SYRACUSE SCORCHED!

Two Disastrous Fires in Progress at One Time.

A Large Amount of Property Licked Up by the Flames—The Less Flaced as High-as \$1,000,009.

SYRACUSE, March 14—8:30 a.m.—Two large fires are raging here. One started in the wholesale district at 6 a.m., and has already destroyed the six-story Hogan block, the Newfay block, the Loomis block and other buildings. At 7:30 another fire broke out in the Roscos wholesale house in another section. That block has been destroyed, and the fire has apread to the Yates block of flats, and threatens the Montgomery flats. Assistance has been asked from Oswego, Baldwinsville and Fulton.

SYRACUSE, N. Y., March 14.—The fire which started in the Hogan block on Fayette street is now under control. The second fire has destroyed Roscoe Bros.' wholesale store. The Syracuse Journal building, the Yates block and the Montgomery flats are buring and will probably be destroyed.

The area burned over by the first fire includes a dozen wholesale buildings occupied by 50 or more firms.

THE SECOND FIRE.

10 a.m.—The second fire is still in full blast. The Journal office has been completely burned, and the fire department is working hard to keep the flames from the Vanderbilt House. The Caudee House is also on fire. The Gates building, occupied by half a dozen stores and a score-of families, has gone, and half the big Montgomery flats have burned, with no hope of saying the rest of the building. Two engines from Utica arrived at 9:30, and two central locomotives are also throwing water.

Three Men Buried Near Crested Eutte,

CRESTED BUTTE, Col., March 14.—Three more snow-slide victims are reported this morning. M. G. Creller, Pat Murphy and Jack Griffin, who have been at work on the Jacobs Trader mine are buried beneath the snow. The slide is over half a mile wide and it would seem that the whole mountain has come down, filling the basin with snow probably 100 feet deep. The place has been considered very dangerous, so much so that since the storm no one has dared to venture up there until yesterday, when three men went to see if their fellow miners were safe. They found no signs of a cabin, and the tunnel entrance was entirely covered. By tunneling through the snow for 30 feet they came to the cabin, which was mashed in by snow. It is the general belief that the men had become alarmed and started to leave, and were caught in their attempt to escape.

The Parliamentary Leader of the Catholic Party in Germany Dead.

Berlin, March 16.—Dr. Ludwig Windthorst, the Parliamentary leader of the Catholic party in Prussia, who has been dangerously ill for some days, died Saturday morning. He was born Jau. 17, 1812. Dr. Windthorst at midnight was merely able to whisper replies to inquiries as to his condition. Suddenly, however, his voice returned, and imagining that he was in the Reichstag, he delivered an impassioned address in favor of the abolition of the law expelling the Jesuits from Germany. His voice could be heard through three rooms. He never spoke after having concluded this speech. The death of Dr. Windthorst, the leader of the Clerical party in the Reichstag, was announced to that body by the president of the body. Herr Levetzow. In his eulogy upon the dead statesman, Herr Levetzow extrolled his acumen, uncessing activity, adgoitness and potent personal influence on all nides of the House. Herr Levetzow said that he had always attached weight to the words of Dr. Windthorst. His personal amiability had endeared him to his intimate friends and pleased everybody who came in contact with him. Herr Levetzow closed his eloquent enlogy by declaring that scarcely anyone would be so missed in the Reichstag as Dr. Windthorst.

ONTARIO'S SCHOOLS

Education, Hon. G. W. Ross.

Growth of the System-French Schools-

The report of the Minister of Education for the year 1890, and the statistics for 1889, have been made public. The school population of the Province for 1889 was 616,028, of which number 500,815 pupils were registered, 263,047 were boys and 237,768 girls. The number of pupils registered di increased 4,492 though the increase of school population was only 675. The average attendance in rural sections was 47 per cent, of the registered attendcrease of school population was only 675.
The average attendance in rural sections was 47 per cent. of the registered attendance, while in towns it was 60 per cent. and in cities 64 per cent. There are now 5,677 to school houses in the Province. Notwithstanding the large expenditure for school sites and buildings and the large increase in the teaching staff of the country, the cost per pupil has but slightly advanced in thirteen years. The average cost per pupil on the number enrolled in 1889 was \$8 44 for the Province. In 1877 the average cost was \$6 26 for the Province. The number of Roman Catholic schools open during the year were 243, pupils, 32,790 and teachers

The number of high schools, including collegiate institutes, was 120, with 18,642 pupils and 427 teachers. The attendance at the high schools has doubled in thirteen years. In 1889 the pupils preparing for matriculation numbered 1,446,583 for the learned professions and 7,816 for teachers' examinations. Total number of pupils attending the several classes of schools in 1889 (excluding colleges and privateschools), 520,827; grand total sum expended for all educational purposes in 1889, \$5,145,370.

