Central Powers' Answer To Vatican Peace Berlin's and Vienna's Answers Proposal Will In No Way Alter Wilson's Reply—Congress Likely To Investigate German Conspiracy To Corrupt Congressmen.

Washington, Sept. 22 .- The replies made by Germany and Austria to Pope Benedict's peace proposal contain nothing that will in any way alter the position of the United States as outlined in President Wilson's reply

First examination of the replies, officials here thought, failed to disclose anything in the nature of terms which would afford a basis for discussion.

Secretary of State Lansing authorized no quotation of any opinion for the Government, but it was clearly indicated at state department that such consideration as had been given to the replies had failed to develop any reason for any alteration of the aims or intentions of the United States Government, either in the conduct of the war or in any peace adjustment that may be undertaken later.

Only Way German Militarism Can Be Suppressed, Pope's Opinion.

Rome, Sept. 22 .- Cardinal Gasparri, the papal secretary of state, tonight emphasized the Associated Press the views of the Vatican regarding a solution of the war by the suppression of conscription and also a joint commercial boycott of any nation which refused to disarm, the occasion being the publi-

It is evident from the article that the Vatican aspires to suppress German militarism by securing a peace treaty requiring the permanent disarmament of The Vatican's Plan.

Conscription, the papal secretary said, led to many wars, the governments always having ready at hand a fighting instrument.

By the suppression of conscription big armies, great munitions plants and militarism automatically would be destroyed and the energy and money consumed in these ways would be used in paying off the huge cost of the present war. It was made evident in the Italia article that the vatican did not hope for a period when there would be no more

Heavy Forces at British Lines In Massed Formations, But In Every Case Is Turned Back, Suffering Great Losses.

British Headquarters in France and Belgium, Sept. 22—(By the Associatde Press).—Fighting is still raging today in the neighborhood of Tower Hamlets, which has been the scene of almost continuous strife since the offensive of the British to the east of Ypres, on the Belgian front, began. On the left the British line was reported to be intact, but no news of the situation on the right could be had this morning.

London, Sept. 22.—Troops of Crown Prince Rup-precht of Bavaria continued last night to launch heavy counter-attacks against the new British lines east of Ypres. on the Belgian front. Field Marshal Haig, in his report today to the war office, says that the Germans used considerable forces in their attacks without gaining any result except to heavily increase their losses. The text of the British official statement says:

"Hostile counter-attacks continued yesterday evening on the Ypres front. Considerable German forces were engaged without any result being gained except a heavy increase in the enemy's losses.

IN MASSED FORMATION. "At dusk the enemy launched a powerful counterattack in massed formation on a wide front east of St. Julien.

The above action was decided upon at a meeting of the special committee appointed to consider the question of grants on Friday afternoon. Only those grants exceeding \$300 are included in the pian, those under that amount being left to the decision of the council as in the past.

In addition to the vote on the manner of making grants, two other bylaws will be submitted, one authorizing an additional grant of \$5,000 to the Salvation Army Rescue Home, and another to cover a grant of \$600 to the Submitted. The committee decided to recommend to the city council that all institutions where charity patients are cared for, such as the rescue homes, orphanaes, etc., will be paid on the per diem basis, but will pay for all city patients at the region rate. For hospitals, as an example, the rate is \$1.25 a day. The city will pay that for all bona fide city patients. It is the opinion that other municipalities send patients to many institutions as in the past.

### HARDEN RAISES ROW TALKING OF BELGIUM

MSTERDAM, Sept. 21.—Maximillian justice and legality. AMSTERDAM, Sept. 21.—Maximilian Harden editor of Die Zukunft, in Berlin, yesterday said that he was convinced that peace was obtainable this year, if Germany promised to waive the right to rule Belgium. This statement aroused a hostile demonstration from the audience and many persons quitted the hall. After the interruption, Herr Harden continued:

"We think too much of waging war and not enough of politics. Whoever brings us peace, whether Socialist or and not enough of politics. Whoever prings us peace, whether Socialist or pope, is welcome.

"The fate of Belgium must be prought to a speedy decision. Either we must annex Belgium or state openly that we never had any such intention. In any case, the German people must decide for themselves their own lot."

