

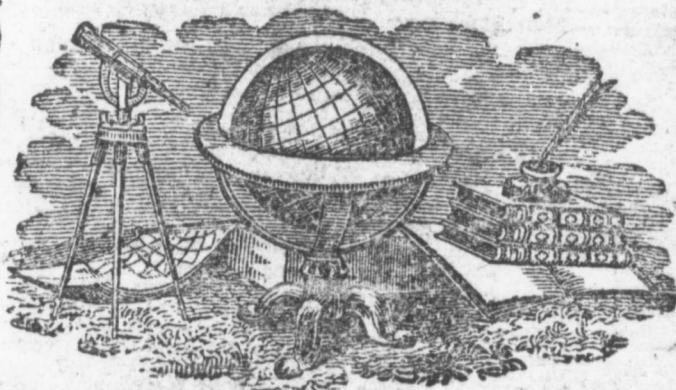

Chronological Summary.

(Continued from the close of 1851—as published in the N. S. Almanac for 1852.)

1852—A variety of incidents referred to in the following summary, compiled from the vol of the Acadian Recorder for 1852, render this year an interesting, if not a memorable period. The more prominent features of the year include—The death of Sir John Harvey; the unabated interest which prevailed throughout the year in reference to the proposed Railway; arrival of Railway Delegates from Canada and New Brunswick, and their subsequent departure for England; threatened difficulties with the United States; seizure of American fishing vessels on the coasts of Nova Scotia, New Brunswick, &c.; the proposed Industrial Exhibition, and the meetings held during the year to promote its success; agitation in favour of reciprocal trade with the United States, and the arrival of Sir Gaspard LeMarchant.

JANUARY 13—A telegraphic message was despatched to Halifax from Quebec, announcing that important despatches had been received from the Secretary of State for the Colonies on the subject of the imperial guarantee for the construction of railroads in British North America.—The substance of these despatches were—"that the Imperial Government will not be disposed to recommend to Parliament to grant its aid to any line of railway which is not calculated to promote the interests of the three Provinces of Canada, Nova Scotia and New Brunswick. The Imperial Government will not therefore propose any aid for the European Line to the United States."

20—The merchants, traders, fishermen and others, residing in Halifax and the adjoining harbours on the shores of Nova Scotia, petitioned the Government of Great Britain to protect the gulfs, bays, harbours or creeks of these Colonies from the intrusion of American fishermen, and to prevent them from fishing within the limits from which they are excluded by treaty.

29—His Excellency Sir John Harvey opened the session of the Provincial Legislature. In his speech he announced—the death of the King of Hanover; receipt of railway despatches; the arrival at Halifax of railway delegates from Canada and New Brunswick; an abundant harvest, and a steadily increasing revenue crowned the efforts of the preceding year; and that there had been a partial failure of the shore fisheries. His Excellency also referred to the establishment of a normal school; encouragement for the establishing of efficient lines of steam communication to connect important points on the Gulf and Atlantic shores with each other, and with surrounding States and Colonies; and directed attention to the report of commissioners for revising the proceedings and practice of common law courts, and the practicability of combining the Equity with the Supreme Court.

31—The chairman of the select committee of the Assembly reported to the House that the committee was not prepared to recommend the adoption of the final proposition of the Canadian Railway Delegates.

FEBRUARY 3—Gasper Tanner and his wife were drowned at Black Rock near Lunenburg, while attempting to cross the ice from the mainland to an island.

4—A meeting was held at Temperance Hall, Halifax. The Railway Delegates, who were severally introduced by His Worship the Mayor, addressed the meeting on the subject of their mission.

27—The R

7—Hon Mr Johnston's Bill for the Incorporation of Counties was read a first time.—An official return of the Shipping owned in the Province was laid before the House, made up to the 31st December, 1830. The number of vessels then registered, was 2761, the aggregate tonnage of which amounted to 163,932 tons. "The registry of these vessels is thus divided—Liverpool 73; Lunenburg 20; Guysborough 14; Windsor 50; Pictou 106; Parrsboro' 6; Yarmouth 309; Digby 47; Sydney 317; Arichat 132; Halifax 1607.