In 1890 there were 1,293 teachers in training in 58 county model schools: 1,228 passed the final examination. In the same year there were 411 students in attendance at the normal and 12 teachers' schools, and

the normal and 12 teachers' schools, and 948 model school and kindergarten pupils and 22 teachers. There are now 5 training institutes in the Province, at Guelph, Hamilton, Kingston, Owen Sound and Strathroy. The attendance in 1890 was 59; the number who wrote at the final examination was 125 and the number who passed 88.

In schools in which special attention had been paid to colloquial and blacktoard exercises, the pupils understood and readily answered questions in English. Satisfactory result in the acquirement of English may be expected of the pupils now entering school and proceeding regularly in the study of the bi-lingual readers, from the lowest to the highest book of the series.

Notwithstanding the many disadvantages under which they labor, the teachers are doing very fair work. In schools in which the pupils understood English all communications between teacher and pupils, in regard to matters of discipline and the management of the schools, were in English. In the majority, however, owing to the pupils 'lack of knowledge of English, French is used in some cases. The inspector has directed the attention of the teachers to the observance of the regulation of the Education Department respecting this matter.

Dr. McDiarmid comes to these conclusions.

Dr. McDiarmid comes to these conclusions: 1. With the employment of teachers trained in the Plantagenet (French) Model School, and the use of the bi-lingual readers, the principal causes which retarded the satisfactory progress of the French public schools will in a few years be removed. 2. Laudable as well as successful efforts are being made in teaching the English language in all the schools, one or two excepted. Some English is, however, taught in the latter schools. The want of suitable teachers is the cause of the backwardness of the instruction given in them in this language. 3. Inspector Dufart is using his power and influence in having the regulations of the department enforced.

The Finance Committee Consider the Disposal of the L. and P. S. R.

Legislature Jurisdiction Over the Road?—The Committee Pins Its Faith to the Former and Asks for the essary Legislation to Dispose

The aldermen are not likely to have smooth sailing in their efforts to secure the re-lease or sale of the London and Port Stanley Railroad stock. A new difficulty has cropped up. The vexatious question of jurisdiction has presented itself, and the aldermen will have to ascertain whether the Pominion Government or the Provincial Legislature has jurisdiction over the road. The members of the Finance Committee were brought face to face with this riddle at their meeting Friday afternoon.

Mr. T. G. Meredith, who was present at the meeting, was asked for his opinion on the subject. He stated that the first question to be decided was whether the city should apply for the necessary legislation from the Dominion Government or from the Provincial Legislature. "The opinion of my brother, Mr. W. R.," said the speaker, "is that the city will not get justice from the Legislature, and for this reason he advises that application be made to the Dominion Government. There will be a very vexatious question to decide, that of jurisdiction. In taking the matter before the Dominion Government there would be no risks incurred, whereas if it were taken to the Provincial Legislature it would be an acknowledgment of that Legislature's jurisdiction, and this might militate against the success of the bill if it were found necessary to take it to the Dominion Government."

Mayor Taylor—Might not the Ontario

Mayor Taylor—Might not the Ontario Legislature claim the jurisdiction? Mr. Meredith—Yes, but the Dominion Government may have control over a rail-way which the Ontario Government may

Ald. Gartshore—What if the charter comes from the Ontario Legislature?

Mr. Meredith—Many railways receive charters from the Ontario Legislature, the lurisdiction over which has been assumed afterwards by the Dominion Government.

Mr. Meredith—Oh, yes; it will perhaps be brought against you if you should have occasion to bring the matter before the Ontario Legislature.

Mr. Meredith—Well, if we want the legislation we must ask for it at once. I have already taken the precuntion of sending down the copy for the Official Gazette, so that if the Council decides in favor of applying to the Dominion Government it can be inserted in time for the first session.

Mayor Taylor—If Mr. Meredith advises the committee to make application to the Dominion Government, I shall support it.



THE WESLEY CENTENARY. The death of the greatest reformer since Martin Luther took place 100 years ago, The great results that have flowed from his work in the development of Methodism are the wonder of the century, his followers are counted by millions, and his influence is a living and a growing power. John Wesley

entered upon his ministrations with the declaration, "The world is my parish." me his parish.

The witnesses to the spiritual dearth of tury are numerous and strong. Southey "There never was less religious feeling than when Wesley blew his trumpet and awakened those that slept." The Weekly Miscellany in 1732 said that "godliness" looked as odd on a man as his great-grandfather's dress." Isaac Taylor declares that but for Methodism the languishing nonconformity of the eighteenth century was "rapidly in course to be found nowhere but in books." "I am told," wrote Lady Mary Wortley Montagne in satiric reference to the prevalence of atheism and profligacy, "that there is a hill cooking to have 'not' taken out of the Commandments and inserted in the Creed at the ensuing ession. It certainly might be carried out; honor, virtue and reputation, which we used to hear of in our nursery, are as much lald aside as crumpled ribbons."

