BULLETIN. Belfast, Nov. 25.—The scenes of the sporadic outbreaks of bombing and shooting which have taken place in various parts of the city during the last few days were closely patrolled by crown forces during the night, and complete quiet prevailed early this morning.

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SAYS SUBURBAN ROADS SCHEME UNFAIR TO CITY

Members of Council Think London's Share of Upkeep Too Heavy.

AUTHORIZE MEETINGS

Will Give Municipal Candidates Four Chances To Discuss Public Issues.

The city council on Wednesday night authorized Mayor Little to call four public meetings, at which candidates for municipal office may discuss various questions of the day and place their platforms before the electorate.

The principal discussion at the short meeting of the council was on the suburban road question. It came up in the report of No. 2 committee in which the committee adopted a resolution condemning the suburban road scheme as being "wholly unfair" and protesting against making cities and towns contribute towards the upkeep of these roads.

Mayor Little left the chair so as to enter into the discussion on the clause. He stated that the matter had been up earlier in the year, and the city had to pay \$7,500 as a result of a suit with the county, as well as face a bill rendered since for \$22,000. A special committee had been appointed to consult with City Solicitor Meredith, and learned that even if the city did win out in the courts it would be little trouble for the Legislature to amend the act making it retroactive, so that the city would have to pay anyway.

Ald. Watkinson said that a resident of Eva and York streets was being made to pay for walks on both streets. He was told to appeal to the clerk.

Ald. W. A. Wilson succeeded in getting his motion endorsing the policy of tenders for all public work passed by the council, although it was defeated at the last meeting of No. 2 committee. He also presented a resolution, urging legislation be passed granting the wives of all property owners or tenants in the city the right to vote at municipal elections. At present only those assessed as co-owners or co-tenants get the vote.

City Clerk Baker was instructed to advertise the names of all candidates running for municipal office for four days, some time before polling day. The mayor will issue a proclamation, asking all employers of labor to let their hands off one hour extra at noon that they may cast their vote on municipal election day.

LONDON WOMAN IMPLICATED BY CORONER'S JURY

Mrs. Louise Leslie Still Held on Murder Charge in Toronto.

YOUTH ADMITS PAYMENT

Says He Gave Dead Girl \$65 for Services of "Party" From London.

[Special to The Advertiser.] TORONTO, Nov. 23.—We find that Eileen Lyons came to her death at the Toronto General Hospital on Nov. 13, 1921, as the result of blood poisoning caused by an illegal operation.

The jury is strongly of the opinion that the evidence points to Mrs. Louisa Leslie as having performed the illegal operation, and that Norman Urquhart and John Collins are accessories to the crime.

After hearing the final evidence in the case of Eileen Lyons, 17 years of age, who died after an illegal operation said to have been performed on Oct. 20, a coroner's jury sitting under Chief Coroner George W. Graham at the morgue last night, implicated Mrs. Louisa Leslie, the London woman said to have come to this city to perform the operation at the request of John Collins, a worker in a Queen street east candy parlor.

Admits Responsibility. Urquhart, the other of the three implicated, is the young man who took the responsibility for Miss Lyons being in the condition which necessitated the operation.

Mrs. Leslie is held on a charge of murder, and John Collins with having conspired with her.

From evidence which came out, it would appear that Mrs. Leslie had a number of Toronto "patients" for Alexander McDonald, manager of the Beresford Hotel, on Queen street east, where the prisoner stopped on her last trip, told of several young women coming to see her in addition to the Lyons girl.

Girl Sought Help. Urquhart said that a friend of his had introduced him to Collins. The friend lived in Riverdale, but his name was not given. At that time Miss Lyons had told Urquhart that she needed help.

He had visited Collins upon eight occasions and was finally told that the party from London would come down on Saturday, October 29.

He and Miss Lyons met Collins, and the other party, a woman, came along a few minutes after. Urquhart did not identify the woman, although no reason for his not being able to do so was brought out.

