

Ontario Company to Suild Additional Plant at Falls.

Niagara Falls, Ont., Nov. 1.—Work has been started by the Ontario Power Company on the construction of an addition to its power plant below the river bank at the foot of the Hortzchoe Falls, which will provide for two additional generating units of 12,000 horsepower each. This will make a total generating specialty of power plant of approximately 148,000 hersepower.

The company has just secured the necessary permission from the Queen Victoria Park board to make excavations in the park above the bank, to provide for the spipes and penstecks. The work will be rushed during the winter and the units will be installed before spring.


