On good authority it is announced that Japan has consented to President Roosevelt's compromise proposition. This permits Russia to "pur-chase" Sakhalin, Japan waving its cession. Japan is to send in a bill—a good stiff one—for the keep of the Russian prisoners, which, coupled to the price of Sakhalin, will really constitute an indemnity. Russia will thus save her face, as legally she will not have paid an indemnity. The matter was today placed before the Czar by the American am-bassador to Russia. If the re-port be correct, the Japanese have scored a brilliant diplomatic triumph by throwing the responsibility of further conflict upon the

SETTLEMENT IN CZAR'S HANDS

The Suggestion Is for Russia to Buy Sakhalin, Thus Furnishing Indemnity Under Another Name.

Portsmouth, N. H., Aug. 22. — It is now possible to reveal substantially the suggestion of President Roosevelt for breaking the existing deadlock in the peace negotiations and rescuing the conference from failure.

His solution would ingeniously permit the satisfaction of the Japanese demands for reimbursement for the cost of the war and at the same time enable Russia to face the world with the declaration that she had not ceded a foot of territory or paid a kopeck of war tribute to the victor. The solution is the one which heretofore has been described as the natural and logical compromise.

Tersely stated, it consists in an agreement by Russia to repurchase presents of either all or half of the Sakhalin Island, now in the military occupation of Japan, for a sum, the amount of which, if the two countries cannot agree, shall be decided by some method of arbitration hereafter deter-



GULF STREAM GETS MOVE ON Steamer Captain Says It Boosted

His Ship 90 Miles in a Day. Boston, Aug. 23.-Interesting reports garding the Gulf Stream were made by Capt. Welch of the steamer Craigronald which arrived in the harbor from Hayana. Capt. Welch says the stream aided his vessel from 230 to 240 miles between Florida and a point about 160 miles north

Capt. Welch declared that never in his sailing career had he found the current so strong as it was on the present trip, though greater speed is looked for during August and September.

His steamer was helped along, he says, about 90 miles one day, while another day it was boosted 80 miles, and on a third occasion about 70. 

Bayfield Fishermen

WHEN THEIR BOAT CAPSIZED

One Lashes Himself to Craft, But Is Driven to Take to the Water and Perishes.

Bayfield, Aug. 22. - The search for the bodies of the two fishermen, William Bailey and William Wood, lost Saturday with James Ferguson, in the capsizing of their boat, the Daisy, still continues, and, as the details of their desperate fight for life are learned one of the most dramatic stories of the lakes is unfolded.

How James Ferguson, lashed to the pump log and net box by his suspenders, battled with the gale all Saturday afternoon, how he struggled all Saturday night and Sunday morning, to reach land, never will be known.



Nowadays we are inclined to take our exercise by proxy. We go to a ball game, and cheer lustily, and go home and imagine the exercise did us good. It is a fact that the strenuous games are decaying in this country. Rugby no longer is popular as an exercise and game. Lacrosse is a profession, baseball likewise. They will soon be in the same category as prize-fighting and professional athletics, that is, something we pay money for to amuse us, but as a means of exercise to the masses of our youth, not worth a whit. Let this game of cricket be encouraged. London is big enough to support a fine team. Let's have one.

The automobile is increasing in popularity in this country, and the number of machines is increasing very rapidly. Auto racing has not yet come in vogue to any degree in this country as yet, but Toronto has the American bee buzzing busily in its bonnet, and has been tempting fate along this line. It is instructive, therefore, to read the comment of the sporting writer on the auto racing game in the States. He has but little use for it.

Track automobile racing has about served its time. Americans are not so delirious after excitement that they like to watch a sport where the odds are about 3 to 1 against one of the participants being killed. The only reason automobile races on circular tracks have not resulted in more fatalities than they have is because the field of foolhardy individuals engaged in it has been small. There was not enough competition to force the men engaged in the racing to take desperate chances in order to win. But there is no call for such a dangerous pastime. Plenty of safe and sane sports may take its place. A minimum of danger may be regarded as a desirable element in a sport. It is a good education, sometimes, for a boy and prevents him from becoming timid or effeminate. That is the redeeming feature in college football, rough as it is, for too often the lines of socalled education lead away from some of the fundamental and necessary ideas of manhood. The mind is educated in certain channels at the expense of others possibly more important. But football, while it requires physical hardihood and pluck, is not foolhardy. It is not dangerous, if the rules are observed, when those engaging in it have received the proper physical training. But in track automobile racing, and even in track bicycle riding, especially behind motor pace, the element of danger is entirely too great and physical benefit to participants is comparatively small. It is more like the old contests of gladiators than a modern sport. And it is hardly practicable to make it other than extremely dangerous. The general criticism against automobile racing, even now, is that it lacks keenness of competition. Those who have gone to motoring meets will recall having seen few contests in which the competitors were close together. The closer the contest the greater the danger, so that from any point of view it looks like a good sport to strike off the list. On the other side of the Atlantic track automobile racing is little practiced. Road racing against time, where the competitors start at different intervals, is the vogue there. The suggestion that the inside fences be removed at all tracks where automobile racing is held in this country does not help matters a great deal. The sport is not a sane one, nor is that of motor cycle racing on the track much better.
