Manifestly every existing company was incorporated under one of the previous acts, and hence its rights were "otherwise provided for by an act."

The Repealing Clause. Then under the repealing clause it is provided that such repeal of the former acts shall not be held or taken to in any way alter, limit, or effect the corporate existence, the rights, privileges, powers and liabilities of any incorporation under the said repealed acts, or any or either of them; but it is expressly mentioned that certain provisions of the act, namely, the eighth part and sections 37, 38, 89 and 90, should apply to every company incorporated under any of the said repealed acts: which was a reasonably clear intimation that an existing company would only be affected by those particular clauses of the 1897 act.

Continuing his examination of the act Mr. Galt showed that the seventh part, relating to procedure against unregistered extra-provincial companies, contained nothing new, and was in itself a tedious and expensive process. He pointed out that the eighth part, relating to the voluntary winding up of companies, afforded no new rights, inasmuch as the act of 1890, section 44, already covered the ground.






