# STATES HIGH BRITISH

Simply Haven't Got the Men, BRITISH BETTER and Must Die Unless Help Tells Americans.

New York, April 23.-The Tribune this morning has the following: "Great Britain has no reserve army to send to France; the 750,000 men enrolled by her since the beginning of the war have fought and died on thirty-seven fronts, and when it is said that she has her 'back against the wall,' it means that."

These statements were made by Lieut.-Col. F. Fraser Hunter, D.S.O., British provost-marshal in the United States, at the Yale Club last night, were he spoke to Toronto University men.

"We simply haven't got the men, or we wouldn't say our backs are against the wall," sald Col. Hunter. "We bend but never break, but for God's ake, get there before we die!"

"The much-heralded army of a million British reserves is nothing but a newspaper army," Col. Hunter declared. Every available British soldier has been utilized in India, China, Somaliland, Turkey, Persia, South Africa, and in more than a score of other places in which, there being Germans entrenched, "are just as truly battle fronts as Northern France," he pointed out.

# CANADIAN NORTHERN TO BE GOVT. SYSTEM

Reid Assures Toronto Everything Will Be All Right.

"TOO MUCH LOBBYING"

Exciting Scene When Committee Is Accused of Being Approached.

Ottawa, April 23.—The contentious Tore to Niagara and Western Railway bill, which extends the time for the construction of the lines of the company from Toronto to Hamilton, and thence to a point on the Niagara boundary, with a branch line to Port Colborne from St. Catharines, engaged the attention of the railway committee of the Commons today. Strong exception was taken to the renewal of the charter by a Toronto deputation, which included Controller McGuire and Alderman Ramsden.

Controller McGuire explained that this was a subsidiary C. N. R. company, and Toronto objected to its being extended when a dollar had not been spent by the company. The objection would be withdrawn, he said, if it could be definitely stated that this line would become the property of the Dominion Government.

R., its entity would be retained, and it would be necessary to have lapsed charters belonging to the company reviewed. This company, he company reviewed. R. charters because the system is owned by the Government. The situation, he said, was under the control of the Government and Parliament. "Anything that is done on the C. N. R. in future," he said. "will be done by the Government and the people of Ontario are safe in the hands of the Government and Parliament."

These statements were made during an interview with German newspaper correspondents at great headquarters on March 12, and reported in German newspapers of that date, which have been received here.

### CANVASSERS HOPE CHANNELS TO GET \$200,000 IN PIRATE THE DRIVE TODAY

Optimism Prevails Among the Campaigners, Who Report Successful First Day.

BIG TANK ROLLING ON

Started Out With Impetus of \$150,000 Secured in Preliminary Canvass.

The big tank rolls on in London's grand patriotic drive, which formally opened at 9 o'clock this morning, to capture \$355,000 in three days for eleven objects, the Canadian, British, Italian Red Cross, the Patriotic Fund, the Secours Nationale, Belgian and Serbian and Jewish Relief, Imperial Order Daughters of the Empire, Y. M. C. A. Overseas and Salvation Army Overseas. And the one alm of all these objects backed by organizations is to speed up the winning of the war, to stand behind the men who are gallantly putting their all into the fight and to keep faith with those who have died on Flanders field in order that the hordes of the Hun may never pass.

\$150,000 as Started.

At zero this morning, 9 o'clock, everything was in readiness at the headquarters, 150 Dundas street, for the beginning of the big push. Aiready advance detachments of the army of canvassers had been out over "No Man's Land" with the tank on a reconnitering expedition, capturing the first objective, \$150,000. It was with good heart that the campaigners went over the top, inspired by the success aiready achieved, cheered by the sunshine of the bring spring day, filled with indomitable faith in the patriotism and goods sportsmanship of their fellow citizens, which never falls in such a crisis.

Expect \$200,000 Tonight.

When the first big busy day ends and reports are made by team captains over the dinner table at the Tecumseh House this evening, it is fully expected that the story will be told that as a result of "steaming up" today, the tank has covered the Intervening ground and triumphantly crossed the \$200,000 trench. There are hopes, even, that it will be well on the way towards the next objective, \$250,000.

