REPORT ON TEMPERANCE.

The Committee on Temperance submit their report:

Your Committee feel the subject of Temperance to be one of vital importance, and one which at the present crisis demands the

most prompt and energetic action.

The awful consequences of intemperance cannot be too vividly portrayed, neither its first stealthy influence too clearly pointed out, nor too early resisted. Hence we call attention to the necessity of employing the best talents, and wielding the strongest moral influence we can command in this important and benevolent enterprise, of total abstinence, that our churches and people may be prepared to appreciate the important advantages of legislative influence to prohibit the importation and sale of all alcoholic liquors .--And we further wish to impress upon our ministers, churches, and people the necessity of active measures being taken previous to the coming election of provincial representatives, that shall enable our electors to dispose of their political influence in that way, which may be the most likely to secure the enactment of the much-to-bedesired law-popularly known as the Maine Law. We furthermore recommend that our ministers and churches withhold and deny the hand of fellowship to all persons who directly or indirectly use or sanction the use, sell or countenance the sale of intoxicating

That this Association feel in some measure the responsibility resting upon every christian to send the Gospel to every creature; and whilst efforts are made to extend the blessings of salvation in the Home Missionary field, it is the opinion of this Committee that a more enlarged and decided effort be made to carry out the objects which, as a denomination we have had in view, in sustaining an independent mission, which has been interrupted by an over-ruling though mysterious Providence.

That they deem it to be a wise and expedient measure to add to the funds of the Foreign Missionary Board, in order that in case at any future period the Lord should call into his service any brother or brethren for the foreign field, ample means may be on hand for their support. And that we would wish to hold with our beloved brother Crawley as close and fraternal a connection as possible by frequent correspondence through the Secretary of the Mis-

That this Committee consider that it is of the utmost importance that Foreign Missions should enlist the sympathies and liberality of the people of God, knowing by past experience thas a reflex influence will be produced on all our churches, animating them to increased piety and extended usefulness.

They would therefore recommend increased attention to the claims of Foreign Missions, by monthly prayer meetings, and by such religious publications as may stir up the minds of the people to strive for the conversion of the world unto God.

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DEAR BRETHREN:-

The subject to which, in our present Circular Letter, we would call your attention, is the Holy Spirit. The personality,

Deity, and Agency or work of the Holy Spirit.

The Holy Spirit is a real and distinct person in the Godhead. 1. Personal powers of rational understanding and will are ascribed to Him; such as revealing, searching, knowing, working, and unit-1 Cor. ii. 10, 11: xii. 11: Eph. iv. 3,-2. He is joined to the other two Divine persons, as the object of worship and fountain of all blessings. Matt. xxviii. 19 .- 3. He appeared under the emblem of a dove, and of cloven tongues of fire. Matt. iii. : Acts iii.-4. Personal offices of an intercessor belong to him. Rom. viii. 26.-He is represented as performing a multitude of personal acts, as teaching, speaking, witnessing, etc. Matt. xiii. 11: Acts xx. 23: Rom. viii. 15, 16.

II-It is no less evident that the Holy Spirit is a Divine person, equal in power and in glory with the Father and the Son. The third person, not in order of time or dignity of nature, but in order and manner of subsisting. 1. Names proper only to the Most High God are ascribed to him; as God, Acts v. 3, 4; Lord. The Lord, the Spirit, 2 Cor. iii. 17, 18.-2. Attributes proper only to the Most High God are ascribed to him, as Omniscience, 1 Cor. ii. 10, 11: Omnipresence, Ps. cxxxix. 7: Omnipotence, Luke i. 35: Eternity, Heb. ix. 14.-3. Divine works are evidently ascribed to him, Gen. i. 2: Job. xxvi. 13.-4. Worship, proper only to God, is required and ascribed to him. Is. vi. 3: Rev. i. 4: 2 Cor. xiii. 14.

III.—The agency, influence, or work of the Holy Spirit is more particularly displayed in, 1. Quickening sinners, dead in trespasses and sins. Ezekiel may prophesy unto and upon the slain, and say unto them, O ye dry bones, hear the word of the Lord;

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but it is the Lord God, the Lord God the Spirit that can and will cause breath to enter into them, and they shall live. Ezek. xxxvii. 4. It is the Spirit that quickeneth. John vi. 63. And you hath he quickened who were dead in trespasses and in sins. Eph. ii. 1.-Paul may plant, and Apollos water; but it is God, God the Spirit,

that giveth the increase. 1 Cor. ii. 6.