There is no question of the fitness of John Wesley, not only to measure the depth of this great need, but to labor successfully toward its relief. His ancestry on both sides was strong, courageous, never satisfied with the existing, always calmest in fied with the existing, always calmest in the most violent storm. Perhaps his own greatest quality was his sympathy for the needy and despised. No man has gone farther than Wesley in a full appreciation of the possibilities of divine power to reach the outermost. A fit type for an artist to represent the first stage in the Methodist history would be the picture of the gowned student going out of his lodgings in Lincoln College with his Bible in one hand and a basket of bread in the other for the Provincial rights and territory of the double relief of the prisoners to jail. Only one community bears Wesley's name, but all the churches have-caught his spirit. "The noblest result of the foligious revival," says Mr. J.R. Green in his "History of England," was the steady attempt which has never ceased from that day to this, to of England," was the steady attempt which has never ceased from that day to this, to remedy the guilt, the ignorance, the physical position of the paternal Empire, that the good little Toronto boy remedy the guilt, the ignorance, the physical positions are respectively. sical suffering, the social degradation of the profligate and the poor." It is needless to say that this vast power for good did not begin to stir in the world without awakening into intense activity the opposition of the powers of evil. The world, the flesh and the devil have not the least objection to the soft euphemisms and half apologetic warnings which compose "the narcotics of wroning pulpiteers," but a downright blow at any fashionable vice or conventional disaonesty will rouse a furious clamor.

It is not astonishing therefore that both the world and the church met the beginnings of Wesleyanism with fierce re-

ougnance. The Methodists of that day had pagnance. The detailed and endless abuse-to confront riotons fury and endless abuse-They were frequently pelted with stones, and beaten with sticks, and on two occasions a baited bull, set on by dogs and dog-like men was driven into the midst of their congregation.

Out of persecution arose strength; not the the crowning glories of Methodism that it has been predominantly evangelistic; not indifferent to doctrine, but habitually keeping the assertion and advocacy of a theo logical system behind the preaching of repentance and faith. The ideal of the early Calvinism was that of a waiting church looking to God to do all the work in his own good time and way; and it waited until it became dead and powerless. The ideal of the latter Calvinism is that of a working church, which knows itself to be the instrument of God in redeeming the world. In the attainment this better and more fruitful method of Calvinism has been constantly stirred up to zeal and good works by its Wesleyan rival, which from the first has been a missionary and evange-

The religion of Wesley was wholly practical. His gospel was the gospel of genuine godliness and his one aim to 'spread scriptural holiness over the land.' He preached heart conversion, justification by faith and the doctrine of sanctification, which he described as a "gradual work," beginning "at the time of our being born again," making us "more and more dead to sin," and "more and more alive to God."

As to the results. If Wesley had don nothing more than to establish the Metho-dist Episcopal Church, with its more than 2,000,000 communicants, its 14,000 pastors, its missions in all parts of the world, its Sunday schools, academies, colleges and other great institutions, the extent of his work would be difficult for the mind to grasp, but the millions of Methodists in other organizations with their multiplied appliances for the evangelization of the world all form parts of the mighty results. The number of actual church members in the Canadian Methodist Church implies a constituency of nearly 1,000,000 in the Dominion of Canada, whose entire population is a little less than 5,000,000. There are no important divergencies as to belief in the various divisions. of the Methodist Church. Methodism doctrinally is one. Many of the divisions were due to the desire for lay representation; others to illiberality matters of administration; others to slavery or sectional or geographical causes.

These causes in most instances have been removed. Wesley is not only an object of admiration to the widespread Methodist family, but to all the world beside, for he, like every other truly great man, belongs to the church universal. It is a sign of the growth of that Christian Union which shall shortly be, that all churches now laud and venerate the founder of the Metho-

The different paris of the cars will be made at Pullman, Ill., and then the sections will be shipped to Australia all ready to be put together. About April 1 a detachment of men from the Pullman works will start upon the long journey, taking with them eighteen cars, which they will put together and finish at Melbourne. The present contract involves \$250,000, and is the first one ever made by the Pullman Company in Australia.

Judge Caldwell, of the United States Circuit Court, at Kansas City, Mo., has sifined the decree of foreclosure in the case of the Rock Island road against the Chicago, Kansas and Nebraska, and the latter line is now to be disposed of at public sale to satisfy the Rock Island's mortgage of \$28,000,000. The date of sale has not yet been fixed. The case has been hotly contested for overa year.