9—Died at St Clements, Moose River, Arthur Wellington Godfrey, aged 31 years. Mr Godfrey was among the first to bring to the notice of the British Ministry the advantages of a railway from Halifax to Quebec.

11—The public accounts were laid upon the table of the House. The increase of the year's revenue over that of the preceding year was £11,000.

—Died at the township of Saint Andrews, Antigonish, Laughlin McPherson, Esq. Justice of the Peace. He was among the most intelligent and respectable native Highland inhabitants of the county of Sydney.

19—The premises of Dr J Woodbury, of Wilmot, with barn, horses, cattle, &c. to the value of £300, were destroyed by fire.

23—The entire right of the Shubenacadie Canal Works, surrendered by the British Government to Nova Scotia, and the lands which the Company owned, were offered for sale, and bid in on behalf of the Provincial Government.—Died at Antigonish, John T Hill, Esq. Barrister at Law, aged 73 years.

27—Rev Dr McKinnon was consecrated Bishop of Arichat, in place of the late Bishop Fraser. The number of persons who assembled at St Mary's Cathedral, Halifax, to witness the ceremony, exceeded 5000, of all creeds and classes. "The Right Rev Dr Walsh, attended by the entire corps of Priests in the Diocese of Halifax, administered the rites of the solemnity.

23—The House of Assembly were occupied principally in receiving temperance petitions; "one from the ladies, favourable to the cause, was a monster, many yards in length, and contained some thousands of names."

MARCH 4—The Provincial Notes in circulation at this date amounted to £59,864.

22—His Excellency Lieut General Sir John Harvey, K C B, Lieut Governor of Nova Scotia, died at Government House, after a protracted illness. He had attained 74 years of age. From youth to the last moment of his life he had been actively engaged in the service of his Sovereign and Country. He was Lieut Governor of this Province for a period of nearly six years. In his official capacity he invariably evinced a disposition to reconcile parties, and advance the most material interests of the Country. As a Colonial Governor he was deservedly popular; and in each of the Colonies where he has administered the Government, he has left behind him a reputation for liberality, urbanity, and private charity, that will live for long years to come.

22—Colonel John Bazalgette, Deputy Quarter Master General to Her Majesty's Forces in this Province, attended at the Legislative Council Chamber, and in presence of both branches of the Legislature, took the usual oaths of office, as Administrator of the Government, and Commander in Chief of the Province of Nova Scotia and its Dependencies.

27—The remains of His Excellency Sir John Harvey were interred at

Fort Massey. All the public offices, stores and other places of business in the city were closed during the afternoon, and the community at large united in rendering becoming respect on the solemn occasion, to the remains of their late Chief Magistrate. The procession was immense.

APRIL 3--Hons William A Henry and James McLeod were appointed and sworn in members of the Executive Council for this Province.

8--The session of the Provincial Legislature was closed, by His Honor the Administrator of the Government. The prominent features of the speech were--A reference "to the demise of our late lamented Lient Governor, Lient General Sir John Harvey," and to His Excellency's distinguished career after a succession of military services in every quarter of the globe; approval of the ample provision made for the Railway from Halifax to Quebec, with an assurance that the necessary steps should be taken by the Executive to secure the co-operation of Her Majesty's Government. Allusion was also made to the erection of an Insane Asylum, and a pledge that no effort should be wanting on the part of His Honor to give full effect to the policy of the Legislature in reference to that object. The grant to enable the Government to expel the too frequent intrusions on the Fisheries was likewise acknowledged, with a promise that it should be so appropriated as to afford to that great interest the largest practical amount of protection.—Died at Arisaig, Gulf Shore, Rev Alexander McLeod, Parish Priest of St Margarets, aged 43 years.

MAY 8--Died at Parrsboro', James Strachan Fullerton, Esq. in the 25th year of his age.

