Columbia Professor Relurns From Ecuador and Reports Very Interesting

NEW YORK, Sept. 11—The Times today says: M. H. Saville, professor of ethonology at Columbia University returned from a trip to Ecuador on the steamship Panama and said that he had discovered the ruins of cities near the coast which contained many evidences of a race hitherto unknown to present day scientists.

The professor's researches extended along the Pacific about fifty miles to the south of the equator. Somewhere between those points and to a distance about 100 miles inland, he found evidence of a city of antiquity. The city, he said, had streets lined with houses of skilful contruction. Though the dwellings had been made of light material, a sort of palmetto or thatch, they had been constructed very evidently with a view, to withstand the shocks of the frequent earthquakes of the region and were intact.

PRICES OF LIVING **GREATLY REDUCED**

Food Supplies are Away Up, Says U. S. Report

WHOLLY RESPONSIBLE Gost Over Fifteen Per Gent More Than They Did Ten Years Ago - Wages Also Much Better.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 10.—How the cost of living is increasing is shown in a summary of the report of the Bureau of Labor sent to the printer Monday. The figures are for 1906, and are compared with the average prices for the years 1890 and 1905.

The price of food was higher in every month of 1906 than in the corresponding month of 1905. The increase over the corresponding month of the preceding year, which, in February, 1906, were only 0.4 per cent, grew steadily greater throughout the year, the price in December, 1906, being 5.1 per cent, above that of the preceding December. CALGARY, Alia, Sept. 10—Gathered in the remote Canadian North-West today are a number of pioneer figures around which centres much of the romance and the picturesque glamour of pioneer days. In this city resides the Canadian "Kit Carson," veteran preacher, pioneer Indian fighter and path-finder, the Rev. John McDougall. Since a boy of 12 he has spent his life out on the edge of things, and now at the age of 69, with a career of more than half a century far beyond the Saskatchewan, is one of the most striking physical types in a country where most men are well proportioned.

METAL TANTALUM

meet tomorrow evening. Organization is always to be desired, and while at TWO YEARS AGO This DISCOVERY Was Scarcely Known Outside Few Laboratories.

> Demonstrate the Extreme Hardness of the Mineral.

Tantalum is a rare metal which has attracted universal attention during the last two years, before which it was scarcely known outside of some scien-tific laboratories. It was discovered and investigated in 1802 by a Swedish chemist named Exelberg, who, on ac-count of the tantalizing difficulties experienced in extracting the metal from its ores, called it "tantalum." Only two years ago, says the Engineering Magazine, it was decided by German scientists that what the dis-

cover thought to be tantalum was an alloy of it and a carbide. More tantalizing efforts were then necessary to produce the metal in its perfectly pure This being achieved, tantalum immediately became of such importance that it is now revolutionizing at least one large industry, that of the manufacture of incandescent lamps for electric

The so-called tantalum lamp is an incandescent electric lamp with a filament made of a very fine tantalunt wire instead of a carbon filament, as in the ordinary incandescent bulbs. The most salient features of the tantalum lamp are that while the filament is so arranged as to have a total length of about two feet without materially increasing the size of the lamp, but half of the amount of disinfecting would drive them away.

Tantalum is one of the hardest substances known, and its use for scientific instruments, where price stands always second to accuracy and durability, will doubtless be developed much sooner, inasmuch as tantalum also resists the corrosive influence of acids and alkaline solution in a very

acids and alkaline solution in a very One of the most striking experiments to demonstrate the hardness of tantalum was that for the purpose of boring a hole through a sheet of pure tantalum metal. A diamond drill bore was used, revolving incessantly for three days and making five thousand revolutions a minute. The result showed a depression of less than 2.02 in the metal, while the diamond had become entirely remarkable degree.

CANCER IN HOUSES.

Startling Theory Advanced by Paris Physician.

Observation Seems to Prove That in House Where Cancer Has Caused Death Disease Frequently Breaks Out Again.

NEW YORK, Sept. 10.-The Sun has received the following cable despatch from Paris:—The sanitary authorities that houses can be infected with car cer, and that rooms which patient have inhabited will convey the disease long after the victims are dead. Observation seems to prove that in houses where a death from cancer has appeared the disease often breaks out again when occupied by other families. This fact has so often been noted that now a census has been taken to see about houses where cancer patients died during the last six months of 1906. There are 1,062 houses on the list which will be watched to see if the new residents become affected with the disease. Already in twelve of the houses there have been two succes-

Dr. Armand reports that in a village of only 400 inhabitants here were in the space of seven years eleven deaths from cancer, all practically occurring in the same block of houses. Three years later seventeen of these houses had sheltered twenty patients. The loctor concluded that the houses were hotbeds of cancer germs, and that no amount of disinfecting would drive

F., Sept. 10.—In a statement published in the form of an interview here today, Sir Robert Bond, premier of Newfoundland, declared that the modus vivendi recently agreed upon by the British and American governments is "a disgrace to British diplomacy and a shameful sacrifice of the interests of the people of the colony."

The new agreement, which is to be in force for one year, pending the settlement of the whole fisheries question by the Hague tribunal, is virtually identical with that of last year, according to the premier.

Sir Robert asserts that only his strong protest during the London negotiations after the conference of colonial premiers in that city prevented the British cabinet from concluding an infinitely worse compact with America. Had this agreement been carried through the premier says that it would have contained a clause undertaking to prevent the serving of legal processes by the Newfoundland authorities upon British subjects on board American vessels in the territorial waters of the colony. Under the colonial laws a Newfoundland fisherman is liable to prosecution for being employed on an open that it must be clearly understood that the modus confers no immunity on the premier and will uphold that the Imperial cabinet on this subject will be produced in the British parliament. He says that his ministry unwaveringly protested against the modus vivendi the negotiations. He avers that he first suggested the referring of all disputes arising over the treaty of 1818 to The Hague tribunal. When the British and American cabinets agreed so to refer the case Premier Bond offered that if the terms of reference were promptly settled to allow colonial fishermen to sell herring to Americans in treaty waters as heretofore. The Americans refused to accept this arrangement, preferring the greater privileges conveyed by the modus vivendi shermen on board the vessels.
