ing the shipping interests against the Government. This interest must at all times draw largely on the revenue of this country, and it was only just that it should pay a share of the duty imposed. He was pleased with the forbearance of the members from Ontario and Quebec, when listening to the hon. gentlemen opposite, from the Maritime provinces. (Cheers.)

Mr. Morris followed, declaring that the tariff would give full satisfaction to the country. He was engaged in shipbuilding in Ontario, and did not grumble at the tax imposed on that trade.

Mr. Killam said the shipping interests, he thought, had been exceptionally free from taxation. The estimated total increased taxation, under the new tariff, including the increase in the 15 per cent. duty, was about 85 cents per ton, or 85 of one per cent. on the value of ships. The shipping of Yarmouth increased from 10,000 tons in 1840, 110,000 tons in 1874, doubling every ten years, and showing that the interest was as prosperous as any other. The shipowners were as patriotic as any class of the community, and if taxation were required temporarily, they were willing to bear a fair share.

Mr. McLeod, Kent, said that since Confederation the taxation on the shipping interest had been reduced \$1 to 50 cts. a ton. He believed this taxation, as amended, would exceed 20 cts. a ton. The question was whether this industry should be taxed at all, for we must bear in mind that the cost of material required in building ships is materially an increase therefore it is the interest of the Government to leave the shipping interest as free from taxation as possible. By doing so, the export trade of the country would increase. On the whole he approved of the amended tariff.

Mr. Goudge said 20,000 tons shipping were being built in Yarmouth this year. The shipping interest had been successful for many years past in the Lower Provinces, and he believed would continue so. One reason was because it was properly fostered, and did not have to compete with the neighboring power, which had heavily taxed their shipping. The people of the United States had been reducing the tax on shipping, and were now ready to compete with the Maritime Provinces could bear this tax for a year or more years, yet he thought anything that would retrograde shipping interests should be avoided.

The following items were passed in supply: Salaries to light-house keepers, \$142,380; maintenance and repairs, \$202,000; construction of new light-houses, \$120,000. In the Senate to-day Senator McLellan made an explanation relating to extra claims on the Intercolonial Railway. He said these claims were sent to him by the engineer to adjust accounts upon, and were sent down to him, though he had no pecuniary interest in them. Two-thirds of them were disallowed, which showed they were not a profitable investment. The tariff resolutions were then concurred in.

On the subject of Thursday night's debate, a despatch to the *New* contains the following:

Dr. Tupper replied. He said he had been charged with candor the other day when he called in question the correctness of the Finance Minister's statements, and pointed out the injustice of the tariff; but his (Tupper's) position was sustained to-day. He was pained at the humiliating position of the Finance Minister and the Government, after disturbing the entire trade of the country, to have now to abandon their position, to reconstruct the tariff and accept the views advanced by the Opposition. In doing this the Government now admitted before the House and the country that they had framed a tariff which could not be justified, and which, in most points, they were compelled to abandon. He showed that there was no deficit, and the revenue of this year exceeded the estimates by \$500,000. There was a surplus from the previous year of \$1,600,000, and there was on hand \$400,000 of a sinking fund for the Intercolonial Railway. Adding these sums to the revenue of the year brought it up to \$23,899,000. This estimate was published in the first of July next, nearly \$200,000 (Cheers.) By Cartwright's statement the revenue for the first nine months of the year would be \$16,000,000, and the expenditure over \$15,000,000, leaving a balance of nearly \$2,000,000, while the last three months would show a further excess of revenue. The whole receipts of 1873-4 exceeded those of 1872-3 by nearly \$2,000,000. The Finance Minister had estimated that the expenditure in working the Government railways for the current year, over the revenue, would be \$1,400,000. This estimate was unjustifiable, as shown by the fact that last year, when there were unprecedented storms, when excessive repairs were made, the expenditure on these railways exceeded the revenue only by \$700,000.

