Brussels, Nov. 5 .- Princess Clementine, King Leopold's youngest daughter, seems to have resigned herself to her life accordingly. She leads a retired, lonely existence, seeking consolation in the company of animal pets, dogs and parrots more especially.

Her favorite dogs are Havana griffons. She has no less than twenty of them, all comfortably installed in a wing of Laeken Palace, remodeled and refitted up for them and other pets. They are the wildest animals for pets that can be imagined and have torn innumerable trousers of officers and skirts of ladies-in-waiting. The princess always has at least two of her griffons with her. As soon as anybody enters her royal highness' drawing-room the animals fly at the





Crow, of the C.A,A.U., this morning sent out a letter to all clubs in affiliation with the governing union that will have an important bearing on clubs in the new Rugby L eague in a forceful way the serious predicament in which they have all landed themselves through their con-

nection with the disqualified Rugby b ody. The closing paragraph of the letter in question points out that no entry from a club having in its membership disqualified members can compete in any sports or meets held under the U nion sanction. COMPLETE ISOLATION.

Asked for an explanation of the clause, a member of the board of governors said: "It simply means that ev ery member of the Inter-Provincial Union, whether they take part in senior or intermediate games, will be barred from all sanctioned meets of t he C.A.A.U. It is the only logical thing to do under the circumstances. The men must be isolated completely who have defied the governing union.

"Disqualified men are barred fro m membership in every amateur club that I have any acquaintance with, and why should the C.A.A.U. make an exception? Take the Argonaut Club, for example. They cannot, under the constitution, admit the Rugby Layers to membership who are under the ban of the C.A.A.U., and before this fight is ended you will see a rebellion in the rowing club. The members of t he Rugby section are alone responsible for the recent mix-up, and when the rowing season comes around there will be trouble, and lots of it."