20--Died at North Sydney, Peter Moore, Esq. in the 65th year of his age. Possessed of sound judgment, correct intentions, and unflinching honesty of purpose, Mr Moore fulfilled the duties of Magistrate, citizen, husband and parent in a most exemplary manner.

24--Died at New Dublin, Rev J W Weeks, Rector of the Parish of St Peter, and for 26 years a missionary of the Society for Propagating the Gospel in Foreign Parts.

29--The 42d Royal Highlanders embarked on board H M troopship Resistance, for England.

JUNE 5--Died at LaHave Ferry, John Pernette, Esq. aged 85 years; formerly a Justice of the Peace for the county of Lunenburg.

6--The Wesleyan Church in Grafton Street, Halifax, was opened and solemnly dedicated.

7--A fearful calamity occurred in the neighbourhood of Acadia College. A party of students, accompanied by Professor Chipman and Rev Mr Very, were unfortunately drowned by the swamping of their boat, while in the act of returning from Cape Blomidon, where they had been collecting geological specimens. The names of the students were Benj. Rand, Anthony E Phelan, W H King and William E Grant; there were also two boatmen named George Benjamin and Perez Caldwell. Of the whole party Benjamin was the only survivor.

10--Much excitement was manifested at Annapolis, about this date, a report having been circulated that specimens of gold had been found in the neighbourhood of the old Girt Mill on the General's Bridge Stream.

11--Admiral Sir G F Seymour arrived at Halifax, in H M S Cumberland, from Bermuda.

21--The Board of Ordnance accepted the tender of Messrs Peters & Blacklock for building the Barracks at Fort Needham, Halifax.

27—Died at Halifax, Dr Joseph Prescott, aged 91 years; for many years a practising physician and surgeon in this city.

JULY 7—Died at Halifax, Charles M Cleary, Esq. aged 55 years; Mr Cleary was Grand Treasurer of the Masonic Grand Lodge of Nova Scotia; he had also served as a member of the City Corporation.

18—Four persons were drowned at the Black River, county of Sydney, by the upsetting of a canoe: their names were Roderick McDonald, Donald McDonald, Allan McDonald, and Roderich Chisholm.

21—The Roman Catholic Church and Cemetery at Hammond Plains were consecrated by the Archbishop of Halifax.

25—Died at Windsor, James D Fraser, Esq. aged 46 years, Barrister at Law, and Representative for the township of Windsor, in the General Assembly.

AUGUST 5—His Excellency Colonel Sir John Gaspard LeMarchant landed at Halifax, from H M S Cumberland, from St Johns, Newfoundland, and after being welcomed by the Heads of Departments and City Corporation, proceeded to the Province Building, and was duly installed as Lieutenant Governor and Commander in Chief, in and over Her Majesty's Province of Nova Scotia and its Dependencies, &c. &c. The oath of office was administered to him in the Council Chamber, by the Provincial Secretary.

9—His Excellency Sir J Gaspard Le Marchant held his first Levee at Government House, Halifax.

15—The United States Frigate Mississippi arrived at Halifax, under the command of Commodore Perry, who had received instructions from the President of the United States to inquire into the fishing difficulties.

—The consecration of the Very Rev Dr Connolly as Bishop of Fredericton, took place at St Mary's Cathedral, Halifax. His Grace the Most Rev Dr Hughes, Archbishop of New York, the Right Rev Dr McKinnon, Bishop of Arichat, and Right Rev Dr McDonald, Bishop of Charlotte-town, were present, and united with His Grace the Most Rev Dr Walsh, Archbishop of Halifax, in conducting the ceremonies.

20—Died at Amherst, Timothy Weatherby, Esq. aged 64 years, Justice of the Peace for the county of Cumberland.

25—The Electric Telegraph was finally transferred by the Provincial Government to the Nova Scotia Electric Telegraph Company, and operations commenced at Halifax in their office, Morton's stone building.

26—Died at Barrington, Seth Coffin, Esq. aged 84 years; much esteemed and respected in all the different relations of life.