He had given Miss Lyons \$65, which was the price agreed upon. The meeting took place at the corner of Queen and Church streets at six p.m., and a further meeting was arranged for 8 o'clock, which also took place.

After this Miss Lyons and the woman went east from Queen and Sherbourne, where the second meeting occurred.

"By his very silence he admits his guilt. By remaining a supporter of such a government, by representing it in this election, he condones its actions.

"There is no reason why this could not have been done, as both parties are working towards practically the same end. However, I believe, the similarity of their ideals will make towards co-operation, when a new government has been established."

KING EXPLAINS WHY MEIGHEN CLOUDS ISSUE

Declares Premier Must Protect Big Interests at All Costs.

ASKS TARIFF REVISION

Denies Truth of Tory Cry That Party Demands Free Trade.

[BY WILLIAM SHARMAN.]
WOODSTOCK, Nov. 23.—Like the homecoming of a conquering hero was the reception tendered Hon. William Lyon Mackenzie King in Woodstock tonight.

Crowding the spacious armories to the doors, and jamming the corridors in a determined effort to catch but a glimpse of the Liberal chieftain, 3,000 Woodstock and North Oxford voters patiently awaited his arrival for more than an hour.

So hopeless became the situation that it was eventually necessary to hold an overflow gathering in the city hall, where waited for three solid hours 800 equally patient residents of the riding, and where Mr. King at 11 p.m. delivered his second address of the evening.

All day long into Woodstock four thousand voters from the rural districts, not only followers of the Liberal standard, but citizens representing politics of every shade, thronged the streets, and lay in particular stress on his contention that the Liberal platform did not include free trade.

Mr. King challenged the Right Hon. Arthur Meighen to state definitely just where the National Liberal and Conservative Party stood on the same issue.

"The Tories have been saying that I vary in my speeches," declared Mr. King, "but don't you think that by this time with all the press of the country at their disposal the Meighen forces might have secured two of these 'varying' speeches of mine and printed them side by side?"

"They have not and cannot. They certainly would not have overlooked the opportunity, and on these billboards you see, in place of Meighen rescuing old ladies you would see my speeches in double columns. It would have been great stuff. But they can't do it. For the past two years since I have been leader of the Liberal party and spoken these things in Canada I have not once varied relative to tariff.

Tariff Needs Revising.
"What I have said is this: The tariff needs revising. We note that thought from other sources. For example, from the lips of the governor-general, upon the advice of the Meighen administration. The latter admits that it has been convinced of the necessity for such revision, but that although a commission was appointed to investigate conditions with this end in view, nothing was ever accomplished.

"Why?"
"The government knew it would have to revise it up or down. If it revised it up it knew it would lose the support of the people, and if downward it would lose the support of the big interests behind it. So it was left alone."

"I want to say this: Premier Meighen has never yet told how he proposes to revise the tariff, up or down. He has been spending his time hounding me, and thus trying to avoid any expression on the subject, and at this moment you don't know what he stands for. I say it is the greatest piece of deception ever practiced upon a people."

"We see three members of that commission, Drayton, Robertson and Calder, who have at this time all this information which is the people's, but which they withhold. If it is to be the main issue this data should be presented to the electors for full discussion. What they found out but is still a secret is a necessity to us."

"How can we carry on a discussion in the dark? I say one of the strongest indictments against Premier Meighen is the very fact that as yet his minister of finance has maintained an absolute silence on the tariff issue."

Explains Issue Clearly.
"Clearly and concisely Mr. King once again defined the Liberal stand on the fiscal question."

"Do you know how much to be raised in taxes this year?" he queried. "Just \$569,936,000 without paying off one cent on the public debt. What is the sense then of any person declaring for free trade? And I say on behalf of the Liberal party that I do not stand for free trade because we feel that to raise this revenue it must be done by other means than direct taxation."

"How can we raise it? Our policy as I say is not absolutely free trade, but we must revise our tariff so as to get revenue, not to protect little mergers and combines but to protect Canadian industries and Canadian workmen."