After recess, Dr. Tupper continued a masterly speech, exposing the fallacies of the financial statement, defending the policy of the late administration, and showing that \$3,000,000 of additional taxation was entirely unnecessary, unless to meet prospective extravagance. Mr. Cartwright replied, reiterating the charges of extravagance against the late Government, and showing that Mr. Tilley had warned the House that additional taxation would be required. He (Cartwright) held that our credit would eventually stand better in the British market by a correct statement of our affairs being made than if we tried to keep up a false appearance. He admitted indirectly that there was not an actual deficit, but the increased taxation would be necessary by increased expenditure in different directions. He defended his reconstructing the tariff, after having decided upon it by showing that other Finance Ministers had done the same.

Despatches to the *Tribune* describe a passage of arms between Mr. Domville, who criticized and condemned the tariff, and Mr. Bleby, who defended it. Mr. Gilmore defended the tariff as it originally stood. The Finance Minister's statement was lauded and mastered. The Shipbuilding should pay a tax as well as other things. He had bounded confidence in the honesty and ability of the Government; Mr. Palmer spoke against the tariff, supporting Dr. Tupper. The resolutions passed the committee at about 2.30 on Friday morning.

OTTAWA, May 2. The House went into Committee of Supply, and most of the proceedings might be characterized as a Parliamentary free fight. In connection with the proposition of the Finance Minister to take any cases of Government officials taking an active part in elections were brought under his notice, such a case would be dismissed.

Mr. Jones hoped the system of dismissal would be extended to Nova Scotia. In the late elections the officials canvassed and worked for Tupper. Dr. Tupper said this challenged Jones to name one who had canvassed for him. In the Halifax elections Jones had stated on the hustings that any official who voted against the Ministerial candidates would do so at his peril. The leader of the Nova Scotia Government went to Cumberland and stated at a public meeting that officials should work for the Ministerial candidates, but if they worked for the Opposition they would be dismissed. Dr. Tupper had told him that he did not believe Macdonald would approve of such a system, when Annand replied that he had just come from Ottawa and was in a position to say that the Premier did approve of it.

After other speeches, and speeches from Jones and Tupper, Carmichael charged Mitchell with dismissing officials for political reasons. Mr. Mitchell challenged proof of this. He had always been liberal towards his opponents. After the late crisis he came back to the House an independent Liberal, and day after day he was attacked by the Ministry and forced into Opposition. He was anxious to treat this Government fairly, yet, if election in Northumberland and Keegan, Snowball and Hutchins explained through the country that if the officials voted for him they would be dismissed. He replied to them that he did not believe his successors would do such a thing. They replied they had telegrams from two Ministers, one of them Smith, to that effect. He (Mitchell) replied he did not believe it, for he had too much faith in Smith. Now it was announced by the Premier that the Yankee system of dismissing officials at every change of Ministry was to be carried out. As an independent member he was bound to oppose the Ministry.

Mr. Smith said he had never attempted to influence officials to vote for the Ministerial candidates. He had been informed that Mr. Mitchell claimed that he had the patronage of Northumberland in his hands. Mr. Mitchell gave the statement a flat contradiction.

Mr. Smith said he had received such information, and, in response to it, he had sent a telegram to the effect that Mr. Mitchell did not hold the patronage of the country. He was informed that Mr. Mitchell was telling the fishermen that the new Government would reconsider their rights, and he sent a telegram saying the new Government would not. These were the only two telegrams he had sent.

Mr. Mitchell denied that he had used such language to the fishermen, and explained what he really did say.

The House adjourned in a bad humor at 2.45.

The Ministry have been hit so hard on the tariff question that they took all last night to vent their feelings by charges against the late Government. Everybody is laughing at their exhibition of spleen.