In any case, the public is keeping an interested eye on the tank and trenches out in front of the Bank of Commerce Building, the device which in a still more appropriate manner tells the story of progress at a glance, as did the bubbling-up thermometer a year ago.

Naval Forces Sink Five Old **Cruisers To Bottle** Up Subs.

London, April 23.-British naval forces today raided the German sub marine bases of Ostend and Zeebrugge, the admiralty announces. Five old cruisers which had been filled with concrete for use in blocking the channels were run aground blown up and abandoned by their

crews. The admiralty reports that, according to incomplete information thus far received, the raid met with a reasonable measure of success.

The ports of Ostend and Zee brugge, on the Belgian coast, are the principal bases for the operations of the submarines in campaign against shipping in the North Sea and English They are of great importance to the Germans for this purpose, and it has been recognized by the Allies that to deprive the enemy of them would be one of the most effective means of dealing with the submarines.

An attack on these ports by the British fleet has been urged, but the British naval authorities aptly regard the land defences as too strong to make this practicable. Various measures have been adopted to destroy German submarines on enter ing or leaving these ports. Field Marshal Haig's offensive in Flanders last summer was generally believe to have as one of its main objectives the bending back of the German northern flank, so as to deprive the enemy of these two points.

#### DAWN TO DUSK FOE HARRIED BY CANUCKS

Germans Gassed. Pounded. Raided for Twelve Hours.

[By W. A. Willison, Canadian Press Correspondent.]
Canadian Army Headquarters, April 23.—Raided in no less than seven places, gassed with thousands of lachyrmatory and lethal shells, harassed by special artillery shots, his trenches swept by machine gun and rifle bullets, his front line hammered by trench mortars, the enemy for the past twelve hours has enemy for the past twelve hours has had a lively time at the hands of the Canadians. From dusk until dawn the whole front has been lively north and whole from south of Lens.

Close Fighting.

In some instances in our raids, which were all supported by our artillery, our men were unable to locate the enemy. In others sharp fighting developed, particularly in one case where protracted hand-to-hand fighting took place. So close was the struggle that we were unable to take ment prisence. ble to take many prisoners.
With fair weather succeeding the cold. dark days of last week, our airmen were busy. With reckless disregard for the regular machine gun or rifle bullet bar-rage, a patrol of four of our machines rage, a patrol of four of our machines flew up and down the enemy trenches for no less than fifteen minutes at an altitude of from 50 to 100 yards, emptying machine gun drums into the enemy front line. Like work was carried out in other parts of the line, and at midnight one of our planes bombed the hostile firing trenches.

#### NORTH IRELAND FLOUTS ORDER OF IRISH LABOR TO STOP WORK FOR DAY

London, April 23 .- The order of the Irish labor convention for a day's cessation of work as a protest against conscription was absolutely ignored in Belfast and the north of Ireland, says a Central News dispatch from Belfast today. Work went on as usual, the message reports, and there was no outward manifestations to make the day different from any other working day.




#### MINNESOTA BOXING **COMMISSION VOTES** TO PERMIT FIGHT



#### CONVERSION OF UNITED STATES LIBERTY BONDS.

With the Third Issue of: Liberty Bonds, the conversion privilege becomes uite complicated, as there will be six different kinds of Liberty Bonds outtanding when the present issue is finally completed and the There are the 3½% bonds of the First Liberty Loan, issued June 15, 1917, hey are exempt from all taxes, except estate and inheritance taxes, and are nvertible into any higher rate bonds issued during the war (except short term

e-year loans) within six months from date of issue of such subsequent high-

rate bonds.

There are the First Liberty Fours which are the 3½% bonds converted into 4% bonds. They are exempt from the normal income tax but are subject to the supertax and excess profits tax on incomes and earnings, except the income from holdings of \$5,000 of bonds. They are convertible into the new 4½% bonds, if application is made before November 9, 1918. When converted they retain their former dates of maturity, redemption and interest payments, but in other respects assume the status of the new issue.

The Second Liberty Fours are the bonds originating under the Second Liberty Loan. Their maturity is November 15, 1942, but they are redeemable at the option of the Government on or after November 15, 1927. Tax exemption features, and that of the conversion into the 4½% bonds, are the same as the First Liberty Fours.