2. In convincing of sin, righteousness, etc. John xvi. 8, 9. We are furnished with proofs of this fact in the examples given us by sacred writers. On the day of Pentecost, by his influence, three thousand were convinced of sin and pricked in their hearts, and led to cry out, "men and brethren, what shall we do." The same ininfluence operated in the case of the jailor, who sprang trembling before Paul and Silas, crying "what must I do to be saved." Acts ii.: xvi. 29, 30. Also in the case of David, who, under his blessed influence was convinced, confessed his sins before Israel and the whole world, repented towards him before and against whom he had sinned, and by the faith of his powerful operation applied to the blood of sprinkling which speaketh better things than that of Abel; and there found pardon, peace, joy and rejoicing. Ps. li. The same fact may be observed at the present day, when by the effectual operation of the Spirit upon the mind of the sinner, his dream of thoughtlessness is disturbed, and all that ever he did is told him. John iv. 29. The follies of childhood, the crimes of youth, and the un. righteousness of riper years. Conscience assumes the stern office of a reprover. He is weighed in the balances and is found wanting. Dan. v. 27. He hath the sentence of death within himself. soul abhorreth bread, and his life dainty meat. His flesh is consumed away, that it cannot be seen, and his bones that were seen stick out: yea, his soul draweth near to the grave, and his life to the destroyer. Job xxxiii. 20, 21, 22. He feels, unless God in mercy interpose he must perish, and that eternally. Ps. cxxx. 3.

3. In regeneration. The bible assures us that regeneration is the work of the Spirit of God, and leads us to trace back the commencement, progress, and consummation of religion in the soul to Divine agency. "Who are born not of blood, nor of the will of the flesh, nor of the will of man, but of God." He that hath wrought us for the self same thing, is God, (God the Spirit,) who also hath given unto us the earnest of the Spirit. By grace are ye saved through faith, and that not of yourselves, it is the gift of God, Except a man be born again, he cannot see the kingdom of God .-

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Except a man be born of water and of the Spirit, he cannot enter into the kingdom of God. Who then can be saved? With men it is impossible, but with God all things are possible. John i. 13: iii. 3-5: Luke xviii. 26, 27: 2 Cor. v. 5: Eph. ii. 8. It is evident from these passages, and many similar ones, that the work of regeneration is begun and performed by the Spirit of God. He claims the honour as the efficient agent. It is by his special influence that men are brought to submit themselves to God, and become his willing and obedient subjects.

4. In sanctification. Sanctify them through thy truth, thy word is truth. John xvii. 17. The world, with all their boasted wisdom, knew not God. Instance Egypt, Babylon, Rome, and even Greece with all its boasted knowledge, as worshipper of the "unknown God." See the world at the present day. Do they know God? Do they not call good evil and evil good? Do they not put darkness for light, and light for darkness? Do they not put bitter for sweet, and sweet for bitter? No man knoweth the things of a man, save the spirit of man which is in him; even so the things of God knoweth no man, but the Spirit of God. The natural man receiveth not the things of the Spirit of God, they are foolishness unto him, (not understood by him), neither can be know them, because they are spiritually discerned. Is, v. 20: 1 Cor. ii. 11, 12, 14.

Under the blessed influence of the Holy Spirit the understanding is opened to understand the scriptures, the heart to receive and attend to the things therein contained, Luke xxiv. 45: Acts xvi. 14. He taketh of the things that are Christs, shows and applies them to his believing people. By his blessed agency they grow in Divine knowledge, faith, love, hope, etc, They grow up in all things unto him who is the Head, even Christ. Each member in its place, and none saying to another, I have no need of thee; but the greatest honour put upon the feeblest member that there should be no schism in the body. John xvi. 14, 15: Eph. iv. 15: 1 Cor. xii.

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[&]quot;Eternal Spirit! we confess,
And sing the wonders of thy grace;
Thy power conveys our blessings down.
From God the Father and the Son."

[&]quot;The Spirit wrought our faith and love,
And hope, and every grace:
But Jesus spent his life to work,
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Such, dear brethren, we believe to be the doctrine of the bible upon this subject; and, in conclusion, we would direct your attention to a few inferences which naturally arise therefrom. The subject we have contemplated suggests one great and glorious idea, that there is a Holy Spirit, the Holy Spirit, and that the Holy Spirit is the third person in the Godhead, equal with the Father and with the Son; filling his place and doing his part, equally concerned in creation, in providence, and in redemption, with the Father and with the Son.

It is evident, then, that without him there could be no creation, Gen. i. 2. Without him there could be no Saviour provided for fallen, lost and ruined man, Luke i. 35. And without him there could be no regeneration, no sanctification, no redemption. John iii. 3, 5: 1 Cor. i. 30. That no flesh should glory in his presence. That according as it is written, he that glorieth let him glory in the Lord. 1 Cor. i. 3.

That it is the privilege, the blood-bought privilege, yea, the bounden duty of all who are born of him, to have him dwelling in their hearts, yea, to be filled with him. Under his saving and enlightening influence, the scriptures shall be clearly understood, the testimony which God has given heartily believed and firmly relied upon. God the Father and God the Son supremely loved, and the Truth, the mind of God revealed to man exemplified and reduced into practice. Under his influence the people of God see eye to eye, feel as the mystical body of Christ for their glorious, their exalted head; pity, compassionate and love precious and immortal souls; and are knowing, wise, prudent, and judicious to adopt means and measures for the advancement of the cause of God on the earth.