"Do you think that in framing a tariff the Liberal party calculates to destroy our own industries? Our aim is the reverse. We seek to build them up and enter in again an area of prosperity. I say this to the manufacturer and workmen, that as far as the Liberal party is concerned, no legitimate business escaping legitimate profits need fear the return to power of the Liberal party."

"The Tories talk protection, but what do they say to Labor? They tell railroadmen high wages are responsible for high freight rates. I say 'propaganda.' They do not say anything about the big profits that were made by their friends as exposed by James Murdock, who quit a commission because his hands were tied."

Knows Tory Tactics.
"Protect the special groups with their interlocking of directorates. There's your protection for the workmen. I know something of Mr. Meighen's mentality and tactics, and if there is one thing he is skilful at it is clouding the main issue. That's the reason for the free trade cry. I say the issue is Meighen himself and his record."

"Pointing out that Premier Meighen had appointed, and was still giving away judgeships, etc., Mr. King continued, 'Let me say to the Progressives, you talk of progressive legislation. How do you expect to get it from men of the low mental calibre and type of

Premier Meighen, who will control the situation for years to come?"
"I say it will be a great struggle to get even moderate legislation. In view of this what folly it is for us Progressives, Farmers, Women's Councils, laboring people and returned soldiers, whose platforms vary but little fundamentally, to allow ourselves to be so divided as against a common foe. I say we need a strong party in the house. We must not divide the real true forces of progress. Now is the time to think. There is the great danger, and that is why I feel so strongly about the Progressives. I have always taken the position that the Progressives were advanced Liberals, and I have always pleaded for closer co-operation, hoping that when the fight came we might co-ordinate and co-operate in a firm stand for the common interests. Not a man living has ever said a word against the Progressives."

Raps Power Behind.
"There is a mighty power behind the Meighen party," declared Mr. King, "that does not dare show itself, or how would it be possible for anyone even of more experience than he to carry off? This power is not an influence for the good of the people, they who secret themselves behind the screen of protection vs. Free Trade. You have only to survey the recent disclosures by Jas. Murdock to realize this."

"This government is visible, but the real power is invisible, the special interests that are protected are the ones who are paying for these magnificent billboards and advertisements."

"The revelation by Jas. Murdock gave you an idea of this enormous fund."

"You had another taste of it last year, the sugar combine, and now later year, the Riddon Paper and Pulp Company, which we find pays the government with promissory notes."

"We are told by Sir Henry Drayton that there are others, but he can only tell his story to the house. That is a new version. I ask what law gave the government power to accept these

notes? The parliament makes the law, not the minister of finance. They think authority is vested in the prime minister and percolates downwards, but that's another form of old-fashioned Toryism."

"The Liberal leader covered a wide range of subjects and dealt at considerable length with the mismanagement and autocracy of Rt. Hon. Arthur Meighen's policy regarding the Canadian National Railways and related the unsuccessful efforts by himself and associates to seek information or gain free discussion of the same in the house."

TO HOLD LIBERAL RALLY IN SARNIA NOVEMBER 25
[Special to The Advertiser.]

CHANGE TIME FOR BORDER VOTERS
Act Allows Variation of Hours To Suit Electors.
OTTAWA, Nov. 23.—(Canadian Press.)—In a few municipalities down near the international boundary, the hours of voting on Dec. 6 will vary from the hours prevailing in other divisions throughout the Dominion. These are municipalities which come under a special provision of the Dominion elections act, stipulating that "upon application to the chief electoral officer by any municipality situated on or near the international boundary line, the chief electoral officer may in his discretion authorize a change in the hours of polling for all polls in such municipality in order to accommodate electors who are resident in Canada but whose occupation renders it necessary for them to be absent from Canada during the ordinary polling hours."

