



MAGNETS FOR EYE HOSPITALS. Many hospitals in England are provided with a special apparatus for extracting iron and steel fragments from the eye by means of powerful electromagnets. The magnet employed has a core three feet long and six inches in diameter of the best Swedish soft iron. Two hundred pounds of insulated wire are wound in two cells about the core. The end of the magnet is threaded to receive terminals of different shapes to suit various conditions. The magnet is mounted on ball bearings, and can be moved in any direction. The strength of the magnet field may be varied at will by means of a rheastat. When used at its maximum nower, the magnet exerts a pull of 30 seconds per square inch at a distance of an inch. A special type of apparatus is provided for reclining patients. 

STARTLE WORLD WITH NEW AEROPLANE TYPES

New York Engineer Describes Air Turbine and Other Novel Features to be Employed in New Machine

RESISTANCE AND SPEED.

In speaking of the main principles upon which his machine is to be constructed. Mr. Faehrmann said:
"Everything in the line of aeroplanes up to the present moment represents the old time water wheel, with its efficiency so low that it will remain only as a souvenir of a few splendid days gone by. The turbine, as the master successor, must soon take away the honors and will become the road breaker to final success.

"Air has very little weight per cubic foot, but we utilize that little weight and transform it into air resistance. Without resistance no one—bird, insect or human being—could fly. It is resistance which enables us to keep up in the air certain weights, which will enable us to fly, as we call it. We know that a plane of certain size suspended in the air must fall to the earth when freed from its support. This, however, will change when we move the plane at a certain velocity; it will take more time to fall then, and will not fall at all when a certain speed is attained. In fact, it will not only carry its own weight but will carry considerably more than that if moyed rapidly. The higher the speed the greater the load we are enabled to carry and less power we require to propel it forward, if properly placed, of course. Every boy has made this simple experiment with small, flat stones by throwing them over the surface of the water, and has found to his delight that the stone, though heavier than the water, does not not sink, but skies along the surface until the velocity has died away, when it sinks.

"High speed is the fundamental necessity of all aerial navigation, but in order to obtain high velocities we must have propellers of great strength to transmit these enormous strains that come upon them. There is only one solution possible and that is a propeller of all steel annd of novel construction. The average speed of a propeller today is about four miles a minute; that means a point at the rim will travel at the rate of four miles a minute. I purpose greatly to increase this speed and still have a factor of safety of five in my design."

Polar polemics could not only generate

QUECEC'S POLICY

NEW YORK, Sept. 13—The Prevince of Quebec has definitely decided to prohibit the exportation of pulpwood cut from Crown lands. In September, 1900, the Premier of the province made a promise that the stumpage rates of sixty cents per cord on wood cut from Crown lands would not be raised for a period of ten years. It is intended to carry out that pledge and no increase in stumpage charges will be made until September, 1910. The Canadian paper-makers are urging the provincial in stumpage charges will be made until September, 1910. The Canadian paper-makers are urging the provincial authorities to stop the exportation of pulpwood cut from Crown lands but the American owners of rights to cut timber on more than 12,000 square miles of those lands represent that the pledge of September, 1900, implied a right of importation for ten years and that in good faith no prohibition should be made until the lapse of that period. The Canadian paper and puly interests retort that the pledge specifically related to stumpage taxes, no to exportation and that the extension of that privilege to American owners for another year will retard Canadian plans and discriminate against Canadian manufacturers who now suffer because of the retailatory clauses of the United States tariff on print paper. The provincial authorities are balancing the question whether they should prohibit the exportation of pulp wood on January 1, 1910, or Septembel 1, 1910. They calculate that the new policy will add over \$200,000 per annum in revenues. They are informed that the interests controlling the Berlin mills property in New Hampsire are planning to instal a print paper mill plant at La Tugue, Que, and that the


