AN AWFUL FATE. BLUFFTON, Ind., March 13.-A girl of four years caused a gas explosion here yeareday that wrecked a house and cost the life of the child and that of her two-year-old sister and the fa-tal injuring of her mother, Mrs. Wil-liftam Huffman, the wife of an employe of the Standard OH Co. Mrs. Huff-man was at work in the kitchen, while her two young daughters were playing in an adjoining room. The elder pulled the gas connecter from the stove, and the gas folled the room, inited and exploded. Mrs. Huffman rushed into the blazing room, where she grabbed the younger child, burn-ing herself so severely that there are no hopes for her recovery. The child died shortly after. The house was de-stroyed. When the explosion occur-red the elder girl crawled beneath the bookcase. Only her skull was found among the ashes.

He sees in the country a great change of sentiment and says that Quebec has not viewed imperialism with favor. He gave the government the life in regard to the sending of con-tingents to South Africa, by stating that Sir Wilfrid Läurier was oppos-to sending the men under any consid-eration. The cabinet ministers had stated that Quebec had supported the government's South African policy, but this was preposterous. He warn-ed the ministers that frankness was always best. Tarte's speeches in On-tardo he treated as insincere, and quite opposite to the minister of pub-lic works' real sentiments. He quoted from various sources to show how bitter had been the Quebec campaign against Sir Charles Tupper as the champion of the contingents. Mr. Bourassa explained that the French electors had been kept posted on comments in papers from other provinces, and this, he says, was re-sponsible for the return of the gov-ernment. He feit that he was not an accomplice of the loyal murderers of the Queen. Preiner Laurier expressed surprise that Mr. Bourassa had insisted on bringing up the question. At the Common Council yesterday, the consideration of bills for the leg-islature was resumed. The bill provid-ing for a better definition of the words real and personal estate was adopted. So also was that to enable the city to acquire the franchise of D. W. Clark & Son, and to furmish private lighting in Carleton and Lancaster. The bill giving authority for the payment of a commission to look into the assess-

ommission to look into the assess commission to look into the assess-ment law. The bill relating to the ship-building industry was then brought up. Section 1 authorizes the council b: a two-thirds vote to convey a site from land owned by the city to a company giving satisfactory evidence that they are able and ready to estab-lish steel ship building in the city, or to grant part of a site and give money to the company, to expropriate the re-mainder, or to give the company not exceeding \$100,000 out of which the value of any site or part of site is to be deducted, provided that the aggre-grate of assistance for the purpose of site is not to exceed \$100,000. If the company fue site is to revert to the ody works within the time to be agreed on between the city and the comyany, the site is to revert to the city. No part of the money is to be given until the works are completed and ready for operation. The deed of conveyance is to contain the terms, conditions and provisces upon which the site, or part of site, is conveyed. Section 2 provides that the city may grant not exceeding \$100,000 to such company which gives satisfactory evi-dence of its ability to provide engines and machinery for such ships. The money is not to be paid until the com-pany has completed the works for providing the machinery according to an agreement to be made between the city and the company, which is to contain all the terms upon which the money is to be given. Section 3 provides that instead of paying either of the sums of \$100,000 in full the city may contribute them by subsidies, wholly or partly, and upon such terms as may be agreed upon. 