Amsterdam, Sept. 22.—Following is the complete text of the German reply to Pope Benedict's peace pro-"Herr Cardinal: Your eminence "Herr Cardinal: Your eminence has been good enough, together with your letter of August 2, to transmit to the kaiser and king, my gracious master, the note of his holiness, the pope, in which his holiness, filled with grief at the devastation of the world war, makes an emphatic peace appeal to the heads of the beligerent peoples. The kaiser-king has deigned to acquaint me with your eminence's letter and to entrust the reply to me.

Praises Pope.

"His majesty has been following for a considerable time with high respect and sincere gratitude his holiness' efforts in a spirit of true impartiality to alleviate as far as possible the sufferings of the war and to hasten the end of hostilities. The kaiser sees in the latest step of his holiness fresh proof of his noble and humane feelings and cherishes a lively deside that for the benefit of the entire world the papal appeal may meet with success.

"Safeguard Peace."

"The effort of Pope Benedict is to pave the way to an understanding amongst all peoples and might surely reckon on a sympathetic hearing and the wholehearted support from his majesty, seeing that the kaiser, since taking over the government, has regarded it as his principal and most sacred task to preserve the blessings of peace for the German people and the world. In his first

biessings of peace for the German people and the world. In his first speech from the throne at the open-ing of the German Reichstag on June 25, 1888, the kaiser promised that his love of the German army that his love of the German army and his position toward it should never lead him into temptation to cut short the benefits of peace unless war were a necessity, forced upon us by an attack on the empire or its allies. The German army should safeguard peace for us, and should peace, nevertheless, be broken it would be in a position to win it with honor. The kaiser has, by his acts, fulfilled the promise he then made in 26 years of happy rule, despite provocations and temptations. rule, despite provocations and temptations.
"In the crisis which led to the present world conflict his majesty's efforts were up to the last moment directed towards settling the conflict by peaceful means. After the war had broken out, against his wish and desire, the kaiser, in conjunction with his allies, was the first solemnly to declare his readiness to enter into peace negotiations. The German people supported his majesty in his keen desire for peace.

"Germany sought within her national frontier the free development of her spiritual and material possessions and outside the imperial territory unhindered competition with nations enjoying equal rights and equal esteem. The free play of forces in the peaceful wrestling with one another would lead to the highest perfecting of the noblest human possessions. Disastrous concatenation of events in the year 1914 absolutely broke off all hopeful course of development and trans-

formed Europe into a bloody battle Note Well Considered submit the suggestion containe therein to earnest and scrupulous ex therein to earnest and scrupulous examination. Special measures which the Government has taken in closest contact with representatives of the German people, for discussing and answering the questions raised proved how earnest it desires, in accordance with his holiness' desires, and the peace resolution of the Reichstag on July 19, to find a practical basis for a just and lasting peace.

Would Reduce Armaments. Would Reduce Armaments.

"The Imperial Government greets with special sympathy the leading idea of the peace appeal wherein his holiness clearly expresses the conviction that in the future the material power of arms must be material power of arms must be superseded by the moral power of right. We are also convinced that the sick body of human society can only be healed by fortifying its moral strength or right. From this would follow, according to his holiness' view the simultaneous diminution of the armed forces of all states and the institution of obligatory arbitration for international disputes. disputes.

"We share his holiness' view that

"We share and a certain safe-

"We share his holiness' view that definite rules and a certain safe-guard for a simultaneous and reciprocal limitation of armaments on land, on sea and in the air, as well as for the true freedom of the community and high seas, are the things, in treating which—the new spirit that in the future should prevail in international relations—should find first hopeful expression. The task would then of itself arise to decided international differences of opinion, not by the use of armed forces, but by peaceful methods, especially by arbitration, whose high peace-producing effect we, together with his holiness, fully recognize.

"The Imperial Government will in this respect support every proposal compatible with the vital interest of the German Empire and people "Germany, owing to her geo-graphical situation and economic graphical situation and economic requirements, has to rely on peaceful intercourse with her neighbors and with distant countries. No people, therefore, has more reason than the German people to wish that instead of universal hatred and

battle that a conciliatory fraternal spirit should prevail between na-

spirit should prevail between nations.

To Stop Future Wars.

