Ihree Quarters Per Cent Offered

For \$185,000 Worth of Debentures-The Car Shops Bosus and L. and P. R. Work-The South Street Sewer.

The finance committee held a most important meeting last night. The chief business was the consideration of tenders for \$185,000 worth of debentures-\$100,000 being G. T. R. bonus debentures, bearing interest at 4 per cent per annum, payable semi-annually, and running 30 years from 1894; and the \$85,000 being for L. and P. S. R. bridges and terminals, the debentures being 3 1-2 per cents, interest payable semi-annually, and covering a period of 40 years from Dec. 9, 1896. Five tenders were received. The highest bid was equal to 3 3-4 per cent on the two issues combined. This is a highly satisfactory rate, proving that the credit of London stands unimpaired. The last issue of city depentures was sold for the same fig-ure, which up to that date was the est ever secured.

THE SOUTH STREET SEWER This question was brought up again by further applications for remission of sewer rates, the council having granted the rebate to a number of ratepayers who claimed that the sewer had been of no use to them. Ald. Armstrong said he thought of moving for a reconsideration of the council's decision, as he had received subsequent information which changed his opinion. With the completion of its system of sewage disposal London will be at the head of Canadian cities in all its sanitary arrangements. Two things alone will be needed as auxiliaries-a proper system of plumbing inspection. and some method of collecting and destroying garbage. The first of these, which was made a condition by the Provincial Board of Health of its approval of our sewage plans, is now under consideration by our local board; and as it can be operated without any expense to the city, it will doubtless soon be adopted. The collection and disposal of garbage, however, will involve considerable cost; and though as a sanitary measure it is very advisable the expense may for some time prevent anything being done.

CONTAGION IN BOOKS. The chairman reported that he had been in consultation with the Free Library Board, in regard to taking proper steps towards the prevention and spread of infectious diseases by means of the books circulated, and he had also consulted the medical health officer. The plan suggested was that the M. H. O., when he visits a house where there is any infectious disease, will take possession and burn any book from the Free Library, which may be in the house, and also notify the Free Library Board of the aber of the book, thus relieving borrower from lability. The cost would be slight, as the great bulk of books loaned by the library are under \$1 in price. Not many would be destroyed. A PLUMBING BYLAW. The chairman, Ald. Skinner and Mr George White formed the committee appointed to consider the question of plumbing, and they reported as fol-

When the system of sewerage now adopted by the city was under review by the Provincial Board of Health, that body expressed its approval thereof, subject to certain conditions. And among these conditions was the following: "That a plumbing bylaw be adopt-

ed by the local Board of Health and the City Council, satisfactory to the Provincial Board.' Even were it not required by the Provincial Board, however, the regulation of plumbing would seem to be, from a sanitary point of view, absolutely necessary. It is a matter of common observation among physicians credit of the board. that imperfect and faulty plumbing is a fruitful source of disease and death. or not the plumbing in the city should be accurately done; the only question effective measures to be adopted to secure that end. We find that the co-operate with us in this matter, and are willing not only to have all the details of their work carefully regulated and inspected by some disinterested practical man, but they would system of registration of plumbers, expressing their readiness to submit to an examination by a competen board, and to pay a yearly license. It does not appear to us, however, that the matter of licensing plumbers comes directly within the province of your board (though we recognize its advisability); but we think it might properly be left for settlement by the City Council and the plumbers themselves. But as to the regulation and inspection of plumbing, we are satisfied of its necessity; and would therefore recommend that the City Council be asked to pass a bylaw embracing the following provisions:

1. Regulating the methods of house drainage and of connections with sew-

ers, as to construction, composition of pipes, traps and vents, proportionate weight and size of pipes, etc.
2. No plumbing to be done, beyond simple repairs, such as tightening of engineer's office. 3. A plumbing inspector to be apby the Board of Health, at a

salary of \$alary of \$--.
4. Fees to be paid as follows: On applying for a permit, a sum equal to 2 per cent on the estimated cost of the plumbing, but not in any case less than 50 cents; for inspecting old plumbing at the request of the houselder, and reporting thereon, 50 cents or sinks and ordinary drainage, and for each bathroom and closet. 5. Applications for the position plumbing inspector to go before a commission, consisting of the city engineer, the medical health officer, three persons appointed by the Mas-ter Plumbers' Association, which com-

ter Plumbers' Association, which commission shall report the names of all qualified for the office.

6. The inspector to be appointed by the Board of Health, and to be paid by the board; and all fees received by the city under this or any other by-laws relating to plumbing to be ap-

MR. SHERWOOD ON ART

And Its National Spirit - Lecture Under

the Woman's Art Club Auspices. Mr. W. A. Sherwood, the noted Toronto artist, last night delivered a lecture on "The National Spirit in Art," which a large audience found pleasant and profitable. The lecture was given under the auspices of the Woman's Art Club in the latter's studio, Rich-

Mr. Sherwood contended that there was in art an element that exercised a momentous influence on the affairs of the nation. The patriotic spirit was developed quite as effectually through the medium of art as that of literature. This patriotic influence was native of the soil and local in character. However excellent foreign art might be, it did not possess the qualities essential to the production of a national spirit. Art was not produced by the exercise of observing powers. It was poetic in an essential degree. It was not to be imparted in schools; it was only by communion with nature from

earliest childhood. "Artists are born and not made," continued Mr. Sherwood. "The product of their easel is inwoven in the fabric of the nation's life. The genre and landscape painter is forever presenting the beauties of rural life, entreating by the most subtle charms which art from nature wins, recalling those scenes of early life which gladden the homes of the dweller upon the western prairie. Can there be anything more lovely than the picture of the old home in Ontario? The child born in the prairie home learns to cherish the scene depicted with something of the fondness which marks the parent's appreciation of it. appreciation is patriotic and national

"The portrait painter excels even the genre and landscape painter in developing the national apirit. He is pre-eminently an historical painter, handing down the men and the manners of one century to the century that succeeds. What gives the younger generation a greater pride in the country, and what more incites it ambitious effort, than familiarity with the portraits of the master of former generations? 

Wholesale arrests are taking place daily both of innocent and guilty, and most horare current. The Spaniards are torturing especially the more important people, in order to force them to declare. I am told they are actually nailing their hands up to the walls and flagellating them, applying the thumbscrew, etc. There is no doubt it is perfectly true, but will all be denied by them in Europe, and any surviving witness likely to speak against them they will promptly get out of the way. Floral Hints and Helps.

The Chrysanthemum - Primula Sacred Lily-A Few Dont's.

By Narcissus.

The chrysanthemums seem to get bigger and better every year. There are some glorious specimens this season. It is the queen of fall and early winter flowers, and is a general favorite, though leaders of fashion tell us that it is not the fashionable flower it was last year. Dame fashion plays some sad freaks with some of her votaries sometimes, however, and senpeople like a good thing whether that fickle dame has set her seal to it or not; and so the "mum" will continue to be cultivated as long as people love brightness in the darkening days of winter, and as long as this regal beauty can be so easily culti-

The florists sacrifice everything these days to a large individual bloom, but I think a plant loaded with many smaller flowers is a greater object of beauty than one with two or three large over-grown flowers. We may get pretty much what we want, according as we cultivate the chrysanthemum. By judicious pinching in the early stages of its growth we make from getting any headway on them; the best thing for this is daily sponging not only on, but under, the leaves. 
