NARCOTIC DRUGS GIVEN CHILDREN

Charges Made That Dealers Are Supplying Denver Scholars With Opium. Denver, April 29.—Charges that narcotic dealers are giving drugs to Denver school children in order to create a permanent demand for them that six drug addicts were discovered on Easter Day among Denver girls from 17 to 19 years old by Federal officers, and that evidence of frequent and repeated sales of drugs within one block of a school has been obtained, were contained in the report of the Federal Grand Jury submitted this afternoon at Judge Robert E. Lewis.

reports said. "On Easter Sunday in Denver six new addicts were known to have been introduced—girls between the ages of 17 and 19—were discovered in Denver and recorded in the office of the Narcotic Division. "We have evidence that persons engaged in this traffic drew salaries from the big dealers' for their services whether in jail or out. Our attention again and again has been called to addicts whose career in the drug habit has been started by some physician who intentionally or carelessly prescribed narcotic drugs in amounts sufficient to establish the habit. "First offenders in both liquor and narcotic law violations would receive the maximum sentences under the law, the statement says. Clinics and hospitals for the care of addicts should be established immediately, and information should be disseminated as widely and thoroughly as possible. "One hundred indictments were returned by the Grand Jury on which forty-five charged violation of the Narcotic Act.

REVOLUTIONIZE AUTO BUSINESS

Syracuse Man Claims to Have an Engine that Will Run a Car 300 for 5 1/2 Cts.

Syracuse, N. Y., April 27.—Three hundred miles by an automobile on a gallon of fuel costing five and one-half cents.

That is the claim H. H. Elmer, treasurer and general manager of the Globe Malleable Iron and Steel Company, of this city, makes for an engine designed by himself, revealed to the directors of the company at its annual meeting here today.

Three full sized models were tested before the directors, today. One of the models, a one-cylinder, three-horsepower engine, ran continuously for 18-hours on one quarter gallon of fuel, the directors stated.

The fuel used is oil, either mineral animal or vegetable. No ignition or carburetor is used. One of Mr. Elmer's models has attained a speed of from 2,500 to 2,000 revolutions a minute, he claims. The principle of the discovery is based on the chemistry of oil, according to Mr. Elmer.

RESTIGOUCHE AND THE SENATORSHIP

At the present time there is a vacancy in the Senate, and no doubt there is much wire pulling from different sections of the province to have the appointment go to their respective county or city.

Several names are mentioned as likely to be favored in this regard, among them being Hon. Wm. Pugsley and O. Turgeon, M. P. While either of these gentlemen would no doubt fill the position with honor, yet it is hardly fair to other sections that they should be appointed.

Restigouche, the most northerly county in the province and the farthest away from the political centres seems to have always been passed over as we have never been represented in the Senate, and we should now use our influence to obtain our rights.

Restigouche is acknowledged to be one of the best revenue producing counties in this province, yet when there are honors to be bestowed, its claims are lightly passed by.

When the great world war was on and men and money were required Restigouche held the honor of sending more men per capita, than any other county in this province, and gave as liberally of her money.

In the 1911 census our county was responsible for a very large proportion of the census increase of the province, yet when redistribution took place we were joined to Matapedia and our own direct representative was taken away from us, and we have to depend upon a man, who while doing the best he can, is not wholly conversant with our needs. A representative in the senate would to some degree offset this. Then he and Mr. Michaud could work together in our interests.

Campbellton particularly, as the largest and most progressive town in the province, should be unanimous in pressing for the appointment of Hon. Wm. Currie to the senate.

Get busy today and write the representative of the different counties adjoining and use your influence in every way possible to accomplish this object.

HOPES FOR GENOA.

No doubt the present condition of Europe is repugnant to every humane mind which considers the matter. But, more than that, the lamentable condition overseas is the prime cause of the miseries which at present afflict our own country. Despite the fact that every nation is anxious to buy the things we can produce, our workers walk the streets jobless and destitute because no country can offer us in exchange the products we require or the return value we must have for our output. Under any order of society this would seem a bit of extravagant nonsense, but it happens to be the condition which actually exists, and for which we must find a cure.

The economic conference at Genoa, cannot be expected to provide this country or any other country with an easy instrument for this purpose. The conference ship is weighed down with colossal world problems and moreover, its essential constitution is too vast. Nevertheless, Genoa may evolve a way if its activities can be properly directed.

This will necessitate loosening all fetters upon the conference discussions and, in a sense, enlarging them. In order to accomplish this it may mean that the conference may be obliged to trench upon the political field. Even so; a gathering of representatives of some thirty nations must necessarily be political to a degree, owing to the vast discrepancy of their national interests. The situation does, however, call for men of courage, vision and, in a sense, enlarging them. In out that the eventual outcome of the conference lies almost entirely in the hands of the British delegates. Let us hope that they may display the courage and perspicuity of vision which have been so conspicuously lacking in so many of the earlier conferences for the settlement of Europe and the subsequent economic readjustment of the world.

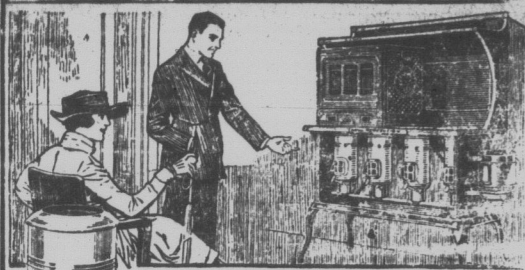