A few municipalities in West Lambton County, which is divided from Michigan only by the St. Clair River, have already taken advantage of this provision, and have been granted a change in hours. The general rule for polling hours throughout Canada is from 8 in the morning until 6 in the evening. In the municipalities indicated, however, the hours of polling will be from 9 in the morning till 8 in the evening.

Advance polls will also be held at a number of points for the benefit of railway employees, sailors and commercial travelers. Advance polls will be held between 7 and 10 in the evening of the three days, exclusive of Sunday, preceding election day.

BONES ALL THAT EXIST OF LANDRU'S VICTIMS
VERSAILLES, Nov. 23.—A small tin box containing a pound and a half of bones was passed around today for examination by the jury which is trying "Bluebeard" Landru for murder. The prosecution claims they are human bones, all that remain of the eleven alleged victims of the prisoner.

The defence challenges the authenticity of the bones.

FIND DEAN LEADS IN SOUTH OXFORD
House-to-House Workers Give Results of Canvass.
[Special to The Advertiser.]
TILSONBURG, Nov. 23.—Nomination day has spurred on all three contending candidates in South Oxford, and the battle is on in full force. Stating a precedent, probably actuated by the great public interest in the riding, the employees of the Tilsonburg Shoe Factory, Limited, stopped work today for 30 minutes, and gathered on the third floor to hear an address by the government candidate, Donald Sutherland, who dwelt on the tariff. It is fully expected the other two candidates will be given the same privilege.

Mayor Dean, Liberal candidate, has from two to four meetings a day billed until the evening of Dec. 5, and having made a reputation in temperance work, he is receiving a huge indemnity.

M. L. Haley, the U. F. O. candidate, has only a few meetings advertised, and is depending more on a house-to-house canvass.

Businessmen and house-to-house workers state that the government candidate will be found in the bottom column, and that at the present time Mayor Dean is leading the U. F. O. candidate by a comfortable majority.