SEPTEMBER 2—A public meeting was held in the Hall of the Province Building, Halifax, "for the purpose of taking into consideration the concession of the reserved fishery of the colonies to the United States, and the abrogation of the treaty of 1818, by the British Government." A series of resolutions, and an Address to Her Majesty, were adopted—"declaratory of the feelings and views of the people of this country upon the apprehended transfer of their fishery to foreign competitors."

3—A Gazette Extraordinary was published on this date, announcing that His Excellency by the advice of H M Council had decided upon appointing five Commissioners to aid the Government by counsel and co-operation in carrying out a system of railways in this province; to authorise surveys; and to make conditional arrangements, subject to the sanction of the Legislature, for providing funds for such works.

15—A Regatta took place in Halifax Harbour, which was witnessed from George's Island and other advantageous positions by thousands of spectators. About 40 prizes were awarded to the successful competitors.

OCTOBER 1—Died at his residence, New Guysboro' Road, Lieut John Cote, aged 64 years, formerly of the 71st Regt, and late of the 10th Royal Veteran Battalion. He was long engaged in active service, and was wounded at the battle of Waterloo.

10—For the three months ending October 10, there were imported into St John, N B from Nova Scotia—Apples and Pears 3235 barrels, Barley 178 bushels, Butter 23,415 lbs, Bark 57 cords, Cheese 245 cwt, Coals 929 chaldrons, Deals 1,205,000 feet, Eggs 11,310 doz, Fire Wood 631 cords, Lath Wood 104 cords, Oats 1830 bushels, Plums and Cherries 1093 bushels, Potatoes 10,460 bushels, Staves 80 M, Sheep Skins 35 crates, Turnips 260 bushels, Trenails 18 M, Oxen, Cows and Heifers 621, Calves 60, Horses 70, Sheep 5,183, Dry Fish 7661 quintals, Mackerel 860 barrels, Pickled Herrings &c 2423 barrels, Fish Oil 251 bbls, Ale 25 bbls.

13—A large number of vessels were stranded and otherwise injured, on the coasts of Nova Scotia and Prince Edward Island, by a severe gale which occurred at this date. The city newspapers of the 23d October and subsequent dates contain various accounts of its destructive effects.

22—The house and barn of Mr Ernst, at Mahone Bay, were consumed by fire, and two of his children burnt to death.

26—Died at Mount Uniacke, Crofton Uniacke, Esq. aged 69 years. His exertions in the promotion of measures associated with the general interests of the country will be long remembered by the people of this province.

23—Hon Joseph Howe left Halifax for England, on business of importance connected with the proposed railway.

31—Died at Westport, Dr Thomas White, in the 69th year of his age.

NOVEMBER 3—A public meeting was held at Temperance Hall, Halifax, at which resolutions were adopted in relation to an Industrial Exhibition, proposed to take place in 1853.

10—The City Council concluded on the erection of a new Market House in Halifax.

13—Died at Annapolis, Thomas Ritchie, Esq. in the 76th year of his age; for many years a representative for the county of Annapolis, and afterwards First Justice of the Court of Common Pleas, and President of the Sessions for the Western District of the Province.

22—Died at Pictou, Henry N Blackadar, Esq. aged 49 years, Barrister. He was also a representative for Pictou in the General Assembly for fourteen years.

23—On this and several succeeding days the weather was extremely boisterous and changeable in the vicinity of Pictou; snow fell on Mount Thom and the hills around it, to the depth of several feet; it was succeeded by a storm of wind and rain, of unusual severity, causing the detention of the mails for several days over their time; telegraph posts and wires were prostrated; the tide rose in Pictou harbour to an unusual height; the graves on the beach were uprooted, and warehouses and cellars overflowed. "From the great force of the wind, the sea was rougher than it has almost ever been known on this coast."

The funeral, which took place on the 23th, was attended by all the Military and Naval Officers not on duty, members of the Executive and Legislative Council, the Mayor and City Council, and a large number of citizens. "In honour of the occasion the American Ensign was hoisted half mast high on the garrison flag staff; minute guns were fired from the citadel, and the shipping in port displayed colours drooped."

