unity, the Indian government's frank confession of error in dealing with disturbances, and particularly Lord Rawlinson's declaration of military policy, it is said, cleared away the Punjab miasma for the session.

Taking advantage of this period of quiet, the new council of state is considering special legislation for the preservation of order which will prepare the way for the repeal of acts which have outgrown their usefulness.

"The constitution now has the line clear for a year," says the correspondent. "This it owes in large measure to the Duke of Connaught's visit, and the doctrine of non-co-operation, by keeping from the councils the firebrands who would have gone there only to obstruct, and by leaving the way free for men devious of genuinely working for reform, an opportunity has been afforded for an understanding between the government and the councils established all over the country."

"But the battle between constitutionalism and revolution has to be fought this year. All over the country non-co-operation is developing into undisguised tyranny, too often accompanied by disorder. Mr. Gandhi deplores this for the moment. It is inevitable that as soon as the dismal failure of his effort to bring all government to a standstill is realized by the public he will be driven to take further measures."

NOVA SCOTIA'S FIRE LOSSES

Five Fatalities in Half Year—Fire Cost \$1,698,772—Two Incendiary Cases.

Halifax, N. S., May 2.—Four men and one woman were killed and nine persons were more or less seriously injured by fire in Nova Scotia during the half year ending in March, according to a report issued by the provincial fire marshal's office here.

The total fire losses in the province for that period were \$1,698,772, caused by the provincial fire marshal's office here.

Among the causes to which the fire losses are attributed were: Defective chimneys, stove-pipes, open lights and fires, carelessness with hot ashes, careless smoking, sparks on roofs, incendiary lighting, spontaneous combustion and carelessness with matches. Two fires of incendiary origin were reported.

The fire marshal's report for the month of March shows that during that month there were seventy-one fires in the province in which the total loss was \$82,540 and the insurance loss \$41,150. Of the total loss \$82,540 was occasioned by three fires, one in the town hall at Yarmouth, one in a garage in Halifax, and one in Hart County. There were eighteen less fires in March than in the preceding month.

U. S. LIEUTENANT ON RHINE GETS MORE THAN FOCH

Life of the U. S. Soldier in American Army There Not a Bad Thing.

Coblenz, April 14.—(The Associated Press.)—The pay of a second-lieutenant in the American Army on the Rhine is equivalent at present to the exchange rate of that of Marshal Foch. This may explain why the American army of 15,000 men cost Germany more than 60,000 French troops in the Mayence zone. It accounts also for the exaggerated statement from German sources that America's fighting force cost Germany more than all the Allied armies of occupation.

Marshal Foch's salary is 83,000 francs. A second-lieutenant in the American Forces in Germany receives \$2,120 a year which extra allotments bring up to about \$2,800. At the rate of exchange of 14 francs and a half to the dollar, the second-lieutenant draws about \$3,350 francs a year. The private receives \$36 a month; a corporal \$51.80; a sergeant \$63; and a technical sergeant \$74.20. The French 65 marks to the dollar, the American soldier at Mayence has to be content with 75 centimes a day; a corporal received 90 centimes and a sergeant two francs, 60 centimes.

