Berlin, Jan. 29, vis wireless to Say-ville.—The following official statement on war operations, issued by the Turk-ish army headquarters in Constanti-nople, January 28, was received here today: In the Dardanelles, on January 27, three Turkish aeroplanes successfully dropped bombs on an enemy monitor, which caught fire aft. The monitor with difficulty reached the Bay of Kephalos on the Island of Embros.