PRUNE AND RHUBARB PIE OR PUDDING.—A correspondent says, the common French prune mixed with a little rhubarb makes a most excellent and economical pie or pudding, the rhubarb supplying the syrup of which the prunes are in some measure deficient. The prunes should be stewed for about one hour in a little sugar and water before they are required for use. This is a very nice addition, and for children especially wholesome.

RECIPE FOR DYSENTERY.—Take a tumbler of cold water, thicken it with wheat flour to about the consistence of cream, and drink it. This is to be repeated several times in the course of the day, or as often as you are thirsty; and it is not likely that you will need it on the second day. We have not only used it in our own case, but have recommended it to our friends in many instances, and we never knew it to fail of effecting a speedy cure even in the worst stages of dysentery. It is a simple remedy, and costs little.—*Farmers' Gazette.*

THE PHILOSOPHY OF RAIN.—To understand the philosophy of this beautiful and often sublime phenomenon, so often witnessed since the creation of the world, and essential to the very existence of plants and animals, a few facts derived from observation and a long train of experiments must be remembered. 1. Were the atmosphere everywhere, at all times, at a uniform temperature, we should never have rain, hail, or snow. The water absorbed by it in evaporation from the sea and the earth's surface would descend in an imperceptible vapour, or cease to be absorbed by the air when it was once fully saturated. 2. The absorbing power of the atmosphere, and consequently its capability to retain humidity, is proportionably greater in warm than in cold air. 3. The air near the surface of the earth is warmer than it is in the regions of the clouds.—The higher we ascend from the earth, the colder we find the atmosphere. Hence the perpetual snow on very high mountains in the hottest climate. Now, when from continued evaporation the air is highly saturated with vapour—though it be invisible and the sky cloudless—if its temperature is suddenly reduced by cold currents descending from above, or rushing from a higher to a lower latitude, its capacity to retain moisture is diminished, clouds are formed, and the result is rain. Air condenses as it cools, and, like a sponge filled with water and compressed, pours out the water which

DELICIOUS BREAKFAST DISH.—Melt in a small saucepan a piece of fresh butter the size of a walnut, add some salt, a pinch of red pepper, half a teaspoonful of curry paste, a desert spoonful of milk, and the contents of two eggs, which have been boiled for ten minutes. Mash well, and simmer very gently over the fire until thick. Stir continually, that it may not curdle. Serve on buttered toast.

The butter prevents the evaporation of the sweetness and aroma of the beet root, and when fully roasted it is taken out, ground, and used

Baked Plum Pudding.—Put into three quarters of a pound of flour a quarter of a pound of dripping; add half a pound of raisins, and mix in with a wooden spoon a pint of new milk till the whole is a stiff batter.—Turn the ingredients into a well buttered dish, and bake slowly for an hour and a half. This pudding will be found an excellent one, either hot or cold.

Leather from Porpoise Skins—At a recent industrial exhibition, of one of the London societies, among the other novelties was some curried leather from the skin of the white porpoise. A report says, "it seems to possess the essential requisites of toughness and softness, and has been considered superior to the skins of land animals; the price is that of the best calf skin; and a sample pair of boots shown is stated to have worn out seven soles."

Special Manure — Clover.—The fashion, of late, has been to ridicule the theory of special manures; and many of our writers on agriculture have set it down as a humbug. We do not claim that mineral manure, alone, is sufficient for producing good crops; but other things being equal, we have no doubt—there can be no reasonable doubt—of the value of mineral manures, and those, too, adapted to particular crops — Thus clover wants potash, soda, magnesia, etc., as there is, in every half ton of clover, twenty three pounds of carbonic acid, sixteen pounds of potash, forty pounds of soda, eight pounds of magnesia. These are taken from the soil, and on burning the clover, will be found in the ashes. Half a ton of clover—or eleven hundred pounds in exact weight—will make one hundred pounds of ashes; and in these ashes will be found the ingredients, and in the proportion we have mentioned, as well as phosphoric acid, chlorine, and sand in similar quantities.