MISSISSAUGA, Editors:—The friends of free schools must be pleased at the noble stand taken by the *Advocate* in supporting our school law, which, while it has not worked well in some Parishes, in others shows excellent results. Take North Ek for instance. In former times, under the old law, there would be perhaps four or five schools in the whole Parish. There are now I think eleven schools in good working order, and during the short time the law has been in operation there have been eight good school houses built. Ever since the law came in force it has been accepted in nearly every district, and no one seems to be anything the poorer for the taxation. I must confess a great deal of trouble has arisen about the location of School Houses, ever after all the good that we are deriving from the free school system is worth years of toil, and we must acknowledge that if the law should be repealed (which is impossible) the good we have already received would be a blessing to the rising generation. I think that in most Parishes in the County the pecuniary advantages of the law have been fully realized. Notwithstanding the unreasonable opposition, there is no doubt that the ratepayers will nobly support it. OBSERVER.

NOTES FROM RESTIGOUCHE.

Weather continues cold, ice strong and fast about Campbellton and Dalhousie. There is a scarcity of hay in the place. Some cattle have died from starvation, on the Indian Mission.

The young ladies of Campbellton have been very efficient in preparing a Tea Sociable, which was held in the Methodist Church, on the evening of the 21st inst. Notwithstanding the inclemency of the weather, a large concourse assembled. The Rev. Mr. Trewin opened by prayer. Chas. Murray, Esq., occupied the chair and made a few very appropriate remarks. Miss Richardson gave a Reading and Recitation, which were fluently delivered, and received great applause. Next in order came a piece by the choir, "Let the Lord and the Beauty of His Name be Praised." Miss Hardman then amused the audience with a Reading. Mr. J. Jardine gave quite an entertaining recitation, and Miss Maggie Hansen followed with "Nobody's Child," which was rendered sweetly and elicited great praise from the audience. In conclusion, "God Save the Queen" and the Dixie were sung, and the audience then dispersed, apparently well satisfied with the evening's entertainment. The next little sum of \$40 was raised, and given to the Methodist Minister. The Rev. Mr. Trewin, who received it very thankfully.—COS.

Dalhousie, N. B., April 29, 74.

To the people of the County of Restigouche. The reports of the last session of our Legislature, (oh! how fallen), were read with pain, I feel sure, throughout the Province. Of the unparliamentary, ungentlemanly, disgraceful language of some of the honorable members, of their little precedents, Inspectorships &c., it is not my purpose to speak. I must only remark that when a gentleman holding the high position of Attorney General made a reckless statement with regard to this County, it was the duty of its members to speak for its honor.

If the County was to be represented at all it should expect to be defended when an glaring slur was thrown on it. Hon. Mr. King is reported as having said that more would be done in Restigouche for the advancement of Education during the past two years than during the previous twenty years.—Men of Restigouche! I ask you to answer this insulting assertion on, as your representatives, to use the forcible, though indecorous language of the "Irrepressible" of Bathurst, were as dumb canines on the occasion of its utterance. Is it possible that for those twenty years you were negligent of the first of your duties, the education of your children? Young men, aye, and young women of this County, you who have been educated during that period, and who with just pride can regard yourselves as the equals in talent and education of those of more favored Counties, I ask you to answer whether this assertion was true? No! I will answer for you one and all emphatically No! Although within the past two years exorbitant taxes have been levied, and to your great credit willingly paid, although you felt the burden of paying, perchance, for the education of your neighbors' children, were during the twenty years prior to that time you were negligent of the duty enough to pay for your own, look around you and contemplate the result. From Dalhousie to the Head of the Tide, there are only two schools in operation. Campbellton a considerable town has been without a school for more than half a year, although the people are taxed as though they were in existence. From the shoreline to the lower end of the County the schools are not more numerous than under the old law. In the back settlements some few, three or four we believe, have been put up, but in two years, it is true, to make it appear as though that wonderful things were being done. These buildings, which remind one of the tall keepers' booths in the old country, at a large average of \$250 each, would give a sum total of \$1000 taken out of your own pockets. Men of Restigouche, and of the whole Province, let me tell you that the Hon. mouthpiece of the Government, who has been so ready to credit, to hold them up to public admiration, I leave the matter to you for consideration hoping at all events, that when called on to send representatives to Fredericton against you will send men who will not allow an insult to your intelligence to pass unnoticed.
