

Trinity Church

AN HISTORIC CHURCH-FULL OF YEARS AND HONOURS.

S WE have entered upon the seventy-fifth year in our history, it may be of interest to those who worship with us, to know something of the past, and of the work which in the Providence of God, has gone on from year to year. It is something that all who belong to the Church need not be ashamed of, and which could only have been carried out through the goodness

of a loving Heavenly Father. Way down among the smoke and dirt and dust of factories, in a section of the city notable more for its industrial than its fine arts, amid surroundings that are homely and uninteresting stands Trinity Church.

Three quarters of a century has passed since it arose in 1843, a magnificent piece of architecture, that was the pride of faithful church-

Within its walls were wont to meet the ancestors of those whose industry and enterprise in these later days have given Toronto an enviable position amid the beautiful cities of the world.

Upon the musty records in its archives are inscribed names that are honoured in civic history for probity and integrity and fondly cherished in affectionate remembrance of this generation.

Now the walls of Trinity stand like some weather beaten mausoleum, burying within itself the greatness and glory of the past.

All over this city are scattered thousands of people whose feet have crossed its threshold, and whose heads have bowed in adoration before God, to whom it was dedicated so long ago. And in the quiet city of the dead, forever rest many who, in the time honoured past, united their voices in the celebration of its beautiful ritual, and doubtless found therein that comfort and guidance that smoothed their pathway to the grave.

Just as this generation of people surrounds itself with greater magnificence and elegance of living, in every way, so this old historic church, once itself great, has been far outstripped by larger, more pretentious and more elegant edifices—slowly but surely it has seen the city growing away from its nurturing care, and reaching for greater beauty and glory towards its northern hill-country, and along the western and north

eastern thoroughfares until not much more of it is left than sacred associations and tender memories.

But even with all its forsakement the old church has a vitality that is remarkable. One parish after another has been taken from its territory, one family after another has left its pews to find a new church home more convenient to their residence.

A long procession has gone from its doors never to return, but even with all this draught upon its strength, its energy, though impaired, is unabated, and it deserves special notice for its present worth and work,

as well as for the history attending to it.

In Toronto's Church of England history, St. James' Cathedral and Trinity Church are indissolubly united because they are the two oldest parishes in the city—Trinity building however is the older, as the Cathedral has been destroyed by fire twice—as to the material fabric of Trinity Church, its erection was chiefly due to the exertions of Mr. Alexander Dixon, an Alderman of Toronto, and uncle of the present rector, who secured the grant for the church and was the moving spirit in securing subscriptions, being ably assisted by Messrs. Wm. Gooderham, J. G. Beard, Joseph Shuter, Enoch Turner and Samuel Mitchell.

There is a patriotic enthusiasm among its present members, which is perhaps unsurpassed in the city, and has given of its very best for the cause of justice and righteousness in the present great war. Five hundred and twenty-three, have joined the colors, every one of them a volunteer—and as far as can be ascertained, sixty-five have laid down their lives. Nor are the young of the neighbourhood overlooked, as the Sunday School for the years 1916 and 1917 according to compiled statistics, was the

largest in Toronto.

The church is known to many people as "Little Trinity" in order to distinguish it from the larger Trinity Church on Trinity Square, and which came about in this way—an unknown benefactress (we believe the name is known now) left money for an endowment, on condition that the church should be called Trinity Church. As there was already a Trinity Church in the city, some perplexity arose as to the matter, so the difficulty was solved by calling the Yonge St. church Holy Trinity and the church of this sketch is known far and wide as "Little Trinity."

Trinity Church celebrated its jubilee in 1893, and there were present at the anniversary services, some two or three individuals who fifty years before as young people had heard the first sermon preached in the build-

ing by the Bishop of Toronto-Dr. Strachan.

When the church was first erected, like nearly all other Anglican Churches, it had extensive galleries. These have all been removed and the arrangement of the pews altered—these in the old days were the old-fashioned high-backed class, now the seats are low, and afford no chance for an attendant at the service to slumber unawares.

It is not generally known that the late Bishop of Huron, (Bishop Baldwin) whose memory is revered by all that knew him, was at one

time Assistant Minister in Trinity.

The brick school house in the rear of Trinity Church facing on Trinity St. and forming part of the present Sunday School building was erected by Mr. Enoch Turner in 1848. Mr. Turner was a benevolent Englishman who prospered in this immediate neighbourhood and died in 1866. He left by will to Trinity church £500.

Several of those who taught in the Sunday School many years ago, went into the Ministry—and no less than five celebrated Judges were at one time connected with the church and Sunday School, viz., Chief Justice Robert Harrison, Judge Sir Charles Moss, Sir Matthew Crooks Cameron, Hon. S. H. Blake, Senator Sir James Lougheed, leader of the Senate of

Canada, and Emerson Coatsworth.

There are several mural tablets in the church, one in memory of the wife of the late Canon Sanson, one in memory of Rev. William Honeywood Ripley, who served for six years "without money and without price," one in memory of William Gooderham, one of the original founders and largest benefactors, one in memory of Harriet Gooderham Worts, wife of William Gooderham, one in memory of James Gooderham Worts, and another in memory of Sarah Worts, his wife.

The church is immediately noticeable on account of its antiquated appearance and rather quaint architecture, being what is known as the undecorated perpendicular Gothic, such as was popular in England at the close of the thirteenth century. At the time that it was built it was intended to run up a spire of 30 feet, but the money was wanting, and it

remains spireless to this day.

The present territorial limits of the parish are Sherbourne on the west, Queen on the north, the Don on the east, and the bay on the south.

The rise of Trinity Church came about as follows: In the early "forties" the part of the city where the church stands, was called the Park—many of its residents were members of the United Church of England and Ireland, and they earnestly desired the establishment of a church of their own faith. No other Protestant denomination had a church in this section and this fact rendered the building of one more feasible. So on the 12th day of July, 1842, a couple of gentlemen met in he house of Mr. Reynolds, on King St. (in the park) and resolved to buy land and proceed with the erection of a church. A contract was entered into for the building of the present edifice at a cost of £1800 (\$9,000).