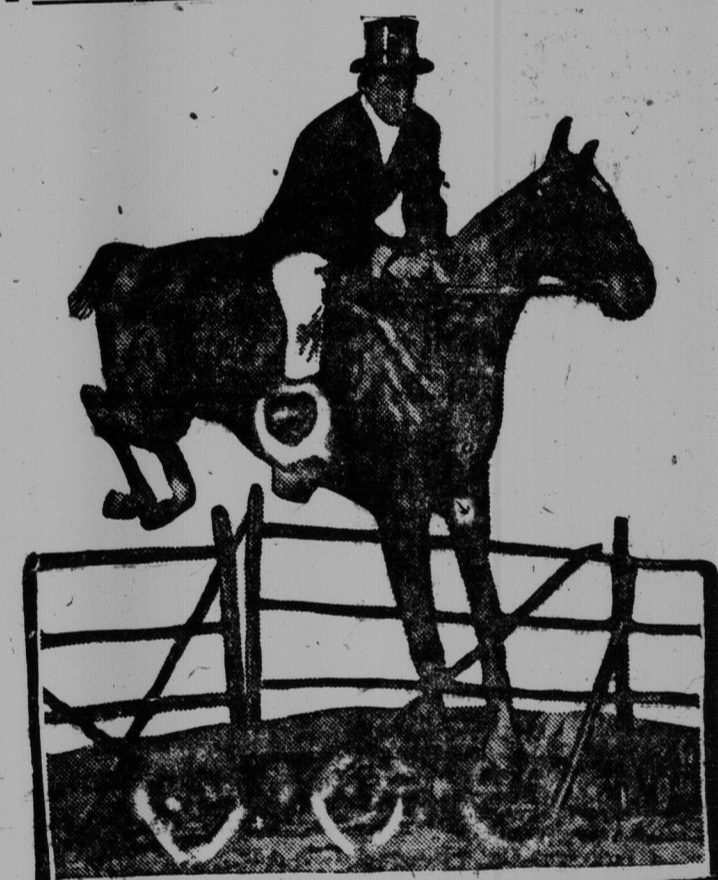

PASSENGERS NUMBERED 54612. An official statement of the number of passengers handled by the C. P. R. through the port of St. John during the season recently closed was issued this morning and shows total of 87,207 arriving and 10,882 sailing. The former was 6,566 in excess of last year.

SAVINGS BANK FIGURES. Returns from the Dominion Savings bank here for April deposits aggregated \$87,002.13 and withdrawals \$88,284.22. For the corresponding month last year deposits were \$85,011.57, and withdrawals \$83,223.01.

The public bequests consisted of: \$3,000 to the rector, wardens and vestry of Trinity Church; \$3,000 to the Home for Incubables; \$3,000 to the Old Ladies' Home; \$3,000 to the Incorporated Clergy fund of the Church of England in the Diocese of Fredericton; \$10,000 to the Seaman's Mission; The leasehold property in Paddock street, including the furniture and household effects was bequeathed to Edith Elizabeth Gilbert, Mabel S. Gilbert and Florence B. Gilbert. To the three children of her brother-in-law John Wilson \$100,000 is left to be divided among the three. One of these is resident in India, one in Africa and the third in England. The other bequests are: To Edith Elizabeth Gilbert, \$20,000; to Mabel S. Gilbert, \$20,000; to Florence B. Gilbert, \$20,000; H. W. Schofield, of Vancouver, \$1,000; Margaret Burke, servant, \$500.

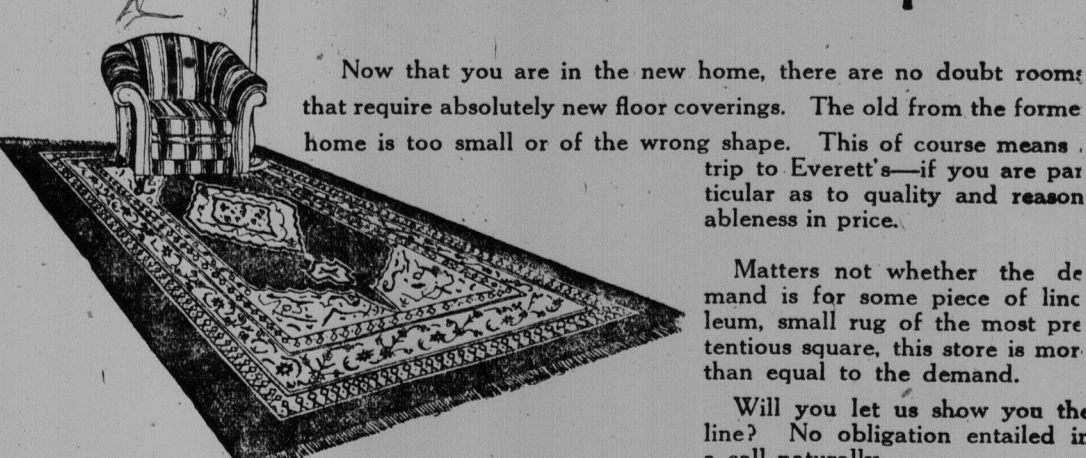