Permit us, then, dear brethren, to urge upon you the necessity of encouraging in your minds a lively and cheering expectation of the powerful influences of the Spirit of God. Let us implore those influences for ourselves, who profess to be ministers of the Gospel

of Christ. Let us implore them upon those who are about to be engaged in its arduous services. Let us pray that a copious effusion of the Spirit may descend on the Church of God, on the branches of his vineyard with which we are connected, on our own families, on the nation to which we belong, and on the human family at large. The present population of the globe exhibits a weary waste of moral desolation, but it shall continue until the Spirit in copious effusion be poured out from on high, then the wilderness shall be as the fruitful field, then, "instead of the thorn shall come up the fir-tree, and instead of the briar shall come up the myrtletree, and it shall be to the Lord for a name, for an everlasting sign that shall not be cut off." There should be then no intermission in our importunity at the throne of grace, no rest given to him that heareth prayer, till he establish and make Jerusalem a praise in the whole earth.

We beseech of you then, dear brethren, grieve him not by whom ye are sealed until the day of redemption, grieve him not by sins of commission, grieve him not by sins of omission. Let all bitterness, and wrath, and anger, and clamour, and evil speaking be put away from you, with all malice: And be ye kind one to another, tender-hearted, forgiving one another, even as God for Christ's sake hath forgiven you.

In fine, let this doctrine be partially preached, obscured, and blotted out, let the Holy Spirit be no longer fully and heartily acknowledged as the exclusive agent in regeneration, sanctification, and shedding abroad the love of God in the hearts of men, and then we may indeed write upon the gates of our Zion; Ichabod, the glory, the glory of the Lord is departed! and the second s

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CONSTITUTION OF THE EASTERN BAPTIST ASSOCIATION OF NOVA SCOTIA.

ARTICLE Ist.—This body shall be called the Eastern Baptist Association of Nova Scotia, and shall be composed of Delegates appointed by the churches of which they are members together with Delegates from Corresponding Associations, and such others as may by the Association be invited to sit in Council.

ART. 2nd.—Each Church connected with the body may send five Delegates besides its Pastor.

ART. 3rd.—The object of this Association being the cultivation of Christian Union, the promotion of individual godliness, and by mutual consultation to seek, in the use of scriptural measures, the extension of the Redeemer's kingdom,—it disclaims all authority over the churches, and shall in no case interfere with their internal concerns, or their entire scriptural independency. Yet it may dissolve its connection with any church that upon sufficient examination shall be judged by the Association to have departed essentially from Scripture principles or Baptist faith and practice.

ART. 4th.—The Association shall meet at such time and place as it may appoint, and the meeting shall be opened with devotional exercises.

ART. 5th.—The officers of the Association shall be—a Moderator, who shall preside at all the meetings, nominate all the Committees, and perform all the duties naturally connected with such an office,—a Clerk, who shall keep a record of all the business transacted, prepare the Minutes for the press, and attend to their distribution,—and a Treasurer, who shall receive all the monies contributed for the purposes of the Association, and dispose of them according to its direction.

ART. 6th.—The Association may receive any church, which by letter shall apply for admission, and shall give satisfactory evidence of its faith and order; and each church belonging to this body, shall send annually a letter, containing an account of its history for the year preceding, particularly of its additions and diminutions, with its number then in fellowship; also money to assist in publishing the Minutes: and any Church that for three successive years omits sending letters, delegates, or money, shall be considered withdrawn from the Association, and shall be discontinued from the Minutes

unless sufficient reason may appear to account for the omission, or provided it may appear desirable to make some enquiry by Committee or otherwise, and report at the next meeting of the Association.

ART. 7th .- This Constitution may be altered or amended by a vote of twothirds of the members at any annual meeting of the Association.

ART. 8th.—The Religious sentiments of this Body are those expressed in the Articles of the "Faith and Practice of the Baptist Churches of Nova

RULES OF ORDER.

RULE 1.—After religious worship, the officers shall be chosen by ballot: the Moderator of the preceding year, or in his absence the Clerk, shall call the Association to order.

RULE 2.—The first letter read shall be from the church with which the Association is assembled.

RULE 3.—No subject shall be discussed without a motion first made and seconded, and no person shall speak on any subject more than twice unless by consent of the Association. The first of the state of the s

RULE 4th.-When any Church is received the Moderator shall give to one of its delegates the right hand of fellowship.

RULE 5th .- At the commencement of each sitting, the Minutes of the preceding one shall be read and approved, and of the last sitting, before the final adjournment.

RULE 6th.—Motions made and lost shall not be recorded on the Minutes, except so ordered by the Association.

RULE 7th .- All resolutions shall be presented in writing.

RULE 8th.—Each meeting for business shall be commenced and concluded with prayer.
