Moscow, Jan. 26.—In a fight between strikers and soldiers last night, fourteen persons were killed and a num-ber wounded. The struggle began through the attempts of strikers to assemble in the Red Square. Expense of Administering the New Province Will Be Very Great.

Ottawa, Jan. 27. - From the conferences which have so far taken place between representatives of the Federal and Territorial Government it seems clear that reasonable generosity must govern the settlement of the financial terms upon which Provincial autonomy is to be conceded to the Northwest. It must be borne in mind that the difficulty and expense of administering a large and sparsely-populated area are far greater than where there is a population concentrated within a comparatively small district. In the Northwest two provinces of 160,000 square miles each could be easily formed, and while the population is scattered over an immense area, it is growing very rapidly, the influx of settlers from without being almost at the rate of 150,000 yearly. Hence it would seem the territories merit better terms than any of the provinces already in confederation, the conditions now entirely dissimilar from those which have heretofore had to be met. In the other provinces, too, the per capita ax is limited to a certain proportion of the population. While that might be a safe and proper thing to do where the growth and maximum number of the population could approximately be foreseen, it would hardly perhaps be bounds as in the case of the Northwest, and so it would appear to those who have given thought to the question that the territories may get better treatment than any of the older provinces, and that there will not be the same limitation as to the number of population earning the capitation allowance of 80 cents per head. WIFEBEATER SUICIDES Drives Spouse From House and Then Hangs Himself.

Groons committed suicide last evening following a row with his wife. After supper Groons pummelled his wife, in terror, and when she returned to the house with friends, found Groons hanging from the balustrade. Evidently Groons after placing the noose about his neck, vaulted over the railing, breaking his neck by the shock. He was about 23 years of age and a hard-working, steady man.

This is the keynote of Thomas W. Lawson's latest attack on the Wall street "system," published in the curstreet "system," published in the current issue of Everybody's Magazine. The article is "The Story of Amalgamated." It is merely the introductory chapter—prefaced by a review of the financial events of the last month.

Mr. Lawson refers to his advertised warning to Amalgamated stockholders, which was followed by a break in the market, and says the promoters attempted to recoup their losses by again unloading on the public the stock which they had been forced to buy at top-notch prises. He reprints Colonel W. C. Green's letter, threatening to arnihilate the Boston financier, and declares that Greene, speaking for the "System," failed to answer any of his charges.

"I simply republish is vituporation."

In the ineffectual general assault from Aug. 19 to 24, supported by no fewer than 400 big guns, the Japanese lost 10,000 men. One regiment alone lost 2,500, leaving only six officers and 200 men after the fight.

To these and many more casualties from actual fighting must be added losses from disease. From July to September, the hospital records showed 16, 000 cases of berl-beri.

The most fearful losses for both sides resulted from the long prolonged fight for the famous signaling position on 203-Meter Hill. When the first direct assault on this position was attempted Sept. 20 almost an entire Japanese regiment, the second of the line, was wiped out.


