Twenty - Nine Living in One Gallery and They Tell of Another Group of Fifteen

Cardiff, Wales, Oct. 15 - Rescuing carding. Wales, Oct. 15 — Rescuing parties searching for the 400 miners, still entombed in the Universal Colliery, got into touch, a little after noon today, with a party of twenty-nine men shut in by a fall of coal in one of the galleries. They signalled that another group of fifteen of their comrades was closed in farther along the gallery, but that they feared they were lost.

Altogether about 500 of the 981 men were rescued vesterday, and today diswere rescued yesterday, and today discovery of other parties of living men gave rise to hopes that the fatalities would not be so numerous as was at first supposed. Nearly 400 men, however, have still to be accounted for.



SELLING CANADIAN GOODS IN THE OLD COUNTRY

(Times' Special Correspondence) London, Sept. 30—The exhibition at Bristol next year will likely prove a surprise as to the number of Canadian manufacturing firms doing business in Great Britain. A fair number have already taken space and others are negotimanufacturing firms doing business in Great Britain. A fair number have already taken space and others are negotiating. In conversation with an Ontario manufacturer of men's wear today, your correspondent was informed that the opening up of business in Great Britain, undertaken with hesitation, had more than justified itself and that the results had been very satisfactory.

"There are certain goods manufactured in England," he said, "which would not sell in Canada because they are crudely made. That was what we noticed when we started. We felt that the superior make of the Canadian article would appeal to the buyer of taste in spite of the relative increase in cost. There seems no reason why the example of the American manufacturer should not be followed by those in the dominion. If the United States can sell collars in competition with Belfast, and boots in competition with Northampton there is no logical reason why Canadian manufacturers cannot meet with equal success."







Let me solicit the careful and sented. Let me somet the careful and earnest attention of those present to the subjects brought forward and discussed at this meeting. We shall then have the satisfaction of an honest endeavor to better and improve our own condi-tions and, in as much as we may do so

or try to do so for ourselves, we shall
also be assisting those who are absent.

Those who followed the subjects discussed at former conventions, the decisions arrived at and the results following