There will be three kinds of Liberty 4½% Bonds outstanding. There will be the First 4½% bonds which will be issued in the conversion of the 3½% bonds or the First 4½% bonds. The date of their issue will be May 9, 1918, and their maturity June 15, 1947. Their tax exemption and inheritance tax features are the same as the First 4½s, and they are not convertible into any future

The Third 41/4 % bonds are those originating with the Third Liberty Loan now being offered. They are dated May 9, 1918, with maturity on September 15, 1928, with no redemption before that date. These will be the only ten-year 44% bonds, as the First 44% bonds mature January 15, 1947, and the Second 44% bonds mature November 15, 1942. Interest dates on the Third 44% are September 15 and March 15. The tax exemption and inheritance tax features and the non-convertibility into future issues are the same as those of the First

and Second 414% bonds.

It will be seen that there will be three issues of 44% bonds available for investment: One that will be a thirty-year bond redeemable at the option of the Government after ten years; and the third, a straight ten-year maturity. Some investors may prefer a straight ten-year bond, while others may prefer to invest in a 41% United States Bond of a much longer maturity.

The Liberty Loan, 41% from an investment standpoint purely must prove exceptionally attractive to the American public, and, no doubt, will be largely oversubscribed in the present campaign. They should sell readily at a handsome premium after the war is over.

#### BANKING AND FINANCE.

In the course of a discussion in April the acting minister of finance stated that another loan would be offered to the public in the later months of the current year, as had been expected. A semi-official statement regarding payments on the loan of \$400,000,000 made in November last indicates that up to 1st March, 77 per cent of the allotments had been paid, although, according to the official prospectus only 60 per cent was required to be paid by that date, so that on 1st April and 1st May the balance remaining to be paid was only 23 per cent, or \$92,000,000. From the proceeds of this loan, together with surplus revenues from other sources, the requirements of the Government until July will be adequately provided for.

We are watching with much interest the progress of the third Liberty Loan campaign in the United States, and congratulate our Allies on the rapid progress which they are making. In this connection it may be of interest to our banking friends across the line to know that the advances made by this bank to enable subscribers to meet their payments to the Dominion of Canada Victory Loan, issued last November, are at the present time less than 31/2 per cent of the subscriptions received through this bank, which amounted nearly \$80,000,000.

Public deposits in the chartered banks at the end of January amounted to \$1,460,091,493, an increase of \$17,998,000 during the month, and one of \$167,301,-000 as compared with the total of a year ago. Savings deposits, which showed a slight decrease at the time of the first payments to the Victory Loan, are again increasing from month to month, and continue to exceed the current loans of the banks. For several years prior to the outbreak of the war these loans exceeded the savings deposits. In 1908 the average amount of the excess was \$123,000,000, and in 1913 \$265,000,000. In 1914 loans declined and deposits steadily increased, until in May, 1916, the latter exceeded the former. At present there is a stronger demand for credit for commercial purposes, as well as for those of provincial governments and municipalities. Comparning the statement of February with that of a year ago, current loans were higher by \$46,000,000, and loans to provinces and municipalities by \$23,000,000. The immediate outlook is that the deposits will continue to grow sufficiently to meet hese increasing requirements.—Monthly Letter Canadian Bank of Commerce.

#### VICTORY LOAN BONDS SHOULD BE HELD.

Many good Canadian citizens are under the impression that having bought and paid for Victory Bonds it is not unpatriotic to dispose of them, and they have been encouraged in so doing by the offers made by manufacturers and tradesmen to take them in payment for goods. Generally speaking, bonds taken in trade are at once offered for sale and tend to depress the price and thus create a condition that will adversely affect the sale  $\iota_1$  future issues. As soon as a Victory Bond goes on the market the seller practically shifts his loan to the Government on to the shoulders of someone else. The only way to help the Government by the use of savings is to invest in these bonds and to hold them

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

"Upon the basis of the information which this registration will supply it is expected that the mobilization of Canada's resources in male and female labor can be proceeded with promptly and intelligently. If Canada is to do her full duty by the mother country and her European allies, the time may come when she must submit herself to some system of food rationing—something which cannot be done intelligently and equitably unless she has first secured accurate information as to the number and distribution of her population. 