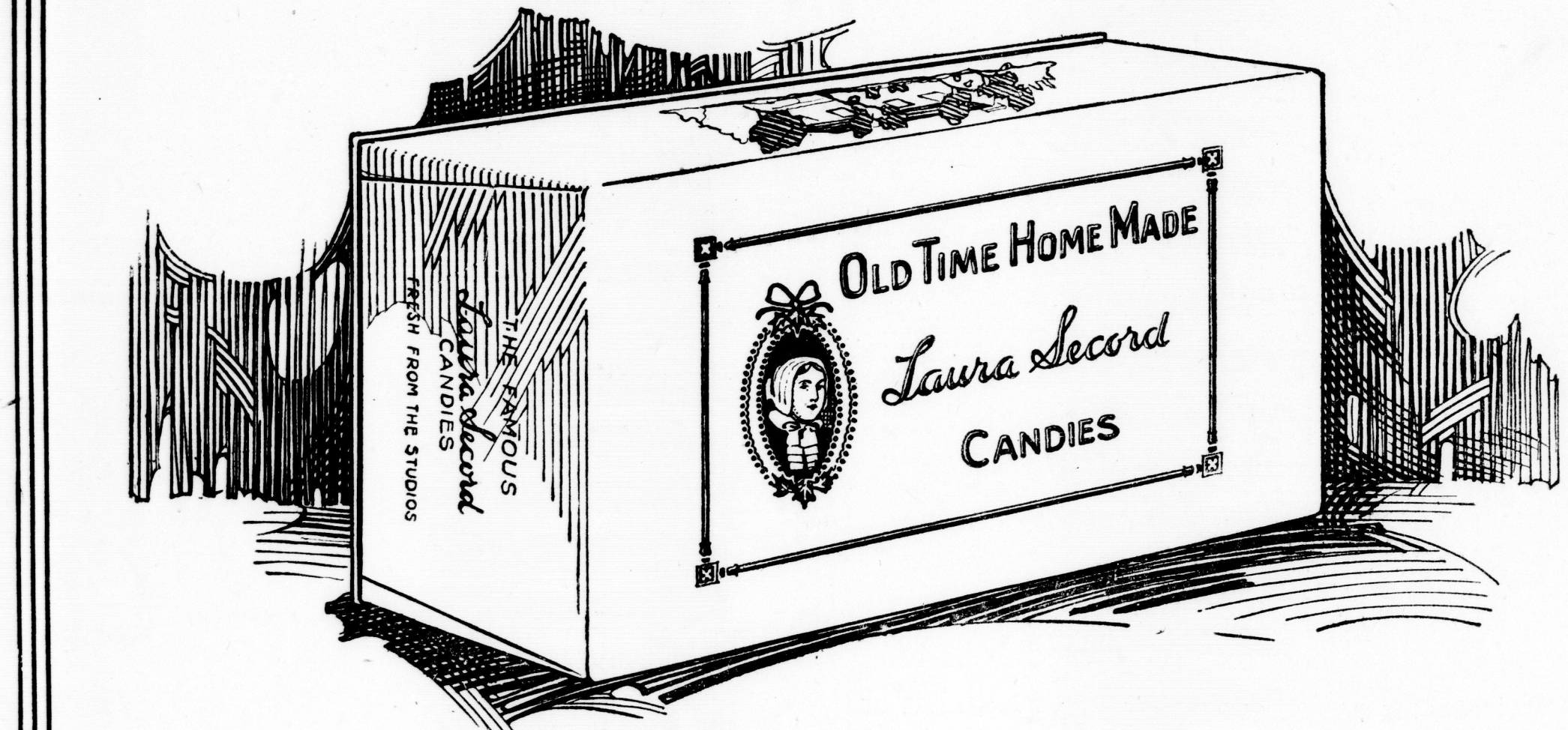

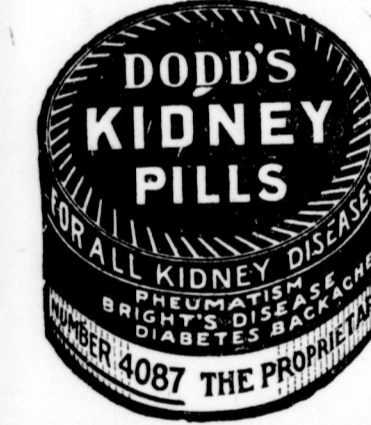

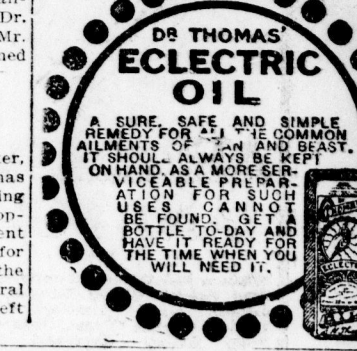

MAKE BIG PROFIT IN LIQUOR TRADE

VICTORIA, B.C., Nov. 23.—The British Columbia government made a profit of \$541,606 on liquor sales for the first three and a half months of operation under the Liquor Sales Board from June 15 to September 30, according to a balance sheet filed in the legislature this afternoon by Hon. J. W. DeB. Farris, attorney-general, in accordance with the terms of the Liquor Control Act. This does not include the \$121,000 received from the sale of permits. In accordance with the premier's promises, half these profits are to be divided among the municipalities on the basis of school population. Total

assets of the board are placed at \$2,502,751 with liabilities of \$1,961,135.

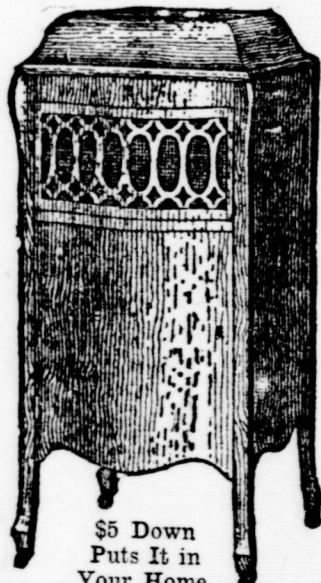
