GERMANS NEAR WARSAW; MUCH DEPENDS ON

GERMANS MAY TAKE WARSAW

London, Dec. 11 It is admitted unofficially in Petrograd today, that German troops are sweeping across Russian Poland, and are now about fifteen miles from Warsaw. The army of General Mackenzen apparently is striking forward rapidly, although it is declared that the other invading armies to the north and south are making little, if any progress. The possibility of German occupation of Warsaw is seen in Petrograd, where it is declared that if the Russians should withdraw from the city for strategic reasons, its capture by the Germans should not be credited as important.

Russia's aim in the fight with the Turks is to plant her flag on the Bosphare.

JAPAN AFTER THE PRINZ EITEL

The Prinz Eitel Friederich belongs to the North German Lloyd Company. Early in the war guns were mounted on board and she was transformed into an auxiliary cruiser. Recently she has been active off the coast of Chile and one of her most recent exploits was the sinking of the British steamer Charcas off Port Coronal, Chile, this month.

London, Dec. 11—A Reuter's despatch from Nish, Servia, contains additional details of the recent overwhelming victory over the Austrians claimed by the Servians in northwest Servia. "The pursuit of the enemy is continuing along the whole line," says the statement, "especially on our left and centre."

The Nurnberg, sunk on the same day as the other three, the Scharnorst, Gneisenau, and Leipzig, was a third class cruiser built at Kiel in 1908, with a displacement of 3,396 tons, carrying 322 officers and men. The Dresden also is a third class cruiser built in the same year, with 3,544 tons displacement. She is a sister ship to the Emden. The Karlsruhe is a small cruiser of 4,820 tons.



London, Dec. 11-More than half of the stock of the Canadian gift flour received to date has been distributed, acceived to date has been distributed, according to a statement made to the Montreal Gazette correspondent here by an official of the local Government Board, which has the flour in charge.