"If the nations are guided by this spirit it will be recognized to their advantage that the important thing is to lay more stress upon what unites them in their relations. They will also succeed in settling individual points of conflict which are still undecided in such a way that conditions of existence will be created which will be satisfactory to every nation and thereby a repetition of this great world catastrophe would appear impossible.

"Only on this condition can a lasting peace be founded which would promote an intellectual approachment and a return to the economic prosperity of human society. This serious and sincere conviction encourages our confidence that our enemies may also find suitable basis in the ideas submitted by his holiness for approaching nearer to the preparation of future peace and conditions corresponding to a spirit of reasonableness and to the situation in Europe."

"With a thankful heart we received this fresh gift of fatherly care, which you, holy father, always bestow on all peoples without distinction, and from the depth of our heart we greet the moving exhortation which your holiness has addressed to the governments of the belligerent peoples. During this cruel war we have always looked up to your holiness as to the highest personage, who in virtue of his mission which reaches beyond earthly things, and, thanks to the high conception of his duties laid upon him, stands high above the belligerent peoples, and who is inaccessible to all influence, was able to find a way which may lead to the realization of our own desire for peace, lasting and honorable, for all parties.

"The importance of the promotion of peace on the method proposed by your holiness, namely, to submit international disputes to compulsory arbitration we are also prepared to enter into negotiations regarding this proposal.



# Pay Will Be The Same

Men selected under the Military Service Act will receive the same pay as those now on active service receive. Pay will start from the time a man reports for duty. Money from the Patriotic Fund and Separation Allowance will also be available for selected men.

> Canadian soldiers are well paid. The fact that wages in Canada are generally higher than those paid in Europe is recognized in the system of remuneration for men on active service. Clothing and all equipment in addition to food is also supplied to the Canadian soldier, leaving him with no expense except personal incidentals.

> The rate of pay for men in the Canadian Expeditionary Force, other than commissioned officers, is as follows:



As in the case of those already gone overseas, Separation Allowances will be available for those dependent for livelihood upon selected men. The Separation Allowance is \$20.00 per month for the rank and file, \$25.00 for sergeants and staff-sergeants and \$30.00 for warrant officers. The experience is that many men can afford to assign half their pay to dependents, in addition.

A considerable number of men who have enlisted in the Canadian forces have found themselves better off under the army rate of pay, which is granted in addition to board, lodging, clothing, equipment, transportation, etc., than they were while in civilian positions. Their wants are provided for, and they receive a steady addition to the bank account each month.

BATTLE OF DUNAJEC DECISIVE VICTORY FOR GERMANS; IT SAVED AUSTRIA AND WRECKED ROMANOFF

In Eight Weeks Germany Accomplished Ruin of Eight Months' Russian Success, Brought Her to State of Collapse and Then to Revolution.

The events of the past six months in Russia have served to change entirely the perspectives of the world. Two years ago, when Russia, after great defeats, managed to save her armies and at the last to rally and stand on her new front from Riga to the Rumanian frontier, the world believed that Germany had missed the larger objective of her great campaign and failed to dispose of Russia as she failed to dispose of France in the preceding campaign at the Marne

Pripet Marshes to the Dniester and captured and destroyed vast Austrian forces, the judgment of the preceding year was seemingly confirmed and the failure of the German campaign of 1915 seemed established. But subsequent events have changed that judgment. We see now that the effect of Russian defeats in 1915 was to shake the whole structure of the Russian Empire. Autocracy took alarm and sought to make terms with the enemy, thus betraying Russia. Then the Russian leaders, the men of the Duma, joined hands with the revolutionists and the Romanoff czar fell. But thereafter came anarchy and the almost total disorganization of Russian military strength.

As a result Russia has failed in this critical year to play a part in the Allied campaign and we have had to recognize the possibility that Russian participation is over. Accordingly, the events of 1915 take a new value. We see that the empire was actually ruined at the Dunajec, as the Napoleonic edifice was ruined at Leipzig. We see that German purpose was accomplished, at least temporarily, perhaps permanently, and Russia for a long period eliminated from the war. Measured by its consequences, the Dunajec is thus established as one of the great battles of human history, one of the few decisive battles.

Accordingly, I have thought it worth while at this time to review this great struggle as I reviewed the Marne some time ago. For the Marne, the Dunajec and Verdun are the three great struggles of the World War to the present






