There is a very interesting account of the Queen's visit to Oxford when her eldest son was staying thire. He arrived about nine, and I found an opportunity of reminding General Bruce of his promise to introduce me to the Prince, which he did at the next break of conversation. to the Prince, which he did at the next break of conversation. His Royal Highness was talking with Mrs. Fel-lowes. He shook hands very graci-ously, and I began with a sort of apology for having been so importunate about the photograph (referring to "Lewis Carroll's" attempt to photo the Prince on his first arrival at Christ Church.) He said something about the weather being against it, and I aske i if the Americans had victimized him much as a sitter. He said they had, but he did not think they had succeeded well; and I told him of the new American process of taking twelve thousand photographs in an hour: Edith Liddell coming up at the moment, I remarked on the beautiful tableaux which the children might make. He assented, and also said, in answer to my question, that he had seen and admired my photographs of them. I then said that I hoped, as I had missed the photograph, he would at least give me his autograph in my album, which he promised to do. Thinking I had better bring the talk to an end, I con-cluded by saying that, if he would like copies of any of my photographs, I should feel honoured by his accepting them. He thanked me for this, and then I drew back, as he did not seem inclined to pursue the conversation." inclined to pursue the conversation."

The language in which Royalty is written of is ordin-arily so stiff and formal that these affectionate allusions of the Queen to her son and his fair consort seemed to take us into her confidence and to row aside the veil of formality and remonial which ordinarily divides a

nonarch from the people.

Assassination of the Czar. The year 1879 was one of considerable gloom in England, for bad harvests and great depression of trade were added to the continued war which had already entailed much distress. Political restlessness followed, and in 1880 came the extraordinary turn of the tide which landed Mr. Gladstone in power with a large majority behind him. With the advent of a new Government, it seemed as though things took a turn for the better, and the commercial outlook was certainly brighter. Queen Victoria's grandson—now the German Emperor—the eldest son of the Crown Princess of Prussia, was married in 1881, and the event was of special interest to his Bitt. But soon after the wedding bells had rung came the terrible news of the assassination of the Czar Alexander I. on March 15th, 1881. The Prince- and Princess, as has been mentioned, were old friends of the Emperor and the tidings made a very deep impression on them. The shock was all the greater because the sister of the Princess was the wife of the ruler who now came to the throne of the Russian Empire. Besides, all such events affect every member of all the Royal families, for they cannot but feel how precarious their own life is. The Princess of Wales was much depressed by the shock which she received, and it was some time before she could get over it. That summer the family gathering in Denmark was shadowed by the constant thought of the death of one who had always enjoyed so keenly his release from police supervision and the sense of freedom which was so impossible in Russia. The Czar said once to the daughters of the Prince: "Goodbye, my dears, you are going back to your happy English home: I am going back to my Russian prison." event was of special interest to his Bit.





ELECTRICAL LEAKAGE.

One of the Great Dangers Which Threaten Men.

The greatest dangers which threaten nan are generally invisible to the victim, and among these none is more productive of disastreus consequences than "electrical lenkage," the selfsame leakage used by the natives of all hot climates to lower their temperatures. As no organic function can take place except by means of electrical currents, so it can be easily understood that if these currents leak from our bodies the loss of power must be distinctly harmful. A common instance of this loss of electricity from our bodies consists of what we call a nervous shock, the scientific explanation being that a sudden egress of electricity takes place owing to the violent mental impressions involuntarily foroing a current of power through channels which had not been previously open to receive them.

"This," remarked a scientist, "is but one case among a thousand of the ways in which we uselessly expend our vital power. The electrical waste of a person is entirely due to his surroundings -the seat upon which you sit, the table upon which you write, the floor, the ceiling, the fireplace, the rays and colors of light which surround you, all may be instrumental in absorbing your electricity, to the great detriment of your health. Red or yellow light waves excite electricity within you, blue and violet waves exhaust it, while green waves are practically neutral in their

effect. "The air you breathe places you in direct communication with the walls, windows or hearth of your room; if, owing to the manner in which they are constructed, they place you in electrical communication with the soil on which your house is built, an 'earth return' is formed, and the electricity in man's condenser-the brain-is drawn out of the body. When one stands in the vicinity of a place of electrical exhaustion one ought to face it, as the base of the skull and spine, being the center of the nervous system, are more sensitive to outside influences than is the more covered front of the body. This is why one feels so tired when sitting with one's back to a fire; the flames serve as conductors and extract the force from the exposed nervous centers."

New Orleans, La., July 10 .- Pestilence is threatening in Jefferson parish, along Harvey's canal, just across the river, because of a blockade of fish. The waterway is literally choked with them. They have died by the millions, and since Saturday night big gangs of Negroes have been at work, employed by manufacturers along the canal, pitchforking the dead fish out

of the water and carting them away. The situation is as serious as unpre cedented, Navigation in the canal has been suspended. The immense cypress plant of the Louisiana Cypress Luniber Co., employing several hundred hands, has been forced to close down The atmosphere is polluted by the poison. Families living along Harvey's canal and in the neighborhood of the mill are fleeing from the place and seeking refuge on this side of the
