The class of '39, of which Dr. Pickard was a member, originally numbered twenty-four, but is now reduced to nine members. The jubilee anniversary of the class with which Mr. Thomas Pickard graduated will be held next year, he being a member of the class of '40.

LOCAL MATTERS.

REAL ESTATE TRANSFERS.—Mr. J. L. Black has purchased eighteen acres of the Morris property, adjoining the school grounds, for the sum of \$2,700.—The property at Upper Sackville owned by Mrs. John Berry, and known as the Brown Thompson place, has been sold to Mr. Albert Fawcett.

Public Works.—Hon. P. G. Ryan, Chief Commissioner, visited Sackville last Friday, and in company with Mr. J. L. Black, M. P. P. inspected Westcott Abolition. Mr. Black has for some time past been urging upon the Government the importance of constructing a permanent bridge at that place, and it is thought that his suggestions will be adopted.

Mr. Black has obtained a special appropriation of \$300 for the Cape Island road.

A HALIFAX SOCIETY NOVEL.—A novel written by a leading belle of Halifax society, the scene of which is laid in this city, is to be issued shortly, being now in the publisher's hands. It is said the story is destined to create a sensation, the plot being of a stirring character, and the tale written in brilliant style.

The leading characters introduced move in fashionable circles. The author gives evidence of possessing a rich talent for novel writing, her profusion being of rare order of excellence.—*Chronicle.*

COMMITTED FOR LARCENY.—Alfred Wry, or Roi, a French Canadian who has been employed by the New York Free Stone Quarrying Co., did not go to work on Monday morning, saying he was going to Amherst.

He was brought back by the Quebec express and taken before Magistrate Cahill. The theft of the money and of one watch was proved, and the prisoner was committed to the county goal for 60 days.

—Since your last issue, two events of more than ordinary importance have taken place in our town, viz.: The ordination at Christ Church on Sunday last and the opening of the new Court House on Tuesday. On Saturday last, amidst torrents of rain, clergy from their several parishes and students fresh from their collegiate studies, arrived in Amherst to take part in the events of the following day. Sunday the sun shone brightly and the flag from the church tower floated to the breeze intimating to the citizens that this was more than an ordinary Sabbath day for the Episcopalians, not only of this place, but of the whole diocese of Nova Scotia. Trinity Sunday, 1889, will long be remembered as a rare letter day in the Church of England at Amherst. At 8 o'clock a goodly number of the faithful wended their way to the sacred edifice to partake of the Holy Communion, and again at 9.30 a solemn morning service brought a fair congregation together, and we very solemnly throughout. Rev. W. E. Vroom, late Rector of Shediac, and now Professor of Divinity at King's College, Windsor, Bent, of Paragwah; Wiggins, of Sackville; Bliss, of Westmorland; Rev. Mr. Harris, Vicar, the Assistant Priest and the candidates for the priesthood and diaconate to the number of nine, all with the Church Warden and Vestry, met in the School House near the Church, and from thence in procession marched to the Church. The ordination services, which were particularly impressive, were attended by a large congregation, and were very solemn throughout. Rev. W. E. Vroom, late Rector of Shediac, and now Professor of Divinity at King's College, Windsor, preached the ordination sermon. Four candidates were advanced to the priesthood, and five to the diaconate. In the afternoon an open air service was held at Fort Lawrence, at which addresses were delivered by a number of clergy, the Bishop being unable to attend on account of indisposition. On Sunday evening the Bishop, who had been invited to deliver the closing address, preached a most impressive discourse. There was a very large congregation present. On Monday morning, at 10 o'clock, His Lordship, in the presence of the clergy and a fair congregation, laid the corner stone of the new Court House, and, as he was to be called after St. Alban, the martyr. THE BRUNSWICK GHOST.

(Caswell's Magazine.)

In Brunswick is a college—the

Carolinian—about which a curious

ghost story was told in 1743, which

created a good deal of stir, not only

in the little capital itself but through-

out Germany. In 1746 there died in

the college one of its masters, Dorien

by name, a worthy man who had al-

ways conducted himself well, and had

discharged his duties conscientiously.

He was a quiet amiable man, who

gave offence to no one, a man

generally respected, alike by the

masters and pupils, and also by those

few who knew him in the town.

On the night that he died he sent

word to another master, named Hofer,

that he particularly desired to speak

to him. Hofer was aroused from

sleep, jumped from bed, hastily dressed

and arrived too late in the sick

man's room to receive his communica-

tion. Dorien was at his last gasp.

He recognized his friend, clasped his

hand and tried to speak; but his words

could not be heard, and he was unable

to give his parting communication to

his friend.

Shortly after the death of Dorien,

the rumor spread that the dead man

had been seen in the passages. But

as these who pretended to have seen

him were only poor pupils of the col-

lege, no importance was attached to the

matter. Their testimony was regard-

ed, and justly on such a matter as

this, to be undeserving of the notice

of the masters and professors. Never-

theless, the rumor continued to be

spread, and after some time the col-

lege masters were vexed, and wished

that the innocent and blameless memory

of Dorien should be left untroubled

with, and also undisturbed by idle

tongues. If any man deserved to rest

in his grave that man was Dorien.

However, in October, 1748, some-

thing occurred which aroused atten-

tion seriously, and made the masters

of the college suspect that there was

something real at the bottom of the

strange reports that had reached

them.

Mr. Hofer was walking between 11

and 12, through the dormitory cor-

ridor, to see that all the pupils were

in bed in their several cubicles, and

that all were quiet, when, as he ap-

proached the door of the college, he

was met by Mr. Lampadius, one of the

professors, he saw the dead man sitting

there in a chair, dressed in his old

evening dress, with a white night-cap

on his head, the lapets of which he

held together under his chin with his

right hand, and so put on the appear-

ance of being asleep. He was looking

down as if to show the eyes and nose,

mouth and chin.

Mr. Hofer was so astonished that

he stood still and looked attentively

at the apparition, unable to trust his

eyes, or realize that he saw old Dorien

in spirit. He was somewhat fright-

ened and had to struggle with himself

before he could resolve to pass; but he

did this, and went into the room of

Mr. Lampadius, and shut the door

behind him. He did not rouse the

sleepers, but passed within a minute,

and then opened the door and went

out again. There he saw the

apparition seated as he had seen it

before. He raised the lantern and

threw the light full on the face of

the spectre; but at the same moment

came over him a sense of horror and faintness

such as he never experienced before,

and he was unable to draw back his

hand.

After this event for several months

the hand remained swollen and pain-

ful, and he had difficulty in using it.

Next day Hofer related what had

happened to Mr. Oeder, a professor

of mathematics. Oeder, as a philoso-

pher, and a man of plain common

sense, laughed at it, and insisted that

Hofer was either the dupe of some

practical joke, played by one of the

scholar, or he had created the whole

concern. When, however, he was

unable to persuade Hofer that this

was the case, he offered to accompany

him on his round next night, and
