DEFENDS WAR RECORD

Did More To Help the Allies Through Industry Than He Could Have at Front.

Summerside, P. E. I. Oct. 3.-Before an audience of 3,500 people, Hon. W. L. Mackenzie King yesterday formally

accepted the nomination for Prince County. Mr. King, who was received with rousing cheers, devoted a considerable portion of his speech to what he said was an attempt to create the false im-

Authorities Claim To Have the Situation At Helena, Ark., Well in Hand.

So far more than 200 negroes have been taken into custody by the military and held under guard at Elaine. The known negro dead today was fourteen, with other bodies reported in the cane brakes and underbrush about Elaine, where most of the fighting occurred.

TO HOLD BACK PAY

Action of the Government Is Strongly Condemned by Many Influential Newspapers — The Government Defends Its Policy by Maintaining Move Is Made To Hasten End of the Dispute.

London, Oct. 3.—Negotiations between the Government and labor representatives other than railwaymen were resumed today in an effort to bring the authorities and the railway representatives together for a settlement of the railroad strike.

Crowds thronged Downing street this morning in expectation of a resumption of the conferences between the transport workers representatives and other trade unionists with Premier Lloyd George in the endeavor to mediate in the strike situation. The crowds were orderly, but the police nevertheless caused them to quit Downing street and move into Whitehall.

At an early hour a conference took place on the Government side in which the premier George N. Barnes, minister without portfolio, Sir Robert Horne, the minister of transportation, participated. At that time, no hour had been fixed for the renewal of the mediation effort, but shortly after noon it was learned that a deputation of the transport men and associated unions had gone to confer with the premier and the ministerys.

"The members of the National Union of Railwaymen broke their contracts and stopped work without notice, in complete disregard of the effect their action would have on the persons and property of ordinary citizens in their charge. 

Rev. He further expressed the opinion that his home had been entered and searched without legal cause, because no search warrant had been issued.







Sox Swat Ball but Free Passes by Williams Lose Them Hard Fought Battle to Winning Reds

CINCINNATI, Ohio, Oct. 2.—The Cincinnati Reds tightened their grasp on the world's series flag today by defeating the Chicago White Sox 4 to 2. As they also won the opener yesterday they need but three more games to land

the series.

Cincinnati has developed in the brief period of the series so far a habit of celebrating the fourth. There is nothing patriotic about it, for in this victory-mad town the "fourth" means an inning, not a holiday.

The game yesterday was safely stowed away in the fourth, and when that inning was reached today the fans emitted a roar in demand for an encore. In a measure, the Cincinnati batsmen responded, but the person who really took the demand to himself apparently was Claude Williams, the Sox lefthander, who was on the mound. He passed three batters, and three scored. An aviator flew close to the grandstand roof at this stage of the proceedings, but if he was looking for Williams, a wit in the press stand remarked, he flew altogether too low, From where Williams floated the 34-story insurance building looked like a speck on the landscape. In the sixth he passed another runner, and the latter scored, but the tally was not needed. The first three were enough. It was moted as unusual that all four of the Reds' runs were counted by players who had been passed to first. who had been passed to first.

Chicago's two runs came in the seventh inning, the result of two hits and an error by Cincinnati. The visitors garnered ten hits, but they were scattered throughout the game. The witness did not think that four tracks were too many for Toronto, but he thought that there were too many at Windsor for the benefit of racing. He would not admit that the owners of the Fort Erie track were professional racing men from the United States. On the contrary, Mr. Madigan, the principal owner, was a British subject.

W. P. Fraser, O.J.C., said that the discontinuance of racing had affected the enjoyment of many people, and that the O. J. C. meetings were social events of the greatest importance.



He put some comfort into the hearts of his followers in the meantime by declaring that under normal conditions there would be no general election until 1922, after the decennial census and redistribution or federal constituencies.





MANY MEMBERS OF PARLIAMENT FAVOR PATRONAGE SYSTEM

Outspoken Expressions of Preference for Old Style.

NEW CLASSIFICATION

Bill Ratifying It Is Given Second Reading After Discussion.

OTTAWA, Oct. 2.-Outspoken expressions of opinion in favor of returning to the old system of party patronage in preference to the administration of the civil service act by the civil service commission featured the second reading of Hon. A. K. MacLean's bill to ratify the new civil service classification. This classification was tabled in Parliament towards the end of the regular session and deals with both the inside and the outside service. It has since been subjected to considerable revision. Despite the many objections voiced in the House to the bill, it was given a second reading and referred to a special committee.

mittee.

