ROUMANIA AND GREECE WOULD JOIN IF RUSSIA SENDS 200,000

London, Nov. 12.-The Times' correspondent, telegraphing from Bucharest expresses the opinion that if Russia could send into the Ser-bian campaign a force of 200,000 men while the French and British troops are landing on the Aegean coast, the hesitation which prevails in certain quarters in Roumania would be dissipated, and both Roumania and Greece would throw in their lots with the Entente Allies.

"In this event," says the correspondent, "Roumania could fall on Bulgaria in the rear with 200,000 men, and simultaneously attack the German front with 400,000 men. Roumania feels safe in the Carpathian passes, which she regards as impregnable. The scene of action in such a case would probably be eastern Bulgaria or Thrace, where Field Marshal Von Der Goltz's army is assembled but lacks munitions."



Lord Derby Gives Eligible Men Last Chance to Enlist Voluntarily and Avoid Compulsory Service

House of Commons Agrees to Credit Vote of \$2,000,000,000 Asked by Premier Asquith-Bitter Attacks on Military Leaders by Nationalist Member-Balfour Reviews Progress in Building Up of Aerial Fleet.

London, Nov. 11 .- A strong intimation of compulsion at an early date is contained in a statement tonight by the Earl of Derby, director of recruiting. This statement is made, Lord Derby declares, with the authority of the prime minister it says:

"If young men, medically fit, and not indispensable in any business of national importance, or any busness conducted for the general good of the community do not come forward voluntarily before Nov. 30 the government will, after that date, take the necessary steps to redeem the pledge made on Nov. 2."

Dublin, Nov. 11 (Correspondence)—Beruiting in Ireland has been placed upon a new basis. Hitherto the work has been entrusted to voluntary committees, formed in each county, with a central recruiting council for Ireland. The Lord Lieutenant of a county, usually a peer, has been at the head of the work in this county. Meetings have been held in every part of Ireland and much zeal has been displayed by the speakers at them, who have included representatives of all parties and creeds. The result has been, as announced by Major Gen. Lovick Friend, the commander of the forces in Ireland, the enlistment of \$1,000 men for the infantry.

A fresh appeal has been made for more men. It will be necessary to fill up the wastage in the Irish divisions at the front. To keep them up to strength a recruitment of about 1,100 a week is officially stated to be necessary, and unless the Irish divisions are to be filled up from Scotish and English drafts that number will have to be found in Ireland.

No difficulty, however, is expected to arise in the matter. The rate of recruitment asked for now is less than that reached in the months of April and May last, and experience has taught the necessity for improved methods, which are counted upon to make the task easier. The existing organization have been thanked for their services which in the particular form are now at an end, and a new department for Irish recruiting has been established under the supreme headship of Lord Wimborne, Lord Lieutenant of Ireland. Some districts in Ulster came under it voluntarily, but even in those districts the filling up of the forms was entirely made optional, and there does not seem to be any intention to follow Lord Derby's methods on the basis of the forms filled up in those districts.

It is likely, therefore, that the new nethods of recruiting in Ireland will have to be based, like the old ones on general appeals.

Districts predominantly of one political character were addressed for platforms by men who agreed with them about no Irish question, and many speakers showed their inability to realize the point of view of their audiences. The kind of patriotic appeal which moves an Englishman may leave an Irishman cold. The most effective appeals addressed to Irishmen have been based upon the invasion of Belgium. The torpedoing of the Lusitania was a powerful stimulus to recruiting, which was still further added to by the sinking of the Arabic.

Ireland was chilled, too, by action on the part of the pallitary authorities, such as that which refused to allow the Irish division to have its own colors. Even yet, though, the colonies and the Ulster division have distinctive badges, the other Irish divisions have not.

There is also a feeling that the exploits of Irish regiments at the front have not had all the publicity they deserved. Except for individual exploits which gave O'Leary the Victoria Cross they are felt to have a poor show in the despatches or descriptions of the official eye-witness. Still, when all is said, the response of Ireland, not withstanding all difficulties, is regarded as excellent, and the avoidance of such errors as may have been made in the past, it is believed, will make easy what remains to be done.

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

SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-WEST LAND REGULATIONS

The sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years old, may homestead a quarter-section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. Applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the District. Entry by proxy may be made at any Dominion Lands Agency (but not Sub-Agency), on certain conditions.

Duties—Six months residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 50 acres, on certain conditions. A habitable house is required except where residence is performed in the





ADVERTISING FOR PATRIOTIC PURPOSES

Steamer weathered gale in shelter of land below North Sydney.

The reports published during the past few days to the effect that the collier D. O. Gordon, bound from Sydney to St. John, was much overdue caused no little uneasiness along the harbor front, and the fact that during the past couple of months two other colliers disappeared gave reason for many to believe that something had really happened to the Gordon. Fortunately, however, the steamship is safe and this news was received last night with the word that the ship would not be due to arrive in this harbor until today. The following telegram received by The Standard from Sydney last night gives the informationo as to the cause of delay.

Sydney, N. S., Nov. 11—The collier D. O. Gordon which sailed from here late Friday evening for St. John, N.