Continued cropping of clover taking these ingredients from the soil, will soon exhaust it; and unless they are supplied, the soil must cease to produce clover. Ashes, contain potash; plaster contains sulphuric acid; salt contains soda and chlorine; and on the doctrine of special manures, these will be very good for clover, and experience confirms the theory.

These are a part of the mineral ingredients. The gases are principally from the atmosphere. To do this, clover is peculiarly adapted, by its extensive system of leaves and flowers; and by its deep running roots, it almost makes amends for the want of deep ploughing. It brings, from the subsoil, mineral matters that few other plants reach, and furnishes them to other plants when the clover is ploughed under, or fed to cattle, and the manure, containing the ingredients spread on the land. The clover roots bring up the mineral ingredients from a great depth; and when ploughed under, they are left in soluble form, near the surface. The gases, drawn from the atmosphere, are also left in the soil for the use of these plants that have not the faculty of gathering them for themselves.

Corn requires a large proportion of potash and sulphuric acid, and would be benefitted by a similar dressing, or by taking it second-handed by allowing clover ploughed under. But vegetable manure is also necessary to form fibre. Powdered granite is found to be excellent manure, but it cannot form fibre. To obtain the full value of either, both should be used—the vegetable and mineral.—*Ohio Farmer.*

A New Manure.—The ammonia which gas, as driven off from coal, contains, is imperfectly separated by the usual process. A great additional saving is effected by a process patented by the Rev. W. R. Bowditch, of Wakefield, in which clay is used as the absorbent. The clay, after being used for this purpose for a certain time, becomes charged with a number of ammoniacal ingredients, all of agricultural value, and all depending by their presence in the gas to diminish its illuminating power. So that by their removal two good effects are produced—the gas company send out a better gas to their customers in the town, and they have at the same time a new manure of considerable agricultural value which they can offer to customers in the country. The cost of producing this manure is comparatively trifling, and when sold at 5s. per ton it leaves a handsome profit to the company producing it. The quantity capable of being

Best Solvent for Bones.—Mix coarsely-ground bones with four times their weight of sulphuric acid which has been diluted with three times its weight of water. A portion of the acid acts on the carbonate of lime which is contained in the bone, and sulphate of lime or gypsum is formed. The remaining portion of the acid then unites progressively with the bone, and produces the superphosphate of lime, which is an excellent manure. — *The Field*.

Curious Incident in Vegetation.—Last April, in the garden of Abbeyville, the seat of the Rev. Richard Mansell, Mr. Henry Fitzroy, gardener, had four potatoes planted, in the centre of two of which he had previously introduced a bean, while in the remaining two he had placed a pea. In a short time the peas and beans burst through the ground in healthy shoots, and grew to maturity in rich luxuriance, and the gardener was able during the season to gather from the four plants four large dishes of peas and beans. But what was more remarkable, the potatoes also grew in a flourishing manner, and the plants were never attacked with any disease or discolouration of the stalk—on the contrary they retained a strong and healthy appearance. Upon being dug out, a few days since, the four potatoes were found to have multiplied in the ground to an extraordinary extent. Beneath one stem were fifty-eight tubers, beneath the second thirty, the third had twenty-nine, and the fourth twenty-five, all good-sized and sound. The above is the result of an experiment which will probably be found worth a trial on a more extensive scale, and may yet be productive of much benefit. — *London paper*.

To Keep Ants from Fruit.—If a horizontal line of gas tar be made near the ground on the wall, and one round the stem of the tree, it will prevent ants from ascending. — *Cottage Gardener*.

Steam Traction on Common Roads, &c.—Another of the triumphs of steam has just been made by one of Boydell's traction engines, which has brought to London from Thetford, along the common road, a load of seventeen tons; travelling at the rate of about three and a half miles per hour, and consuming from one half to three-quarters cwt. of coals in that time. The previous week the engine was ploughing land at the rate of an acre and a half per hour, and this week it is carting as above, thus proving that horses may be superseded to a great extent in agriculture. — *Engineer*.