The arguments of members opposed to the present civil service system were mainly to the effect that it was wrong both in theory and in practice; that the most efficient officials in the government service were named under the old system, because members made their recommendations with a sense of responsibility, and that better results would follow a return to the practices. old system, because members made their recommendations with a sense of responsibility, and that better results would follow a return to the practices that prevailed before the passage of the civil service act in 1908. Members who disapproved of the existing system included Hon. T. W. Crothers, former minister of labor; Dr. Edward C. Hocken and Thos. C. Foster (East York), while supporters of the abolition of political patronage included Dr. Charles Sheard, Dr. Michael Clark, R. L. Richardson and H. M. Mowat.

At a late hour D. D. McKenzie's motion, asking for the appointment of a committee to go into the matter of the Meighen code telegram and the taking of the soldiers' vote at the last general election was under discussion.

Hon. Jacques Bureau continued his speech of yesterday and read affidavits from two private soldiers who claimed that they had been ordered to vote for the Union Government under a threat of being transferred to infantry battalions if they refused.

Statement an Insult.

Brigadier-General Griesbach quoted Mr. McKenzie as having said that officers from the rank of general downward threatened men under their command with the front line. The only officers who would dream of issuing such a threat was a man who was a coward himself. Such a threat could be addressed advantageously to cowards, and cowards among officers and men in the corps. "It can only be repeated by cowards for the benefit of cowards," General Griesbach declared.

His declaration raised a storm. There were loud cries of "order." Mr. McKenzie angrily jumped to his feet.

"Does the honorable gentleman," he called out, "direct the charge of cowardice to me as a member of this House?"

"If the cap fits the honorable gentleman, he can wear it." General Griesbach sharply retorted, and again there were loud cries of "order."

Mr. Bureau broke into the fray. "I have just read two affidavits that threats had been made. Does the reading of those affdavits constitute cowardice?" he asked.

"I am speaking of the Canadian corps in France."

Gratuities There is also the gratuity which has been authorized, and has been and is being paid to assist soldiers to tide over the period between discharge and their re-adjustment to civil life. For this purpose alone, \$61,000,000 must be provided out of the Victory Loan 1919, in addition to the \$59,000,000 already paid out of the proceeds of the Victory Loan 1918.

Furthermore, soldiers who desire Land ' Settlement

to become farmers may, under the Soldiers' Land Settlement Act, be loaned money by Canada with which to purchase land, stock and implements. The money so advanced will be paid back; meantime each loan is secured by a first mortgage. Up to August 15th, 29,495 soldiers had applied for land under the terms of this Act; and 22,281 applications had been investigated, and the qualifications of the applicant approved. For this purpose Canada this year requires \$24,000,000.

Vocational For this work which, with the Vocational Training and Soldiers' Training Service Departments, embraces the major activities of the Department of Soldiers' Civil Re-establishment, an appropriation of \$57,000,000 is necessary.

These national expenditures are war expenses. They will be accepted readily by every citizen who gives thought to the task which Canada faced following the Armistice, and to the success with which she has met it.

By deciding to release temporarily W. J. Gray, investigator, the housing commission last night fairly well establish ed the fact that it does not mean to proceed with more work before the end of the year than it already has on hand. Mr. Gray has been employed with P. W. Wilson for some time investigating the various applications made to the housing commission, and deciding whether the applicants were qualified to receive loans. He received \$25 a week.

Only 30 Houses.

P. W. Wilson's duties as an investl-gator are also at an end for this year, apparently, and for the next two weeks he will be employed with Building Inspector A. M. Piper clearing up the general work of the commission. What his duties will be after that time is problematical.

This means that not more than 30 houses will be completed by the end of the year, and that little will have been done to relieve the housing problem which is acute. The 30 houses which the commission may have finished by

done to relieve the housing problem which is acute. The 30 houses which the commission may have finished by that time will go but a little distance in meeting Londoners home needs.

Where Blame Lies.

Those closely in touch with the problem say that the commission itself is not entirely responsible for this small result. Three factors, they claim, have been instrumental in delaying the work. One was the indecision of applicants as to the kind of house desired, location, the amount of money they wished to spend and other details. A second, was the lack of a sellingmanager, who would to some extent counteract this indecision in much the same manner that a successful salesman convinces the doubtful buyer.

Some members of the commission have steadily urged the appointment of such a man, who when an application for a house was received, would take charge of it, follow it through all the detail work, and not drop it until a house was under way for the applicant, or he had decided to withdraw. He would have definite information about each application, and there would be no doubt about them such as exists in the majority of cases today.