Hot Water for House Plants.—A Correspondent of the *Boston Cultivator*, writing of the management of house-plant, says:—"The way to have healthy plants is to shorten in all straggling growth, and to remove every leaf and flower as soon as the least symptom of decay is perceptible, washing them occasionally with warm water, from the fine rose by a watering-pot held high above them—thus giving them the benefit of a warm shower at any time or place. But the thing of all others most important is to water them with hot water at all times; yes, hot to the touch, even beyond what is supposed to be prudent until after experiment—and it is only necessary to watch the result on the health and vigour of the plants, especially when in bloom, to be convinced of the virtue of this

'grand specific.'" The writer says he has fuchsias now in bloom, mere cuttings, about six inches in height, not one failing out of seven or even more cuttings, planted in a single pot and watered with hot water.—*Essex Transcript*.

To Keep Birds off Young Peas.—A correspondent of the *Gardeners' Chronicle* says he has placed a few wine bottles along the rows, a yard or two apart, and has found this method answer perfectly.—The bottles may be either sound or broken.

Manure from the Sea.—The Agricultural Society of La Rochelle has been for some time past engaged in making experiments with the slime or mud of the sea applied as manure. The results obtained by this process are pronounced to be highly satisfactory, and particularly advantageous to the districts bordering on the sea-coast, where other manure is scarce.

Egg-eating Hens.—For curing hens of this propensity, the following method was once adopted with success by a correspondent of the *Cottage Gardener*. He took a partially-eaten egg from the nest, and substituted in place of the yolk mustard mixed with water to a similar consistence. He then replaced the egg in the nest, and supposes the bird did not approve of the flavour, as he has not lost an egg since.

A Simple Barometer.—The *Mobile Register* says:—"On board the Mexican steamer is a barometer of the most simple construction, but of the greatest accuracy. It consists only of a long strip of cedar, very thin, about two and a half feet in length, about an inch wide, cut with the grain, and set in a block or foot. This cedar strip is backed or lined with one of white pine, cut across the grain, and the two are tightly glued together. To bend these when dry is to snap them, but on the approach of bad weather the cedar curls over until the top at times touches the ground. This simple instrument is the invention of a Mexican guitar-maker, and such is its accuracy that it will indicate the coming of a "norther" full twenty-four hours before any other kind of barometer known on the coast.

New Fodder.—Prince Schwartenberg has lately made successful experiments in some of his farms for converting the leaves of the ash-tree into forage for cows. About 50lb. of the leaves were in October last arranged in a tub with alternate layers of salt, and kept covered until the beginning of March, when they were mixed with chopped rye straw.—This new food appeared so palatable to them that they would select the leaves with the greatest avidity, leaving the straw untouched. The leaves were then given to them without any mixture, and were eaten with the same relish.—*London paper*.

Cure for Blight.—A correspondent of the *Cottage Gardener* says he effectually destroyed the blight on his standard apples, roses, gooseberries, currants, and wall trees, by the use of ammoniacal liquor from the gas-works. He put one pailful of the liquor to six pailfuls of water into a copper, and made it boil. He then syringed his trees with the mixture, boiling hot. This had the desired effect.

It is said that a large onion, if planted near to a rose tree so as to touch its root, will greatly improve the odour of its flowers.

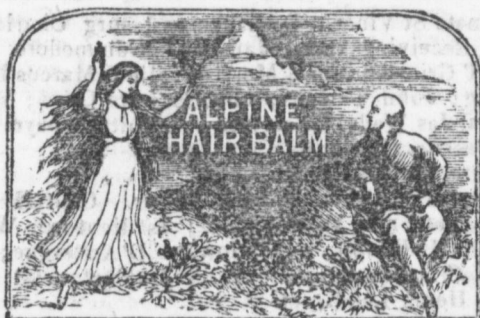
